Court Watching:

Judge dismisses charges against defendant in hotel fraud case

Jenmond Neiltavius McCullum, 22, of Sumpter Township was charged with fraud, use of a computer to commit a crime (maximum sentence 10-20 years), and identity theft on July 16 in Van Buren Township.

He was set for his probable cause conference on Nov. 1. His live preliminary exam was set for Dec. 20. Personal bond was \$20,000.

On Dec. 20, Judge Oakley dismissed charges without prejudice part way through the preliminary exam and the prosecutor said the charges will be refiled with the witnesses needed for the testimony.

Defense attorney Kerry Martin had objected to evidence he called "heresay" and said, "You've got to have somebody here from Kalitta." Judge Oakley agreed.

One witness had testified on Dec. 20. Renson Hanna, regional manager of Hampton Inn, Holiday Inn Express, and other hotels, testified to what went on at one of his hotels from July to October 2023.

He said they have a computer program where you can check the room occupation and other details and they found a pattern of fraud. He testified airline employees could bill their company for lodging and some of those listed were fraudulent and not authorized by the airline.

The defense attorney convinced the judge there should be direct testimony on that evidence instead of the witness just saying he saw something.

City Council sets goals for new year in Jan. 2 session

Most of Belleville City Council's 63-minute regular meeting on Jan. 2 was spent setting goals for the new year.

Led by City Manager Jason Smith, council members put their thoughts in writing on six paper sheets Smith had affixed to the wall behind the council table.

He had asked them to put the goals they want on: Police & Fire, Parks, Economic Development, Citywide Misc., Roads & Sidewalks, and DPS.

Mayor Ken Voigt wrote his goals and then wrote the goals that Mayor Pro-Tem Kelly Bates called in to him. She was absent due to illness, but was watching by Zoom.

When they were done writing everything on the sheets on the wall, Smith asked them to put colorful 1st, 2nd, and 3rd stickers on the comments, selecting the most important.

He and Councilwoman Kissel then moved the sheets to the wall at the back of the meeting room so the public could see them better.

He said he would put all the ideas together

and issue a report for the council, sending it to councilmembers early and then putting it in the next council packet.

At the beginning of the session, Councilman Jeremiah Beebe asked if Smith had consulted with the directors of those different departments for their views and Smith said he hadn't yet.


"I feel kind of funny telling the police chief what their department goals are," Councilman Beebe said, adding his overall comment would be, "Just spend less

money."

The main goals for the police and fire departments were ordinance enforcement and recruitment, Smith said, reading off the sheet on the wall.

After the thoughts were on paper, Smith said it pretty much looks like the council mainly wants to clean up and take care of things which have been neglected over the last few years.

Goals included cleaning the gutters, senior transportation, beautifying Horizon Park, setting up a road program, and taking care of what had been deferred maintenance.

"It's internal," Smith said referring to the goals. "It's how we deploy the troops."

Mayor Voigt said he wants to see the leaf collection program reinstated, along with weekly street sweeping. He said the city cut back on those two services when it was in a period of retrenchment, but now it is recovered.

Smith said during Winterfest, he and Project Administrator Steve Jones were out on the street with shovels trying to get the leaves out of the drains.

Smith said he is certified to handle code enforcement and DPS Director Rick Rutherford can do code enforcement. He said they could assign someone to help.

"We've been in a reactive mode for some time and now we can become proactive," said Councilwoman Kissel.

She wrote a goal on the Citywide page: "Social media presence – manage our narrative & prevent mis-information."

Smith said with ordinance enforcement, you take the low-hanging fruit first, such as having trash all over. He said then you can get into the more involved infractions.

He said there is a plan to walk around downtown this spring to see what needs work. He said in his past jobs, he has given the residents an ample opportunity to clean up before enforcement.

In other business at the Jan. 2 meeting, the council:

- Approved accounts payable in the amount of \$61,555.97 and the following departmental purchase in excess of \$500: to Washtenaw Area Mutual Aid Association, \$1,500 for 2024 membership dues;
- Heard Smith report the new radar speed sign has been delivered and the city won't have to borrow Van Buren Township's sign any more. He also reported the car parts for the 2023 scout car repair have arrived and it is a three-day job. He also said the interview with an experienced police officer will be the next day and the FEMA funds came in and the city will write a check for \$330,000 to R&R for the new fire truck, withholding a small amount for a piece that is yet to come;
- Learned the requested extension for

the annual audit was approved by the state and the city has until May to complete it. The system was tied up with a computer problem. Smith also announced the CapCon for the Michigan Municipal League (MML) will run March 12-13 at the Lansing Center and he plans on going. He said it is a worthwhile event to attend for those on the council, as well, with lots of information and contacts with legislators;

• Heard Smith recommend getting the MML attorney to come in to give "The Essentials of Local Government" session for a joint meeting of the City Council,

Planning Commission, and Downtown Development Authority. It takes from 1½ to 3 hours and the cost is \$1,800 total, including travel, which would be divided among the three groups. Also he announced the old generator and old dump truck are in an auction ending Jan. 17;

- Heard Councilwoman Kissel announce that her son, fire fighter Garrett Kissel, has offered to make photo badges for council members. All they have to do it give him their favorite photos, she said;
- Learned the firewall for the city internet service is ordered and Smith said they hope

to have it that week. He said the internet work by the new company the city hired will begin the next day; and

• Heard Councilman Jeremiah Beebe ask about the water being so expensive in the city. "We charge a *lot* of money for water," he said, noting this is hard on seniors and those on fixed incomes. Smith said something weird is going on in the digital water readings with the same round numbers coming up every month on some readings. He said DPS Director Rick Rutherford and he are keeping an eye on it, but there has not been a full audit.

Sumpter OKs \$6,534.93 repair to lift station generator

Sumpter Township Public Works Director John Danci told the township board at its regular meeting on Dec. 12 that a backup generator for a lift station at the corner of Willis and Rawsonville roads was leaking coolant and needs to be repaired.

He presented a proposal for \$6,534.93 from Cummins, the company that installed it in 2004 and maintains it. He said \$2,600 is for labor and \$2,500 for actual parts. They will have to remove about 30 to 40 bolts to get to the inside and can't just swap out parts, he said.

It will take about a week or two to repair it, he said. He said it only has 590 engine hours on it.

Director Danci said this backup generator services the last pump station out of the township that sends the sewage to Ypsilanti. He said if there is a power outage in that area, and the backup generator turns on, it will leak coolant all over the Red Rooster parking lot. He said it turns itself on a for a 10-minute test each Wednesday morning, but they have turned it off completely because it leaks coolant all over the place.

He said it is a large task to take out the the backup generator on a trailer that they have and the way it has to be at the site is dangerous. He said a car nearly hit it on Thanksgiving night.

Danci said he didn't even ask about the price of a new backup generator because he knows it is very expensive and that it will take a long time to get.

Trustee Don LaPorte said maybe the township should look at other companies and he wants to make sure the process is cost-effective.

"I would consider this critical," said Trustee Tim Rush, recommending it be put on that night's agenda for action. He said with just 590 hours on it, the cost for repair is a drop in the bucket.

Danci said this pump station is larger than the other pump stations in the township and if it goes down it affects a lot of people.

He said in early November Cummins did its preventive maintenance check on the

generator and it passed everything. He said it was all bolted and the coolant put in and an hour or so later, the coolant was gone. The repair cost was put on the agenda and

unanimously approved by the board.

In other action at the one-hour workshop and regular board meeting, the board:

• Approved a resolution approving three 2024 Wayne County permits, A-24044, A-24099, and A-24133;

- Approved a five-year Axon agreement at a total cost of \$15,292.80 to outfit the additional patrol unit with an Axon Fleet 3 camera system;
- Approved posting and hiring a nonunion, temporary, 90-day DPW employee at the hourly rate of \$16.04 with the hour not exceeding 29 per week for the months of January, February, and March;
- Approved the ratified Michigan Association of Fire Fighters local agreement for July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2027, with Trustee Don LaPorte abstaining because he is a fire fighter;
- Heard township attorney Rob Young say Freedom of Information Act requests were submitted to Wayne and Washtenaw counties concerning the misplaced water line on Rawsonville Road and they had little to no response from the counties. He is focusing on attorneys at the county and drain commission. A claim may be filed concerning who made the mistake on that water line. He has taken this action since the special board meeting on Dec. 6, he said. "We're full-court-pressing as of today," he said;
- Heard Township Manager Anthony Burdick report that the required ARPA (American Recovery Plan Act) document was filed and will be filed again in March, trash recycling has resumed, the township hall door is secure after the alarm was set off Dec. 9 by someone trying to open it, the first interment in Martinsville Cemetery since 2015 was to take place Dec. 23, and he is asking department heads to decide what they want in the upcoming budget;
- Heard Mary Ban speak during public comment saying people have taken offense to what she said at the Nov. 28 meeting

about communication with the residents. She said the quarterly newsletter is very nice, but it is not sufficient to tell the people what's going on. "People would like more," she said. "I would like to have everyday comments." She also said the roads are absolutely atrocious and they are just potholes. She said residents got their tax bills and wonder what Wayne County does for them for those taxes. She said she went to the open house at the museum and said it was very nice to see the big murals on the wall.;

- Heard Trustee Tim Rush say he was at the last meeting of the Council of Western Wayne and learned the Great Lakes Water Authority will be reimbursing communities 100% for the overages they had to pay for water for Highland Park over the last ten years. He said Sumpter is not involved with the sewer payments. He said CWW is paying \$140,000 for audits of all the CWW communities for use of coordinated air space in Southeastern Michigan. Doing the audit will be Air Space Link, a FAA contractor who has been attending CWW meetings. He said drones are coming, with drones making deliveries, taking pictures of private citizens, and if the air space is not coordinated your drone won't leave the ground. "We're covered," he said referring to drones used by him and Treasurer Bart
- Heard Trustee Peggy Morgan say she agrees with Ban and she realizes the board doesn't care for the Independent, but the township had more volunteers and more bids when the township used the Independent. "You may not agree with what she writes," she said. "It's a hard copy. In the new year maybe we can switch back to the Independent." Rush cut in to ask why the Independent isn't writing about township events and, "You need to talk to her." He said he remembers what the editor has done to individual board members. "It's sad," Morgan said to Ban. "All you can do is try"; and • Heard LaPorte say he'll be out on
- Heard LaPorte say he'll be out on medical in January and will be absent from the January meetings.

Fentanyl, ketamine in neighborhood sends chills

A recent 34th District Court case had testimony from a Belleville Police officer who said 56 fentanyl pills were discovered in a car he stopped at the corner of Third and North Liberty streets in Belleville. That was on May 2, 2021, but the case was just being

Charges against the defendant were dismissed by the judge because the defense attorney convinced her that his client didn't know the pills were in the car because he had borrowed the car from someone else. Although the defendant had scales in his pocket, pills are counted out and not distributed by weight, and no one was using drugs. There was no evidence to prove the intent of distribution. And, all the cash in his pocket was from money from the government stimulus checks since it was during the pandemic.

The police officer testified this is a very dangerous drug to the community. He told of how he and his partner carefully checked their Narcan to make sure they had it in case they touched the dangerous drug

Another recent news release from Detroit Metro Airport said on Dec. 13 U.S. Customs and Border Protection agents intercepted 110 pounds of ketamine in a traveler's baggage.

We're sure the local police see drugs every day and we don't hear about it. But these two recent public stories send a chill to our communities because they show how close these drugs are to our families.

EXTRA THINGS I KNOW

We had two people come into our office on Jan. 2 to tell us a WDIV Channel 4 television camera truck was at Belleville City Hall and the newsperson was talking to the city manager. It didn't seem like breaking news.

That night at the city council meeting, I asked City Manager Jason Smith about it and he said crewmembers from Channel 4 were doing mini-interviews and laying out the process for a live news "In Your Community" telecast from Belleville in early February.

He said there were many on-line votes for Belleville to be a site for the live telecast and the channel has special telecasts from different places. He said Martha Hanoian of the chamber set it up.

Jason said he believes the live telecast from Belleville will be set up in the Belleville High School Commons. He said the crew will be back in town with its drone and to do other short interviews in preparation for the February telecast.

Jason and Hanoian took WDIV personality Karen Drew and her cameraman to the Rusted Crow on the Lake, Gloria Jean Café & Bakery, and the Butcher Shop and Channel 4 will be doing a story on the Denton Road Bridge and Five Points, Smith reported.

The "Help Me Hank" personality, Hank Winchester, will also be coming to town to hang around and do a story.

On Christmas Day there was a hot police pursuit through the tri-communities that started in Washtenaw County and ended in a crash near the landfill at the corner of Ecorse

and Hannan roads in Van Buren Township. That was discussed, as well, at the Jan. 2 city council meeting. Councilman Randy Priest said he saw a police car turn from East Huron River Drive to Madelon Street on two wheels. He lives near that corner.

A person on Savage Road said he saw police cars going 90 mph past his house.

Belleville Police Chief Kris Faull said Belleville Police weren't involved in the chase because there was just one patrol car on duty and it was at the other end of town when the cars sped through.

Chief Faull said she was told it started with the Flock cameras finding the stolen car with the two people in it that Washtenaw was chasing. Chief Faull, who lives in rural Sumpter Township, said she was at home and her husband told her a high-speed police chase just went by their house. She called in to find out about it.

We saw them go by our house, too, on Haggerty Road in southern VBT.

Van Buren Township had an "assist other department" call listed on its dispatch log for Christmas at about 2:13 p.m. at Van Born and Hannan. Then, a while later, there was the accident at 3:57 p.m., at Haggerty/

Chief Faull also confirmed a Dec. 20 report of sexual assault. I had been told the report came from Belleville High School and she said the call came from there, but the incident did not happen at BHS. There were two more juvenile complaints listed on the dispatch log for Belleville, one on Dec. 20 and one on Dec. 21. Chief Faull said those two calls were about kids getting hyped up

and misbehaving before winter vacation.

We publish the "Court Watching" items in our paper to show our readers how our local justice system is working. Some cases go on for years. Some are closed quickly. Some go on for a long time and then are dismissed. Since the 34th District Court is dealing with a wide variety of human beings, we see a lot of interesting situations and alleged crimes.


The "Court Watching" also shows what recent crimes have been allegedly committed in our communities. Sometimes the assaults

in domestic violence charges are dropped by the victim because the victim no longer wants to punish their husband or wife or grandson. Sometimes, a victim is just afraid to testify.



For years we went to court in Romulus every Wednesday and stayed for the morning to see all the local felony cases. After moving to the new courthouse and after COVID, now some cases are by Zoom and some are in person. We tried to go back to the old once a week for the felony cases, but that didn't work out. I ended up in a vacant courtroom because the judge was on Zoom that day.

It's great to watch the cases on live YouTube from my office, but Judge Martin is the only one who does that now. The others can be watched by Zoom, but often that gets turned off before the preliminary exams begin.

Sumpter OKs moving solar farms from Ag. District to Heavy Indust.

The Sumpter Township Board of Trustees approved the planning commission's recommendation to approve a solar farm ordinance amendment at its regular Nov. 28 meeting.

The amendment moves solar farms from Section 4.6.2 Special Land Uses in Agricultural District to I-2 Heavy Industrial District, Permitted Land Uses, Section 4.16.1(g).

In other business at the 54-minute workshop/regular meeting, the board:

- Approved the 2024 dates for township workshops and regular meetings;
- •Approved the supervisor's reappointment of Kathie Steigerwald to the Zoning Board of Appeals with a term to expire Dec. 17, 2026:
- Approved the proposal from Burnham & Flower for the 2024 medical, vision, and dental employee benefits totaling \$51,703 monthly, a 7.4% increase;
- Approved the new township employment application for immediate use;
- Approved closing township hall for the employee holiday luncheon from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Dec. 13;
- Approved the updated contract for Cari Ford accounting services;
- Approved the proposed Quarter 2 budget amendments;
- Removed from the agenda a proposal to approve the updated cemetery ordinance. It is expected to be on the Dec. 12 agenda for consideration (but was not on that agenda);
- Approved with regrets the resignation of fire fighter Eric Powell as of Nov. 21;
- Approved, with regrets, the employment separation of Michael Petrowski of the DPW with the total benefits bank payout of \$5,196.66. Burdick praised the work of Petrowski, but said he has been struggling with an illness for the last six months and has used up all his benefits as of the end of November. He is looking into COBRA benefits, Burdick said, adding, Petrowski is still not diagnosed, but his doctor will not allow him to come back to work;






