Belleville DDA considers new city clock on 4th St. Sq.

On Oct. 16, the Belleville Downtown Development Authority agreed something should be done about the malfunctioning clock on the Fourth Street Square.

Assistant City Manager/DDA Director Steve Jones reported the clock, which is from the 1990s, is not in good repair and is hours behind. He said he reached out to the Verdin Clock company in Cincinnati, which installed the clock and was told that particular model is obsolete. It has been 2010 since the Belleville clock was maintained.

Director Jones said there is a refurbishment option that would require attaching a small box at the base of the clock because the present clock is not big enough to hold the mechanism needed.

He said the basic refurbishment would be \$7,385 and about \$13,000 with new dials and the box.

A brand-new clock, similar to the present clock but with the controller built inside, would be \$17,413.

Mayor Ken Voigt said the existing clock is pushing 30 years olds and is cast iron or aluminum and he doesn't like the idea of a separate box at the base.

DDA vice chairman John Winter asked if there are guarantees for refurbishing or for the new clock and Jones said he didn't know.

"We'd be better off with a whole new clock," Mayor Voigt said looking at the

Jones said with a new clock it is run by a photo cell and the light comes on and off by itself and the time can be updated by

Winter, who was running the meeting in the absence of chairwoman Alicia McGovern, said they need to know the (continued on page 16)



VBT approves budgets for 2025, honors Commissioner Haidous

The Van Buren Township Board of Trustees which has been working on its 2025 budgets since April, held the required public hearings at the last meeting, and finally on Oct. 15, unanimously approved the documents.

This included approval of the amended 2024 and proposed general fund budget with a 2025 salary schedule; the amended 2024 special revenue funds and 2025

special revenue funds budget; and the amended water sewer fund budget and the proposed 2025 water sewer fund budget, with a fee schedule.

Supervisor Kevin McNamara said the general fund budget of \$24 million is balanced, as required.

He said the township has the secondlowest water rates in the region and in 2025 there will be a zero rate increase for water and sewer. He said the township is having a rate raise from DWLS, but won't raise the township rates since they had a little surplus.

Before the board dealt with its brief agenda, which held mostly the budget approvals, it welcomed State Rep. Reggie Miller, D-Van Buren Township, who brought a framed tribute from the State Legislature honoring Wayne County Commissioner Al Haidous.

She said Commissioner Haidous will retire from the county commission at the

end of the year. She read a long list of his accomplishments.

Supervisor McNamara pointed out the Van Buren Township board honored Haidous a few months earlier. But, "He's been a pretty good egg to Van Buren Township and we want to celebrate that."

Haidous was invited to say a few words and his comments ended with, "Thank God for the USA where a story like mine could exist."

Officials from the city of Wayne, Romulus, and Belleville were present, along with the Assistant Wayne County Executive, other county officials, along with Commissioner-elect Allen Wilson and Haidous' family members.

The assistant county executive said he is related to Haidous and "his son-in-law is my first cousin." He said Haidous was an Arab-American elected mayor of Wayne, just after 9-11. He was the only Arab in the city and showed others that they could make it here.

Van Buren Police Chief Jason Wright said Haidous was his mayor when he served in Wayne. Chief Wright said he came to Wayne in 1993 as a 23-year-old patrol officer and Haidous taught him the art of compromise. He pointed out other police officers in the audience that were a part of that team in Wayne.

Romulus councilwoman Tina Talley read a proclamation from the Mayor of Romulus Robert McCraight, who could not be present.

Belleville Mayor Ken Voigt told Haidous, "The city of Belleville loves you."

VBT Clerk Leon Wright said 16-18 years ago he met Haidous going door to door as a candidate in Wright's front yard and he's known him ever since.

VBT Treasurer Sharry Budd said she's known Haidous since serving on the community block grant board with him in 1998. She said his story is when he and his wife were looking for a place to move in Michigan, they ended up in Wayne because of a flat tire. People came out and helped them and they decided that was the place for them. She said if it weren't for that flat tire, they could be residents of Van Buren Township.

Trustee Kevin Martin said he has known him for 10 years and he has been an exemplary commissioner.

Supervisor McNamara ended the comments with his story of his father telling him to go sit on Al Haidous' stool in his party store and talk to him if he wanted the answer to a particular question. He didn't want to sit on a stool and then someone else told him to go sit on the stool and eventually he did. He said Haidous use to talk politics for hours with people sitting

on his stool while he waited on customers.

In other business at the Oct. 15 meeting, the board:

- Heard Jeneen Rippey of Van Buren Township and Therese Antonelli of Belleville support the township's legal action against the radioactive waste coming into Wayne Disposal. Rippey said they are in a group with more than 750 residents gathering information on this;
- Heard Reg Ion say there wasn't a fuss at the time when the landfill started taking toxic waste. He said some of those on the board have taken money from the landfill company. "You let us down, bigtime," he said, adding that now there is quite a battle, and he can't imagine fighting a battle with the mafia. He also said the township still hasn't put up the deer-crossing signs it promised and the fence along the south Ecorse Service Drive was taken down and never put back up. He repeated, "The board sold us out and now you guys can fix it." (McNamara said the township has the deer signs and is waiting for permission from Wayne County to put them up);
- Heard Ms. Stevens say she has not a lot of faith in government, but she asked them to stop the radioactive waste and send it somewhere else;
- Heard John Williams of Van Buren Township since 1998 who said he served in the Marines and is a cancer survivor from Camp Lejuene. Now his cancer has stirred back up. "I don't trust government, don't trust big money," he said. "I hope the big money doesn't win out";
- Heard the president of Robinson River Park Homeowners Association implore the board to do everything it can to stop the radioactive waste;
- Heard McNamara say he stopped by the Denton Road Bridge earlier that day and DTE has bored the hole underneath the lake and reported the clay was very strong. They have to reem it out and make it bigger and then they have to put the pipe in and it will take weeks to put in valves and other things:
- Heard McNamara also say that the court case against Wayne Disposal was due in circuit court Oct. 16, but it has been moved to federal court at the request of Wayne Disposal. He said since the township is in litigation, along with the cities of Wayne, Romulus, and Belleville and Canton Township, he is not permitted to talk about the case; and
- Heard Clerk Wright say it was 25 days before the election and early voting begins Oct. 26 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. He said 7,895 absentee ballots were out and 2,151 back so far. Election day voting could have long lines, he said, urging everyone to make a plan to vote.

Enhancement Millage was approved by voters in 2016, not 1994

The Wayne County Regional Enhancement Millage was approved by voters in 2016, not 1994 as reported in last week's story on the Oct. 14 Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education. It was not passed in 1994, but was passed after the 1994 law that said districts could not ask voters for more funds for operations.

Also, 33 school districts and 90+ public school academies will receive funding, not 32 districts as reported, stated Jacqueline Wayneguite, communications strategist at Byrum & Fish, a firm based in East Lansing.

This request for a correction was sent to the *Independent* by Wayneguite, who said she is working to promote the RESA Enhancement Millage.

We do not recall School Supt. Pete Kudlak mentioning 90+ charter schools at the Oct. 14 school board meeting, however.

Law suit over radioactive waste disposal moved to federal court

Wayne Disposal, Inc., the hazardous waste landfill in Van Buren Township, moved the lawsuit filed against it to federal court on Oct. 15, citing a constitutional clause it argues blocks western Wayne County communities' fight against its disposal of waste from a Manhattan Project cleanup site.

According to a report in *The Detroit News*, Wayne Disposal cited the U.S. Constitution's Commerce Clause in its notice to move the case to U.S. District Court of the Eastern District of Michigan.

The company contends the clause "has long provided that 'the problems of waste disposal' represent 'a matter national in scope and in concern" and does not allow states or local governments to unilaterally stop shipments of out-of-state waste.

It also argued stopping the waste shipments would "fundamentally interfere" with the federal hazardous waste program and create a problem for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, which is charged with remediating Manhattan Project sites.

Belleville, Romulus, Canton Charter Township, Van Buren Charter Township and Van Buren Township fire chief filed a lawsuit against Wayne Disposal Inc. in September in Wayne County Circuit Court, with Wayne County later joining their effort.

The municipalities argue the landfill put their residents in danger by disposing of waste with low levels of radioactivity. They said they were "kept in the dark" about the hazardous material and are not equipped to respond if the material escapes.

The case has so far resulted in a delay of Wayne Disposal Inc.'s plan to import and dispose of waste with low levels of radioactivity from a cleanup site in western New York, although Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Kevin Cox allowed the landfill to continue importing similar waste from other sites.

Round-abouts at 5 Points, Third St. considered by city

Belleville City Manager Jason Smith delivered a report on the SEMCOG Road Safety Audit that talked about pedestrian and vehicle safety in the city between Five Points and High Street.

The recommendations were written by SEMCOG people who stayed most of a day in Belleville to look things over. Guess what? A round-about at Five Points was suggested, along with a mini traffic circle at Main and Third streets. This is all to make traffic safer and reduced in speed.

Smith said the grant SEMCOG used to do the audit only allowed them to do the study from Five Points to High Street and didn't cover the troublesome intersection at Main and N. Liberty. Also, the grant didn't cover them giving the report themselves, so that's why Smith gave the report.

Five Points is complicated and confusing and a single-lane roundabout with a bit of a dogbone is suggested. Mayor Voigt, who likes roundabouts, said that maybe some of the property owned by the city could be used to make it happen so other property at the intersection wouldn't be impacted.

The mini traffic circle at Third was suggested because A&P no longer brings the traffic on Third that the light used to control and it could be eliminated.

There are no roundabouts in Wayne County and some city officials would like Belleville to be the first to have one.

We are saddened to hear of the death of former Van Buren Township Trustee Al Ostrowski. He was an animal control officer when VBT had its own dog pound on Tyler Road, near Hannan.



Belleville city council to sell all the Priority Waste bins left in city

When the city of Belleville signed a contract with a new trash service, its former provider, Priority Waste, pretty much left town before the end of its contract.

Residents were told to put out their recycling bins by the curb to be picked up and it never happened. DPW crews came in on a Saturday to pick them up and they have been stored in the DPW yard and the city's empty lot next door.

Mayor Ken Voigt said, at Monday's regular council meeting, that city manager Jason Smith had made many calls to Priority Waste to ask it to pick up the bins, to no avail. The city had its attorney send an official letter and Priority Waste responded with a brief letter saying it didn't want the

At Monday's meeting, the council approved auctioning off the bins with other items it is auctioning and to keep 40-50 to rebrand with the city's name for special events. They will be sold in bunches of 10-20, city manager Smith said.

In other business at Monday's one-hour-14-minute meeting, the council:

- Heard a report from Michigan Municipal League representative Richard Murphy about opportunities for local entrepreneurs. He said they did a "deep dive" in Belleville and suggested popup events, minigrants, and to use regional sources available. The complete report was in the packet;
- Heard Smith give a report on the SEMCOG Road Safety Audit that was done between Five Points and High Street along Main, which included a roundabout at Five Points and a mini traffic circle at Third Street. This study is needed to apply for the Safe Streets for All grant the city is pursuing, Smith said. Fire Chief Brian Loranger said a roundabout at Five Points next to his business is not the answer and it would make things worse for his business and others because of the influx of vehicles from the high school in the afternoon;
- Approved the Knights of Columbus Tootsie Roll Sale on the streets of Belleville April 11, 12, 13 to rise funds for Michigan Citizens with Disabilities;
- Approved the Belleville VFW/PLAV Veterans Day ceremony at 11:11 a.m. on Nov. 11 at the Veterans Memorial on High
- Approved the annual Cinnamon Car Show at Victory Park on Father's Day, June 15, 2025. The show brought 126 cars

last year. Steve Cinnamon said he walked the site recently and said because of the changes to the park, the entrance for the cars will be a little bit further east at the end of the fence and there is a low spot that will have water if it rains and the grass will get beat down by the cars. The council said the grass would grow back;

- Approved selling the old street sweeper to Brown City. The vehicle was posted for sale and Brown City offered \$7,000;
- Approved \$1,191.07 worth of new data cabling because a new lieutenant/detective position is being created and there is no data drop in the area where the officer will
- · Approved a contract for the next financial audit by Alan C. Young and Associates. Smith said last year it was not to exceed \$16,020 and this year it is not to exceed \$18,975;
- Set a special, brief meeting for 6 p.m., Monday, Oct. 28, to open bids for asphalting the alley between W. Wabash and Henry streets so it can be done before the asphalt plants close for the season;
- Approved accounts payable and an expenditure in excess of \$500 to Atchinson Ford of \$626.38 for vehicle maintenance of a 2018 Ford Explorer;
- Approved having Osier Electric fix the electrical service on the roof of the fire department, so the new roof will be ready to be installed. A light on the roof does not work and Osier will be asked to put that into service, as well;
- · Approved quotes from Leffler and Randy Brown for removing trees that are damaged;
- Heard city manager Smith report that the milling and capping of High and Liberty streets is being studied; boardwalk repairs start Thursday; hydrant flushing is under way and loss of pressure will be experienced by residents, leaf pickup starts Nov. 4, and the MDOT is coming out to inspect the city's vehicle to see what repairs need to be made;
- Heard Mayor Voigt report he tasted 17 pies as a judge in Saturday's Apple Pie Baking Contest and his "youngest son" won second place in a category of the Monster Mutt contest the same day. He referred to Alex, a rescue dog he now owns that came from Texas. He said Alex was dressed as a dragon. He said it cost the city \$200,000 to improve Church Street and it would have cost \$750,000 to improve the whole thing, but the city didn't have the

money and is trying to fix the streets the best it can without raising taxes;

- Heard Mayor Voigt report that he likes to go to the home football games at the high school and last Friday the police and fire departments had to do extra service and they are commended. He said two cars caught on fire in the Early Childhood Center's parking lot and damaged the lot. There also were a couple of fights. Mayor Voigt said some charges may be brought in the incidents. Police Chief Kris Faull was not present at the meeting;
- Discussed the monster pothole on High, the senior transportation issue, and progress Davenport is making on cleaning up the residentially zoned property next to the Co-op on Sumpter Road; and
- Invited everyone to join in with eating a piece of the cake brought by planning

commissioner Becky Hasen to celebrate both the Oct. 10 birthday of city manager Jason Smith, as well as the one-year anniversary of his position as city manager.

Sumpter board approves 3 reappointments to planning commission

At its meeting on Oct. 8, the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees unanimously approved the supervisor's reappointments of three members to the planning commission

Jane Stalmack and Matt Oddy were reappointed to both the planning commission and the zoning board of appeals, with Stalmack's term to expire Nov. 14, 2027 and Oddy's to expire Nov. 20, 2028.

Daniel Watson was reappointed to the planning commission, with his term to expire Nov. 13, 2027.

In other business at the 58-minute meeting on Oct. 8, the board:

- Approved the quote provided by PPM Tree Service for the Graham Park project at a total cost of \$22,850;
- Removed from the agenda approval of a one-year contract renewal with JaPro Janitorial at a 3% incred rate of \$3,401 per month, effective Oct. 1, 2024. Township manager Tony Burdick asked for the removal in order to improve services;
- · Heard a resident of Elwell Road ask if there is any more information about the illegal slaughtering in their neighborhood. Attorney Rob Young reported it's in the court process and they had a hearing. They are looking for temporary compliance, "which we have now ... they are not operating a slaughter house." The man asks Young how he knows that? Young said police have given him no new citations. The man said harassments are being stepped up now against the neighbors, and threats. "It's in the court now," Trustee Oddy said. The man asked to have someone responsible for letting the people know when it's going to court and Young said he was the one asked to do that and he said no. Young said he doesn't set the docket or the adjournment. "We don't provide updates on ordinance violations," Oddy said. "That's not what

we do in board meetings." Young said if there is a problem to call the police and they will come out and investigate. "You can smell it, plain as day, all day long," the neighbor said, referring to the slaughtering and the burning of the entrails;

- Heard Mary Ban say that Trustee Tim Rush brought her some good news and she thanked him. Trustee Rush said he had to shake a lot of trees and had to go to the state, because of outrage with the service of Comcast. He said he was told in two to three business days an engineer would call and five minutes later an engineer called. Rush said Comcast will buy the township a new encoder and install it free. That is expected to solve the problem of the township channel. Ban also asked about the progress on the handicapped access doors at the community center and was told the parts will be coming in the next two weeks. She also said the paved parking lots are beautiful and good for people in wheelchairs and walkers;
- Heard township manager Burdick say they are getting another bid for HVAC units for the community center, the Willis Road

sewer work is being reviewed, and the Willow Road water main is being studied by Hennessey Engineers who have a draft-level report. Also, 89% of the \$984,000 in township ARPA funds have been used, leaving \$105,000 to apply;

• Heard Young report about two lots, owned by Sumpter Township, that people

have offered to buy and there are questions, so he will get the surveyor in. This was added as an agenda item and passed unanimously to get a surveyor in; and

• Heard Young report on the ongoing Republic Waste lawsuit brought by surrounding communities.

warranty for both options and the cost out the door, and have Jones bring the information back to the next meeting.

Mayor Voigt said somebody needs to go measure the current clock to make sure the replacement is the right height.

Jones said he will find out what it would cost to get the city seal on the clock.

Full-time DDA Director

The DDA also discussed at length the proposal to hire a full-time DDA Director. The DDA currently shares Jones with the city.

Treasurer Sabrina Richardson-Williams said as a first step she got the job description for DDA's previous full-time director Carol Thompson and went to Van Buren Township DDA Director Merrie Coburn's job description and Coburn gave her copies of the Holly and Romeo job descriptions.

She said the committee said the DDA needs a full-time director. There was discussion about whether Jones would come on full time and leave his city position and she didn't know what Jones wants to do.

DDA member Valerie Kelley-Bonner said there is a uniqueness in what Jones is doing and the DDA hasn't even been a part of the city discussion on how that would work.

"It's not an emergency to make a decision on this tonight," said Mayor Voigt. He said the city is trying to hire a DPW director and the person accepted the job and then withdrew, putting the hiring back to square one with advertising.

Mayor Voigt suggested giving everyone time to think about it and table action until the first of the year.

DDA member Chris Donley suggested rewriting the 2016 job description.

Richardson-Williams asked Jones if he would be willing to be DDA director and he said he doesn't know the details of how that would be.

Mayor Voigt said things are getting done now.

Jones said he would like a job description before making a decision.

Mayor Voigt suggested forming a personnel committee to work on a job description and he would be happy to help.

Donley said Jones is very involved with Music Lakeside and asked if that would continue as a part of his duties.

Mayor Voigt said Jones has been working on Music Lakeside for 15 years without pay.

Kelley-Bonner said the DDA needs to know what it needs and how much it's going to cost.

Mayor Voigt said it could be a threeperson committee.

Richardson-Williams said she got his present salary and the DDA could afford to pay him, but it paid \$300,000 for the parking lot and 20,000 to hard-surface the alley, and now more is needed for the hardware store.

Mayor Voigt said the DDA has a fund

balance of about \$1.2 million and it isn't a problem to spend it. Later he explained a salaried position could not come out of the fund balance.

He said the DDA has three options: Hire

Jones full time, hire someone else full time, or go on the way it is now. He said the first step would to put together a job description.

Mayor Voigt said having a good DPW

person is essential to this board and the city has to have higher standards than in the past.

What he's been doing overlaps with the city and change should be taken slowly and they shouldn't rush into anything, Mayor

Voigt said.

The DDA voted to set up a three-person committee for the job description. It will be made up of Mayor Voigt, vice chairman Winter, and chairman McGovern, if she wants it, and Donley if she doesn't want to be on the committee.

Kelly McWilliams, of the Economic Development Committee, asked for the committee to put a performance review in the job description, remind them that Richardson-Williams has been asking for a job review for Jones for some time.

In other business at the Oct. 16 meeting, the DDA:

• Heard Donley report from the Marketing

Committee that there is a Facebook page now. Jones said they just got it last week;

- Heard Richardson-Williams report that the Budget and Finance Committee determined if the DDA paid \$80,000 for a director, they would have a deficit. She said they have to be mindful. She said the summer taxes will be coming in;
- Heard Kelley-Bonner report on the youth project her SOOAR business is doing with the school. She said it is not a DDA project, but it goes along with the idea Richardson-Williams has for an alley project. Donley said they need more things

for kids to do downtown;

- Heard artist Vera Redden report she has finished the mural on the hardware store and she passed around a picture of the final result. Richardson-Williams said the ordinance calls for one-third of the window to be left clear, but Redden made a mistake and just painted one-third. Donley said the result was shorter than he envisioned and Kelley-Bonner said she thought it would be bigger and it's hard to see just driving by. "We should have been out there with eyeballs" while it was being done, Donley said. After discussion, the DDA approved paying her the original amount due of \$1,208.71 and authorized another \$600 for more paint and more of her time to make the drawings bigger. Donley said he had some ideas and would meet with her;
- Tabled the hardware store wall project until after the election. This will give city engineers time to look at the project and make a recommendation. Bids are currently required by the city charter for any project over \$5,000. Mayor Voigt pointed out

changes to the city charter are on the Nov. 6 ballot and bidding is included, so maybe they should wait until after the election. Jones had presented two proposals with quotes, with one being to completely take out and rebuild the wall, which was costly, and one to build another attached wall to reinforce the failing wall, which was a third of the cost;

• Heard McWilliams promote the Oct. 19 book signing and apple pie baking contest at the Fourth Street Square, along with the Mutt Walk at the Fourth Street Place. The Witches Ball was mentioned along with trick or treat coming up downtown. Mayor Voigt said Belleville really does well with events, "Better than most communities."

City of Belleville voters to consider four changes to charter on Nov. 5

Voters in the Nov. 5 General Election in the city of Belleville will consider four changes to the City Charter, which was written in 1982.

At the end of the ballot is the Proposal Section and the following is on the city ballots.

Proposal 1: A proposed amendment to Section 5.3 (Regular Meetings) of the City of Belleville City Charter

Currently, Section 5.3 of the City Charter requires that meetings of the City Council are held two times each month at 7:30 p.m. The proposed amendment requires City Council to set an annual schedule for its regular meetings by no later than the first meeting in December of the prior calendar year and allows the Mayor to cancel a meeting in the event a meeting has no scheduled agenda items.

Should this proposed amendment be adopted?

Proposal 2: A proposed amendment to Section 5.7 (Rules) of the City of Belleville City Charter

Currently, Section 5.7 of the City Charter requires a roll call vote for all matters acted on by the Council. The proposed amendment to Section 5.7 provides that a voice or roll call vote may be taken and recorded in the meeting minutes, except that votes related to the expenditure of City funds must be taken and recorded by roll call vote.

Should this proposed amendment be adopted?

Proposal 3: A proposed amendment to Section 15.8 (Purchase Procedure) of the City of Belleville City Charter

Currently, Section 15.8 of the City Charter requires that city purchases of more than \$500 require Council approval and that purchases of \$5,000 or more require a formal bidding process. The proposed amendment would: 1) delete the section's requirements for Council approval of purchases of more than \$500 and a formal bidding process for purchases of \$5,000 or more, 2) require the Council to approve a policy by resolution that details purchasing and contracting procedures, price thresholds, and sources, and 3) change this section's title from Purchase Procedure to Procurement Procedure.

Should this proposed amendment be adopted?

Proposal 4: A proposed amendment to delete Chapter 16 (Civil Service) of the City of Belleville City Charter

Currently, Chapter 16 of the City Charter provides for a Civil Service structure and creation of a Civil Service Commission responsible for personnel administration. The proposed amendment deletes the Chapter in its entirety so that the City Manager is responsible for personnel administration.
