Yankee Air Museum is located at 47884 D Street, Van Buren Township, at Willow Run Airport.

"The Belleville, Sumpter and Van Buren communities have been loyal friends of Yankee Air Museum from the very start. We are extending the Michigan Neighbors initiative to them in recognition of this tremendous support," said Kevin Walsh, executive director. "Our exhibits have changed and they're better than ever. In fact, we received a pristine Douglas A-4 Skyhawk on Dec. 1, and it is on display now. This is an amazing airplane."

Walsh said he is delighted by the number of Belleville, Sumpter Township, and Van Buren Township students who come to the museum and he hopes the free admission program will encourage even more. He says the exhibits have never looked better and the docents are eager to greet people who are interested in aviation. There are interesting restoration projects under way in the exhibit gallery through which people can learn more about aircraft, technology and museum science.

"Our docents, many of whom are veterans, are looking forward to a great turnout and guiding the kids to flying the simulators and enjoying the interactive computer activities."

Sumpter Planners table Medical Marijuana zoning amendments

At its Dec. 8 regular meeting, the Sumpter Township Planning Commission tabled proposed revisions to the Medical Marijuana Zoning Ordinance at the request of township attorney Rob Young.

Trustee Matthew Oddy said he spoke with Young and, "He wants us to table this one more time." Young was not present at the meeting.

Trustee Oddy said Young wants to make sure the proposed additional language doesn't conflict with the new state law.

Oddy said in the future the township will be looking at approving or disapproving provisions of the new state law. He said many municipalities will be looking at the money marijuana establishments would bring in, since it will cost \$5,000 each for them to apply.

He said but there is uncertainty at how much money comes back to the township.

Oddy said they will look at this before the

VBT public hearing on 2017 budget included ideas on landfill funds

On Nov. 29, the newly elected Van Buren Township Board of Trustees held its first official meeting after being sworn in on Nov. 18.

It held a public hearing on the proposed 2017 general fund budget, the 2016 amended general fund budget and budgets for special revenue funds.

No member of the public commented on the budgets, which were then approved, slightly revised, at the Dec. 6 regular meeting.

The budgets had been prepared by former Supervisor Linda Combs' office and she decided to have the new board vote on the budget, rather than the outgoing board.

That meant the new trustees – Sherry Frazier, Kevin Martin, and Paul White –spent part of Thanksgiving Day and that week end studying the budget that was new to them and they will have to vote on. Supervisor Kevin McNamara and his executive assistant Dan Selman had gathered the information to study and to share, and made department directors available to answer questions.

At the beginning of the Nov. 29 meeting, Trustee White congratulated Supervisor McNamara for gathering the budget information for himself and the new trustees so they could make informed decisions when they vote.

Among the issues discussed in the threehour work/study session on Nov. 28 and the public hearing on Nov. 29 were the Waste Management landfill tipping fees that are being used to balance the general fund budget.

Trustee White pointed out the township has \$10.6 million in total revenue noted on the budget and \$15.5 million of total expenditures.

Supervisor McNamara said the expenditures include three years of retroactive pay for the recently approved contracts. He said the township is not growing to bring in more taxes and they have only added three new employees in the whole township.

"It's been a challenging project," said Trustee Frazier. "The budget was dropped on us over the last week. I appreciate the directors getting information to us and Supervisor McNamara.

"We had a lively discussion yesterday over three hours," she said. "I did glean information and whether I agree with that or not I don't know."

Frazier said the trustees are stewards of the tax money.

Trustee White said the budget shows

\$10.6 million in revenue and the revenue basically has been stagnant over the past several years and the expenditures have grown.

He said the plan is to take \$4 million from the landfill fund, making the fund the lowest ever.

"I totally disagree with the deficit," said Clerk Leon Wright. "We don't report the landfill fund as revenue. We show significant deficit, but use what we have to balance it ... There was a shortfall in public safety and voters passed the extra millage ... in 2018 when we start receiving those funds, we'll have a balanced budget."

Clerk Wright said VBT has always balanced the budget with landfill funds since 2008. This year there are \$3.5 million in tipping fees. "I agree we're in the red in 2017, even though we're not in the red," Clerk Wright said.

"We're in the red in 2017," said Supervisor McNamara. "We need \$1.99 million in 2017."

"The landfill is a revenue stream for the township and I asked why it wasn't labeled as such," Trustee Frazier said. "We do get revenue from the landfill."

"We're going to put it in the books the way it should be," Supervisor McNamara said. "This really has nothing to do with the budget today. We got a millage increase. We are deficit spending: \$4 million comes in for police and we spend \$8.5 million for police."

"We're still \$1.3 million short and are dipping into the general fund fund

balance," White said, adding this budget is \$4.87 million short.

Supervisor McNamara said by June he will get advice from financial experts on how to treat the landfill funds. He said this can be considered a "budget request."

"False information is being given to my constituents," Clerk Wright said. "If I think it's wrong, I'll say so."

Treasurer Sharry Budd said the landfill fund was not to be used to support the budget and was to do projects for the township. She said in around 2008 the board started the special revenue fund because that it allowed the landfill funds to be kept as a special fund.

She said the audit shows it combined with the general fund. She cautioned that (continued on page 6)

Editorial **Ordinance change** could sell city hall

Belleville Councilman Tom Fielder said if the council passes the new zoning ordinance amendment it would enhance the "saleability" of city hall.

At Tuesday's meeting, the council approved the word changes and sent the amended ordinance to the planning consultant to put it into its final format. It is expected to be approved at the Jan. 17 meeting.

The move to step back from requiring two-story buildings in the downtown B-2 district came after Davenport Brothers said they wanted to build on the vacant site at 337 Main Street – and they wanted to build a single-story building.

Fielder said the move to allow singlestory buildings to be built downtown is not a "single issue ... It's a 10-year evaluation that maybe we need to do something different."

Fielder said the city has been putting money into the city hall building that "is not useable by anyone but us." He said the appraiser said there is value to the city hall site for a one-story building.

In the past, Fielder had said businesses looking at the prime site at 5 Points backed off after learning a two-story building was required.

Jeff Vernon said from the audience that for the past three years Fielder talked about selling city hall every December, but this year he delayed until January. Vernon asked if the city had someplace to move.

"We own property," Mayor Conley replied without further comment.

EXTRA THINGS I KNOW

Last week we reported a bit about the Dec. 26 fire in a warehouse at 41199 Van Born, between Haggerty and I-275.

The VBT Fire Department responded to an 8:45 a.m. fire alarm. They found one of the units in the big warehouse was full of smoke. The sprinklers had gone off and had pretty much put out the fire, but the smoke was very thick.

Fire Marshall Dave McInally said there was a small row of Ethan Allen furniture - about 2-1/2 feet wide by 15 feet long that was due to be delivered on Dec. 28. It burned. Nothing else. He suggests the loss may be from \$8,000 to \$9,000.

The rest of the furniture in the warehouse was covered with plastic and may have been protected from the sprinklers. But, the smoke was thick.

Romulus Fire Department was called on a mutual aid run and that helped fire fighters cover both sides of the warehouse unit.

I was told Ethan Allen sells furniture from that warehouse. One of the fire fighters said he told them to call the Independent so people will know.



Sherry Frazier should resign from a position

To the Editor:

I was surprised to learn recently that Sherry Frazier apparently intends to continue to serve simultaneously as trustee of both Van Buren Township and Van Buren Public Schools. I believe that this presents insoluble conflicts of interest, because the township collects taxes for and runs elections for the district.

The law itself (Incompatible Public Offices Act 566 of 1978) is ambiguous re this particular conflict, so questions about its application are settled by court cases and by official guidance from the State Attorney General. The statute requires that, in determining if an incompatible situation exists, courts examine the purpose and function of each position to determine whether the exercise of the powers of one office would prevent the proper fulfillment of the duties of the other by resulting in: "(1) the subordination of one public office to another; (2) the supervision of one public office by another; or (3) a breach of duty of public office."

Opinion of the Attorney General No 7156 (June 1, 2004)

The Attorney General opined that the offices of township clerk and member of a board of education of a local school district became incompatible on Jan. 1, 2005, which was the effective date of amendments to the Michigan Election Law requiring townships to contract with school districts to run their elections. Although the opinion asked for referred specifically to township CLERKs, it noted that the possibility of disagreement over legitimate election costs "presents an issue of competing interests between the township [not just the clerk] and the local board of education." Van Buren Township runs VBPS elections.

Opinion of the Attorney General No. 6234 (July 10, 1984)

The office of trustee of a charter township and the office of member of a board of education of a school district are not incompatible unless the charter township and the school district in question undertake negotiations for or enter into a contract with each other. One example of a potential contractual relationship between the township and the school district that would render the two offices incompatible is an agreement for the collection by the township of summer taxes for the school district. Van Buren Township (among other entities) collects summer taxes for VBPS.



Oakland Co. Prosecutor, supra, Wayne Co. Prosecutor v. Kinney, 184 Mich.App. 681 (1990)

The IPOA seeks to prevent "any suggestion that a public official is acting out of selfinterest or for hidden motives because of a conflict between the two offices of the public official." To determine whether a conflict exists, "the salient question is not whether the public official will be affected, but whether there exists the possibility that actions in one office will be influenced by the other position held by the public official." Merely abstaining from official actions to avoid an incompatibility does not remedy a breach of duty under the statute. Rather, vacating one of the offices is the only solution to the problem.

While the incompatibility of these offices has been clarified by AG and court opinions, Section 15.184 of the statute (Injunction or other judicial relief or remedy) prescribes that "The attorney general or a prosecuting attorney may apply to the circuit court ... for injunctive or other appropriate judicial relief or remedy. However, this act shall not create a private cause of action." That means that enforcement relies on challenge in court by either the AG or the County Prosecutor - both of which seem unlikely in this case. Instead, we must rely upon Mrs. Frazier to do the right thing and choose which office she wishes to continue to hold, while resigning from the other seat.

Editor's Note: Martha Toth was vice president of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education when she announced her resignation before her term was up to move out of state. She had served 25 years. Her resignation necessitated the school board having to fill Toth's seat with a temporary board meetings for three meetings to fill out her term. Trustee Sherry Frazier said Van Buren Township Clerk Leon Wright checked with the state to see if her serving in the two trustee positions was incompatible and he told her he was advised it was not incompatible.

almost \$500,000 of the landfill fund has to pay for the fire station on Hull Road and other land.

"EQ tipping fees are included in the general fund," White pointed out.

"We'll get a professional opinion on this and I'll present it to the board," McNamara said.

"I can show since 2002 the landfill fund has balanced the budget," Wright said.

Frazier said the township has a lot of important things facing it like the pension shortfall and the Visteon bond.

McNamara said the health care shortfall is estimated between \$9 million and \$15

McNamara said. "It's crazy for the new board to vote on

this budget," said Wright, who was also a member of the old board that prepared the budget. "It should have been put in place in September or October... We've got four years to think about it."

White said historically the budget was left


for the new officials to approve. He said it is good for the new officials to understand the budget. He again voiced his concern about spending landfill dollars.

"We are responsible for getting the best bang for the buck for our taxpayers," White said.

Frazier said the holiday season is not the best time to have public hearings on the budget because people are busy. She said it should be moved up a month and McNamara said he had no problem with that plan.

DARINKA Z. BRIGGS

September 2, 1932 - December 24, 2016 Darinka Z. Briggs, a long-time resident of Ann Arbor, MI passed away December 24, 2016 at Cedar Woods Assisted Living in Belleville, MI. She was born September 2, 1932 in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, the daughter of Vojislav and Milica Zigic.

She emigrated to Canada in the late 1950s then to Michigan in the early 1960s. Darinka was a scientist, an artist and an adventurer. She worked in the Department of Geology at the University of Michigan, published several papers together with her late husband, Dr. Louis I. Briggs, Jr. and traveled to geological sites throughout the U.S. and South America. She was a lifelong member of several professional organizations including more than 55 years with the American Association of Petroleum Geologists (AAPG). She was also a prolific painter with hundreds of landscape and abstract paintings throughout her Ann Arbor home, including a painting entitled "Mediterranean" that she donated to the University of Michigan upon her late husband's death. She taught herself to play guitar and harmonica, and so family vacation trips often included music and singing. Bob Dylan's "Blowin' in the Wind" and Mary Hopkin's "Those Were the Days" were two of her favorites.

Most of all, she loved driving her car and spending time with her beloved German Shepherds, whether frequenting Michigan's parks and lakes, New York's Adirondacks Mountains or North Carolina's Outer Banks. Despite numerous physical challenges in later years, she rarely complained and instead was known for her quiet presence, her love of good food and for her many hats that she liked to wear.

Darinka was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, and her sister Ljiljana Mamuzic of West Lafayette, IN. She is survived by niece Bojana "BJ" Mamuzic (San Antonio, TX) and cousins Ruzica Peric (Jackson Heights, NY) and Dragomir Peric (Belgrade, Serbia).

township decides whether to opt in or opt out of approving marijuana establishments for Sumpter.

Planning consultant Chris Atkin of Carlisle Wortman said he is at his office in Sumpter Township two days a week and this week there were two drop-ins and one phone call on marijuana facilities.

He said one wants to put up a multimillion-dollar indoor growing facility in an Industrial zoned site.

"I told them to wait," Atkin said.

Oddy said he read that they are going for more enforcement in Colorado because the black market has exploded. He said there is a 25-28% tax on marijuana there and it's cheaper to buy it on the black market.

He said now in Colorado a caregiver can grow 99 plants and the state is looking to reduce that to 12.

Oddy said people are starting to "ramp up" in Michigan in advance of when the new law takes effect in December 2017.

At the Dec. 8 meeting, the commission also:

• Heard Akers announce that there is a request for a solar farm in the northern part of the township which he will announce to the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees at its Dec. 13 meeting. He said there is a request for a 20-year lease of property, with option for another 20 years. Akers said his firm worked on similar solar farms in Augusta Township and Monroe Township; and

• Discussed an example of an Administrative Site Plan Review Ordinance that Atkin worked on for another, larger community. "It's quite robust," he said.


