City Council adds another \$15,000 to legal action against landfill

At Monday's meeting of the Belleville City Council, the council voted unanimously to add another \$15,000 to its share of the legal bill to fight the delivery of radioactive waste to the Wayne Disposal operation on the North I-94 Service Drive in Van Buren Township.

Mayor Ken Voigt said this is in addition



to the \$5,000 already approved by the lawsuit. He said the money will come out of the city's fund balance. He said that is the city's "rainy-day fund" and if this isn't a rainy day, he doesn't know what is.

Mayor Voigt said Van Buren Township is paying the biggest share of the litigation cost. The township has not publicly announced any cost associated with the litigation.

Mayor Voigt said there is a Wednesday, Oct. 9, motion hearing before Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Kevin Cox in Detroit and he is on the witness list. He said the hearing should be interesting.

Judge Cox first enjoined radioactive waste from being delivered to the site and then amended that to say only the waste from the Niagara Falls site is enjoined and the similar wastes from other sites could



continue.

He said they think they have a good case since the landfill's permit expired two years ago and it was allowed to continue. A public hearing is part of the permit application and that is yet to be held.

When asked if the Oct. 9 hearing will be the end of it, he said it wouldn't, but he expected the state government to ultimately

New write-in joins **Democratic candidates** in VBT board election

All of the candidates for Van Buren Township offices are Democrats and were unopposed in the August primary election.

But, write-in candidate Janine Houle filed at noon on Oct. 1 to run for a trustee position. She also is a Democrat, but her name will not be on the Nov. 5 General Election ballot and voters will have to write it in if they want to vote for her.

Van Buren Township Deputy Clerk Brianna Beaudry said she checked with the county and voters can write in the name under either the Democrat or Republican township trustee spaces since a write-in is considered a non-partisan candidate.

Incumbents running are Supervisor Kevin McNamara, Clerk Leon Wright, Treasurer Sharry Budd, and Trustees Donald Boynton, Bryon Kelley, and Kevin Martin

Since incumbent Trustee Sherry Frazier is not running for reelection, her son William Frazier is running for the seat.

Now, Janine Houle has filed as a writein candidate for trustee making five Democrats running for four, four-year positions.

<u>Editorial</u> City Council grants itself longer terms

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Although city council terms are four years under the current city charter, at Monday's meeting the Belleville City Council voted unanimously for a resolution that gives themselves an extra year and makes their current term five years.

City Manager Jason Smith said at the Michigan Municipal League conference Mayor Voigt spoke to Mayor Colestock of Eaton Rapids about odd-year elections. Mayor Colestock said they had changed their election years by resolution rather than by a ballot question. She sent information to Belleville and they adapted it for our city.

Smith said the city attorney looked it over and said Belleville could make this change in a similar fashion and the attorney general said she preferred votes of the people, but a resolution would work. The council voted unanimously to change the terms of councilpersons Beebe and Kissel from expiring in 2025 to expiring in 2026. The terms of Mayor Voigt, Mayor Pro-Tem Bates, and councilman Priest, which expired in 2027, will now expire in 2028.

City clerk/treasurer Briana Hootman said this change will save the city \$5,000 in costs for the odd-year city election which has nothing else on the ballot and brings only about a 5% turnout.

Mayor Voigt said this should have been done years ago.

The next council members, elected in 2026, will be for four-year terms again.


on Saturday, a Van Buren Township woman went to Chase Bank on Main Street to get \$50 cash to take to Meijer to get a money order to send as a donation to a nonprofit she supports. She said it costs less than \$1 for the money order at Meijer and costs \$5 at Chase, so that's how she does it. Also, if she writes a check she has to wait for the donation to clear and she doesn't want to wait for her books to clear.


She got her \$50 bill and took it to customer service at Meijer, where the clerk checked it with a counterfeit detector pen and told her it was a counterfeit bill. The mark on the bill was brown and it should be yellow if it's OK. She was embarrassed and upset and told the clerk she just got it from the bank. She said the clerk called her supervisor and the supervisor told the clerk to just give the bill back to the customer, so she did.

The VBT woman had other cash so she got the money order and took the \$50 bill back to Chase Bank. The clerk who waited on her earlier was still there and she said she had checked the \$50 before giving it to the woman in the first place, but she checked it again with a pen. There was nothing wrong with the bill, she said. Other people at the bank checked the bill with their pens and electronic means and found it was fine.

They held it up to the light and showed the woman the lines going through the bill which counterfeit bills don't have. The bank took the bill back.

Another woman told me she had purchased some counterfeit-detecting pens for a relative to use for her upcoming craft sale and she wonders if the pens are foolproof.

settle the problem.

In other business at Monday's regular meeting, the council:

• Approved on a 4-1 vote spending \$1,090 to get stretching exercises for the police department from ATI which will be given to officers to use to stave off injuries from wearing heavy equipment. Copies of the exercises will be made for the rest of the employees. Councilman Randy Priest voted no without comment. City manager Jason Smith had recommended spending \$34,065 to get workstation assessments and ergonomic training, but the council agreed it wasn't going to be paying \$5,000 for each new chair to follow through on workstation assessments. Although Smith had proposed this for police and fire, Fire Chief Brian Loranger said the fire fighters mostly come from home for runs, with a few working seven-hour shifts, so it doesn't apply to them;

• Was told by Smith that the DPS Director contract for Jordan Edwards for \$75,000 didn't work out because he was not interested and so the proposal to hire him was removed from the agenda. Edwards works at Metro Consultant Associates, a public works consulting company in Plymouth, and also worked at the Ecorse DPW. He was to start immediately to replace the former DPW that Smith fired ; • Approved a Family Court Awareness

Month Proclamation;

• Approved a Konica Minolta printer lease for four multi-function printers, but rejected Smith's plan to have an additional six smaller printers on desktops. Cost will be \$610.65 a month for five years and follows the state contract for such items. This will not service the fire department, which said the auxiliary owns its printers. Councilman Beebe said the goal is to stop killing trees and go electronic when possible;

• Directed Smith to go out for bids for finishing the alley paving instead of presenting quotes for the work from contractors. City workers had taken out the existing paving to begin the work. Mayor Voigt said for projects over \$5,000, they have to go out for bids. The work left to do on the alley between Wabash and Davis streets is fine grading, compacting, and four-inches of asphalt. The DDA has approved paying 50% up to \$20,000;

• Heard Assistant Fire Chief Chris Zweng say that when the fire fighters were going to get a generator, they had three contractors with quotes in hand and the department was told it had to go out for bids. And, the fire department can't open its doors during a power outage, he noted. He said it seems the fire department has to follow different rules than the other departments. That's when Mayor Voigt directed Smith to bring the alley bids to the next meeting;

• Directed Smith to bring bids for the tree to be removed in Victoria Commons and the three trees in Hillside Cemetery instead of the quotes he presented from a preferred contractor; • Approved a resolution formally adopting the 5-Year Parks Plan Refresh;

• Authorized selling the old street sweeper, since Smith said he had an offer. Assistant Fire Chief Zweng said two or three years ago when the fire department had an offer of \$15,000 for its old fire truck, it was told by the city that they had to go out for bids and someone bought it at bids for \$5,000;

• Tabled until the next meeting for more information the updated parts quote presented for the 1991 Vac Truck just purchased. Smith said he thought it was 100% ready to go, but it might not pass MDOT inspection without some \$4,296.99 worth of upgrades;

• Changed the Nov. 11 council meeting date to Nov. 12 in observerance of Veterans' Day;

• Approved a resolution to accept \$3,956 from Wayne County Parks millage for this year which will be used to purchase new, heavy duty picnic tables for Victory Park;

• Approved \$264,809 accounts payables and a departmental expenditure over \$500 from Core and Main for \$840 for a sewer project;

• Heard Smith announce that the clock in the Fourth Street Square is going to be repaired. He said assistant city manager Steve Jones called the repair man in Cincinnati and he's coming out;

• Heard a Victoria Commons resident complain about the pond where she can't see the water because of the weeds and the fountain that isn't working. Mayor Voigt said the DDA has engaged a company to fight the weeds that are hard to get rid of and the fountain is to be installed;

• Heard Carl Bono, who has lived in the senior co-op on Sumpter Road since December of last year, complain about the mess next door to their housing where the contractor is using the area as a dump. He said there are 100 dump loads of dirt with stones spread over the area, which makes the property one to two feet higher than it was. Now there is cement and metal and earlier that day an excavator was stacking

things in eight to ten-foot high piles. He said in a previous incident in his life he went to the attorney general's office and had it taken care of. "If you folks don't get him to comply, I'll do that again," he said. He said zoning for that property is not for a landfill. Mayor Voigt said the city would take care of it. Smith said he does have a meeting planned with Steve Davenport on another project;

• Heard Mayor Pro-Tem Kelly Bates ask about the Priority Waste bins that were left when the company stopped its service. Mayor Voigt directed Smith to send them a registered letter saying the city is going to dispose of them if they don't take them back by a certain date;

• Heard Smith report that he has had a conversation with Steve Davenport about swapping some property he owns for city property and they have a meeting set to continue the conversation. He also reported the Sani repairs are now under \$9,000, half than what it was. He said the DTE contractor is at Denton Road Bridge and will move the gas line and access to the cemetery will be closed for a couple of days and after that demolition of the bridge can begin. The suggestions from the SEMCOG road safety study included a dogbone roundabout at Five Points which would take a small piece of the car place. Also, it suggested curb extensions at Second, Third, and Fourth to calm the traffic. He said it would cost \$2.5 million to

\$3 million for the roundabout. He said he has sent this to the grant writer for an April deadline for the Safe Streets for All Grant application;

• Heard Mayor Voigt say signs are going up at the parks so people will know how to contact the city when they have complaints on the parks instead of going to social media. He said he is happy the bridge is under construction and he gives Van Buren Township credit for getting permission to do the engineering which probably took two years off the project. He also praised State Rep. Reggie Miller who was 90 days on the job and was able to get \$10 million from the state for the project. Jones said the bridge was on the "do not repair" list and Commissioner Al Haidous got it put on the "repair" list;

• Heard Police Chief Kris Faull say there are 70 tractors in Saturday's Harvest Fest Parade. She said they will be taking off from her place in Sumpter at 10:10 a.m. and will get to Belleville at 11 a.m.; and

• Heard fire fighter Kissel say after a year of work he now has his paramedic license and he has given heart-saver training to 36 employees in the Van Buren Public Schools. Chief Faull said her officers will be trained by him, as well.



What do you think are the most pressing issues in our school district and what should be done about them?

Recently, we have hired a Director of School Safety, updated McBride Middle School, along with Tyler and Savage Elementarry Schools with new secure entries, a new key card entry system at the high school, and we have a Safety Resource Officer from Van Buren Township that is a presence in all of our schools. We practice safety drills at all of our schools on a regular basis, and we are providing A.L.I.C.E. (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) training to all of our staff and students. We are continually looking at ways to keep our staff and students safe, and to make sure our students receive the best education possible while in a safe environment."

Owen also added, "I would like to take this opportunity to address why I am a write-in candidate this year. Back in 2012 when I ran for school board the first time, I turned in my initial paperwork a few days past the filing deadline, which generated a \$50 late fee on my Wayne County Campaign Finance account. At the time, I had an obsolete email that these late fee notices were sent to. The Wayne County Campaign Finance Department sent an initial notice to this obsolete email only, and I was unfortunately not notified through any other methods of communication. When I ran for reelection in 2016 and 2020, I was never alerted that I had an outstanding balance, and I was completely unaware of it. This did not affect my ability to be on the ballot in those elections.

"In 2022, a law was passed banning candidates from running for office if they had an outstanding campaign finance balance. It was not until Aug. 8, 2024, after submitting my paperwork to run in this current election, that I was notified of my fine from 12 years ago which rendered

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

Just imagine. You are at work one day and someone comes to you and says you can't go home. You are going to live with another family not too far from here. That will also mean that you can't work here anymore, but you'll get another job, so it will be ok. No, I don't have your clothes, but I'll bring you some in a couple of days. No, you can't speak to your family right now, I'm setting up a time for that in a few days.

Yes, this is an oversimplified and somewhat silly comparison to foster care. It's hard to paint a picture of what being removed from your family feels like. It depends on so many variables. What was the child's age at the time of removal, do siblings get to be together, is the child placed with someone they know, what time of day did the removal take place?

For the children who are removed, this is often devastating regardless of the reasons that led to the removal. Kids are not only taken from the harmful situation, but they are often removed from their schools, neighborhood, friends, toys, and even siblings. If there are no relatives to care for them, they are placed with people they may not know. This would be incredibly stressful for anyone.

Kids are left with complex feelings of

loss and longing. They may be angry with their parents or aligned with them. Usually, it's both. Foster parents, who are excited to get to care for a child in need, can feel surprised or disappointed when they are not appreciative. Foster Care is not for the weak. In fact, the strongest people I have ever known I have met through the foster care system. This applies to foster parents, relatives, birth families and children.

Foster care is a temporary living situation for children whose parents cannot take care of them. The Court makes the ultimate decision about whether a child should be removed. Once that decision is made, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) places that child with an agency like Guiding Harbor.

As a provider of foster care services, Guiding Harbor is responsible for supporting the birth family while they work on getting their children back, the relative caregivers or foster parents while they care for the child, and the youth who was removed.

The goal is for children to reunify with their families whenever safely possible. This can take between 6 months to 2 years for most families to demonstrate to the Court that they can safely parent their children. Our case workers help connect birth parents to resources like housing, mental health and substance abuse treatment, and parenting classes.

Ultimately, safety and stability for kids is the most important. Achieving permanency can take several forms, including:

1. Reunification: Returning a child to

their birth family after the resolution of issues that led to their removal.

2. Adoption: Providing a permanent family for a child through legal adoption.

3. Guardianship: Placing the child in the legal custody of a guardian who takes on the responsibilities of parenting without adoption.

Permanency is a critical aspect of ensuring the well-being of children, helping them develop lifelong relationships and a sense of belonging. The quicker permanence can be established, the better the outcomes are for kids.

Creative problem solving is one aspect of service delivery. We are paid by the state of Michigan to provide foster care services, but it's not enough for us to solve problems as quickly as we'd like. We rely on fundraising to make ourselves nimbler and more prepared to respond quickly to the needs of our families.

We also think it's important to celebrate our successes, spread the word about our services, and enjoy a night out. On Nov. 9, Guiding Harbor will host our 39th annual auction, The Greatest Gala on Earth. It will be held at the Baronette Renaissance hotel in Novi. Doors open at 6 p.m. Tickets include dinner, dessert, open bar, silent auction, and entertainment by Comedic Magician, Cameron Zvara. VBT board approves amendment to Walden Woods agreement

The planned unit development agreement (PUD) that Van Buren Township had with original developer Hayden Gregory Associates for the construction of Walden Woods subdivision has now been amended to pave the way for new developer Pulte Homes to build an 88-unit, single-family residental development on a vacant site.

At the Oct. 1 regular meeting of the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees, Ron Akers, director of municipal services, explained that the township attorney has approved of the changes. The board unanimously approved the changes.

Supervisor Kevin McNamara was absent and excused from the meeting and Treasurer Sharry Budd presided.

Director Akers said Pulte Homes had expressed interest in the property and submitted plans to build the residential development on the vacant property located at the northwest corner of Tyler and Morton Taylor roads.

This property was a part of the original development agreement for Walden Woods subdivision and was originally slated for multi-family and commercial development.

The project has been before the planning commission for recommendation and a preliminary site plan approval, but was tabled until questions about the required changes to the existing Walden Woods PUD agreement were answered, since the township no longer has PUDs.

Akers said the township staff and township legal counsel met with Pulte to discuss various options for how to proceed and they came up with an amended agreement, which would allow the planning commission to continue with their site plan review process.

Akers said, in general, the amendment to the original PUD site plan allows the replacement of multi-family and commercial development to allow for the construction of an 88-unit single family residential development subject to the PRD (planned residential development) standards in the zoning code.

The other significant item in the agreement is that there is language which specifies that Morton Taylor Road will be paved to the entrance to the Walden Woods subdivision and measures relating to timing and performance guarantees.

The project goes back to the planning commission to work toward preliminary and final site plan approvals.

In other business at the 40-minute meeting on Oct. 1, the board:

• Held a three-minute public hearing during which no public spoke on the 2024 amended and proposed 2025 general fund budget, water/sewer budget, and nine special revenue budgets (Downtown Development Authority, Local Development Finance Authority, Landfill, Belleville Area Museum, E-911 Service, Federal Forfeiture, State Forfeiture, Long Term Debt, and Capital Improvement. The final approval of the budgets is expected at the Oct. 15 board meeting;

• Approved the reappointments of Ben Ross and Ron Merritt to the Environmental

Sumpter uses ARPA funds on police dept., township hall roof

At its regular meeting Sept. 24, the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees voted unanimously to use federal ARPA funds to replace the south side windows and restroom floors in the police department and to replace the roof at township hall.

ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds have been allocated to help communities recover from the COVID pandemic. Sumpter was allotted \$984,000.

The board:

• Approved a proposal of re-obligation of ARPA funds and targeted projects;

• Approve the bid by EMU Global Services to replace the police department's south side windows at a cost of \$18,350, with ARPA funds or other available funds, if required;

• Approved the sole bid by Concrete Floor Treatment to replace the police department restroom floors at a cost of \$13,952, paid with ARPA funds or other available funds, if required; and

• Approved to post and publish an invitation to bid for the township hall roof

replacement, paid with ARPA funds or other available funds, if required.

In other business at the one hour and 25 minute meeting, the board also:

• Removed from the agenda without explanation an agenda item to approve an amendment to the Finance Director's and Township Accountant's contracts to report to the township board and an amenda item to define payroll duties are under the Clerk's office supervision and overseen by the Finance Director;

• Added to the agenda and approved accepting the sole bid of \$39,800 from Diversified Excavating for the Graham Park and Banotai Park interior roadways and parking lot, saving \$10,000 by using campus parking lot millings;

• Heard Finance Director Scott Holtz report that the royalty check from the landfill just arrived and it is \$196,000, 5% down for the year. Also, because of the federal interest rate cuts, the township interest earnings will slide downward;

 Heard Township Manager Anthony Burdick report the HVAC unit for the (continued on page 23)

• Approved accepting the fuel tank refresh quote from Chapp & Bushey Oil Company at a total cost of \$3,915.65; • Approved Rachel Scott of the DPW to attend the MRWA (Michigan Rural Water Association) S3 and S4 training at a cost not to exceed \$650;

• Approved Resolution 2024-08 opposing toxic waste being sent to the VanBuren Township Republic Waste landfill, adding that the township strongly disapproves of disposing of out of state toxic waste in Wayne County; and

• Went into a 43-minute closed-door session at the end of the meeting to consider its attorney's opinion pertaining to Republic Landfill and attorney's opinion pertaining to a pending audit. After the board came out of closed door session, it voted to direct the attorney to proceed as directed in closed session, with no details given.

Businessman John Chapman curses at Sumpter Twp. Board

John Chapman, who for many years has owned an auto mechanics shop on Sumpter Road, just south of Willow Road, got up to speak at the Sept. 24 meeting of the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees.

He was angry over the township putting

a cloud over his title so he can't sell his business, saying, "... there's a cloud on the title of my f---ing building..." He used the "f "word a second time in his remarks and started to use it again.

Trustee Tim Rush called out "point of order" and Chapman was asked not to curse.

Chapman said the township put a condemnation order on his building in 2002 and everything was cleared up, and, "Why hasn't the cloud been lifted?"

Supervisor Tim Bowman said he didn't know anything about the issue.

"Is my building condemned?" he asked, asking Supervisor Bowman if he could meet with his real estate agent and if Bowman could set up office hours to do so.

Township attorney Rob Young scolded Chapman for expecting to talk three minutes and have people know what he's talking about. The board has a 3-minute limit on public comment, but often lets people speak as long as they want.

He said Chapman is talking about a notice of condemnation in 2002 that no longer is valid and that can be corrected easily. He asked Chapman to submit his paperwork to the clerk's office.

Chapman said he has been in the community for 35 years and he has master's certificates on automotive and truck repair. He has had a state license since 1993 and the state has not prosecuted him.

"You are not going to take away my rights," he said.

He said the township has been messing with his business. The township finished the inspection and under the ordinance they "shall" issue a business license, he said.

Chapman said he is a neighborhood mechanic who charges reasonable rates and now is the last one on Sumpter Road between Milan and Five Points in Belleville.

As he finished his remarks, he put a bag on the podium and left the building.

The board asked the township manager to check the bag and remove it from the podium. Township Manager Anthony Burdick checked the bag, said there was no fuse, and removed it from the podium.

Trustee Rush said he has never heard such foul language and he hopes they can mute the foul language on the videotape because it needs to be done. "I've never heard anything like that ... outrageous."

[The posting of the video was delayed by almost two weeks and the comments were left in space, with a big warning posted about how the language may be offensive to viewers.]

"We need details about what he's talking about," said Trustee Matt Oddy, asking Young to look into it.

Young said he doesn't like to be at 3-minute meetings where people pose a lot of illegitimate questions. He said sometimes people have legitimate things to say.

Then, Young said he just remembered that he was asked to draft termination of a lein from 2002. He said he remembers drafting the lein and coming into the township parking lot with it 7, 8, 9, or 10 days ago while a township employee was out in the parking lot talking to Glenn Silvenis, Chapman's real estate agent.

"It's so ridulous to throw this at us when it's already been solved," Young said.

"It took me 15 minutes to think about it," he said and then he remembered what Chapman was talking about. This was after Chapman had left the building.

Young complained about the 3-minutes open forum and said people can come in to tell the board off in any way they want instead of coming into the township hall and finding the truth opposed to lies.

"I wish I would have recalled that," Young said, of the termination of the lein he had recently written.

Board members pointed out they could have warned Chapman about his language and if he did it again have the police escort him from the building, but that didn't happen.
