VBT board signs resolution for left-turn signal

Both Van Buren Township Trustee Kevin Martin and Clerk Leon Wright said they got in accidents at the corner of Tyler and Belleville roads and that corner needs a left-turn phasing signal.

At the last township board meeting, Trustee Martin asked the board to sign a letter asking Wayne County to put in the signal – and then to keep sending the letters until the county acts.

Municipal Services Director Ron Akers prepared a resolution and at the July 18 meeting the resolution was passed unanimously as presented.

In the agenda item, Director Akers included the information that the board could add language stating that it is willing to share the cost. He said an estimated cost for the turn signal is between \$200,000 and \$300,000. This language was not included.

Clerk Wright said there are left-turn signals on Belleville Road at Aldi's, Tim Horton's, and the I-94 Service Drives and so he doesn't know why there couldn't be one at Tyler Road.

"We don't want to get into a fight with them," Wright said of the county.

"This has been a bee in my bonnet for some time," Trustee Martin said, adding that he had an accident at that intersection. He said south-bound left turns are dangerous, especially from 4 to 6 p.m.

"I asked for a letter and I hope it will not fall on deaf ears," Martin said.

In other business at the 47-minute meeting on July 18, the board:

• Approved the personal services agreement of Kathryn Hood as Building and Grounds Superintendent. She recently retired from the City of Romulus where she spent more than 30 years in public services. She holds a S-4 license, was chief (continued on page 3)

City of Belleville candidates file for five seats open in November election

All five seats on the Belleville City Council are up for election on the Nov. 7 General Election. The deadline to file was 4 p.m. July 25 and the *Independent* goes to press before that.

These are the candidates who filed as of 3 p.m. on July 25:

- Ken Voigt mayor;
- Julie Kissel council member (partial

term):

- Jeremiah Beebe council member (partial term);
- Kelly Bates council member (full term); and
- Randy Priest council member (full term). If others file in the minutes before the final deadline, we will report it in next week's paper.

Four-year terms are expiring in December for Mayor Kerreen Conley and Councilmembers Bates and Voigt.

Also, Councilmen Beebe and Tom Fielder were appointed in 2023 to terms that expire in December 2025, but they must both run in the November election to finish the terms.

City Council moves toward EV stations all over town

On Monday, the Belleville City County advised the city's administration to move forward on getting final contract wording for an agreement that would put electric vehicle charging stations in all the city's parks and parking lots.

Acting City Manager Steve Jones said Charge EV, LLC would install the electric vehicle charging stations without charge to the city and would charge customers for service, giving a small percentage of that back to the city.

He was directed to come back to the council with more specific language in the contract and to present a list of precise locations for the EV stations within the city.

A copy of the sign to be posted at each EV station said "EV Parking While Charging ONLY. Violators Will Be Ticketed," implying city police will monitor and enforce violations.

Jones said he talked with a person in Clarkston who told him this company was fabulous to work with. They get three cents per kilowatt hour and have a five-year lease. Two vehicles can use each station.

Clarkston, Oxford, and Holly have signed up with this company, which is targeting smaller communities, he said.

John Juriga, a member of the board of the Belleville Area District Library, said he has been working to get EV charging stations in the 90-vehicle parking lot at the library since 2020 and he hopes the city can get three to five stations for that parking lot. He said when he looked into it it would cost \$40,000 to put an EV station into the library/city parking lot.

Jones said the company will put in as many stations as they want. If there are more than four at one location, DTE will have to put in a cabinet.

Resident Mike Renaud said Belleville's contract is for 10 years and the penalties are pretty severe if you pull out before then. There is nothing in the agreement about them being responsible for technical updates, he said, asking, "Do we have to tell them when it's down?"

Deputy Fire Chief Chris Zweng said they know when it's down and the company wants to make money so they will make sure it is operating. Zweng said Ann Arbor paid quite a bit to install EV stations.

Renaud said there's no such thing as a free lunch and there is a risk to this.

In other business at Monday's two-hourand-20-minute meeting, the council:

- Heard a presentation via Zoom from Leslie Abdoo of FosterSwift law firm on the details of how to either revise or amend the city charter. She recommended proposing the nine-member board and the question of whether to revise the charter on the same election. It's too late for this November's election, so it could be the first one in the spring, once the state decides on the 2024 election schedule;
- Deferred approval of retiree incentives until more precise language could be formulated. A stipend of \$2,000 is proposed if the employee announces retirement six months in advance so the city has time to fill the slot and train the employee. Council members want the agreement to state that the person is really retiring under MERS definition;
- Discussed, at length and hotly, an ordinance proposed by Councilwoman Kelly Bates that would ban traditional cigarettes, eCigarettes, chewing tobacco, pipes, cigars, etc. in all the city buildings, including Victory Station, outdoor restrooms, all parks and parking lots and special events approved by the city, including BORA-DORA district sidewalks. Police would enforce with \$50 tickets. No
- Approved paying \$250 per paycheck as token compensation for the extra work being done by Acting City Manager Steve

Jones and Acting Police Chief Kris Faull until the positions are filled with permanent employees. The paychecks are every other week and the pay is retroactive to when they were appointed to the acting positions;

- Approved a network evaluation by a computer consultant for \$1,800 that would provide a full evaluation of the city's system. This is in the wake of the recent crash of the city's server;
- Set a special meeting for 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 26, for a presentation by PFM on city finances for road work and possible interview of a new city manager candidate. Also, the council set a special meeting for 5:30 p.m., Monday, July 31, to interview candidates, including internal candidate Acting City Manager Steve Jones who in the middle of the city's interview process decided to apply for the job. Although he does not have the credentials the city requires for the position, the council is interviewing him as a courtesy;
- Approved accounts payable of \$264,282.85 and the following departmental purchases in excess of \$500: to Ann Arbor Township Fire Department, \$1,000 for fire academy training of Tristan Hugo; to Atchinson Ford Sales, \$557.37 for coolant work on vehicle 218; to Hennessey Engineers, \$1,228.50 for Hillside Cemetery Paving Project and \$1,008 for Victory Station Renovation Project; to Randy Brown Landscape, \$2,597.50, bank clearing by goats – city portion; to Snider Electric, \$885 for replacement of broken light pole head in front of Professional Building; and to Western Wayne County Fire Department Mutual Aid Association, \$3,638.56, annual dues and HIRT Assessment;
- Heard Tracy Hill of South Liberty Street tell of the drivers who are speeding down her street next to Victory Park when the speed limit is 15 mph. She also said the storm drain on that street is not working and what's there blows up into her yard. She also applied for a fence and was turned down and now is looking for a variance, but the three people on the panel don't meet very often;
- Learned city administration is still working with SMART to get a small van to transport seniors and handicapped in the city:
- Heard Jones report that Scoops Ice Cream on E. Huron River Drive will be having outdoor movies from 9 to 11 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays throughout the summer: and
- Learned Mayor Pro-Tem Ken Voigt donated the new clock in the meeting room that has replaced the old clock that was always wrong. Also, the city has replaced the deteriorated window blinds in the meeting room that now can be adjusted to block out the afternoon sun.

union steward, and retired as assistant of public works. She said she was to begin work on July 24;

- Approved entering into a five-year contract with Motorola Solutions for Body Work Cameras to purchase 34 body cameras and three in-car cameras using a five-year subscription plan to be expensed from State Forfeiture and Technology Purchases accounts. Deputy Police Chief Joshua Monte said the existing body cameras are six years old and at the end of their lives. He said officers now are sharing cameras. Deputy Monte said the cost is \$54,987 in 2023 and then \$47,002 per year, which includes training. Total cost is \$242,995;
- Approved a \$40,000 addendum to the agreement with Fishbeck Associates for the design engineering for the Denton Road Bridge. This expenditure is expected to be reimbursed by the county. Director Akers said the bids on the bridge project are expected to be opened in May of 2024 and construction to begin in July 2024. Survey work has been done, he said;
- Approved special land use by Donyeal Sizemore to change her existing Day Care-Family Home use to a Day Care-Group Home use, as recommended by the planning commission. The home is in Country Walk subdivision and approved by its homeowners' association;
- Approved the first reading of an ordinance to rezone Van Born Road property, east of Sheldon on the north side of the road, from M-1 Light Industrial to M-2 General Industrial as requested by Robert Sloan and recommended by the planning commission. Sloan said there are no plans for a specific use of the property and Supervisor Kevin McNamara said he would like to talk to Sloan about the use;
- Approved the first reading of an ordinance to rezone 16355 Haggerty Rd. from R-1B Single Family Residential to AG-Agricultural and Estates, as recommended by the planning commission. Dan Power, director of planning and economic development, said the Master Plan supports "Rural Settlement" use in the area and there is a lack of sanitary sewer facilities in that section of the township. Property owner Cameron Smyth wants to expand his agricultural use of the 10-acre property and someday have a pick-yourown apple orchard;
- Approved the first reading of an ordinance to increase the maximum allowable height for detached single family dwellings to 2.5 stories or 35 feet in height from the current 2.0 stories and 30 feet. Director Power said this change will bring the township more in line with other municipalities and there are eight parcels, almost nine, in the township

that already have 2.5 stories;

- Approved purchasing two vacant parcels from the Wayne County property foreclosure list. The parcels are located along Denton Road and are needed for the path of the Iron Belle Trail. Costs are \$1,225.93 and \$2,478.12;
- Approved Amendment No. 3 to the FY 2019-22 intergovernmental agreement with Wayne County Parks for improvements to French Landing Park, adding a millage allocation of \$35,997 to the previous allocation of \$99,261 for a total of \$135,258;
- Approved the Senior Alliance Annual Implementation Plan;
- Approved the upgrade and migration of the township's email application to Microsoft 365 Exchange On-line which would reside on Microsoft's Government Cloud Servers. In a memo, IT Director Steve Rankin said, "This is another step in ensuring that the township has the best cyber security protection available to service residents in our Premier Community without interruption";
- Approved the supervisor's reappointments of Leonard Armstrong. Alex Dine, Dave Schreiber (representing Wayne County) and Scott Medlen to the Local Development Finance Authority (LDFA) with terms to expire Aug. 12, 2027;
- Approved the supervisor's appointment of Peter Creal to the Planning Commission with a term to expire Oct. 1, 2025. Creal is leaving his seat on the Environmental Commission, where he served for five years;
- Heard Supervisor McNamara announce that as of July 19 and to October, parts of Ecorse Road will be closed near Stack's as DTE brings a second gas line into the township; and
- Heard Supervisor McNamara announce the community center is 51% complete and is on time and on budget. Clerk Wright congratulated Director of Community Services Elizabeth Renaud and Deputy Director Tammy Dohring and thanked them for their hard work on this project.

Gov. Whitmer names Sen. Camilleri to her new Growing Michigan council

On July 13, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer announced that Sen. Darrin Camilleri, D-Trenton, has been selected to serve on her Growing Michigan Together Council.

The council, which the governor said will look at ways to grow Michigan's population and establish a population goal for 2050, will also focus on improving Pre-K-12 educational outcomes and long-term funding solutions for higher education including financial aid.

Sen. Camilleri represents the tri-community in the Michigan Senate.

Should city OK proposed smokefree ordinance?

Belleville Councilwoman Kelly Bates, who works in Ann Arbor, proposed a smoke-free ordinance for the city at Monday's meeting, based on what Ann Arbor has approved. It applied to all the city buildings, bathrooms, city vehicles, all parks, the Fourth Street Square, and the kayak launch. The first violation would be a fine or community service.

It didn't go over so well.

"This is Belleville, not Ann Arbor," said Police Officer Bart Devos, who said he has smoked for 40 years and enjoys it. He said when he first became an officer, 80% of the officers smoked after upsetting incidents to unwind. He accused her of trying to impose her values on others.

Others in the audience who no longer smoked opposed her plan to ban smoking while the council had approved the BORA DORA procedure that allowed people to walk around drinking alcohol up and down Main Street and in Horizon Park. They called it a sin tax and pointed out smoking cigarettes was not against the law.

One called such an ordinance a sledgehammer approach, when a tack hammer was all that was needed. The city already had problems enforcing the ordinances it has, others said.

It was noted that fewer people are now smoking and the real killer was alcohol. No action was taken on the proposed ordinance. Councilman Bates wiped away her tears.

EXTRA THINGS I KNOW

Larry Bodenmiller, the oldest of three brothers, was a religious man who always carried a rosary and had considered being a priest. He had never smoked.

His niece Shannel Barnett called to tell me that the story on our front page last week about his death in the fire was wrong, especially about the idea that he and his brother smoking together may have been the cause of the fire.

She said Larry's brother, George, did smoke. George was released from the U of M Burn Unit on July 20.

The cause of the fire has yet to be determined, but it started on the screened-in porch, according to the fire department.

The two brothers had taken a long walk on the trails at the Lower Huron Metropark on July 12 and they were going to take a nap. She said Larry was found in his bed and the medical examiner told the family that he died of fumes from the fire.

She said Larry took care of George and they lived together. Now the family will be determining how to take care of George, who needs 24-hour care. She said the third brother is disabled and has a metal plate in his head after being struck by a drunk driver when he

Shannel said she, too, is disabled and is in a wheelchair. She said the obituary we printed

The story we printed had information from the fire department and we are sorry some things weren't quite right.

On Saturday, the Belleville City Council met for almost four hours to interview candidates for the vacant city manager position. One of the candidates held up an Independent and asked why the museum had been closed for

Councilwoman Kelly Bates said that it probably was by someone from a foreign country and Chief Faull said he actually was scammed by someone from Ann Arbor.

All three defendants end up pleading guilty to Egypt's 2017 murder

Two of the men charged in connection with Egypt Covington's 2017 murder pleaded guilty as their jury trial date neared.

The trial for Shandon R Groom, 30, and Timothy Eugene Moore, 37, both of Toledo was set to begin on July 24.

Instead, last week, both men pleaded guilty to second-degree murder. Moore also pleaded guilty to one count of felony firearm. Because of the pleas, charges of first-degree murder, felony murder, first-degree home invasion, and felony firearm were dismissed against the pair.

A third suspect, Shane Lamar Evans, 34, of Sumpter Township is currently in prison after pleading guilty to the same charge. He was sentenced to 15-25 years in May.

As part of his plea, Evans was going to testify against Groom and Moore at trial.

All three would have faced life in prison if convicted of the original charges. They have all been in the Wayne County Jail since their arrests in late 2020.

After the murder, Van Buren police began investigating, but Michigan State Police took over the investigation in August 2020. Evans and Moore were arrested in November 2020 and. Groom was taken into custody in December 2020.

Armeka Devonta-Marquis Thomas, 30, of Ypsilanti was video-arraigned Friday on 16 charges by 34th District Court Magistrate Al Hindman while in custody at the Van Buren Township Police Department.

His bond was set at \$50,000 cash and a probable cause conference scheduled for Aug. 2.

Thomas is accused of committing the offenses on July 19 in Van Buren Township. He is charged with:

- Possession of 50-449 grams of narcotic or cocaine;
- Three counts of possession of firearms by a felon;
- Three counts of possession of ammunition by a felon;
- One count of carrying a concealed veapon;
- Seven counts of felony firearm; and
- One count of assaulting / resisting / obstructing a police officer.

If he bonds out, he must have no firearms and be fitted with a GPS tether.

and fleeing a police officer.

In describing the arrest, Van Buren Township Deputy Chief Joshua Monte said officers arrested Thomas, at approximately 8 p.m. on July 19.

A Van Buren officer initially observed the vehicle Thomas was driving, traveling on Rawsonville near Grove and determined the vehicle was wanted out of Washtenaw County. An investigation was conducted in the parking lot of the Speedway gas station on Rawsonville Rd.

Deputy Chief Monte said Thomas, who was the driver and lone occupant of the vehicle, refused to show a driver's license or comply with the officer's orders. Thomas eventually exited the vehicle and attempted to flee on foot. The officer pursued Thomas on foot catching and tackling him in the parking lot of the gas station.

Back-up officers, including deputies from the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office, arrived to assist as Thomas continued to resist arrest. He was eventually handcuffed after a brief struggle with officers. The Van Buren officer suffered minor injuries during the struggle to take Thomas into custody, Deputy Chief Monte said.

Monte said Thomas was found to be in possession of multiple loaded handguns including a drum-fed, AR-style pistol. He also was in possession of a large quantity of cocaine, marijuana, amphetamine pills oxycodone pills and hydrocodone pills. Monte said.

Thomas was charged as a habitual offender for his previous felony convictions.





Belleville DDA votes to grant/loan Health Markets \$7,915 for sign

The Belleville Downtown Development Authority voted to give Michael Gatteri, owner of Health Markets at 186 Main St., \$7,915 as a 50% grant and a 50% loan over three years.

This was at the DDA's July 19 meeting where Gatteri's application was considered for a \$10,000 grant/loan for work on his building facade. Gatteri, of Van Buren Township, did not attend the meeting.

It was noted that Gatteri had already done the improvements that he wanted the DDA money for and that was not the proper step.

Mayor Kerreen Conley said Gatteri had painted the brick white which was against the overlay district the DDA put in place a few years ago. There was to be no painting of brick. She said there had been some brick repair and he closed off the Second Street entrance and the former ATM with brick. There were glass doors and windows added

The building was already ADA accessible, she said.

Signage was the only thing left on the list of things that could get grants, Mayor Conley said. She said he is working through the city for approval of the signage so that is not yet in place.

She made a motion to grant him the \$7,915 grant/loan for the signage and it was passed

unanimously by the DDA. DDA members Ivan Ankwatsa and Valerie Kelley-Bonner were absent from the meeting.

DDA member Jennifer Winter said when Egan's Pub got its façade grant/loan from the DDA they wanted to paint the brick at the top and were told they couldn't because of the overlay district rules that banned painting the brick.

"Can I get out my paintbrush now?" she asked, since Gatteri was able to paint his brick. She got no reply.

The former Douglas Carpet building also had its brick recently painted white by new owner 240 Main LLC.

Acting City Manager Steve Jones said that Gatteri first applied before the April 19 meeting, but something was incorrect on the application and had to be corrected. It was ready for the May meeting, but there were no DDA meetings in May or June.

In other business at the July 19 meeting, the DDA:

• Learned DDA member Ivan Ankwatsa told DDA chairperson Alicia McGovern verbally before this meeting that he will no longer be coming to DDA meetings because he is busy opening up another business location. She said she is waiting for a written resignation, but this means there now are two open seats on the DDA. She asked for those willing to serve to



Angelique Lana White

On May 11, 2022 Angelique Lana White, 23, of Westland pled no contest to a new charge of operating while intoxicatedfirst offense on Jan. 1, 2022 in Van Buren Township. Her original charge was operating while intoxicated-second offense, which was dismissed. She was sent to probation for a sentencing report. Sentencing was set for July 10 and then adjourned until Aug. 10.

On Aug. 10, Judge Oakley sentenced her to fines of \$1,300, serving house arrest on an alcohol monitor for not more than 60 days, 48 hours of community service, substance abuse treatment, and others.

Damion Eugene Devine

Damion Eugene Devine of Maplewood, MN, was present via video from the Wayne County Jail for his probable cause conference on May 18, 2022 on a charge of fleeing police in a vehicle on April 9, 2022 in Van Buren Township. Case closed.

He was then charged with domestic violence on Oct. 11, 2022 in Romulus. A final pretrial was set for April 5, 2023 and then set for May 10. On May 10, the final pretrial was adjourned until June 14 because attorney Josh Hadley said they are looking for a global resolution with this case and a related case at the Frank Murphy Hall of Justice with the same victim. The complainant was present on May 10 and will not have to return on June 14.

On June 14, the attorney was still looking for a global resolution and the case was adjourned to July 5. This was then adjourned to Aug. 9. Judge Martin discovered a warrant in the file for a home invasion-1st degree in Romulus on Feb. 9. She recalled the warrant and set that case for a June 21 court date. Then an Aug. 9 probable cause conference was set.

Michael Anthony Conroy

Michael Anthony Conroy, 50, of Taylor is charged with unlawful imprisonment, domestic violence-second offense, and interfering with a crime report on May 17, 2022 in Van Buren Township. He was present via video for his probable cause conference from the Wayne County Jail on June 1. His defense attorney said although his bond was set at \$1,500 (\$15,000/10%), he is on a parole hold and needs his preliminary exam as soon as possible. Judge Martin set his live preliminary exam for June 15, 2022. On June 15, Judge Martin dismissed the charges on a motion of the defense attorney.

Blake Alexander Metzger

Blake Alexander Metzger, 19, of Ypsilanti, was charged with felonious assault, malicious destruction of property (\$200 to \$1,000) and domestic violence on May 23, 2022 in Van Buren Township. He was free on \$5,000 personal bond and could not return to an address on Sylvia Drive or have any contact with the victim.

On June 1 he was before Judge Martin for his probable cause conference and she adjourned it until June 15 because defense attorney Sofia Nelson needed discovery. Frank Leonard Anderson

Frank Leonard Anderson, 28, of Sumpter Township was arraigned on a bench warrant by Magistrate Al Hindman on June 9, 2022. He is charged with assault & battery, disorderly person, two counts of malicious destruction of property, and breaking & entering (illegal entry) on Nov. 18, 2021 in Van Buren Township. His remote pretrial was set for June 16 and he was released on

\$3,000 personal bond.

He had failed to appear for his jury trial on April 12 and so a warrant was put out for his arrest. The warrant was cancelled once he was in custody. He said his attorney gave him the wrong court date. A live bench trial was scheduled for July 7, 2022.

July 7, his bench trial was held before Judge Martin. He pled guilty to one count of malicious destruction of property and the other charge of malicious destruction of property, counts of assault and battery, and disorderly person were dismissed. He also pled guilty to a charge of trespassing, which was the reduced charge of breaking & entering (illegal entry). Sentencing was set for Aug. 8. Police report no victim contact information in the file, so a letter was to be sent to have the victim who had lived on Parkwood be present for the sentencing. A review of the situation was scheduled for July 28. At that time the court reported it had



scheduled for review on Aug. 4.

On Aug. 4, an estimate from Parkwood management was presented, plus a memo to the judge saying the tenant is responsible for repairs.

The fine of \$2,250 was added to the current payment plan for a total of \$3,000. This is to be paid in \$50 payments beginning Aug. 19, with the last payment bu July 19, 2027.

Ashton Linn Brooks Kerry Williams

The live preliminary exams for Ashton Linn Brooks, 30, of Detroit and Kerry Williams, 31, of Detroit, who had the same charges on the same date in Van Buren Township, were waived on June 8, 2022 and the cases were bound over to circuit court for June 22 arraignments on the information. The calendar conference was set for July 14 and the pretrial for Williams set for Aug. 10 and for Brooks on Aug. 11.

They are charged with possession of burglar's tools and larceny from a motor vehicle on April 5, 2022 in Van Buren Township.

A final pretrial is set for Aug. 9. He was ordered not to return to an address on Maple and have no contact with the victim.

At his pretrial on Aug. 9 the case was dismissed.

Stephanie Marie Hawkins

Stephanie Marie Hawkins, 50, of Ypsilanti was due for her probable cause conference on July 6, 2022 on charges of stealing / retaining a financial transaction device without consent and stealing two FTDs on April 11, 2021 in Van Buren Township. The complaint was authorized on May 31, 2022. A bench warrant was put out for her arrest and she was in custody and arraigned on June 23, 2022. On July 6 a probable cause conference was set for July 13. On July 13, her defense attorney Sofia Nelson asked for an adjournment because this case involves a parallel case in Washtenaw County. Judge Martin adjourned the case until Aug. 3. Hawkins was free on \$10,000 personal bond and must not contact the protected party in the case.

A live exam was set for Sept. 7, 2022 and on that date it was learned the prosecutor did not send out the subpoenas for officer or the complaining witness.

Attorney Nelson said there is a companion case in Washtenaw County that already had been bound over and he asked for a dismissal. Judge Oakley said the people can file the charges again, if desired, and the defendant still owes \$720 to the court for misdemeanor charges.

Judge Oakley dismissed the charges.
