Court Watching: Thomas Cahill bound over for homicide, co-defendant freed

Thomas Charles Cahill, 22, a Sumpter Township resident who is charged with the bludgeoning murder of his grandfather, has been bound over to Wayne County Circuit Court for trial.

At a 90-minute preliminary exam on the afternoon of Jan. 11, 34th District Court Judge Brian A. Oakley found there was enough evidence to bind Cahill over on charges of homicide, torture, attempted arson, larceny in a building, and stealing a credit card, all on Dec. 2 in Sumpter Township.

The defendant's grandfather, Charles James Cahill, 82, died of his injuries on Dec. 23 and so the previous first charge of "assault with intent to murder" against Thomas Cahill was upgraded to homicide.

His co-defendant Chanice Khadish Letang, 20, was charged with accessory after the fact to a felony, but Judge Oakley found there was not enough evidence to bind her over for trial, so that charge was dismissed. She was defended by retained attorney Jill Schinske.

Letang was free after posting bond of \$10,000/10%, but Thomas Cahill has been in the Wayne County Jail without bond since his arrest Dec. 4. Thomas Cahill's court-appointed attorney is Luther Glenn. The preliminary exam before Judge Oakley began with the first witness, Sumpter Township Officer Colleen Carefelle, telling how she was dispatched to 25 E. Arizona in Holiday West mobile home park with her partner Officer Christopher Herrick at 8:43 p.m., Dec. 2. She testified that dispatch said a male was having a possible stroke and bleeding from the head.

When she knocked on the door, Angela Morris told her to come in and she smelled a strong odor of gasoline, she said. Charles Cahill was sitting in a chair, slumped over, (continued on page 3)

On Saturday night, Van Buren Township Fire Department, with the help of Belleville Fire Department, fought a house fire on Cumberland Drive, just off Martinsville Road in Country Walk subdivision. The roof collapsed about 7:25 p.m. VBT Fire Marshal David McInally said the fire started in the garage and the homeowners didn't know it was burning until they opened the door to the attached garage and saw the flames. They got out of the house with their dogs. Two cats were found after the fire was out - one under the deck and one in the house, both fine. A third cat was found Sunday morning and seems to be all right, said Fire Chief Dan Besson. Sumpter Township Fire Department staged at VBT Fire Station #1 at Hull/Sumpter roads to handle calls for VBT and the city while they were fighting the fire. As the *Independent* went to press there was no report on what started the fire.

Sumpter Twp. Police issue warning on possible cougar sighting

The Sumpter Township Police Department was recently contacted by a property owner in the area of Sumpter and Kozma roads regarding a large feline that he had observed on his property three times since Nov. 1, 2016. Police issued a Nixel alert with the following information:

The property owner took a video of the feline during the November sighting and had a relatively close contact with it again just three days ago. He explained that he contacted the DNR about it possibly being a cougar, but was not satisfied with their response and decided to contact Sumpter

Township Police.

Officers went to the property and were able to confirm that the layout of the land appears to positively match that in the video. Officers also measured the tall grass shown directly behind the cat as 7-8 feet tall (note: video was taken on Nov. 1, measurement taken on Jan. 14).

Sumpter Township Police reached out to a local exotic animal expert, who after viewing the video has confirmed the animal as a large feline; definitely not a house cat and possibly a cougar. He also believes that it's probably illegally owned by a private individual and has escaped.

Based on the video and subsequent scene measurements the expert gives an approximate height of the feline at 2 1/2 to 3 feet at the shoulder. He stresses that wild cougars have a range of 100 miles or more

and could possibly be a threat, especially to other animals.

We note however that Sumpter Township has had no other reported sightings of the cat or any unexplained attacks on domestic or wild animals. We have reached out to the DNR and will post any new information to our Facebook page (Sumpter Township Police Department) as it becomes available.

with dry blood all over his face and a large gash on his head, Carefelle testified. She said blood was dripping from his head and brain matter was on the coffee table and floor

She said he was alert and talking when she arrived. She said she asked him if he had fallen and she couldn't understand his reply. Then he yelled out "Tommy" twice.

That's when Officer Herrick started to look for Thomas Cahill, who lived in the home with his grandfather and Morris. Carefelle said Morris stayed in a bedroom with a lock on the door.

Carefelle said she saw a hammer submerged in water in the sink in the kitchen. Michigan State Police were called to the scene to collect evidence and they collected the hammer, bagged it, and gave it to Carefelle. A gas can from the enclosed porch also was collected by MSP and bagged as evidence. Carefelle testified about a charred welcome mat and a battery charger that was knocked over on the porch. MSP also took pictures.

Carefelle said a fire fighter pointed out a cigarette butt on Cahill's lap. She said Morris' room was closed and locked.

Charles Cahill was transported to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital by Huron Valley Ambulance, Carefelle said.

The second witness was Sumpter Police Sgt. Christopher McGlynn who was sent to the hospital to pick up the belongings of the victim at 7 a.m., Dec. 3. He testified he could smell gasoline from the several paper bags he was given. He said the bags were secured in Lt. Patrick Gannon's office and later the items were put into 11 different bags, processed and tabulated, and put into the evidence room. Gannon is the evidence officer, he said.

The third witness was Sumpter Officer Joseph Balowski who was called in on Dec. 3. He said he and Sumpter Detective John Toth put out a BOL (be on the lookout) for the Kia driven by Letang, Thomas Cahill's girlfriend. They had already talked to Letang's adoptive mother who lives in Van Buren Township. Balowski testified that a VBT police unit found the car at the Red Roof Inn.

Det. Toth got the ledger from the motel and located Letang in room 239, Balowski testified. He said he did a loud "police knock" on the door and after about two minutes Thomas Cahill opened the door. Balowski said he asked him to step out of the room and for permission to pat him down and he complied. He had no weapon and there was no blood on him, Balowski

He testified Letang was there and he searched the room with Letang's consent, since she had booked the room, and

recovered a green towel from a rack by the bathroom door with a 3-4" smeared circle stain believed to be blood. It was not a hotel towel. He said he also found clothing in the northwest corner of the room behind a chair. It was male work clothing from Salisbury Landscaping, where Thomas Cahill had worked and in later questioning said he had quit. Multiple small stains appearing to be blood were on the jeans.

Balowski also testified he went inside the Kia in the parking lot with the permission of Letang and found what appeared to be blood on the passenger seat, between the size of a quarter and a dime.

Letang drove her car behind police cars to the Sumpter station to voluntarily discuss the situation and Thomas Cahill asked for a ride with police to come in for questioning, and Officer Beth Egerer gave him a ride, Balowski said.

Det. Toth was the fourth witness, testifying he was at home that night and came to 25 E. Arizona 30 minutes into the incident. He said he saw the ambulance drive off with the victim.

Toth testified he observed "brain blood" all over the coffee table next to the La-Z-Boy chair and on the floor. He said he saw what he believed to be skull fragments on the floor. He explained brain blood is more raised than regular blood. He also saw the charred black welcome mat and noticed the strong smell of the gas. He said he went to look at the hammer in the dirty dish water in the sink and almost fell down because the linoleum on the entire kitchen floor was slippery.

Toth said they tried to find Thomas Cahill to see what he was up to during this time and they were looking for him and his girlfriend. He said they were given information by Letang's adoptive mother that the couple was at the Westland Motel 6, but they found there is no Motel 6 in Westland. That's when VBT police located them at the Red Roof Inn.

Toth said neither Thomas Cahill nor his girlfriend were suspects at the time. Toth said he advised Letang of her rights and she said she gave Thomas Cahill a ride, leaving work early at 2:45 p.m. and picking him up at his home at 3 p.m. She said they went to Taco Bell, Walmart, Red Roof Inn, Walmart, and Red Roof Inn. Toth said she paid for the room with her cash.

Toth said at a later time she said Thomas Cahill came out of his home with a clear trash bag over his shoulder with clothing that belonged to somebody else. They drove to his biological brother's home on Rawsonville Road and put the bag in the passenger side of a red truck his brother was going to buy. Toth said he took out a backpack.

Toth said Letang indicated Thomas was moving out and she had visited with Charles Cahill for a time.

These are the teachers and administrators and their annual salaries for 2016 as reported by National Heritage Academies which operates Keystone Charter Academy located on Bemis Road in Sumpter Township.

Teachers and administrators in the State of Michigan are required to be named and their wages listed for the state registry.

These teachers and administrators working at Keystone Academy are hired and paid by National Heritage Academies in Grand Rapids. Under the law, NHA is not required to give out any more information than what is in the state registry listing.

Keystone is a free, public school academy serving 768 students in grades K-8 and operating under a charter contract issued by an authorizing body - Bay Mills Community College.

The Keystone Academy Board has entered into a services agreement with NHA, an educational service provider.

Through this services agreement, NHA is responsible to provide for the day-today operations and staffing at the school including the school's leadership team and teachers. Consequently, Keystone does not have any employees.

Also, NHA, a private company, does not have to reveal individual benefits nor give any information on how much employees may or may not pay for benefits. NHA has provided 11 pages of listings of benefits.

Years ago, we started out with the Van Buren Township Police Department salaries and then it grew from there. Certainly, the money paid to certain police officers – specifically the cross-trained police/fire fighters – was the most eyebrow-raising of the salaries.

The printed salaries of specific VBT police officers are saved from year to year by some readers. They say they show them around to their friends and police officers in other communities.

This year, VBT has asked to have more time to put together the financial information requested, so we expect to be receiving that about Jan. 25. Give us a few days to get that ready for print, which means we should print that the first week of February, or so.

We have requested salaries and benefits from: City of Belleville, Township of Van Buren, Township of Sumpter, Van Buren Public Schools, Keystone Academy charter school, and Belleville Area District Library.

Diane Madigan is putting the information into printable form and we appreciate her efforts very much. We're starting today with Keystone. Hope you find it interesting.

EXTRA THINGS I KNOW

On Tuesday morning, the Van Buren Public Schools were abruptly closed for the day after a school bus slid into the ditch because of icy conditions on Fret Road. Another bus was sent out to pick up those students and take them home.

Pam Johnson, assistant to the superintendent, said the superintendent had gone out early and thought the roads were all right. But after the bus went into the ditch, about 6:45 a.m., Supt. Kudlak decided to call school because it had started to rain and the roads were worse than they had thought.

They did not pick up the elementary students and took all those who were already at school back home. Pam said she sent out the alert to parents but no one received the alert, so she sent it out as an emergency and they got it and then the notice got changed on the website.

Earlier in the morning they had noted on the website that the buses would be later than usual because of road conditions. At about 7:25 a.m. they changed the notice on the website to reflect the closing.

Pam said the VBT police officer she spoke to said the gravel roads were OK to travel if you stayed in the middle of the road, but if a bus got off to the side and put on the brakes it slid right into the ditch. It wasn't possible for two vehicles to pass safely on the gravel roads the way they were.

Over the week end there was a lot of talk about the tap water in Downriver communities, and then also in Van Buren Township, smelling like Sulphur and tasting and looking bad.

When an alert was sent out on Monday





morning about a water problem in Belleville and VBT, people assumed it had to do with the water quality problem.

Instead, it was an alert that the water pressure would be down to a trickle for up to 12 hours because of a water main break on Savage Road, near Lenmoore Road. That's the area of the Wolverine pipeline work. VBT Field Supervisor Marty said a joint in the water main started to leak and they had to replace it. Nothing to do with the water quality issue.

I was talking with a man waiting to appear before Judge Green at 34th District Court last week. He was cited for feeding deer a whole bag of carrots. He said the DNR officer who cited him said he should only have fed half a bag because one deer can eat that, but if other deer join in eating, a disease that's affecting deer in the state can be passed. Nobody in the courtroom around us had ever heard of such a crime.

He said he gets his carrots at the gas station and that's the size bag they sell. He never considered taking half of it back to the garage to store. He dumps it all out.

He said he and his son go out on their property to hunt deer and that's how they bait them. He thinks his next-door neighbor turned him in because of a dispute they had. He had criticized the neighbor for smoking pot outside in front of the man's son.

Whatever. He was told the charge was dismissed and he left a happy man. Maybe

the gas station should sell smaller bags of carrots.

On Saturday, I heard a report on the police scanner of someone who had spotted a large cat, possibly a cougar, in the bushes next

to his mailbox. When he went out again, the cat was gone. A police officer, with a sigh, said he would check it out.

An unsigned note was sent to us on our website: "Missing Bike Racks: I

recently married and moved to Belleville from Ann Arbor. I ride my bike three days a week from Sumpter and Bemis to shop uptown, Meijer's, Walmart etc. Where are the bike racks? Oh, there's one at the local library! Thanks!"

Michigan State Police Sgt. C. Green said that it was James Tuttle, Jr., 48, of Canton who died in the accident on I-275 in Van Buren Township at about 10 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 12. Sgt. Green said his car ran out of gas and Tuttle left a passenger in the car and ran across the freeway to get some gas, but was hit and killed by a pickup truck. The accident is still under investigation, but there was no alcohol involved, the trooper said.

Board members have concerns about DeVos

To the Editor:

At the time this letter was read at Monday's [Jan. 9] board meeting, the hearing regarding Betsy DeVos' nomination as the secretary of education was still scheduled for Wednesday, Jan. 11. Later that evening, the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions postponed the hearing until Jan. 17 at 5 p.m.

During the past few board meetings, Mr. English has expressed concerns publicly about Mrs. DeVos' appointment to the top education post, and we reiterate those same concerns here. Mr. English has contacted Senator Stabenow and Peters' offices, and they both have now expressed their concerns regarding this appointment and have vowed to vote against her nomination. We commend this move from our senators on behalf of the students in Michigan's public schools.

In Michigan, DeVos has been an outspoken advocate for charter schools. As Stephen Henderson of the *Detroit Free Press* has written, she and other family members have given over \$2 million to GLEP, the Great Lakes Education Project, a political action committee that promotes "school choice." She is a member of the American Federation for Children as well as other organizations that encourage "choice" and "parental empowerment." While these phrases sound good, they all operate under the guise of improving academic outcomes, but are supported by incredibly troublesome records of achievement.

We encourage anyone wishing to learn more about Michigan's lackluster results with charter schools to read "Michigan spends \$1B on charter schools but fails to hold them accountable" from the *Free Press*.

We are deeply troubled over the possibility of her appointment to this post for a myriad of reasons, including: her utter lack of experience in public schools, as she did not attend a public school, did not send her children to public schools, and has never worked in a public school; the DeVos family's contributions to undermine increased charter school oversight, including lifting the cap on the number of charter schools in Michigan; and her involvement in the 2000 campaign to amend Michigan's constitution to allow school vouchers, which is currently prevented by the Blaine amendment.

At the time this letter was submitted, the Office of Government Ethics, the department responsible for vetting cabinet nominees, has expressed concerns about



DeVos' hearing and the seemingly rushed nomination process, as well, noting that her ethics review was still incomplete.

We believe that the secretary of education should put research first, and he or she should represent the best interests of our public schools and not work to undermine them.

David James Wilson

DAVID JAMES WILSON

(June 25, 1930 - January 12, 2017)

David James Wilson, 86, of Van Buren Township, died peacefully in his bed the morning of January 12, 2017, after a three-year bout with melanoma.

He was born in Ames, Iowa, son of James Calmar Wilson and Alice Winona Olmsted Wilson. As a teenager he became an Eagle Scout. He graduated from Fort Collins High School in Colorado. He went off to Stanford University to major in chemistry (had known from the seventh grade that he wanted to be a chemist).

In his junior year at Stanford he took engineering physics and there met Marty, a biology student taking the same class. They married on September 6, 1952, the summer after graduation.

The next five years were pretty hectic: 1 year at grad school, 2 years in the army (first baby was born then), and 2 more years at grad school. He earned his Ph.D. in chemistry from Caltech in 1957.

He spent most of his working life teaching: 12 years at the University of Rochester (NY) and 26 years at Vanderbilt University (Nashville, TN). He (and Marty) had an interesting sabbatical year abroad from each of the universities. 1964-65 at the University of Ife at Ibadan, Nigeria, with their four young boys; 1993-94 at the University of Malaga in southern Spain – no children with them that year. By the time he had retired, he had written two books and about 300 journal articles; he had 75 graduate students earn their Ph.D. while working for him.

In Nashville, in addition to teaching chemistry, he worked with young people as a Scoutmaster and later as an Explorer Post Advisor; and he mentored many students in science fair projects.

After he retired from Vanderbilt in 1995, he consulted at Brown and Caldwell, an environmental engineering firm, for a few more years. By this time his five children were scattered, none were close to Nashville.

In 2003 he and Marty moved to Belleville to be

close to son Bill (and Gloria and three schoolage children). It was good move and a great family to be close to.

Dave's environmental interest started way back. In Rochester in the 1960s he was involved in getting lead paint out of old housing (to reduce lead poisoning of young children) and was also involved in cleaning up the beaches on Lake Ontario (contaminated by an outdated sewage treatment plant). In Tennessee he was deeply involved in identifying a large hazardous waste site in west Tennessee.

In Michigan, fully retired, he contacted the Huron River Watershed Council and learned how to assess the water quality of streams through the prevalence of different insects at the bottoms of streams. He regarded it a privilege to work with the Van Buren Township Environmental Commission. His final environmental fight, in conjunction with both the HR Watershed Council and the Environmental Commission, resulted in the banning of coal tar driveway sealants in Van Buren Township.

Dave leaves behind his wife, Marty (64 years of marriage); four sons John (Megumi) Wilson in Sagamihara, Japan; Chuck (Stephanie) Wilson in Gainesville, FL; Bill (Gloria) Wilson, now in Ann Arbor; and Andy (Stephanie) Wilson in Pescadero, CA; daughter Joyce Wilson (and husband Ken Johnson) in Maplewood, MO; and 10 grandchildren.

Dave donated his body to the University of Michigan and there will be no funeral service now. The family is planning a Celebration of Dave's Life on April 2 at the Pittsfield Union Grange.

Two years ago while helping coach his daughter's softball team, Jason Basham, Belleville High School class of 1996, was accidentally hit in the head with a ball, and a CT scan discovered a large brain tumor that had been undetected before.

Basham had a brain surgery in June of 2015, but they were unable to remove the entire tumor. He also had complications and bleeding into the brain which required a secondemergency surgery the next morning.

After the surgery, he suffered from loss of vision and memory problems. A month ago, during a follow up MRI, it was determined that the remaining section of the tumor had begun to grow.

He has a new neurosurgeon and will have to have a third brain surgery in March to remove the rest of the tumor. It is still pressing on his optic nerve and is quite large.

Basham has been on active duty as a Seabee in the Navy for almost 17 years. His medical expenses are all covered by his military insurance, however, the new surgeon is in a different state and there will be hotel costs and gas for his wife to travel with him during the surgery and to visit him while he is still in the hospital for recovery.

He has 4 children ages 10 months to

16, and the added expense of hotel stays as well as his wife's income loss for time taken off for his surgery and recovery will take a toll on the family financially.

The family said anyone who is able to

Basham was born in Ypsilanti where both his parents, Donald and Cindy Basham, worked at the Willow Run GM

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
Thank you to all who helped wounded vet

The day of the meeting we found out he was a wounded combat veteran from the Iraqi War. He was accompanied by his wife

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Smell, color, taste of tap water a concern in VBT, Downriver homes

Last Thursday, residents in Downriver communities started complaining about a Sulphur smell to the water coming out of their taps, along with a color and taste that wasn't right.

Soon, residents in Van Buren Township also were complaining and worried that the water was not safe to drink.

On Sunday there was a television news report of puppies and dogs that drink tap water being hit with a bacterial disease that owners said could be attributed to bad water.

The Great Lakes Water Authority, now responsible for the water coming out of Detroit to Southeastern Michigan communities, issued a statement that it is working on the problem.

The Great Lakes Water Authority also said that the water is safe to drink based on tests performed after the smell had been detected.

But one Downriver community was getting a private test done on its water over the week end and now VBT also is performing testing. A Nixel alert was sent out Monday morning from Van Buren Township Public Safety Department saying that VBT residents are continuing to notice a Sulphur smell in their water and the VBT government will continue to monitor this for residents.

A VBT resident said she called the Great Lakes Water Authority and Cheryl from the Authority said Lincoln Park and Allen Park were the first to report the problem, and now they don't have any complaints. And, the water that leaves the plant is clear of odors and bad tastes.

The resident reported Cheryl said, "We need to run a load of hot laundry, drain the hot water tank, and let the cold water run until it stops smelling. We did all that and the water smells worse."

She said, "Our problem is that darn water tower." VBT fills the water tower during off-peak hours in the night to save money in water costs.

"I called non-emergency police. Asked if Van Buren was going to drain the tower. They didn't know but told me to call on Tuesday because Martin Luther King Day is Monday."

On Tuesday, VBT sent out a four-page

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fax with an update from James Taylor, VBT Director of Public Services, saying that he has been assured by GLWA that there are no harmful contaminants in the system but, "As a precaution, and in light of the heightened concern created by the Flint situation, Van Buren Township is performing sampling and testing to confirm the results of the GLWA and that there is no health risk..."

Last Friday, the Great Lakes Water Authority issued a notice to all its communities serviced by the Southwest Water Treatment plant that all the appropriate regulatory compliance checks indicate that they are meeting the regulatory standards.

"The taste and odor that your communities are experiencing is a water quality aesthetic problem. The GLWA is expanding its response and testing," the statement said. "The GLWA estimates the T&O incident should resolve itself within the next 12 hours. Any questions please contact GLWA Water quality at 1-313-926-8102."

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Cheryl Porter, Chief Operations Officer of GLWA, also offered a statement on Friday that included: "At this time, we are working with our local community partners to continue to assure water of unquestionable quality, and have put into operation at our treatment plant our activated carbon system, which will assist with the taste and odor issues. We expect the taste and odor issues to be resolved within the next 12 hours. In the meantime, we continue to expand testing to determine factors that might contribute to the detected odors."

The taste and odor issues in VBT were not resolved within 12 hours.

VBT Planners to hold Jan. 25 hearing on Lakeshore Amendments

Van Buren Township has sent two series of letters to residents and taxpayers along the Belleville lakeshore to alert them to the 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, Jan. 25, public hearing on the proposed shoreline districts amendments and general ordinance changes.

In December 2015 changes in shoreline rules were presented, followed by a great deal of public opposition and threats of law suits over the next few months.

The documents were pulled from the table and a committee of lakeshore residents was set up to work with the township staff on changes that could be supported.

What is being presented now has been approved by the committee whose members were so vehemently against it last year. Now, they are presenting it to the public.

The public hearing was discussed briefly at the Jan. 11 meeting of the VBT Planning Commission.

In other business at the two-hour Jan. 11 meeting, the commission:

• Heard planning consultant Patrick Sloan give a report on proposed changes to Articles 6 and 7 in the Zoning Ordinance which is being completely updated. The changes are being presented in multiple parts to the commission and will be ready for a recommendation after one or two more meetings explaining updates, Sloan said;

• Accepted the year-end report of the planning commission given by Ron Akers, director of planning and economic development, and sent it on to the township board; and

• Heard Commissioner Bryon Kelley give a presentation on what he learned from three days of classes from the Michigan Association of Planners. The presentation is necessary to earn his Master Planner certification. Kelley said, among other things, he learned that it is very important to look at what your neighbors are doing and make a cohesive plan for you and your neighbors to plan for growth. He said the separate communities should be working together because, "We're really tied together." He listed other important ideas he learned from MAP. He said some planning commissions are requiring each member of the commission to at least earn a Citizen Planner certification. Kelley was very enthusiastic about the classes.



Toth said, when she was arrested, she said it actually was a day or two prior when she had spent the night and visited with Charles.

Toth said he interviewed Thomas Cahill twice and the second time, on Dec. 4, he was arrested. That's when Thomas said he wanted to make a statement and, Toth said, "He appeared to be coming to terms with what he had done." Wayne County Assistant Prosecutor Latoya Willis made a motion to show to the court the statement Thomas Cahill made via video and both defense attorneys agreed as long as it was just for this exam. Judge Oakley agreed and the video was shown to the court.

The video showed Toth reading Thomas Cahill his Miranda Rights, sentence by sentence, with Thomas saying he understood and then initialing each sentence. He is shown seated at a table on Dec. 4.

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"I could go away for life," Thomas said to Toth on the video and Toth replied, "He's not dead."

"It doesn't matter," Thomas said.

"Felony murder is life in prison," Toth said. "I don't know your criminal history, anyway."

Thomas listed his offenses, adding, "There's no hope for me."

"Why did you do that?" Toth asked.

"I got tired of being touched," Thomas said. "He's a f----n sex offender, man." Thomas told of his grandfather watching when he showered. "I never saw it coming. He never tried to penetrate.

"I just lost control and I was doing drugs, too," he said. "I hit him in the head with a hammer." He said he hit him three times with a hammer.

He said he went to work and quit. "Nothing lined up."

Toth asked if words were exchanged and Thomas said there was no argument.

"I'm no good. Just like my father," Thomas said.

When that portion of the statement concluded, the video was turned off in the courtroom.

Prosecutor Willis said the Chase credit card owned by Charles Cahill has never been recovered.


Under cross-examination by Schinske, Toth said VBT Officer Chris Hayes located the Kia and Sgt. Michael Papin was there at the motel with a bunch of VBT officers – about five -- he didn't know.

Toth also said they have no results from the MSP lab as yet on the stains or other evidence.

All officers testified they wore gloves for everything handled and Toth said they all had their body cameras rolling throughout.

Schinske pointed out Letang was cooperative and drove to the police station for questioning. Toth said Letang gave police her cell phone, but no one reviewed her phone or text messages.

In giving her argument to bind Letang over to circuit court, Willis said she picked Thomas up at the victim's home but there

"It shows she probably had an idea of what went on," Willis said.

Schinske said Letang picked him up and drove him around, but there is no evidence she was assisting him to avoid police.

"She gave consent to police to come into the hotel room, gave her phone to police, gave her car to search and went to the police department and talked to police," Schinske said.

Schinske said the prosecutor said she probably had an idea of what went on, but, "Nothing shows she had knowledge," noting even Thomas Cahill said on the videotape that Letang didn't know what had happened. "You can refile if there's more evidence," she said.

Judge Oakley bound Thomas Cahill over on five counts and said he agrees with Schinske that there was not probable cause on Letang and her charge was dismissed.

Thomas Cahill was scheduled for a Jan. 18 arraignment on the information at the Frank Murphy Hall of Justice in Detroit.
