## **Belleville High School head football coach suspended until 2024 season**

By Rosemary K. Otzman Independent Editor Belleville High School's head football coach Jermain Crowell has been suspended by the Michigan High School Athletic Association for the rest of this season, all of next season, and will not be able to coach until the 2024 season.

## FBI investigates complaint by VBT resident, arrests suspect

Wendy Halsted Beard of Franklin, MI, was arraigned in U.S. District Court in Detroit on Oct. 14 on two arrest warrants, one for wire fraud and one for mail fraud and a Van Buren Township resident is one of the alleged victims.

Her preliminary examination was set for Nov. 4 and then was adjourned until Dec. 9 so the retained attorney she plans to hire will have time to review the evidence. She is free on \$10,000 unsecured bond.

Superintendent Pete Kudlak said the district is appealing the decision, but the district probably will not get a decision on that until after this season is over.

He said the school has no MHSSA sanctions based on the coach's suspension.

Supt. Kudlak said Crowell's suspension was based on the charge in The Detroit Free Press that he gave rides to Belleville to a Detroit student, now a senior, Jameel Croft, Jr., just before his freshman year. This would be a violation of MHSAA rules concerning recruitment.

Croft recently signed two statements saying that didn't happen, Kudlak said.

Crowell denies all the allegations. He had been suspended by the school and the MHSSA during the investigation and has been unable to coach the team on the field for the past few games.

Kudlak said Crowell has been cheering the team from the stands as it tries for a second state championship.

Belleville High School is a school-ofchoice school and has attracted several athletes who do not live in the Van Buren district.

In response to an Independent Freedom of Information Act request, the district said it had 65 members on its varsity football team in the 2021-22 school year and 60 in the present school year. The district denied the FOIA request to state how many of those were school of choice students who live in other districts, saying the district does not compile such information and such a record does not exist.

Kudlak said the district does not keep records on how many school of choice students it has and only looks into that on a case-by-case basis, when necessary.

He stated that Crowell bought a home in Van Buren Township and has been living there for the past two years. Kudlak said Crowell does not have any school of choice students living with him, contrary to some reports. Van Buren Township records show Crowell lives in Country Walk subdivision.

During the FBI's investigation, over 100 rare photographs with a combined estimated value of about \$1.6 million have been identified as being consigned to Beard and not returned or sold to victims without being delivered.

Bank records and other business records indicate there are likely to be more victims who have yet to be interviewed.

According to the criminal complaint filed by FBI Special Agent Julia MacBeth, there is probable cause to believe that Beard has executed a scheme to defraud by receiving valuable fine art photography prints on consignment, selling the artwork without the owner's knowledge and keeping the proceeds of the sale for personal gain.

In addition, Beard has sold artwork to victims and after receiving payment never delivered the artwork to the purchaser. There is also probable cause to believe that interstate wire transactions and interstate mail services were used to execute the scheme to defraud.

### **Belleville rushes past Detroit CC**, 33-10, advances to State Semis

Three fumbles, one interception, a little light snowfall, and limited passing for Belleville's Bryce Underwood, still wasn't going to be enough to stop the Belleville Tiger football team as members called upon their running game and defeated Detroit Catholic Central, 33-10, on Nov. 12, played at Belleville High School.

The victory clinched the Regional Championship title for BHS and set the stage for a State Division 1 match-up against Detroit Cass Tech (9-3) this Friday at 7 p.m. at Novi High School.

The winner advances to State Finals over Thanksgiving weekend at Ford Field.

It was the first game without a TD pass for Underwood, considered one of the best QB's in the country, as the freshman unleashed the ground attack as the Tigers ran for five touchdowns, two each from Jeremiah Beasley and Colbey Reed, and one from Jalen Johnson.

This Friday's game will be televised live on Bally Sports Detroit.

by Ansel Adams and other famous photographers that he had consigned to her for sale for a lump sum of \$40,000 in February 2020. The consignment was for one year and paid a 10% commission.

Beard said she had planned to take the photographs to a sale she was hosting in a Florida gallery.

Baughman, 69, a Pulitzer Prize-winning photojournalist and college professor, lost his life's work and art collection from the water used to fight a fire at The Waverly, the former Harbour Club apartments, on May 24, 2021.

Eighteen months after the consignment agreement ended, he said he has yet to get any money from the sale of the photos or to have them returned to him.

Baughman said he had great respect for Beard's late father, Thomas Halsted, and so had no problem in dealing with Halsted's daughter. Halstead established a gallery in Birmingham in 1969 and, according to the victims, was well-respected. He died in 2018.

According to the criminal complaint, one of Baughman's 20 photographs was "Human Pin Cushion, Maryland, 1961" by Diane Arbus, which Beard valued at \$8,500. This photo had originally been purchased by Baughman from Beard's father in 1972.

After about six months, Beard became evasive about the photographs, according to the complaint, and Baughman contacted the gallery in Florida. He was provided contact information for Beard's assistant, "Katy Welsh," who he later learned does not exist.

Numerous victims told the FBI that Beard had told them she was going to take their artworks to her gallery in Florida to sell. The FBI investigated and found that Beard had rented space at Palm Beach Art in Lake Worth, FL in January 2021 for seven months. After the lease term had ended Beard left an inventory of 62 photographs and management of the showroom attempted to contact Beard to ask her to pick up her artwork.

An inventory list of 62 photographs was provided by the showroom to the FBI, which contained artwork belonging to identified victims, which was not returned to them after the period of consignment had ended. One of these photographs belonged to Baughman, "Human Pin Cushion."

The criminal complaint described four other victims, including an 89-year-old man with Alzheimer's who, among other things, had his signed Ansel Adams photo returned with the signature gone; an 82-year-old who gave Beard \$900,000 in fine-art photography to sell; a 70-year-old victim who placed a signed Ansel Adams book and three photographs with Beard and got the book back and a bad check for one photo for \$4,000; and a 72-year-old victim who paid \$73,000 for an Ansel Adams photograph and never got the photograph.

Different victims told the FBI of Beard's excuse for not returning their photographs was that she had been in a months-long coma and/or had a double-lung transplant. The dates were two different times within one year, according to two victims.

One coma report came on Sept. 1, 2022 and just two weeks prior, on Aug. 18, 2022, she was observed by the FBI, while on physical surveillance, to leave her residence and drive to a Detroit parking structure owned by the same company in which Beard's bank account records show incoming payroll deposits since about January 2022. Beard did not appear to be physically impaired, the FBI report said.

Baughman said when he was unable to get his photographs back from Beard, he went to the Belleville Police Department and they told him he needed to file with the Van Buren Township police, since he lived in the township. After being interviewed by Van Buren Township detectives, he said they recommended he file his complaint in Birmingham because that police department has more resources.

He said he and his sister, Mary Ann Bitner, drove to Birmingham to file the complaint and police said they received multiple complaints on Beard and it is being turned over to the FBI.

A joint investigation was conducted by the FBI Detroit Metropolitan Identity Theft and Financial Crimes Task Force and the Birmingham Police Department, with the assistance of the FBI Art Theft Unit, that showed Beard was executing a scheme to defraud beginning at least in 2017.

The criminal complaint noted that Beard's victims are typically elderly individuals.





### Victory Park was named for our boys in WWI

Most Belleville residents are aware that our beautiful lakeside community is full of hidden treasures. This summer, upon making our normal gardening rounds, we stumbled across another interesting piece of our history.

After removing a large, overgrown bush from a bed at the east end of Victory Park, we uncovered a rock with a mysterious 1919 on it.

Shortly thereafter, my mom was going through some of her belongings and found a gold-covered pamphlet from 1955 titled, "Golden Anniversary Belleville Michigan." Inside it, a brief mention is made to "the triangular piece of ground at Five Points."

It states, "The Park & Playground Association was organized by a group of ladies backed by the businessman, community and later the village council... Funds were donated by the businessman and community in general and the triangular piece of ground at five points was purchased from Mrs. Kate Clark.

"The park was dedicated in honor of our boys who went to World War I and was named "Victory Park." Mrs. Alban was the first and last president and original promoter of the project and (the) association was dissolved in March 1928." All of these years of enjoying this beautiful park as a child, and now with children of my own, and never once did I question the name. As a fourth-generation Belleville resident, I thought this was an interesting little tidbit about my community and in honor of Veterans Day, we wanted to share this with all of you.

We want to thank our Veterans and their families for their service and sacrifice. We are extremely grateful for you, our country, and our freedom. May God bless you all.

### CYO Athletic Director, Coach resigns at St. A.

To the editor:



## **VBT** planners table action on Brookwood housing development

At its regular meeting Nov. 9, the Van Buren Township Planning Commission tabled consideration of Brookwood senior housing development until the three absent commissioners could be present to share the information and participate in the decision.

The commission met with a bare quorum with Commissioners Medina Atchinson, Jeff Jahr, and Calli Barr absent and excused.

Chris Garner on behalf of owner SB-Invest L.P. wants to construct an independent, multi-family, residential senior housing development with 132 single-story dwelling units with a combined gross floor area of about 154,110 square feet.

The 44.4 acre site is on the north side of Tyler Road near Morton Taylor Road. It is zoned RM-Multiple Dwelling Residential District and the proposed Special Land Use requires a public hearing. Garner was also seeking Preliminary Site Plan approval.

At the public hearing on Nov. 9, Director of Planning and Economic Development Dan Power explained that the development would be west of Hickory Woods and there would be 25.9 disturbed acres of the 44.4 total. There would be 132 units and a clubhouse with two, four, and six-plex buildings.

Each unit has a two-car garage. There are 284 parking spaces and 264 of them are garage spaces.

All access would be from Tyler Road by a wide boulevard. The north end of the parcel would be a preserved wetland.

First speaker at the public hearing was Eric Moore who said his property on Bradley backs up to this "bowling alley," referring to the deep, narrow parcel. He said the residents in his subdivision paid premium prices for backing up to the woods. He wanted to know about the trees.

Moore said the project is good for this community, especially for aging people like himself.

Carolyn Rushing lives on Ironwood and also backs up to this property. "We were told nothing would be built behind us because of wetlands," she said, also asking about the stand of trees. "We got a letter from the state about the wetlands possibly being changed," she said.

Ray Kolb, who said he lived next door to Moore on Bradley, asked if the developers could trade off the wetlands. "There's a lot of wildlife out there," he said.

A woman who said she was a Hickory Woods resident also asked about the tree line. She voiced concern about the traffic on Tyler Road, which she said was heavy.

"I've lived her for over 15 years," she said. "Morton Taylor was supposed to be paved...The new senior complex will add traffic... The new EV plan up on Ecorse will bring more traffic."

She said Kevin McNamara when he was running for supervisor said he would make sure a traffic light would be placed there. She wondered if that statement was just for the campaign.

That ended the 23-minute public hearing. After the commission tabled the Special Land Use requested, Director Power said the items brought up will take more review.

The Preliminary Site Plan item on the agenda did get a lot of discussion before it, too, was tabled for consideration at a future meeting.

Director Power said the Brookwood developers had been coordinating their plans with other adjoining homeowners' association and there are still some things to be addressed. He said the zoning is RM, the site plan submittal was complete, and a traffic-impact study was done by Wade Trim and it found "no further improvements are needed now."

He said there will be one boulevard entry with 20 street parkings and the rest for the homes. It will include a series of retention basins and a pump station at Tyler that is part of the sanitary system and will pump sewage under Tyler to the sewer.

Power said it does have side-entry garages and shared driveways.

Chairman Kelley said he doesn't want the full reports now, since the three commissioners aren't here.

Vidya Krishnan, planner, said there is a regulated wetlands at the north end and



EGLE (Environment, Great Lakes and Energy) was not interested in them cutting through to Morton Taylor. There was no option but to go in and out by Tyler Road.

Krishnan said Van Buren Township has tried to work with Wayne County for a light at Morton Taylor and Tyler, but right now the county is not interested in a traffic light there.

"It has always been the township's intention. Hopefully in the future the county's count will go up and they will consider it," she said.

Krishnan said the township has worked with the applicants for a long time and the applicants have put forth their best efforts to solve problems.

The township's consulting engineer Paul Kammer said the county goes by numbers on traffic lights to determine whether an intersection "warrants" a light. As more development comes in and traffic figures go up it could change, he said.

"It's not the township's ultimate decision," Kammer said.

Chris Garner said the developers have five senior communities in its program. The one in Taylor is under construction, Fenton Township is breaking ground, Superior and Ash townships are under the approval process. He said they have been working for one and a half years in getting the Van Buren Township approval.

Luke Bonner, a real estate consultant with Bonner Advisory Group in Ann Arbor, told the commission the property is challenged. He said when they are seeking sites, they look for a real good community, close to airports and freeways. He said they reached out to neighboring HOAs and there were no less than six meetings with them.

He pointed out the shaded areas on the site map that showed the wetlands. He said EGLE had a hearing and looked at the wetlands for six to seven months. They determined it is a high-quality, wooded wetlands and EGLE wants the developer to put the land in a conservation easement.

To the Hickory Woods residents, he said the property behind them will never be touched and developers have no interest in disturbing trees along the property line.

### School signs agreement with VBT for one more school resource officer

At Monday's regular meeting of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education a memo of understanding was approved with Van Buren Township to provide another school resource officer to the school district.

The agreement is in effect from Jan. 10, 2023 through Dec. 31, 2025.

Van Buren Township Deputy Police Chief Josh Monte, a graduate of Belleville High School, was present to explain the project. He said the new school resource officer will work with the Belleville Police Department's resource officer Sgt. Kris Faull and with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department.

The school district will pay for 75% of the officer's pay, which over the three years

of the agreement amounts to \$220,731.26. The township will pay remaining wages and fringes that amount to \$138,977.50 over the three years.

The officer will mainly work at the high school but will service all the other schools as well. The lengthy agreement covers all the details of the officer's work. The officer will spend 75% of his or her time with the schools but is an employee of the township.

At the end of the agenda, School Supt. Pete Kudlak explained the new way the district is regarding safety since working with the Secure Education Consultancy

They are looking to set up common alert language in all of the schools and they are looking to have more specificity for roles assigned at the schools for emergency situations.

He pointed out school building areas that need to be made more safe and other structural and equipment changes the district is looking at. He said Dan Wright, who was recently appointed to a district safety position, will come to school board meetings to report on his work and explain how they are changing the way they do safety.

Sgt. Rick Houk of the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department was present to explain what his department is doing in its county, where the troubled West Willow area is in the Van Buren School District. Students from this area are the ones who brought guns to school last spring.

He said officers are in that neighborhood, where there has been violent crime, and also have a presence on social media where the youth are now using codes. He said youth break into cars and homes to steal guns and then sell them. He said they are creating dossiers on certain individuals and citing landlords who continually rent properties to troubled people.

"We are only one piece of the puzzle," he (continued on page 10)

said, adding the police build the case and then turn it over to the prosecutor who files the charges and then it goes to court.

"We can only do so much," Sgt. Houk said, adding the problem is not always taken care of. He said a new law says individuals now have to be 18 to be adults and those who are 17 have one more year in the youth home or are back to their parents' custody.

"We arrest for larceny from a vehicle and they are sent home by the court," he said.

He said the Sheriff's Department has a tip line and when people call in tips, they can request the police not drive up in their driveways and instead call them back on the phone.

Sgt. Houk said he has two children in the Van Buren school district.



He said this development is for 55-andolder residents who are active seniors. The buildings will be of brick and stone. Most are four-unit buildings.

"The township wanted different looks, so we turned garages sideways and backward," Bonner said. He said there will be 11.8 acres of preserved wetlands and 10.5 acres of general open space, including ponds and grass. There will be 264 trees.

He said during the planning they went from 190 units to 132 and when they couldn't access Morton Taylor, they widened the boulevard for two-way traffic. They will be sprinkling the units and they have a letter from EGLE on the wetlands.

He said Power came up with a request that week to separate shared driveways and they have enough room to separate the driveways and put something there, like a gravel-based separation.

Treasurer Sharry Budd was concerned about seniors having to back out into the streets and she asked who would own the pump station in the future.

Bonner said municipalities like to own public utilities. He said they would



contribute in perpetuity to the township for care of the pump station.

Budd also was concerned about people not stopping at the four-way stop at Morton Taylor and Tyler roads.

Bonner said there will be no school buses to Brookwood since it is for seniors and people work with different time schedules now. He said he likes four-way stops.

Commissioner Bernie Grant, an architect, said wetlands can change and maybe they will be dried out with the retention ponds and other drainage for the development.

Veronica, the Wade Trim representative, said, "We will discharge to the wetlands at the allowable rate ... That's why we needed a permit." She said there will be a seasonal stream to make sure it doesn't dry up.

When Moore asked about ponds, Veronica said the Hickory Wood pond is a retention pond and the Brookwood pond overflows over riprap to the wetlands.

Rushing asked when the traffic study was done. Veronica said the traffic study was completed in September. She would look into whether the assisted living facility to the south of Tyler was taken into account. Kammer said the original traffic numbers were taken in the fall of 2021.

Commissioner Grant noted that the wetlands along Morton Taylor were not connected to the special wetlands to be preserved and if they dried out could they be moved and homes built there. Bonner said that was possible.

In other business, the commission:

## **Belleville Area District Library at end of construction expenses**

O'Neal Construction presented its final construction project bill to the Belleville Area District Library at the library board's November building committee meeting.

At the regular board meeting on Nov. 8, the board approved amendments to the current Capital Project and Debt Service budgets, noting most of the \$14 million in construction is done.

There is \$247,950 construction work in progress and the remaining funds of \$543,900 were transferred out of the Capital Projects Fund Budget to the Debt Service Fund. The Capital Projects fund balance now is zero for the 2022-23 fiscal year.

The annual audit of the 2021-22 fiscal year ending June 30 will be on the agenda of the Dec. 13 regular meeting and is expected to show a favorable variance in the \$2 million approved budget.

"We budgeted conservatively, for the worst-case scenario," said board chairperson Sharon Peters. "It's better than finding ourselves in the hole."

Library Director Mary Jo Suchy said she will miss the monthly meetings with O'Neal, "but they will always remain a phone call away to assist us in any building issues or future needs.

"We have some small remaining items to address but will be closing out the project portion of our budget during the coming months," she said.

Suchy said one of the HVAC units was not functioning, resulting in a warmer-than-normal second floor. She said ThermalNetics, the HVAC controls company, came out and fixed it.

Joy Cichewicz, chairperson of the building committee, said they met a week ago with O'Neal and John Juriga noted that he, as a committee member, had spent 258 hours from the beginning of the new library project. Juriga had spent more because he comes into the library almost daily to check on details. Juriga agreed to continue to monitor the library.

Besides Cichewicz and Juriga, the building committee consists of Mary Jane Dawson and Suchy, with Peters usually in attendance as well. Instead of dominating committee reports in meetings, as it had over the past few years, in the future the building committee will be able to give brief reports like the other committees.

Treasurer Tanya Stoudemire thanked the building committee for their years and years of work.

Cichewicz said the library had a guaranteed construction price from O'Neal and will be getting \$80,000 back.

She said the library gave its final payout to O'Neal. They will be available in the future by the hour.

Chairperson Peters said O'Neal was a good group to work with and they will still be available to help deal with little switches and things.

Cichewicz said they put a groove in the entryway to the meeting room to drain so it is not slippery in the winter. She said that decision took lots of discussions before it was done.

She also noted that there is still a sidewalk issue on Roys Street because the Baptist church's font is draining there and they are concerned it is not draining properly. City DPW Director Rick Rutherford is looking into the problem so the sidewalk can be poured there.

### **Belleville Charter** Amendment, School Sinking Fund pass

Two local proposals were passed by voters in the Nov. 8 General Election.

The city of Belleville's Charter Amendment concerning medical marijuana, that took six pages out of the charter that were put in during the previous election, passed with 912 yes and 698 no votes.

The Van Buren Public Schools Sinking Fund proposal passed with 9,793 yes votes and 9,207 no votes.

All three state proposals were also passed

by voters.

In Sumpter, Republican Bart Patterson, with 2,321 votes, beat Democrat Sheena Barnes, with 1,731 votes.

The incumbents were reelected on the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education. Amy Pearce got 8,383 votes, Darlene Loyer Gerick got 6,865 votes, and Calvin Hawkins got 5,697 votes. Unsuccessful candidates were Andrew Frazier with 5,451 votes and Terrance Goff with 4,594 votes.

The Belleville Area District Library Board had four openings and four candidates. Three were incumbents. Winners were Sharon Peters, 7,931; newcomer Daniel Fleming, 7,461; Linda Priest, 7,241; and Tanya Stoudemire-Phillips, 7,241.

asked for a Cobbs plea consideration and Judge Green gave Wayne County Assistant Prosecutor Bryn Bailey a week to discuss the plea with her office and adjourned the pretrial until Nov. 9. Judge Green noted that Bailey had not had exposure to this kind of thing before.

Two members of the victim's family were present via zoom to observe the proceedings.

On Nov. 9, he pled guilty as charged to running a red light or multiple red lights on westbound Ecorse Road killing Mitchell Ronnie Lee on Sept. 30. Judge Green sent Ibrahim to the probation department for a report and said a sentencing date will be set.

At the sentencing, the three family members of the victim, who were present by zoom on Nov. 9, will be able to write a letter or speak their feelings.

"I've done four or five of these cases and they are terrible," said Judge Green, noting both families are forever affected.

She said she prefers a lot of community service with youth as a sentence. Judge Green said it's important for the defendant to tell his story in driving school, to tell the students to be very, very careful because if you miss a stop sign you could kill a motorcyclist.

"If I put him in jail, it's not the most successful way to deal with this," Judge Green said.

At first the sentencing was to be by zoom, but Judge Green changed her mind. "I'll do this as live sentencing. I owe it to you and your family." The date is yet to be announced

Arion Joseph Ely-Dawson

Arion Joseph Ely-Dawson, 18, of

Westland, had his probable cause conference adjourned from Oct. 12 to Oct. 19 because his defense attorney William Noakes did not have discovery.

Ely-Dawson was charged with assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than murder and failure to stop at a personal injury accident on Oct. 3 in Van Buren Township. His bond was set at \$25,000/10% and he is to have no contact with the victim and wear a GPS tether if released.

On Oct. 12, Wayne County Assistant Prosecutor Bryn Bailey told Judge Green that the victim told her that the defendant's mother and another relative are having contact with her through her girlfriend. They are laughing and offering to pay for the damages. The victim allegedly was run over by the defendant.

On Oct. 19, the case was adjourned one week to Oct. 26 because the attorney wasn't present. Ely-Dawson said he had no contact with his attorney because the mail went to his father.

On Oct. 26, the defendant waived his preliminary exam and he was bound over to circuit court for a Nov. 9 arraignment on the information. A calendar conference was set for Dec. 22.

The Wayne County Jail called into the court stating the defendant is in the hospital.

Parchman had been bound over to circuit court on Sept. 19 on charges he tortured a woman in Parkwood apartments in Van Buren Township. The arraignment on the information was set for Oct. 4, but was reset by circuit court to Nov. 18.

Jeremy Abraham Napier, 48, of Romulus was due for his probable cause conference on March 23 on charges of larceny from a motor vehicle, forgery of license documents/ plates, identity theft, and drove while license suspended on March 8 in Van Buren Township. The probable cause conference was adjourned until April 20. On April 20, Judge Martin set his live exam for June 1.

On June 1, Prosecutor Jane Gillis made an offer that if he pled no contest to one count of unlawful use of license plate and no contest to driving while license suspended, the other charges would be dismissed. He pled no contest and testified that he used a plate he was not authorized to use and drove while license suspended.

Then he apologized. His defense attorney Brendon Debolski said his client is 49 years old, was living in Romulus, and engaged to be married when his fiancé had sores and he drove her to the hospital and she was not yet home from rehabilitation.

Debolski said Napier put the license on the car to take her to the hospital, which was not a good decision. He should have called 911. He has four kids, two in college, and is a longtime Ford Motor Co. employee. Napier told Judge Martin that he is a tool and die worker, having worked his way up from the production line, and this is very embarrassing. He said he builds Ford Broncos at the Wayne Assembly Plant.

Judge Martin assigned \$890 in fines and costs. She noted his felony has been reduced
