Belleville DDA votes to pay \$37,565 to repair Community Events sign

At its regular meeting April 17 the Belleville Downtown Development Authority voted unanimously to select the Watchfire Sign bid of \$37,565 by Curb Appeal Concepts, Inc. of Shelby Township to replace the LED portion of the Community Events sign at

the corner of High and Main streets.

The sign that was installed in 2010 had failed and the DDA was unable to turn it off until one of the bidders did so without charge a month ago. The four bidders also included Metro, Johnson Sign Co., and State Electrical Co.



1,700-lb. stone memorial for Officer Graham installed at Sumpter PD

On the 28th of July, 1985, a tragic incident occurred that deeply impacted the Sumpter Township community. Police Officer Roy

Graham was fatally injured in the line of duty.

A drunk driver, ignoring a red light, collided with Officer Graham's patrol car at the intersection of Sumpter and Bemis roads. Officer Graham, along with his partner,

Officer Dennis O'Connor -- who suffered critical injuries -- were responding to a call for help from a neighboring jurisdiction at the time.

In November 1985, Sumpter Township dedicated a park at the corner of Sumpter and Wear roads, naming it Graham Park in memory of Officer Graham's sacrifice. Additionally, the police department lobby features a memorial wall honoring him.


As we near the 39th anniversary of Officer Graham's end of watch, we've added a new outdoor memorial at our station that's been years in the making.

In 2013, a group of officers and staff participated in the inaugural Heroes of Hines Half Marathon/5K in Hines Park, running in honor of Officer Graham. This event has become an annual tradition for us, with all proceeds supporting the maintenance of the Wayne County First Responders Memorial inside the park. The walls of this memorial include Officer Graham and the many other law enforcement officers who've also paid the ultimate sacrifice serving Wayne County communities.

Over the years, the Sumpter Police have been awarded prize money in various categories during the race, totaling \$1,250. This and a \$1,000 grant from the Officer Down Memorial Page (ODMP) in 2019 sparked the idea to create a memorial outside our station.

We quickly realized that our vision was challenging due to financial constraints. With costs estimated between \$7,000 and \$10,000 and only \$2,250 in our funds, we were demoralized but not beaten.

Our breakthrough came when we met John O'Connor and Craig Sheets of Metropolitan Stone in Carleton. Upon



discussing our project, they immediately offered to donate materials and labor, insisting on it. Their generosity was unexpected and deeply appreciated.

The project faced delays due to COVID,

but in 2022, we were able to purchase a bronze plaque and, with Craig's expertise, finalize the design of the stone monument. The intricate details of the carving including the flag and tree leaves, were meticulously completed with hand tools.

We extend our deepest gratitude to Metropolitan Stone for their kindness and support in bringing this memorial to life.

The monument's motto, "In Valor There Is Hope," is attributed to the Roman historian Publius Cornelius Tacitus. It reflects the courage and sacrifice of law enforcement officers. The National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C., also features this quote on its limestone walls.

Weighing nearly 1,700 lbs., the monument was installed in March with the collective effort of the Department of Public Works staff, who played a crucial role in preparing the site and positioning the stone. We are immensely thankful for their assistance in honoring Officer Graham's memory.

School board approves sex education materials for middle school

Since the updated sex education materials for students in grades 4 through 7 is due to be taught in late April and early May, the lessons were brought to the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education on April 22 for approval.

Topics for approval usually are presented at one meeting and then the board members can think about it and question details and then vote two weeks later. This approval was in a hurry.

The board voted unanimously to approve the materials on April 22. Trustee Dionne Falconer was absent.

Director of Curriculum and Instruction Jeff Moore said the current HIV videos are out of date and the maturation videos are out of date and some became pretty comical to view. The videos need to be updated, he said.

"Gender identity has become a big issue, but this has not been added to the curriculum," Director Moore said. He said there were strong comments on that in the fall when input was sought in a survey.

"We're asking for approval tonight because of the starting of the units," Moore said.

School Supt. Pete Kudlak noted that parents can exclude their students from seeing the videos.

Board secretary Darlene Loyer Gerick said when she tried to access the eight videos on the link provided by Moore, she couldn't do it. After finding another way, she was able to access the videos one by one. Moore said he would look into the problem.

Moore said the old videos, which are on DVDs, can't be found on line.

"We will do a better job with the new videos," which he said will be available on the district website.

President Pearce noted that the only sexually transmitted disease that the state requires the district to teach is HIV.

Moore said in a memo to the board that in response to the recognition of outdated materials currently in use, the sex-ed committee has worked on updating the district's resources. It hosted two review sessions, on March 20 and April 10, inviting parental input, which has been positive, he said

In other business at Monday's regular meeting the board:

- Approved the NJROTC trip for 43 BHS students to Fort Custer Training Center in Augusta, MI, May 20-23, with transportation by school bus. The trip is financed through the JROTC account and cost to each student is \$40;
- Heard a presentation by Renea Kirek, secondary instruction specialist, to explain the new 6, 7, 8th grade middle school math curriculum that is proposed to begin in the next school year. She said the committee researching what programs are available has selected Middle School Illustrative Math Curriculum by Imagine Learning out of 13

bids. Board treasurer Simone Pinter asked if this will roll the students into high school better than the present curriculum and Kirek said it would. Moore said the curriculum for the past six years has been Discovery Tech Book and it has suffered with the quality of its support. Cost for the new program is \$210,323 over five years and there will be 10 professional development days scheduled for teachers, occurring twice a year for the next five years. This is expected to be voted on at the next school board meeting;

- Approved the Schools of Choice program for the first semester of the 2024-25 school year, with a Sept. 27 deadline to apply and unlimited number of openings;
- Approved the IDS Student Clinic Architecture Proposal as presented at the last board meeting to transform the existing 1,200-square-foot storage room and 280-square-foot office of the Media Center to provide health services to BHS students and other district students, in coordination with University of Michigan Medicine. Spaces to be included are a lobby, reception, patient intake, two exam rooms, storage room, toilet facility, laboratory, therapy office, and nourishment room. Cost is expected to be \$400,000, but there are some grants. Julien Frazier, director of special services, said this clinic will have no abortion services and no gender-diversion care. He also said state law requires all services to have parental consent. He said the health care services offered will include dental, vision, and hearing

- screening, substance abuse, counseling, crisis intervention, housing and financial instability. These services are separate from the services offered by Dionisia Munoz, the district's Registered Nurse;
- Approved the June 30 retirements of Theresa Libs of Rawsonville Elementary School after 26 years of service; Deborah Mounsey of Rawsonville Elementary after 25 years of service; and Jonathan Gibson of Edgemont Elementary after 11 years of service;
- Approved the resignations of Jessica Carlin of BHS after seven years of service as of May 10 and Joseph Gaines of BHS as of June 6 after three years of service;
- Approved the retirements of noninstructional staff: Patricia Harris of McBride as of June 6 after 40 years; Franklin Key of transportation as of June 7 after 14 years; and Janet Key of transportation as of April 30 after 27 years of service;
- Approved the resignations of noninstructional staff: Gregory Martinez of Building and Grounds as of April 12 as of less than a year and Williams McMichael of Rawsonville as of April 19 after three years of service; and
- Approved the employment of noninstructional staff: Beverly Swank as a substitute bus aide in the transportation department as of April 18 and Jennifer Adams as a paraprofessional at Edgemont Elementary School as of April 29.

Belleville DDA for 'geofencing' city

At its meeting last week, the Belleville Downtown Development Authority was presented with a suggestion from its Marketing Committee to hire Placer.AI for about \$7,000 a year to monitor your cellphones and auto GPS systems to find out where you've been and where you're going while driving through the city.

Assistant city manager Steve Jones, who serves as executive director of the city's DDA, said he didn't have a proposed contract to present to the DDA members yet, but he hoped to have it for the next meeting at 6 p.m. May 15 so they could consider it. (The DDA now meets at the Belleville Area District Library.)

Jones said Placer.AI had demonstrated what it could do with "geofencing" and monitored visitors to the downtown for a few weeks last June. He said Placer.AI reported a minimal number of people and where they were going and then the number jumped up to about 20,000 when Lakefest held its boat races.

Jones listed the places people visited and those at the April 17 meeting showed enthusiasm for having this information to market the downtown.

DDA chairwoman Alicia McGovern, who was absent April 17, had mentioned this tracking in passing last year and then the Marketing Committee, on which she sits, passed on the proposal to Jones who put it on the agenda for discussion.

We are not in support of tracking people without their knowledge or approval and the city has to have its vacant buildings filled before trying to market downtown.

EXTRA THINGS I KNOW

At Monday's regular meeting of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education president Amy Pearce told about the death of a robotics student at the international competition in Houston, TX, which a team from BHS also attended last weekend.

Pearce said the student was from Lake Orion. She said the Lake Orion team had nominated the BHS team for a Torch Award and there is a picture of them all together on Facebook.

She said this district sends all their best to the Lake Orion district in dealing with


Board treasurer Simone Pinter said while she didn't go to Houston to watch the robotics teams, she was able to watch the competition on her iPad.

Keystone Academy board puts off filling vacant position on board

After extensive discussion at the March 14 meeting of the Keystone Academy board of directors meeting, the board agreed to wait until later in the school year to name a replacement for board president Vesta Losen, who retired after 20 years on the board as of March 1.

National Heritage Academy representative Andrew Roth said there had been preliminary plans for JC Huizinga, who organized NHA, and new NHA CEO Jason Pater to be at that evening's meeting to honor Losen. But he said she had retired as of March 1, so they decided she shouldn't come. He said Losen said she had a busy week and so he contacted the two and told

The board voted to officially accept Losen's retirement and decided informally to continue with four board members, instead of five, for a while.

Two educators, recommended by Losen, had been interviewed at the February meeting and Roth said he would call them to ask if they are still interested and tell them the board will be interviewing others, as well.

The process to fill the board seat is to have a recommendation from the local board, which is then sent on to Bay Mills Community College, the authorizer of the Keystone Charter. After Bay Mills approves the recommendation, Keystone swears in the person as a board member.

The seat occupied by Losen was designated to be filled by an educator and so the board hopes to find another educator to fill the position. Since educators are difficult to find for school boards, Roth said Bay Mills probably would approve someone who wasn't an educator for an

At the April 11 meeting of the board Princial Jorvanna Drain responded to the board's suggestion at a previous meeting that someone from the PTO be interviewed for a board position. Principal Drain said Christine Dare, who is a very active parent at the school, would be a good board member. Drain said Dare told her she was interested in serving on the board.

Dare was invited to come to the next board meeting at 5 p.m. May 9.

In other business at the 50-minute meeting on April 11, the board:

- Heard board vice-president Steven Harsant, who was chairing the meeting since there presently is no president, say he would like Drain to see how the board can help at the next level. He said he knows there are a lot of resources at the National Heritage Academies offices. Harsant said, "We had a person with 25 years of experience retire and we have to learn more about what is possible for us to do. "She knew everything and we have to learn," he

The Attendance Report for 2023-24 shows average daily attendance of 93% and percent chronically absent (10% or more of enrolled days) of 27%;
- Was advised that Darius C placed third and Caleb Ujeniuc placed seventh in NHA's regional spelling bee;
- · Learned new certified hires are a seventh grade ELA teacher and a seventh grade math teacher, who will be in place next school year; and
- · Was informed open enrollment has started for the 2024-25 school year and Keystone has 42 more applications in comparison to last year at this time. With current re-enrolling and registered students, Keystone has 737 students projected to

enroll for the 2024-25 school year. **March 14 Board Meeting**

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SEMCOG announces eight grants including one to benefit Belleville

SEMCOG, the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, has awarded eight grants to conduct formal safety performance examinations of existing or planned roads/intersections across Southeast Michigan, including one to benefit the city of Belleville.

The road safety audits (RSAs) funded will be conducted by an independent, multidisciplinary audit team and result in priority recommendations for safety improvements.

The only project in Wayne County is for Belleville. The segment of Main Street from Columbia Avenue to High Street (with a focus on the Five Points and Fourth Street intersections) in the city has been selected for a road safety audit to help address the complex design of the Five Points intersection, as well as existing and anticipated non-motorized safety concerns due to the Iron Belle Trail.

"Our region has a strong coalition of partners who are committed to putting safety first and creating a safe and equitable environment for all," said Amy O'Leary, executive director of SEMCOG.

"We are taking a systematic approach to creating safe streets in Southeast Michigan by studying some of the locations with the greatest opportunity for impact. Each of these audits represents an opportunity to identify and implement life-saving improvements," O'Leary said.

Other RSA projects will be in Brighton, Eastpointe, Mount Clemens, Macomb County Department of Roads, Birmingham, Lathrup Village, and Wixom.

The U.S. Department of Transportation awarded SEMCOG with a Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) supplemental planning grant to establish a regional Road Safety Audit program.

SEMCOG's RSA Program is a

competitive grant program, funding formal safety performance examinations of existing or planned roads and intersections by an independent, multi-disciplinary audit team. RSAs can be used in any phase of project development from planning and preliminary engineering, to design, to construction. They can also be used to retrofit existing locations.

The RSA program implements the Southeast Michigan Transportation Safety Plan. Project awards were selected by SEMCOG's Regional Review Committee, comprised of local elected officials in Southeast Michigan.

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Sumpter OKs posting DPW position, hiring temp. in clerk's office

At its regular meeting April 9, the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees unanimously approved posting an opening for a DPW worker at the AFSCME-approved wage of \$28.83 an hour and benefits.

Although it was to be posted until April 19, Trustee Matthew Oddy asked that it be posted until May 1 to give people time to apply.

In other business at the 44-minute combined workshop/regular meeting, the board:

• Approved front counter replacements in the Treasurer's and Clerk's offices. This was added to the agenda at the last minute and Township Manager Anthony Burdick apologized for the delay since the application to be on the agenda was submitted properly;

- Approved on a 6-1 vote the hiring of Kristina Stencel as a temporary, part-time clerk's office assistant for up to 29 hours per week at an AFSCME-approved hourly rate of \$16.04, effective April 10 to Nov. 15. Treasurer Bart Patterson cast the only no vote;
- Heard manager Burdick report that he and Finance Director Scott Holtz met with CWA to discuss rebuilding of the DPW. Burdick said there were a number of bells and whistles to help manage the process, especially with power use of the BS&A modules;
- Heard Supervisor Tim Bowman ask about how the planning commission approves use of property. He didn't like the use approved by the township board at its last meeting for the building next to the

restaurant/bar at the corner of Willis and Rawsonville roads. He said he thought something more like a 7/Eleven would be more suitable. Trustee Oddy and township attorney Rob Young explained to him that the planning commission only recommends and the township board makes the final decision. The commission's decision is based on the zoning ordinance's use or special use for that property;

- Heard Burdick detail refurbishing plans for the recycling and fuel areas. He said yellow paint, at almost \$300 a gallon, will be used. He said he would like to earmark in \$13,000 in Wayne County 2024-25 grant funds to be used for road improvements to Banotai Park. He also reported the DPW will be sprucing up the parks with trimming after the winter season and asphalt patching at township hall as a temporary fix. An Adrian firm, that Holtz knew, gave a very attractive quote for top-dressing all township parking lots, he said;
- Learned some of the Parks and Recreation people are struggling with health issues;
- Heard Public Safety Director/ Police Chief Eric Luke report that three intersections are tied for two crashes each in the month of March: Harris/Martinsville, Rawsonville/Willis, and Judd/Rawsonville. Also, he said less than four weeks after first approaching CLEMIS, the fire department will be operating on CLEMIS no later than May 1. "We're happy we're going there,"
- Heard Trustee Tim Rush say he is authorized by the National Weather Service and he will be teaching a Sky Warn class and anyone interested should contact him. He said Sumpter is the only municipality in Michigan that is Storm Ready certified;
- Heard Treasurer Patterson note that this is the day Mary Ban will be having her knee surgery. She usually speaks under the public comment part of the meeting and "We miss you," he said; and
- Heard Trustee Don LaPorte say he is recovered from his knee surgery and was back to work on Monday and will be back at the fire department ASAP.

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

Assistant city manager Steve Jones, who serves as DDA administrator, said Curb Appeal was the sign's original installer. He said the lifetime of an LED sign is 10 years and the Belleville sign is 15-years-ish. He said if the DDA puts it on a timer and shut it off from midnight to 5 a.m., they will get more years from the LED.

Jones said 12 tiles make up one side of the sign and there are 12 tiles on the other side. If just one tile is damaged, they can fix one tile.

This will be cellular based so the sign can be changed from "wherever we are," Jones said, adding the police and fire officials can easily put emergency or tornado warnings on the sign.

At the March meeting of the DDA, members went out to the parking lot to see demonstrations of various LED signs.

In other business at the one-and-a-half-hour meeting on April 17, the DDA:

- Approved a maximum of \$15,500 in a grant and a no-interest loan for Façade Improvement to 240 Main St., as requested by owner William Osier with the appropriate paperwork presented to the DDA within 30 days. Jones said he has talked to Osier many times on the phone and he has asked Osier to come in to clarify things, but he has yet to come in. City Manager/Police Chief Dave Robinson had suggested that Osier delay applying since the DDA rules were changing and grants were going up, so Osier just began work. DDA treasurer Sabrina Richardson-Williams said the paperwork is confusing and it needs to be redone;
- Discussed a proposal for a Placer.AI contract to track visitors to the city by their cell phones and GPS, noting where they are from and where they go back to after they are here for marketing purposes. Jones said the company "geofenced" Horizon Park, including cars that drive by, for a couple of days last June. After a few days, the traffic was sky-high, when the Lakefest festival was held with the boat races on the water. Jones said around 20,000 people were reported. They went to Johnny's, Bayou, home, Meijer, he said. He said he was told over the phone there is a \$7,000 cost a year for this and there is no contract yet to study. He said this information would be for the DDA marketing only and the police or fire departments couldn't use it. Jones said the Marketing Committee approved the expenditure for this. The proposal was referred back to the Marketing Committee and is expected to be discussed at the next DDA meeting;
- Discussed another request from the Marketing Committee that new flower planters be purchased for Main Street so they all matched each other and the black benches. Jones ordered two samples. The black one is \$86 each including the tray underneath and the grey one is \$102 each with the tray. It was noted this is too close to planting season for this year and they could talk about it in September. Jones said they would revisit this in the fall. DDA member Chris Donley said this is more like icing

on the cake and the DDA "has bigger fish to fry at this point – attracting businesses to the downtown." Kelly McWilliams of the Marketing Committee said she would like the new planters to happen, but she is more interested in the park at the Veteran's Memorial;

- Heard a 40-minute sales pitch by Mark Fisher of Today Publishing, publisher of the Van Buren Today magazine that is mailed to 20,000 addresses in the tri-community. He said while businesses pay \$1,000 a page to advertise, he had a reduced rate of \$400 per page for DDAs. When DDA members showed an interest in a pullout standalone just about Belleville, Fisher explained how that could be done. Jones said this could be discussed by the Marketing Committee and Fisher and the DDA Executive Director Merrie Coburn could be invited to the meeting. A proposal will be brought back to the full DDA;
- Heard Jones say that black curtains have been put in the windows of the hardware building that the DDA recently purchased. They have considered a special exhibit in front from the museum while the work in the back, or posters or something else to display in front. Treasurer Richardson-Williams said she wouldn't mind having a mural rather than black curtains. Part of a wall in the building needs fixing and so that is being addressed. He said Hennessey Engineers gave some ideas of what the back parking area could look like once the building there is demolished and members looked at those drawings after the meeting;
- Heard DDA member Mike Gatteri say that someone bought the U-Haul business that used to operate behind the hardware store, but the city won't let him run it on the back area, like it used to run. Jones said the hardware store had it as accessory use on the property it owned. The U-Haul business can only run in the city's IP zoning district, which is over in the Davenport industrial area; and
- Heard treasurer Richardson-Williams say the DDA needs to know the amount of rent coming from the people in the businesses along the side of the former hardware store that they now own. Jones said one was \$750 a month, another was \$682 a month and the third was similar. He said there is also the electrical, dumpter, and water fees and he will get a report for the DDA. "We've never been landlords before," Jones said.

 Heard Zaenglein announce that the township's
- Heard Zaenglein announce that the township's summer camp is back and will be run out of the new Community Center for eight weeks starting June 17. Cost is \$205 per week for township residents and \$230 per week for non-residents. The township is hiring camp counselors 18 and older. She announced a couple of minigrants including a \$450 grant from MParks to get the summer campers to Lansing for a field trip, and a Safari grant of \$2,500 through MParks for archery equipment, plus an additional \$1,000 from MDNR for a \$3,500 total to pay for archery equipment and learn the safe way of doing this indoors for all ages; and

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
