VBT OKs resolution to move forward on Haggerty construction

The Van Buren Township Board of Trustees unanimously approved an Intergovernmental Agreement with Wayne County for reconstruction of and water main work adjacent to Haggerty Road north of Ecorse Road. This was at its regular meeting on Aug. 16.

The township will pay the entire cost for water main reconstruction enlarging the water main from 12" to 16", estimated to cost \$2,475,670.20, to service present and upcoming development along Haggerty.

The township also has agreed to pay road reconstruction cost of up to 8% -- \$458,294.90 -- over estimated total combined construction, design, and construction engineering cost of \$5,728,673.63, associated with the reconstruction of Haggerty Road between Ecorse and Van Born roads.

Work is expected to start in the spring of 2023 and competitive bids will be taken during the winter.

Supervisor Kevin McNamara said more than \$2 million worth of development is planned on the west side of Haggerty and some of the existing businesses have had water-flow problems. There also have been fire-fighting capability problems. This project was planned for a later time, but got moved up in priority to coincide with the better prices the township would get by tying it to the road project.

In other action at the one-hour meeting on Aug. 16, the board:

•Held a public hearing and then established the Greenbriar Special Assessment District for \$750,000 to upgrade the roads in the subdivision and set a public hearing. Supervisor Kevin McNamara was recused and left the meeting during the discussion because he lives in Greenbriar and had a conflict of interest. He did not vote on the

VBT DDA considers what to do about obsolete streetlights

The Van Buren Township Downtown Development Authority was informed at its regular meeting Aug. 23 that its lightpoles along Belleville Road are obsolete and the DDA's stock of replacement parts is depleted.

Executive Director Susan Ireland said the DDA had been in contact with its representative from GrayBar who informed her that the streetlights are obsolete and Holophane would have to see if any of their parts could be retrofitted so that the DDA can continue to use its existing streetlights.

Director Ireland said, after no responses from their representative at GrayBar, they were informed that the DDA's representative no longer worked for the company and they were directed to another representative, who didn't reply to them either.

"As a result, staff contacted the DDA's representative for community lighting at DTE and a meeting was set up," Ireland said.

She said in front of Comerica Bank a vehicle ran over one of the DDA's original Gingko trees, flipped over and hit a light pole. A claim has been submitted to the insurance company.

Ireland told the DDA that DTE installed a sample pole there.

DDA chairman Craig Atchinson said they tried those lights before and the DDA

didn't like it.

Ireland said she will see how much the sample light would cost.

Atchinson commented on distracted driving, saying his insurance company now requires him to have a distracted driving clause affirming no one driving my car is on the cellphone, etc. He said Atchinson buys the cars on the lot and so they all are technically his.

Former Romulus Mayor Burcroff pleads guilty to federal wire fraud

LeRoy Burcroff, former mayor of the City of Romulus, on Aug. 25 pled guilty

to a wire fraud charge before Judge Denise Page Hood in U.S. District Court

Under federal law -18 U.S.C. 1343 – Wire Fraud -- a guilty plea could bring a fine and/ or up to 20 years in



Residents "deserve to LeRoy Burcroff be served by public officials of the highest integrity," Detroit U.S. Attorney Dawn Ison said in a statement. "Those who abuse positions of trust by misusing campaign donations for their own benefit will face stiff consequences."

The advisory guideline range for a sentence cited by prosecutors would send Burcroff to prison for up to 14 months. His lawyer Walter Piszczatowski argued the range is no higher than 10 months. The sentence ultimately will be decided Dec. 8 by Judge Hood.

Burcroff, 58, pleaded guilty in federal court in Detroit three months after prosecutors charged him.

Instead of spending campaign funds according to law, prosecutors say he spent the money on his daughter's wedding, a Florida vacation, flowers, a \$4,500 booze bill and dues and expenses at the Belleville

According to the indictment on May 13, U.S. Attorney Dawn S. Ison and Assistant U.S. Attorney Eaton P. Brown, state, "On or about Nov. 11, 2017 in the Eastern District of Michigan, Southern Division, the defendant, LeRoy Burcroff, for the purpose of executing a scheme to defraud, did cause to be transmitted by

means of wire communication in interstate commerce, a signal and sound involving a \$2,428 payment to the Belleville Yacht Club, from a Comerica Bank checking account entitled, 'Committee to Elect LeRoy D. Burcroff."

The indictment continued: "Burcroff used the scheme to defraud to convince individuals to contribute money to him for the purpose of supporting Burcroff's efforts to be elected as the Mayor of the City of Romulus, Michigan through the Committee to Elect LeRoy D. Burcroff. In truth and in fact, however, Burcroff used over \$15,000 of the money contributed to his campaign account for his own personal benefit instead of to benefit the campaign.

"All in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1343."

The plea cut-off date had been extended from July 26 to Aug. 25 at 3 p.m. to further plea negotiations and the trial date was extended from July 27 to Sept. 6.

"This case is yesterday's news. LeRoy decided not to run for reelection in 2021 and the campaign fund has been fully reimbursed," Piszczatowski said to The Detroit News.

"Burcroff betrayed his supporters and neighbors, the people of Wayne County, by embezzling their donations to fund his lifestyle," said James Tarasca, special agent in charge of the FBI's office in Detroit.

Burcroff was first elected in 2013 but did not run for re-election in November amid questions about the FBI investigation. He was succeeded by Robert McCraight.

Former Taylor Mayor Rick Sollars is awaiting trial in a federal corruption case that involves allegations he cashed more than \$30,000 worth of campaign checks at a party store while corrupting a city foreclosed-property program.

Wayde Hoppe approved to design new Sumpter Township Fairgrounds

Wayde Hoppe, an architect who lives in Van Buren Township and designs developments for Davenport Brothers Construction, churches, and other groups, was approved to design the new Sumpter Township Fairgrounds and prepare a master plan for the fairgrounds, with four associated designs.

Trustee Peggy Morgan cast the only nay vote on Hoppe Design's \$11,500 contract at the township's regular meeting Aug. 23.

Hoppe told the township board in its workshop session that an initial land survey was part of his proposal and the uses will be put on top of that survey. He said the first part of the project would have to do with the circulation of people and he would include a curb cut, fencing, lighting, and decorative art, the work along the roadway.

He said his contract does not include cost estimates for the work.

At the Aug. 9 meeting, Supervisor Tim Bowman announced his recommendation to give the fencing contract to Davenport Brothers and asked for a motion. No motion was offered except to accept his

At the Aug. 23 meeting, Trustee Morgan questioned the minutes about that exchange, saying she was absent from that meeting, but watched the video recording of the session, and maybe the other board members would like to table approval of the minutes until they could review that part of the meeting.

Trustee Matthew Oddy said it was his understanding that the contract approval was part of his report.

Trustee Morgan also noted that the minutes did not reflect the addition of the words "with regret" to the resignation of a fire fighter and she asked that this be added.

Township attorney Rob Young addressed the board on the process for amending the minutes and led them into making a motion with one change, adding "with regret," but not changing anything about Supervisor Bowman's recommendation for Davenport.

The minutes were amended with the one change with Trustee Morgan voting no.

Later Oddy amended the agenda to add a vote on confirming Davenport's contract, which passed 6-1 with Trustee Morgan

Trustee Morgan said that when attorney Young adds something to his report that needs board approval but is not on the official agenda, he says that approving his report will include approving that item as well, but Bowman did not say that.

During the public comment at the beginning of the regular meeting, Eric Partridge said he was concerned that the fencing bid went to the highest bidder and Allied Fencing was actually the lowest

Partridge said Allied's bid was \$18,000 cheaper than Davenport's bid and Partridge's own bid was \$3,000 cheaper.

"It upsets me," Partridge said. "I think Allied Fence should get the job." He said there was no master plan in place and going out for bids for fencing was putting the cart before the horse.

Later, while the board was discussing the minutes, Partridge said awarding the bid was collusion and conflict of interest. He

said the winning bid put in services that weren't in the scope of the specifications. He said Allied Fence gave him a copy of its bid and board members were not provided

"I'll leave," Partridge said, standing in the audience. "You're wrong. You're corrupt." He left the meeting.

Trustee Tim Rush said the meeting was getting a little testy. He said the board is not obligated to take the lowest bid, but to choose the best bidder. He said the board all looked at the two bids.

Township Manager Tony Burdick explained, saying originally when the bids were put out, three bids were submitted. Then the specifications regarding residential and commercial fencing were amended. He said just after July 22, he sent out an email asking all the bidders to confirm their bids.

He said Allied never responded to the request for confirmation of the new set of specifications.

Trustee Morgan said Allied's original bid already had the commercial fencing that was in the amended specifications.

Manager Burdick said he talked to the owner and he said he "missed it," referring to submitting the confirmation.

Trustee Morgan said Partridge explained to the township the difference between residential and commercial fencing. She said when Partridge spoke to Bowman about it, he replied, "I'm not a fence guy."

She said Davenport added ground work to their bid, but it was never a part of the specifications. Trustee Morgan said the other two didn't bid on that because they didn't have the big equipment.

Burdick said the township encouraged bidders to walk the site and make suggestions. "It wasn't part of the specifications,"

Trustee Morgan stated and Burdick said he Trustee Morgan, referring to Burdick's

preparation of the minutes of the previous meeting, asked if he looked at the recording of the meeting and he said he assumed the contract approval was part of the report.

In other business at the Aug. 23 meeting.

- · Approved hiring Nelson Hammons as a full-time police officer, contingent upon him passing a drug test in addition to the required physical and psychological examinations. Public Safety Director / Police Chief Eric Luke said Hammons got married the previous Saturday and so he wasn't at the meeting. Director Luke said he would bring him to an upcoming meeting to introduce him;
- · Approved the financial audit of the fiscal year ending March 31, 2022 as submitted by PSLZ, LLP. It was an unmodified opinion, with "nothing bad to report." She said there is a \$10 million fund balance in the general fund and the pension liability is 90% funded. Landfill revenue was down \$210,000 for the year. None of the ARPA funds have been spent;
- · Approved the quote from West Shore Services for repair of emergency siren #9, Sherwood at Arkona, at a cost of \$3,760;
- · Approved having UIS install communication equipment at the Martinsville Road pump station at a cost of \$9,325, plus a review of the current

Independent can't accept advertising for marijuana shop

Blue Sky Cannabis Co., soon to open on Savage Road in the City of Belleville, reached out to the *Independent* over the weekend for advertising rates so it could advertise its business.

The *Independent* uses the U.S. Postal Service to deliver its subscriptions. Marijuana is still a controlled substance at the federal level. Our legal consultants say that means we can't accept advertising for marijuana products or shops or cooperatives.

Although marijuana is legal in Michigan, it still is a controlled substance where it counts for our subscriptions.

Blue Sky's new sign is very nice and its building is all repainted and sharp-looking.

In Belleville there is a move by the same people who got the recreational marijuana business approved to move some of those licenses out of the local law and replace them with medical marijuana licenses. That item will be on the Nov. 8 ballot in the City of Belleville. Some of our readers have posted comments on our website telling people to vote against marijuana in Belleville, but it's too late for that. Recreational marijuana shops have already been approved by voters.

Belleville officials say this new ballot question is to the city's benefit. A yes vote will remove the 11-page ordinance put into the city charter by voters. Some of the recreational licenses will become medical marijuana licenses. Confusing.

EXTRA THINGS I KNOW

When the strong wind gusts hit the Belleville Farmers' Market on Monday afternoon, we understand people from Egan's Pub ran across Main Street to hold down the tents. The wind gusts were violent but passed through quickly.

There were power outages in pockets throughout the tri-community and lots of tree trimming, with leaves and small branches in yards and on streets.

We see that Shawn Fix, 40, of Sumpter Township is one of five having their preliminary exams in Antrim County District Court in Traverse City. He is one of the defendants with state charges having to do with the alleged plot to kidnap/kill the governor.

This is a preliminary exam which will determine if there is enough probable cause to bind them over to circuit court for trial.

Gov. Whitmer's summer home is in Birch Lake in Antrim County and that's where some of the activity was, so that's why the charges were brought there.

Dekenta Reshard Parchman, 30, of Westland was unable to appear for an arraignment/pretrial at 34th District Court on Aug. 18 because he had COVID in jail. This new arraignment was on a charge of threats from a 2020 incident in Romulus.

He also was due for an Aug. 24 probable cause conference on five felonies from his alleged torture of a woman at Parkwood Apartments on July 23, but he didn't appear because he was in a nursing home receiving medical care for seven gunshot wounds he received in another incident. His virtual probable cause conference was set, with hopes, for Aug. 31.

Ireland said the DDA has a \$1,000 deductible. She said she wants to try to find out what parts will cost and she wants general feedback on the sample pole.

Director Mark Laginess said he would like to see one more distinctive than the sample pole.

"Won't it look strange to have 50 poles and other designs mixed in?" said vicechairperson Carol Bird.

"You don't want a hodge-podge," Ireland responded.

Ireland presented Deputy Director Lisa Lothringer's report in her absence and Lothringer, as well, addressed the street light problem.

In her written report, Lothringer said staff met with Courtney Baum, the DDA's new Community Lighting Account Manager from DTE. She said they discussed the potential benefits of using DTE stock products thus eliminating the time that staff spends trying to source extremely scarce replacement parts, file insurance claims and stock parts for repairs. She said Baum showed them how DTE has improved their LED lights to allow for better light distribution through increased lumens while using lower wattage.

Lothringer wrote that staff will provide the DDA's feedback to the DTE rep and then meet with her again to discuss options under the Community Lighting Program. That will be brought back to the DDA.

Ireland said DTE would take care of the pole and insurance in their program.

"We'll see what we can put together,"

• Unanimously approved and confirmed the application of a Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant. The DDA will develop an SS4A Action Plan Grant application with the assistance of the Wade Trim FundingScout Division that would extend beyond the DDA boundaries. Cost is not to exceed \$15,000 and the DDA and township would each pay half. The township board has already approved its portion. The SS4A has an allocation of more than \$1 billion of funding available and the minimum award for this grant is \$200,000;

• After discussion, approved buying one bike repair station for Harris Park at a cost of \$1,730 with customization skin with logo included, plus \$100 shipping and \$500 installation, from low bidder Penchura. Director Joyce Rochowiak voiced concern about vandalism and the prospect of having to spend money on repairs. Three bike stations had been requested by Assistant Executive Director Lisa Lothringer, who was not present:

• On an 8-1 vote approved Grosse Ile Lawn Sprinkler to continue with the installation of the winter holiday season lighting for one year at a cost of \$9,350 for Harris Park and the monument sign property. Voting no was Director Victor Delibera who said he had voted for this twice, but he had a major issue with Christmas lights and using other people's money to put them up. He suggested having students from the school put up the lights. Chairman Atchinson said the DDA doesn't have to do anything and could have no lights. Vice-chairperson Bird said years back the lights at the triangle were out more than on. She said these professionals come out and fix them immediately. Director Velon Willis made the motion for one year and Director Joe Baskin seconded the motion, noting they should be evaluated every year. Grosse Ile Lawn Sprinkler had submitted quotes for one year, three years (\$26,719), and five

years (\$44,899);

· Approved the financial audit for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2021, with total fund balance of \$5,138,836. It carried an unmodified opinion, reflecting no problems;

• Approved the amended 2022 DDA budget and the proposed 2023 DDA budget. Ireland said 2023 is kept flat with no big projects. However, the \$1.1 million expenditure for the theater portion of the new community center that had been set for 2022 has been moved to a 2023 expenditure. Tax capture for 2023 is expected to be \$2,030,000 and fund balance at the end of 2023 is expected at \$5,191,891; and

• Heard Ireland report that two business parcels in the DDA district are before the state tax tribunal: Auto Zone and Aldi's. She said if the two are successful, it will affect the DDA by \$5,530.

decision. The estimated total assessment for each parcel is \$4,455 which may be paid in up to five annual installments of \$891 each, which includes 1.5% interest. The township board will meet at 6 p.m., Sept. 6, to review the SAD roll and hear objections from the public before voting to approve the roll;

- Approved Supervisor McNamara's appointment of architect Bernard Grant to the planning commission with a term to expire Oct. 1, 2022;
- Approved McNamara's appointment of Van Buren Public Schools Supt. Peter Kudlak to the Local Development Finance Authority and to reappoint Van Buren Public Schools Finance Director Sara Cortese to the LDFA. Both terms expire Aug. 12, 2026;
- Approved the personal services agreement as Network Administrator in Information Technology for Brad Barbaza at a salary of \$78,000. His career was working with Information Technology with the City of Dearborn's Police Department of more than 300 personnel. McNamara said they received more than 40 resumes through INDEED and he came out on top. He started the next morning;
- Approved selecting the only bidder Davenport Brothers Construction for the French Landing Park Phase II for a total of \$490,544. Russell Design, the township's landscape architects, recommended not accepting two of three proposed alternates: seeded lawn in lieu of sod or milling asphalt in lieu of removing and disposing. Russell did recommend alternated #3 for composite rail fence in lieu of cedar rail fence, which increased the bid price by \$15,660, making it \$490,544;
- Approved the agreement between the township and the City of Romulus for the provision of water services to a property owner at 13164 Hannan Rd., at the responsibility of the property owner;
- Approved the agreement between the township and Wayne County Airport Authority for the east side infrastructure project to construct potable water and sanitary sewer to support their facilities at Willow Run. The Authority will incur all the costs and when complete turn it over to the township, McNamara said;
- Approved a Management Consultant Professional Services Agreement with the township's retired Water & Sewer Director James T. Taylor for \$100 per hour, to work no more than 20 hours per calendar month. McNamara said the Water & Sewer directorship changed three times since Taylor left and he has been consulting to make sure everything is done right. "We want to give Director [Kevin] Lawrence all he needs to succeed," McNamara said of the latest director;
- Under public comment, heard Reg Ion say he is impressed with the looks of the museum but he would like to see the total cost. He also requested the township

do an air quality study on the Beck/ Ecorse area next to the airport. He said for about a mile it is dust, dust, dust. He said on Denton and Ecorse roads you have to roll your windows up. Trustee Donald Boynton interrupted Ion's comments and said the hill of spoils, the huge mound of pavement there at the airport, is pretty much gone. Ion said it is not gone. · Heard Ion say Clerk Leon Wright was a "lousy clerk" because he does not get good sized flags at the polls for election day and sometimes there are no flags at all. "You failed big time on flags on election day," he said, noting this was the fourth or fifth election he has complained to Wright about the flags. He accused Wright of putting "itty-bitty flags" up. Wright disagreed, saying he got awards for being "a lousy clerk." He said big flags don't fit in the bags prepared for the poll workers and sometimes the volunteer workers don't pull them out. Flem Stiltner, IV, sentenced to 29-50 years for killing, dumping father

On Aug. 18, Flem Stiltner IV, 27, was sentenced by Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Wanda Evans to 29 to 50 years in prison after pleading guilty to seconddegree murder in the Aug. 9, 2020 death of his father, 48-year-old Flem Stiltner III.

Stiltner IV was initially charged with first-degree murder for allegedly stabbing his father to death in Wayne and then placing him into the back of a pickup truck and leaving it at Quirk and Belleville roads in Van Buren Township. He also had been charged with home invasion-first degree and tampering with evidence and those three charges were dismissed in exchanged for the guilty plea.

He also was fined \$1,898. Stiltner IV received credit for 739 days of time served.

On Aug. 9, 2020 Michigan State Police

were notified by the Van Buren Township Police Department of a dead body in the bed of a pickup truck that was found stuck in the grass around Belleville Lake in its township. An investigation by the Wayne Police Department and MSP led to the identification and arrest.

Kenneth Ray Barrett

Kenneth Ray Barrett, 61, of Willis, had his probable cause conference adjourned until Sept. 21 on charges of driving while license suspended causing death and failture to stop at the scene of an accident / death on July 27 in Van Buren Township.

His defense attorney Seymour Schwartz said he received discovery and, "I couldn't get to it." He asked for the probable cause conference on Aug. 24 to be adjourned. Judge Martin set it for Sept. 21. Schwartz said his client has a pretrial for a suspended license in Oakland County.

Prosecutor Marc Fedorak said he has two officers to testify for the preliminary exam and the medical report as part of the evidence. The date of the exam has yet to be set.

contract with UIS;

- Approved the reappointment of Richard Pokerwinski to the planning commission with a term to expire July 23, 2025. The board also approved moving Dan Watson from the alternate position to a regular position on the planning commission;
- Approved directing the township supervisor, attorney, and manager to begin assessment and design planning for the Banotai Park and Sherwood Pond Reclamation and Improvement process and entertain design bids for township board consideration. Trustee Morgan voted no. She said such a five-year plan is usually done by Parks & Recreation Commission. Young said this is limited to Banotai Park and will be incorporated into the township's five-year recreation plan. Burdick said the township's Parks & Recreation Master Plan expired last December. He said they are seeking citizen input on this on the

township's web site and also on paper at the township offices;

- Approved unanimously Manager Burdick as the Sumpter Township Interim Parks Administrator, an item added to the agenda by Trustee Oddy. He said Burdick would deal with the county, but the Parks & Recreation Commission would generate the grants. Trustee Morgan asked if Burdick will be replacing Sharon Pokerwinski who currently deals with the county on the grants. Oddy said they were not replacing her and she will bring grants to the township manager. He said this is bringing the new township manager into the loop;

VBT planners approve Kenworth's final site plan for N. Service Dr.

The final site plan for a 62,750-square-foot building with related site improvements for outdoor vehicle sales and vehicle showroom uses with accessory vehicle repair and service was approved for a 20acre site at 44660 N. I-94 Service Dr.

This site is located between National RV and Camping World locations.

At its regular meeting Aug. 24, the Van Buren Township Planning Commission unanimously granted approval after discussing the problem with the county drainage ditch that cuts off the proposed sidewalk and water main in front.

That means constructing the required sidewalk will be more costly because it will have to traverse the Quirk Drain, a county ditch, with a bridge estimated at \$400,000.

Dan Power, planning and economic development director, said the applicant did not wish to invest in the sidewalk at this time and negotiated an agreement with the township to defer the construction of the sidewalk until a later date when the National RV site is required to build its sidewalk. As part of the agreement, the applicant will pay \$28,225 into the township's sidewalk fund to be used towards construction of the sidewalk within three years of occupancy.

There also was no public water main to the site, so the developer is being asked to build a 12-inch water main from Camping World to the west by 500 feet. The township is not requiring construction of the water main across Quirk Drain.

"The sidewalk is a challenge," Director Power said. He said the developer is being asked to extend a water main on someone else's property. Also, they will seek a variance to the pond ordinance to put in a dry pond.

"If approved by the board, it will be ready to go into pre-construction mode," Power

The applicant, Jeff Minter of CSM Companies, Inc., said they have been working on this project for the better part of a year and are getting ready for breaking

Commissioner Jeff Jahr asked if the \$28,225 mentioned is a performance bond and Power said it essentially is. Commissioner Jahr noted that the paperwork said it needed approval of the Downtown Development Authority and Power replied it was in the DDA district and it should go before the DDA to make sure they're comfortable with it.

Jahr also asked if it needed the approval of Wayne County and Power replied challenges could keep them from approving the sidewalk design. It will have to have a review by Wayne County because it's in the county's right of way, Power said.

"What happens in three years if no sidewalk is built and the bond forfeited?" Jahr asked and Power said the township would hire somebody.

Jahr said no cost overage is included and Power agreed that was true.

The gap is 130 feet on the National RV property and they would stay away from the road, if possible, according to one option, said Commission Chairman Bryon Kelley.

Power said if the bridge was outside of the right of way it would cost more and McKenna consultant Vidya Krishnan said it would be five times the cost estimate.

Paul Kammer, engineering consultant from Fishbeck, said it would cost \$80,000 for a bridge to just be delivered to the site and it is a "significant undertaking."

"A bridge too far," commented Krishnan. "We really need sidewalks on that road,"

Jahr said. "Sidewalks are very important to us in Van Buren Township. We need sidewalks, particularly along that road." Jahr also noted the technical design of the pond doesn't match the applicant's design and he wondered if the township's technical manual needs an update.

Kammer said the Van Buren Township manual has not been changed since 2014 and, yes, it needs an update.

Krishnan suggested the applicant should be responsible for any overage in cost.

Minter said they are not going to do a \$300,000 bridge. He said any construction would be more efficient while their equipment is on site.

Jahr made the motion to approve the final site plan with reasonable overages if the township has to seize the bond. This was seconded by Commissioner Medina Atchinson and the motion passed unanimously.

"We are not requesting you build a bridge," Commissioner Atchinson said.

Minter agreed to work with the township to come up with a plan for a sidewalk that was agreeable.

Zippy Auto Wash

The proposed Zippy Auto Wash at 11650 Belleville Rd. will be seeking a variance for relief from minimum glass requirements on a front building façade under the Belleville Road Overlay District. The planning commission was asked to comment informally on the project so its thoughts can be sent on to the Board of Zoning Appeals.

The site is located on the west side of Belleville Road between Maria's and the drive back to the medical clinic, behind it.

The car wash was turned slightly to have the long part of the building facing Belleville Road, which requires 50% glass and just 46% is glass on the plans.

Present were Dave Brewer of the design firm and Corey Weaver of Saline the owner, with his wife Michelle, of the Zippy car washes in Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, Saline and four more coming up including the Van Buren Township site and one in Canton.

Weaver said their business wants to be a part of the communities that host them and has donated a quarter of a million dollars to more than 100 community organizations. He said the project includes two EV charging stations and is made of concrete construction, so there is no opportunity for

Brewer said this is the fanciest Zippy yet and Commissioner Jahr said, "It's a beautiful car wash. Fanciest car wash I've

The white building has a blue roof and a residential look to the design.

Bernie Grant, an architect who is the newest member of the planning commission, said he understands they want people to recognize their brand and don't want to deviate from the design.

"We changed the 45-degree angle on

suggestion of township staff and we really like it," Weaver said.

Discussion on side-entry garages and building separation

The commission also discussed at length a proposal to change the zoning requirements for the minimum percentage for sideentry garages and building separation in residential developments.

Krishnan presented photos of homes 10 feet apart in Northville, Ypsilanti, Plymouth, and Pittsfield Township.

The commission had asked to see what it looked like in communities with the 10foot setback and garages set forward or

Krishnan said developers want to finish the planned residential developments in Van Buren Township, but if they follow present rules, the prices are too high for young families to afford.

Commissioner Grant said in the 1940s and '50s, such higher density was built and, "You're building a wall." He said maybe a portion of a subdivision could have the higher density.

Commissioner Callie Barr agreed, "It looks super-tight."

Grant commented on the drainage between the houses with 10-foot setbacks. He said while that may be open with drainage between the homes, residents often bring in extra fill and there is a change from the time it was built.

Atchinson encouraged planners to continue their work and Krishnan said they could fine-tune the proposal and bring it

"We're the only one requiring 20 feet and we are trying to learn from their mistakes," Krishnan said of nearby communities.


Pond design

Positive COVID tests total 10,574 for residents in 48111 zip code

The Wayne County Health Department announced that as of Monday, Aug. 29, positive COVID test results have totaled 10,574 for the population in the 48111 zip code. That number had been 10,482 on Monday, Aug. 15.

The number of deaths from COVID in the 48111 area remains at 138, where it was on Aug. 1.

On Monday, Aug. 29, the separate case totals released by the Health Department for the tri-community were: Van Buren Township, 7,327 positive cases and 91 deaths; City of Belleville, 1,144 positive cases and 14 deaths; and Sumpter Township 2,103 positive cases and 33 deaths.
