Mystery message to Environmental chair sent to attorney

At the Jan. 15 meeting of the Van Buren Township Environmental Commission, chairman Norm DeBuck said he had received a strange e-mail that concerned him.

He handed over his cell phone to Director of Public Services Larry Luckett for him to read the message.

Then, township board liaison Trustee Donald Boynton asked to see the message and the phone was handed over to him.

They agreed it should not be discussed publicly, but should be turned over to the township attorney.

At the Dec. 18 meeting, Director of Municipal Services Ron Akers informed the commission that the township's attorney advised against openly discussing the ongoing lawsuit with Republic.

Akers said if any commissioners are contacted by Republic's legal counsel, they should bring it to Director Akers' or Supervisor McNamara's attention.

The subject of the message to DeBuck was not discussed at the Jan. 15 meeting and when asked by Trustee Boynton if he knew the person who signed it, DeBuck said he did not.

In other business at the 27-minute meeting on Jan. 15, the commission:

- Heard Director Luckett explain that he missed the last meeting and Director Akers was present instead. Luckett said his younger brother passed away and he went to Dallas;
- Was informed by Luckett that he purchased a light meter for the police to use when a violation of the light ordinance is being investigated. Commissioner Tony Gibson explained that at a previous meeting he complained about a light from Moon Star Express trucking business that is streaming onto Rawsonville Road. It is

Libraries ask Wayne County to pay for audit of penal fines

Representatives of the Belleville Area District Library attended a recent meeting at the Romulus Library where they were invited to discuss owing money for penal fines they were given by the state.

In December, the Belleville library was informed it has been paid \$139,087.48 too much over the last ten years and needed to pay it back. The problem was that the Wayne County Treasurer's office had been using the wrong percentages.

The Library of Michigan had set a Jan. 31 deadline for libraries to say whether they

would accept the proposed agreement.

At the regular meeting of the Belleville Area District Library Board on Jan. 14, library director Mary Jo Suchy reported to the board that she and board president Sharon Peters attended the Romulus meeting.

Although the mistakes made at the Wayne County level over ten years that went on to the state level had some libraries getting too much money for penal fines and some getting too little, those at the Romulus meeting were just those that were being asked to give money back to the state.

No interest has been mentioned, she said.

Director Suchy said the consensus was that the owing libraries were working toward a settlement, not agreeing to the state's proposed agreement.

She said the consensus was that Wayne County should conduct an audit of those penal fines to make sure they are correct.

Suchy said the state agreement would withhold upcoming penal fines over a period of years and the overages would be paid off that way. Or, she said, Belleville has enough money to just pay it off all at once, if the board decides to do so.

Suchy presented each board member with

a huge packet of information on the penal fines for all the libraries over the past ten years.

She said the initial proposal is from the Library of Michigan. But, some at the meeting said the statue of limitations is six years.

Board member Joy Cichewicz, who also is a library director in Ypsilanti, asked if the county has no responsibility for this mistake?

Board president Peters said at the meeting the Plymouth librarian brought forward the idea of responsibility.

Peters said she brought up the idea that the mistake should be shared fiscally by Wayne County.

"None of the libraries in Wayne County are responsible for this problem," Peters said.

It was noted that the Detroit Public Library may be separated from the problem.

Newly sworn-in library board member Dr. Maria Jackson-Smith asked how this happened.

Suchy said it is her understanding that the courts with circuit courts had their penal fines distributed at their courts instead of putting it in the big state library pot for distribution countywide.

Suchy said all the discussions are in the early stages but the consensus is for the libraries to consider the state agreement, the county has to pay for an independent audit.

"There's no guarantee this won't happen again," Cichewicz said. "It is their responsibility."

Peters said some of the libraries don't think their numbers from the state are correct

"This is a good first step," said board vice president Linda Priest.

Cichewicz made the following motion,

which was seconded by treasurer Tonya Stoudemire and passed unanimously:

"Motion to participate in a settlement solution facilitated by the Library of Michigan that addresses the miscalculation of penal fines by Wayne County, provided that:

- Wayne County agrees to pay for an independent auditor to review all payments to the Wayne County Treasurer from the Courts and all payments to the Wayne County Libraries to determine the accurate penal fine disbursement numbers from 2014 through 2024;
- And, to provide copies of the completed audit to the Wayne County Libraries and to the Library of Michigan."

The State of Michigan website explains: Michigan is the only state that constitutionally mandates the use of penal fines as a funding mechanism for libraries.

Michigan has enacted statutes requiring that all fines collected for violations of the state penal laws are paid to the local county treasurer. The courts determine the percentage of each fine/fee that comprise "penal fines" and the percentage of each fine/fee that comprise court "costs." The county treasurer receives the penal fines collected by the courts in that county. The

county treasurer then distributes those penal fines to eligible libraries within that county on a per-capita basis using service population numbers supplied by the Library of Michigan.

There are 25 or 26 libraries in Wayne County and this all started when one of the libraries noticed the problem a few years ago and investigated, Suchy said.

About a decade ago, someone with institutional knowledge retired from Wayne County and since then the libraries in the county have been overpaid and underpaid in court penal fines because the needed percentages being used were wrong.

Peters said, "It will be interesting negotiating with Wayne County."

District Library Board gives 3.5% raise to Director Suchy

Belleville Area District Library Director Mary Jo Suchy was given a 3.5% raise

in pay by the library board during its regular meeting on Jan. 14.

Board treasurer Tonya Stoudemire, a member of the personnel committee, said inflation was 2.7% and the committee didn't want to just keep up, but to give more.

This would be in addition to her 2024 salary of \$99,158.

Personnel committee chairwoman Linda Priest said director evaluation forms were distributed in December to all board members for the anonymous evaluations of Suchy.

She read a three-page evaluation, beginning by saying the comments showed Suchy was performing her job at a very high level.

Priest explained the completion on goals for 2024 and plans for her new goals in 2025.

After the evaluation, board members gave their own compliments to Suchy on how she runs the library and interacts with staff and visitors.

"Our director has institutional knowledge and was deputy for a very, very long time before becoming director," board president Sharon Peters said.

Suchy said she started in 1987, knowing she would be working to get librarian credentials, and she's been here ever since.

Cichewicz said Suchy "is truly one of the peremier directors in our state" and Priest added, "It's great to work with her. She doesn't make you feel stupid when you ask a question."

Suchy said, "They teach us in library school there's no such thing as a dumb question." She added, "I'm in love with this community."

In other business at the Jan. 14 meeting, the board:

• Heard treasurer Stoudemire present the financial audit for 2023-24 by Alan C. Young and Associates, which she said was a clean audit. The total revenues on June 30, 2024 were \$3,409,220 and the total expenditures were \$3,135,080. The fund

balance on June 30, 2023 was \$6,017,000 and the fund balance on June 30, 2024 was \$6,291,140;

- Heard Suchy ask the board to make adjustments to two parts of the salary policy, increasing the maximum pay of a director's position to \$99,600 and librarian position to \$60,320. Also, a library intern position pay from \$17 to a maximum of \$18. She said they weren't hitting the top figures in the policy until this year. The board voted unanimously to make the changes. She said the raises for staff are going to be 3.5%;
- Heard Suchy announce the monthly Memory Café for people having memory difficulties and their caregivers has become very popular. They frequently work on an art project which is placed on temporary display in the library lobby. She said jazz nights resume at the library with The Aston Neighborhood pleasure Club on Wednesday, Jan. 29 at 7 p.m. February features Elder Master Storyteller Ivory

Williams from the Detroit Association of Black Storytellers on Wednesday, Feb. 5, at 6:30 p.m. "Michigan Roots, African American Migration in Michigan" will be presented at 6:30 p.m., Monday, Feb. 10, by Rozlyn Kelly;

- Learned the new solo exhibit in the atrium of the library are artworks in several media, all by Danielle Whitehead. The exhibit will be there for three months;
- Heard Peters urge board members to attend the annual meeting of the Friends of the Library at 11 a.m. on Jan. 25. "We would not be where we are without the Friends," she said. Suchy added that the Friends will be celebrating their 40th year; and
- Learned the new stair treads have been installed, children's storytimes resumed after the holiday break and "Game Day! Game Day!" that was such a success during the Belleville High School football season, is being brought back for the basketball season.

More looking back:

30 years ago, this is what was happening in the tri-community

We are celebrating completion of our 30th year of publication by printing stories from our earliest issues to show what was happening in Belleville, Van Buren, and Sumpter.

In our third issue of the *Independent* on Jan. 19, 1995, which had 12 pages, our front-page story was headlined: "Critics: Cleanup plan moving too fast" and concerned the cleanup of toxic Willow Creek with much work to be done in Van Buren Township.

A long story detailed the Department of Natural Resources public hearing on Jan. 12, 1995, that was held at Van Buren Township Hall, but contained only a handful of residents from VBT of the 150 present. VBT residents said the township didn't let them know about the hearing.

VBT officials said the township didn't put out any notices because the meeting was being announced by the DNR.

Most of those present were public officials

and residents of Ypsilanti Township. Ypsilanti Township Trustee Karen Lovejoy Roe said her township tried to put inserts in the weekly *Ypsilanti Courier* to alert citizens, but they didn't know how many people get that paper.

Trustee Roe said the 30 days of public comment, which was to end Jan. 23, was not long enough.

She said she and others asked the DNR for an extension of the public comment period since the 2-inch-thick Proposed Remedial Action Plan was put into the official depository, the Ypsilanti District Library, on Dec. 23 and then the next day the library closed for 9 days for the holidays.

VBT property owner Marilyn Hieber said she found out about the meeting by accident after she found stakes behind her property. She said it took eight calls to VBT hall before she found out about the project in her back yard.

The \$70 million cleanup plan involves Edison Pond on the north shore of

She wrote 30 stories on the blocks, which ran week by week.

The story next to the quilt series was about how Diane Eissinger, a local glass artist, had told fellow members of the Michigan Glass Guild about the Belleville quilt and they discussed how to do a similar community project.

After the idea was published in the Michigan Glass Guild newsletter, the response was immediate. A representative of the Dearborn Council for the Arts and the Downriver Council for the Arts contacted the guild and offered a grant to complete a glass quilt for the Ronald McDonald House.

The Ronald McDonald House is a place for parents of hospitalized children to stay. Diane said stores who specialize in glass offered their scrap bins free to artists who will be working on the quilt.

Each glass artist was to do a square in his or her specialty, whether it be hot, blown glass, leaded, or fused glass. They also plan to put together a brochure to explain the blocks, the artists, and the techniques similar to what Marilyn Locke did for the Belleville Community Quilt.

also contained the announcement that the DDA chairperson, Alicia McGovern, had


The Belleville City Council was scheduled to meet on Tuesday instead of Monday this week because of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday. The original agenda sent out for the Jan. 21 meeting included a bond presentation by a Miller Canfield attorney and a vote to approve an intent to bond for up to \$3.5 million for various city projects, including rebuilding of the Horizon Park boardwalk, water bank stabilization, and road repairs.

The bond or bonds would also pay for the bond attorney. attorney wouldn't say how much that would be until the council decided on how much

it wanted to bond for, according to the paperwork in the original agenda packet.

On Tuesday morning, we got a notice from the city that the bond attorney and the bond vote were no longer on that night's agenda.

We were quite surprised to see it there in the first place since the council had barely mentioned moving forward on bonds. Once the council votes and its intention is published in the newspaper of record (the Independent), voters will have 45 days to object.

Senior citizens can get help with water bill

To the editor:

Sumpter Township currently uses a base rate when charging its residents for their water usage. In some instances, that base rate may be higher than the amount of water actually used, resulting in a higher water

To help residents who are at least 65 years of age, and who own or are purchasing their own residence, Sumpter Township offers an exemption, which insures that those residents only pay for the amount of water they actually use.

To claim that exemption, the resident needs to fill out a very simple SENIOR CITIZEN AFFIDAVIT and show a driver's license or other form of identification.

This exemption is only for those seniors who get their water from the township and does not apply to those who may get their water from a mobile home park or through other outside sources.

In addition to the above township program, there is also a utility and water assistance program from Wayne County for those who qualify.

You can pick up the SENIOR CITIZEN AFFIDAVIT form and information on the Wayne County assistance program at township hall, located at 23480 Sumpter Rd., where the courteous and knowledgeable employees will be glad to help.

very strong and when it is raining at night it interferes with safe driving. The light will be checked out and maybe can be repositioned, Luckett said;

- · Heard DeBuck ask if there are any plans for the widening of Rawsonville Road since it is solid traffic in the morning and evening. Rawsonville is a traffic artery and it should be done. Luckett said he has an upcoming meeting with Wayne County about road projects and he will ask about it. Trustee Boynton said he will check with SEMCOG and Washtenaw County, since Washtenaw maintains Rawsonville Road, the border line between Washtenaw and Wayne counties;
 - · Heard Luckett announce the Huron

River Watershed Council is seeking volunteers for a Jan. 18 count of winter stoneflies which will indicate water quality throughout the watershed;

- Learned from DeBuck that he was able to put winter fertilizer on his sod fields this winter, after being unable to do so last winter because it was too warm. He said you can't drive the fertilizer spreaders on the ground when it's not frozen because then it leaves tracks on the sod;
- · Heard Boynton reply, when asked about housing starts in the township, that housing is going pretty well and developers are completing subdivisions that are uncompleted;
- Heard Luckett report that work continues on the Denton Road Bridge and they hope to have it completed by this time next year. DTE has completed its portion of the

project and contractor E.C. Korneffel has mobilized on the bridge. They completed asbestos abatement and started bridge removal;

- Heard DeBuck say he would like to see "waterfall lights" as a part of the holiday light display on the entry into the township. He saw them in Colorado and put some on his house. He said it would be nice to welcome people into the township with these special lights:
- · Heard Commissioner Jill Yob said she tried out for a part in a dinner theater presentation of "Murder at the Pie Auction" to run March 8 and 9 at the Black Box Theater at the township community center. She said she got a small part and is delighted to be a part of it all; and
- Heard Commissioner Ron Merritt talk about the horrible road conditions on Mott Road between Denton and Dellor. He said he went to see a friend and got a flat tire after hitting a hole that was two-feet deep.

Belleville Lake and a possible toxic landfill on the North I-94 Service Drive in VBT.

The story said everyone wants to see a cleanup of the Willow Run Creek, but several chemists questioned the methods proposed by Conestoga-Rovers, Ltd, a Canadian firm with offices in Romulus.

The firm was hired as a consultant by the parties potentially responsible for the pollutions: General Motors, Ford Motor, the Ypsilanti Community Utilities Authority, Ypsilanti Township, Wayne County, Chrysler Corporation and the University of Michigan.

A high concentration of PCBs and a host of heavy metals and other toxins polluted Willow Creek, which empties into Belleville Lake, starting in 1942. The chemicals came from wastewater treatment systems at the Willow Run Bomber Plant. The creek was last used to deposit sludge

Now there is a thick mat of vegetation covering toxic sludge up to 15 feet thick.

Although authorities have been studying the problem since 1978, the pending International Tradeport zone around Willow Run Airport has put the cleanup on a fast track.

Promoters of Tradeport fear businesses will not want to be a part of the project if the Willow Creek pollution problem is given federal Superfund designation, which is threatened.

The potentially responsible parties are voluntarily paying for the cleanup, but

work must begin by September to avoid Superfund.

Sites slated for dredging include a lagoon and Tyler Pond in Ypsilanti Township near Willow Run Airport and Edison Pond, which is surrounded by Van Buren Park on three sides and a residenial area on the

In addition, since Conestoga-Rovers proposes on-site landfilling of the sludge, a toxic landfill is to be constructed. There are three sites proposed, two of them in Van Buren Township.

To clean up Edison Pond, the sludge is to be trucked out the VBT Park entrance on Old Denton Road to the on-site landfill north of I-94 and will take a route from Old Denton west on the South Service Drive to Rawsonville Road and north to the landfill.

Also, in the Jan. 19, 1995 paper there were the following stories:

- "Belmont Manor tenants voice concerns over apartments," where people who live in the Belleville apartment complex say they cannot get the management company to act on their concerns, such as frost on the inside walls of their apartments and heating problems. Tenants said they have had no success going through the proper channels, so they are bringing them to public attention by going to the Belleville City Council. Mayor Glenn Silvenis directed City Manager Reid Charles to look into the problems. Mayor Silvenis said the problem at Belmont is one of the reasons the city is tightening up the rental
- Belleville City Council hired McKenna Associates to put together a recreation plan

that would make the city eligible for more than \$500,000 in state recreation grants for a five-year period. The council plans to go to the Downtown Development Authority for reimbursement for the \$6,500 project.

Food need in community continues to grow

In 2024, the Emergency Food Closet housed at Belleville First United Methodist Church, 417 Charles St., served 328 families with an increase of 54 families over 2023.

2,352 bags of food and refrigerator items including a meat, a lunchmeat, a dairy product, a loaf of bread and a 4-roll pack of toilet paper were given out. We had 207 new clients; 44% of our families were aged

Everyone receives food on his/her first visit. To continue to receive food, a referral is needed and one must be a resident of Van Buren and Sumpter townships or the city of Belleville. Referrals can come from a school social worker, a pastor, a physician, a health agency, or the Salvation Army.

In 2024, due to the increase in food costs and the number of clients, food was distributed bi-monthly. The food closet is open every Tuesday and Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. If Van Buren Public Schools are closed due to weather, then the food closet will also be closed.

When the food closet is closed, food can be found in the Little Free Food Pantry located on Charles Street.

\$72,990 was spent on food, toilet paper, bags, postage, and ads in 2024. All of the workers at the food closet are volunteers.

Without the partnership of the philanthropic philosophy of Meijer and its Simply Give program, we would not be able to provide food as we currently do. We are partners with the Belleville Meijer store at 9701 Belleville Rd.

The Winter Simply Give Campaign started Dec. 29, 2024 and runs through March 29, 2025. There will be two Double Days – the first is Saturday, March 1 and the second is Saturday, March 22. If one purchases a \$10 Simply Give Card on either of these Double Days, Meijer will match with \$20, for a total donation of \$30!

If you would like to support the food closet, non-perishable food items dated 2025 and later are always needed. Each weekly bag contains canned soup, canned vegetables and fruit, canned tuna or chicken, canned chili or canned pork and beans, mac and cheese, and cereal. Personal care items including toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo, deodorant, dish soap, laundry soap, Kleenex and paper towels are always needed.

Monetary donations can be made payable by check to Belleville First United Methodist Church with "Food Closet" written on the memo line. Checks can be mailed to the church or dropped off at the church office Tuesday-Thursday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

I would like to thank all the community residents, local churches, community agencies, and local businesses for their support by hosting food drives, donations of food and personal-care items, or donations of money. The need in our community continues to grow. Thank you for helping to fill that need!

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

VBT resident Wigginton climbs steps of tallest building in 47th state

James Wigginton of Van Buren Township, a Vietnam-era Marine and multiple world record holder, continued his quest to climb the stairs of the tallest building in all 50 states with his climb of the Panorama Building in Miami on Jan. 9.

This is his 47th state to-date. Number 48, Hawaii, is scheduled for Jan. 26 or 27.

Wigginton said, while the climbs to-date already represent a ninth world record for him, the more important message is that the climbs are being done to bring awareness and funding to Folds of Honor.

Folds of Honor is a veteran-led organization that has, over the last 18 years, provided more than 58,000 scholarships to the children of fallen military and first-responders.

The climbs are also being done to bring awareness and funding to the Punya Thyroid Cancer Fund at the University of Michigan, which has helped fund thyroid cancer research and treatment at the U of M. Van Buren Public Schools Superintendent Peter Kudlak was elected to the position of vice-chairman, a position he was appointed to in late 2024.

In other business at the meeting, the LDFA reviewed the draft synopsis of the 2024 finances prepared by Township Deputy Supervisor Dan Selman. He said all the changes are left in red ink so they can be easily seen. At the next meeting, a clean copy will be presented, he said.

The report gave an overview of the LDFA activities from its beginning to today.

The original purpose of the LDFA was to finance and construct eligible public improvements for the Visteon Village project which was completed in 2004. In order to complete public improvements, the LDFA established a development plan and tax increment financing plan which identified the improvements, estimated the costs of the improvements and estimated the amount of tax revenue the authority would capture based on the proposed improvements.

In order to finance the construction of the public improvements, the LDFA issued bonds to cover the costs of the improvements and those bonds were guaranteed by the township's ability to tax. Those public improvements have been completed.

Due to economic conditions, the LDFA

was unable to capture sufficient tax revenue to cover scheduled debt service due to the shortfall, which occurred on Oct. 1, 2019. This triggered a continuation of litigation over a longstanding legal dispute with the LDFA and township against the original developer Visteon, over the oligation relating to the Series 2003 Tax Increment Bonds, the Series 2006 Tax Increment Revenue Refunding Bonds, and the Series 2015 Tax Increment Revenue Refunding Bonds issued by the township for improvements on certain real property for the development of Visteon Village, now known as Grace Lake Corporate Center.

In 2019, the LDFA and the township structured a loan agreement with "advances" from the township to the LDFA to cover the shortfall amount of the debt service. These "advances" were necessary to meet the bond obligations due on April 1 and Oct. 1 each year until the bond obligation is fulfilled.

In 2023, the township and LDFA reached a settlement agreement with Visteon. The terms of the settlement were that Visteon agreed to pay the sum of \$12 million to Van Buren Township in two installments of \$6 million. In return, the township and LDFA agreed to release Visteon of any future obligations related to assisting in the repayment of the bonds.

On July 1, 2023, the township received the first installment of \$6 million. On July 3, 2024, the township received the second installment of \$6 million.

Per legal counsel, the settlement funds went toward repayment of the "advances" for the debt service. The principal and interest amount paid off was \$8,216,264.35. The LDFA is currently paying semi-annual debt payments with the remaining Visteon settlement money supplemented by semiannual tax capture revenues. As of Dec. 31, 2024, the LDFA's cash balance was \$2,672,630.88.

With the terms of the settlement agreement satisfied, the Visteon matter is now closed.

As specified in the most recent audit (2023), the primary focus of the LDFA is payment of debt obligations from tax captures. Due to this, there were no capital or promotional projects by the LDFA in

At the end of the Jan. 14 meeting, Deputy Supervisor Selman asked those present to help the township in filling a janitor's position that is open. He said hours are 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and although the job is not glamorus, it is a solid job. Those interested can apply on



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
