Belleville City Council votes to opt out of new state marijuana law

During a special city council meeting on Monday, Belleville city attorney Steve Hitchcock gave a lengthy presentation on the new state law that allows provisioning growing licenses, secure transportation, and compliance facilities for medical marijuana.

Then the Belleville City Council voted unanimously to officially opt out of that law. It also directed City Manager Diana Kollmeyer to bring back the paperwork necessary to change the zoning ordinance that provides for medical marijuana establishments in Industrial zoning.

Belleville wants to be completely out of the medical marijuana business.

Hitchcock said Dec. 15 was the date set to start issuing permits under the Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act, but first the state is doing background checks, which will take a while. He said those who pass the checks then will apply for the licenses, which probably won't be granted until spring.

He said unless the municipality passes ordinances for location of marijuana facilities, they wouldn't have them.

Hitchcock said some communities are opting out of this by doing nothing, but that leaves the municipal staff without something to tell the callers and they'll keep calling every week until you have

The MMFLA provides for three levels of growers licenses, other forms of medical marijuana such as oils and edibles, provisionary centers (retail centers to sell marijuana to those with medical marijuana cards or caregivers), secure transportation licenses (to transport from the grower to processing to the provisioning centers) and compliance facilities to test the marijuana for THC and purity.

The child lived in the Martinsville Road area, south of Wear Road in Sumpter Township.


Supt. Kudlak said neither paperwork was

Van Buren Planners delay OK of Ashley Capital project

After a public hearing and long discussion, the Van Buren Township Planning Commission tabled a request for special land use approval and preliminary site plan approval for Ashley Capital's new distribution center on 158.5 acres just northwest of the Ecorse-Haggerty Road intersection.

The Ashley Capital property stretches all the way to Van Born Road.

Twenty years ago Ashley Capital built a warehouse on Ecorse just south of this location. The township ordinance states anything larger than 250,000 square feet is a "distribution center" and the new project will total 1,575,778 square feet of gross floor area in four buildings.

Michael Balow of Ashley Capital said the buildings will have precast construction and are being built speculatively, with no tenants, under the belief that if you build the buildings, "they will come."

He said they plan to break ground in the spring on the first two buildings and by the end of 2018 they hope to have tenants.

Sue Farr, 6960 Haggerty Road, who backs up to the Ashley Capital site, said Bowen does have the traffic study the township requested in 2015 and never received.

Farr pointed out the heavy traffic on deteriorated Haggerty Road. She said there were three overturned semis at Haggerty and I-275 just this summer. She said the potholes on Haggerty caused 23 flat tires in one night, with people coming to her door for help.

"Ashley does not want to pay to buy us out," she said, noting that at a rate of \$6 a square foot, Ashley makes \$9 million a month. She said she has 1.8 acres and a house and they offered her \$30,000.

"We've lost three very dear friends," she said. "One in 1999 was harrassed to death by Ashley Capital."

She urged the planning commission to require as part of its approval process that Ashley Capital buy out the few residents left along the east side of their property on Haggerty.

The son of 80-year-old Ralph Turner, who lives at 6598 Haggerty Road, said his father is surrounded by Ashley Capital. He said the semi traffic in front of him on Haggerty is horrible and now there will be traffic in his back yard, as well. He said he doesn't know what Ashley Capital will do with its property to the north of this project.

He said they received an offer of \$60,000 from Ashley Capital a long time ago for the house and 1.7 acres. He said they need enough money to move his aging parents into a retirement home and if they got a fair offer on the house, they'd probably take it.

"We've all been very concerned about houses on Haggerty Road and a couple on Ecorse," said township Treasurer Sharry Budd, who sits on the planning commission. "This company should be fair with the neighbors."

"There are extreme issues already on those roads," said commission chairwoman Carol Thompson.

Balow said his company went through some site plan approval sessions and the planning commission asked them to meet with the residents. He said they made offers in 1998. They figured 2.5 times the State Equalized Value would generate a fair number, but those numbers were not met positively by the residents.

He said then they hired an appraiser and offered 10% over the appraised value. He said they offered that to all residents and they were rejected.

"We stopped offering," Balow said. "We stopped trying to convince them."

Farr said their appraiser walked around the outside of the houses and didn't go inside.

"We all know how that works," she said, adding if you hire the appraiser, he'll give you the numbers you want.

"I had a good offer from Taco Bell and KFC," Farr said, noting somebody on the commission worked in Canton and Taco Bell and KFC went to Canton to avoid the controversy in Van Buren Township.

"Haggerty Road is a death trap with all the cars and semis," Farr said. "They'll tell you if you let them do this, the trucks will go through Ecorse Road to I-275, but you know some will take Haggerty.

"In 1999, I could hear them clearing the trees," she said, noting this was without proper permission, with the cutting done at night. Now, with the trees removed, she has to run a fan 24/7 to cover the noise. She said they hear noise from the Ashley Capital on the south side of Ecorse "all the time."

"I've been in front of you before," Farr said to the commission. "I've got my whole life in there -- 44 years I worked and sometimes two jobs."

Ralph Turner's son said his dad turned 80 this year and was 60 when Ashley moved into that area 20 years ago. He said the family didn't know he was going to be "surrounded by traffic."

After the public hearing, Patrick Sloan of McKenna planning consultants gave a report on the special land use portion of the project.

He said the roads are a regional and local issue around industrial land. He said you can't make them improve something apart from their site.

He said there is no proposed drive to Haggerty Road and Wayne County will "Haggerty Road is a death trap with all the cars and semis. They'll tell you if you let them do this, the trucks will go through Ecorse Road to I-275, but you know some will take Haggerty."

require a traffic impact study, "and it is something we would want to see." The project will add more trucks to Ecorse and I-275 interchange and possible Haggerty Road. He said the bay sites are facing north and south, not facing the residential area.

Treasurer Budd said Webb Engineering's report said a traffic impact study was done. An engineer from Webb said it was done in 2016. The county wanted something for Ashley South and while they were with the county, they told them what they wanted them to do, he said. Webb was hired by Ashley Capital.

"We have not seen their traffic study," Thompson said.

"No offers since 1999?" asked Commissioner Medina Atchinson.

"I don't know the date," Balow said. "We have purchased a few homes." He said he could suggest the company consider new offers.

"Can we add that as a condition of approval?" Commissioner Atchinson asked.

Ron Akers, director of planning and economic development, said the township couldn't legally require that, but it could make a suggestion.

"If we had those properties [along the eastern border of their project] we would have to start over on the site plan," Ballow said. "They are no value to us now."

Atchinson said they had "human value" and, "I still would like to see them considered."

"We did consider them," Balow said and Atchinson laughed. "More recently," she said.

"Does there have to be a change in the Master Plan?" Thompson asked and Sloan said it is already zoned Industrial.

Thompson asked if in that area is commercial and Akers said commercial can be developed under the ordinance in an Industrial zoning.

Farr said in the past the owner of Ashley Capital flew in to a meeting at the township. It was in winter and he wore sandals and shorts and was tanned to the hilt, Farr said. She said he laughed at their questions and left

Thompson said part of the approval of

special land use should be to have the traffic study and to ask Wayne County to come and talk to the township. Akers said he could ask the county to come. Sometimes they come and sometimes they don't.

Balow then walked up and placed a packet of papers on the commission table, noting, "Here's a copy of the traffic study."

Thompson said, "That's not going to cut it."

Commissioner Bryon Kelley make a motion to table the special land use request so this could be reviewed. Commission Vice Chairman Donald Boynton seconded the motion and the commission voted unanimously to table.

Then, the Ashley Capital site plan was discussed, with Balow pointing out that Sally Hodges of McKenna wanted the design of the building different than the South Ashley building, with bump outs and designs to keep it from being a flat-fronted building.

Akers pointed out the fire department is requiring two-way radio enhancements, as specified by the fire code.

Farr was concerned about the water in the project's retention pond. She did not want it flooding her yard, like it did when she claims they cut down 105 acres of trees in the middle of the night.

"I pumped for three months after they cut the trees," Farr said.

Thompson assured her the township does not let people drain their water onto someone else's property.

Engineer Dave Potter said he has requested a drainage breakup job and Farr may see him out with his boots on as he walks the site. They also will use aerial shots, he said.

Budd said, "I'm not ready to do anything on the preliminary site plan," and the commission voted to table it to coincide with the special land use request because answers are needed to several questions.

In other business at the Nov. 8 meeting, the commission:

- Approved the final site plan for the new Speedway station on two acres at the northeast corner of Belleville and Tyler roads, with the troublesome French drain at the sidewalk brought into the Speedway underground water retention system;
- Voted to recommend to the township board that it approve distribution of the Master Plan amendment and distribution of the proposed future land-use map, as part of the rezoning of the 75-acre Smith Farm in Denton village to light industrial use; and
- Approved the elevations presented by Gilbert Homes for eight new homes in Arlene Arbors. The homeowners association has provided a draft approval of the homes' designs. Each home will be 2,064 square feet in size.

Marijuana law still an unknown in Sumpter

On Monday, the Belleville City Council voted unanimously to opt out of the state's new Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act. No pot shops in Belleville.

Van Buren Township has indicated it will do the same shortly. Sumpter Township is an enigma.

Sumpter has announced meetings of a committee to look into the "facts" of MMFLA on the first Wednesday of every month, starting in November. It will meet again Dec. 6 and then again in January. Seems there is no hurry to decide.

Now we see Nelson Po has erected a sign on his Willis Road property where he said he plans to build four large marijuana growing facilities and a dispensary up by the roadway -- with a paved parking lot and landscaping. He said the site plan is being reviewed by the township planning consultant.

A circuit court judge had directed Sumpter Township to approve Po's growing operation in exchange for Po dropping his lawsuits against the township which are damaging its insurance coverage.

Are the committee meetings a charade? On Tuesday, township attorney Rob Young said that the committee will not make a recommendation to the board after all --only present "facts."

When the committee was formed it was stated that VBT had a committee that studied the MMFLA and made a recommendation to the planning commission. That's what Sumpter was planning to do until now. What's going on?

The candidates and their percentage of the votes are: Jesse Marcotte, 27.16%; Thomas Fielder, 23.48%; Jeff Vernon, 18.78%; Kelly Bates, 18.40%; and Gwen Hooks, 11.93%.

As you recall, incumbents Marcotte and Fielder were re-seated. The terms are four years. Pay is \$1,000 per year.

VBT Environmental Commission discusses changes at US Ecology

Two changes being sought from the Department of Environmental Quality by US Ecology were explained to the Van Buren Township Environmental Commission during its meeting on Oct. 18.

Two public notices on the requests were published in the Oct. 12 issue of the Independent concerning US Ecology.

Matthew Best, deputy director of VBT Planning and Economic Development, explained that one is a site-specific variance petition. They are cleaning up a site in Kalamazoo and the boots, gloves, bottles, tie-backs and some soils, not

heavy-duty contaminants, are involved. He said it was what workers had on when they cleaned the site and the soil over where they changed out of the gear.

Best said they are only allowed so much dioxin, period, and each dioxin has a waste code. US Ecology has a list of waste codes it can take, including PCP, dioxins, and purins. They want to use a treatment process with a waste code that is not currently in their permit.

He said what is being cleaned up is a former wood treatment solutions plant that operated in the early 1900s. The wood treating solutions got into the ground water and Strebor, current owner, got in trouble. They are cleaning it up and need places to

He said besides the other items, they will be bringing structural pieces of tile from the site. They want to truck it here instead of to Montana, Nevada, or Idaho, Best said.

The other request by US Ecology is an 'operating license major modification." Best said like the changes requested only for Strebor, they want to do it for the landfill. There are new processes created and they have to have them in their license. They want to add waste codes to

Best said there is a 2 p.m., Oct. 30 meeting at Wayne County Community College Western Campus if people don't want to send a letter and wish to comment on this request.

"No different material will be coming, but it will be from different sites," Best said, adding other than the codes, there are no other changes.

In other business at the one-hourand 21-minute meeting on Oct. 18, the commission:

- Unanimously reelected David Brownlee as commission chairman and Norm DeBuck as vice-chair for the next year;
- Heard Best report that more than 250 cars came to US Ecology for the recent household hazardous waste dropoff program at the landfill. He said there was some confusion because some people went to the main entrance instead of the east entrance because the facility failed to put up directional signs;
- · Discussed algae blooms on Belleville Lake on Oct. 1 and on Lake Erie, where about a third of Lake Erie was covered, as seen by satellite. Commissioner Jeff Jahr said he took a picture of the algae on Belleville Lake next to his home and it looked as green as the Chicago River on St. Patrick's Day. Chairman Brownlee said the group studying algae on Belleville Lake has finished its grant-funded work and he will see if he can get a report to share;
- · Discussed coal tar asphalt paving and enforcement of the township's anti-coaltar ordinance. Brownlee complained that the informational pamphlets have yet to be distributed to the township residents.

Best said there has been a disconnect with the Huron River Watershed Council where he was planning to get the pamphlets free. He said Grosse Ile took a copy of VBT's ordinance in order to base its new ordinance on it and then called back to ask about enforcement. Brownlee asked if the cable department couldn't put a program on concerning coal tar and Best said that department had been busy with doing a VBT advertisement, but might be able to

- · Heard a report from Best on a wellattended Septic System Maintenance Workshop at the township hall on Sept. 14 and the planting of 30 trees by the water tower in a workshop to show how to plant trees properly. He said in 10-12 years they will have a really nice tree line of London Plane, Tulip, and Ginkgo trees;
- Was informed that Town Place Suites by Marriott has pulled a demolition permit for the big red barn on Quirk Road that used to be a boot shop. "They are getting ready to go," Best said of construction on the new hotel at the corner of Quirk and the North I-94 Service Drive; and
- Heard Best say the American Center for Mobility, now under construction at Willow Run, is expected to be open for tests in December. Best said the automatic cars are great, but he is more intrigued with the individual transport robots. They are working on ways to have personal robots deliver goods and services by taking personal orders for purchases and then traveling down the sidewalks to a store and back. And then there are the "awesome drones," he said.



Hitchcock said all licenses have to be in Industrial zoned areas.

He said people are saying they will lose out if they don't opt in by Dec. 15 and that isn't true. But, if you wait two years, the communities could be saturated and it may be too late.

Hitchcock said according to 2016 figures there are 208,000 licensed care givers and patients in the state and 15,000 in Wayne County. He said there is a 3% tax that will be placed on gross sales of provisioning centers and of that 25% goes to the community hosting.

"I'm not sure how that's going to be calculated," Hitchcock said. "The state hasn't said."

He said nobody is questioning that small communities will not get rich on this.

Hitchcock said in Colorado it was estimated that each patient has \$347 to spend a year and that brought in \$700 million to the state.

"I worked it out and I never got any huge numbers for Belleville. Maybe you'd get \$20,000 per facility. It's speculative what each community will get," he said.

He said a community can charge fees, such as \$500 per facility for the aggravation of having it in town, plus an application fee up front to deal with site plans and other details. Then simple ordinances

could be passed on security, smell, hours of operation, and inspection by police department.

Then, he said, a community has to determine how to choose who gets licenses. Some do a Request for Proposals, use a first-come-first-served procedure, or put the applicants' names in a pot and draw five out, or however many facilities are approved for that area.

Councilman Tom Fielder said the city has had the zoning ordinance in place since about two years ago when someone wanted to put a dispensary in commercial zoning. The only place allowed is in Industrial zoning, across the railroad tracks, he said. At most there was one place available and those interested couldn't afford to go to that one place, he said.

Councilman Fielder said he estimates there are 50 to 100 people in Belleville with medical marijuana cards, which could bring in \$3,450 with a single provisioning center, or up to \$10,000 a year, if that.

"There will be a battle next year when it's on the ballot," he said, referring to recreational marijuana.

He said the Michigan State Police said there is enough marijuana grown in Michigan to allow each medical marijuana card holder to have 500 doses a day.

"We're talking about money we're going to make," Fielder said. "That shouldn't be the consideration... I'm in favor of opting out." Hitchcock said there could be policing issues.

Fielder said if the city doesn't have medical marijuana in its one-and-a-half square-mile area, people won't be deprived. They can go to nearby communities to get it.

Hitchcock said recreational marijuana will be on the ballot next year and people are getting in place to be ready because there is so much more money to make when it's recreational.

Hitchcock said, if the citizens approve recreational marijuana, it would be up to the legislature to decide if it needed additional rules and regulations. Most states adopt the maximum amount you can buy over a period of time.

The state could make Belleville go back to the drawing board, he said.

Mike Renaud said from the audience: "I strongly urge the council ... to bow out of this particular business... This is going to expand. We're a small town. Ypsilanti has it and Sumpter Township will probably be adopting it. This would just be one more shop we don't have in Belleville. It's a slippery slope coming down the pipe."

Fielder said the council will have to repeal the present zoning ordinance and vote to opt out.

He then made that motion, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Jack Loria, and the council unanimously passed the motion.

Hitchcock said if recreational marijuana is voted in, the legislature may say it's like any other business and it can locate wherever it wants to. Or, it could come up with some other rules.

"This is in place in Belleville until that happens," said Councilman Tom Smith of the opt-out decision.

In other business at the 30-minute meeting, the council:

• Approved the Jingle Bell 1K Run and 5K Run/Walk at 9:45 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 2, starting and ending at Horizon Park. This is sponsored by the Van Buren Public Schools Education Foundation; and

• Went into closed-door session with Hitchcock to consider a communication from him under attorney-client privilege.

records. The whole thing started in 1968 when the Sumpter School District split up. "Sumpter Township was correct," Kudlak

said. "They had the original documents.
"Our district just got a little bigger," he said, noting everything is being corrected.

He said neither district was fighting over students, but just wanted to find out what was right.

Kudlak said very few students are involved and the correction will be coordinated with Airport. First, the people who live there will all be contacted.

He said if students are presently attending Airport and belong in Van Buren, they could continue at Airport as Schools of Choice students. That's if they are happy at Airport, he added.

In other business at Monday's 42-minute meeting, the board:

- Heard Financial Director Shareen Barker tell of a problem playing itself out in the courts that may impact the Van Buren Schools 2017-18 budget. In 2010-12 school employees in the state were paying 3% more to the state than they should have been. Nobody in Wayne County was paying the FICA tax on that 3%. She said the employees will have to be paid back from the state and the district may have to pay its share of the FICA. They will have to locate all the employees affected. Supt. Kudlak said probably somebody will create guidelines on how to do this, "but we have to pay the taxes";
- Came back into open session, after a closed-door session at the end of the meeting, to reinstate a student for the 2017-18 school year. The student was expelled during the 2016-17 school year and came


