# Open house set Dec. 11 for proposed VBT data center

Post cards have been sent out to neighbors of a 280-acre tract in Van Buren Township inviting them to a community open house from 6 to 8 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 11, at the Van Buren Township Hall, 46425 Tyler

This public meeting is being held to discuss a proposed data center to be built on property bordered on the west by Haggerty Road, on the east by Hannan Road, on the south by the I-94 North Service Drive, and to the north by I-275.

Ron Akers, Van Buren Township municipal services director, said representatives from DTE also will be there, along with the developers. He said this is not planned for all 280 acres because there are wetlands on

The post cards said the developer Panattoni will be in attendance to present the potential project and answer questions people may have regarding development of the site.

According to its website, the Panattoni Development Company was founded in 1986 and now is one of the largest privately held, full-service real estate developers in the world. Its U.S. operations are headquartered in Irvine, CA.

Reportedly, Panattoni was one of the developers seeking to build the Stellantis warehouse complex, which went with another developer and is now under construction on Ecorse Road north of Willow Run Airport in Van Buren Township.

Data centers are bringing pushback from residents around the state and the proposed site in Saline Township is bringing demonstrations against it.

The Michigan Public Service Commission planned a public hearing for Wednesday, Dec. 10, over DTE's application for

approval of contracts for a massive AI data center in Saline Township.

It comes after DTE tried to fast-track the contracts and avoid public hearings. But this is just one example of the ongoing fight over data centers in Michigan.

There are 57 data centers in Michigan, including 27 in Detroit, five in Ann Arbor, and one in Monroe.

A family in Howell Township that had requested rezoning to put a AI data center on its property, on Sunday withdrew its request due to opposition. It was due to be discussed at last Monday's Howell Township Board of Trustees' meeting, but rezoning is off the table for now.

Breanne Green, with Stop the Data Centers Livingston County, a leader in the movement to prevent data centers from flourishing, said the withdrawal of the request was a tactical victory but was not a final decision.

"The community will continue to show up, and we expect the township to protect residents and uphold the master plan. We're not backing down," Green said in a statement. "Residents spoke up, that's what made a difference. But it's also clear the developer plans to return as soon as they believe they have influenced the process or changed the board's mind. This is far from over."

This week a proposed data center for a vacant parcel on Inkster Road in Southfield was announced.

According to a report from WKAR in Lansing, a data center is a facility that hosts powerful computers. Those servers process and store massive amounts of digital data. Every time someone sends an email, scrolls Facebook or streams Hulu, that information is processed and stored in a data center.

Organizations use data centers as a central

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

## Sumpter delays rezoning after lawyer notes Open Meetings Act violation

At the beginning of the Nov. 25 meeting of the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees, Jeffrey B. Schlussel, an attorney representing Carson-Fisher Group, asked the board members not to approve rezoning 90 acres, representing four of five parcels thought to be on the agenda before them.

He said he tried to find out exactly what the planning commission had recommended and asked for minutes of the Sept. 11 special meeting, but he said he was denied the minutes until after they were approved by the board. He said this is a sheer violation of the Open Meetings Act, along with other violations because minutes haven't been published in the required number of days on other meetings.

He said he checked the township "newspaper of record" and township minutes haven't been published there in a timely manner.

He said he sent a letter to the planning commission on Sept. 4 listing why it should not recommend rezoning of the property and he made sure the board members got a copy of that letter.

The minutes of the Sept. 11 meeting, now on the township website in draft form, states Schlussel spoke for the property owners, and said the 90 acres next to

location to build, run and deliver services as well as store and process the data.

The report said data centers are usually large, plain buildings that look like a normal warehouse on the outside. They can be loud – up to 96 decibels inside of buildings, which is louder than a lawnmower. People have reported hearing data centers from the outside, which sounds like a low buzz, and can be heard miles away in some cases.

These facilities can be traced back to the 1940s when early computing systems needed a lot of space. In the 1990s, microcomputers – like a desktop computer – were introduced and began filling the old computing system rooms. Those were called servers, and the rooms were called data centers.

The introduction of cloud computing in the early 2000s allowed organizations to access resources remotely, through the internet. The demand for data centers boomed, leading to the first hyperscale data center in 2006 – like the one proposed in Saline Township.

Today's surge in demand for data centers is fueled by emerging technologies like artificial intelligence, 5G, and edge technologies, WKAR explained.

Rawsonville Woods was always intended to be used as a unified residential area.

The township's planning consultant Joe Pezzotti submitted his rezoning analysis at that meeting and stated that there are currently 535 manufactured housing sites in Rawsonville Woods. The Master Plan Future Land Use map identifies the parcels in question as designated for future Rural Residential zoning, which would bring a low-density development as in one dwelling unit per acre.

At the Sept. 11 meeting, the commissioners approved recommending to the township board the rezoning of the MHP (Mobile Home Park) designation to RF (Rural Farm) for the following parcels:

- 81-071-99-0004-000
- 81-071-99-0007-000
- 81-071-99-0003-000
- 81-071-99-0006-000
- 81-071-99-0001-705

The ones attorney Schlussel objected to rezoning were the final four on the list.

After much discussion at the Nov. 25 meeting, the board voted unanimously to table the minutes of the Sept. 11 special meeting of the planning commission. The Sept. 11 minutes were put on the unfinished business part of the agenda of the Dec. 9 meeting.

(All the videos of regular board meetings were removed without notice from the township website as far as last April. Video

of the Sept. 11 planning meeting is on the website.)

In other business at the Nov. 25 meeting, the board:

- Approved the meeting dates for 2026 for both the township board and the planning commission;
- Voted 6-1 against closing the township hall offices during the holiday season with employees using four benefit bank days for Dec. 26, Dec. 29, Dec. 30, and Jan 2. Treasurer Patterson cast the only yes vote;
- Approved a new construction checklist as submitted by Carlisle Wortman Associates:
- Approved purchasing eight vehicles for \$96,120 to be included in the 2026-27 budget, per the agreement with Enterprise Fleet Management as approved by the board of trustees;
- Heard resident Kay Harris say the board is changing the emblem of the township. Its current emblem says Sumpter is "country living at its finest," but there are already three to four junkyards in the township in residential areas. She said this is not "country living at its finest." She said people don't want to raise their kids in a junkyard. She said the township approves used-car sales, but the cars in these lots have no doors and the front ends are smashed in. She recalled someone coming to build a market in Sumpter and the township got a gas station;
- Heard Arcell Harris say that the property next to them at 25891 Sumpter Rd. no longer is Sammy's Auto (run by Hassan Nassar). Arcell said Nassar was given the exception because it was Sammy's Auto. The cars are still there and now it is under the name of Sumpter Property LLC. He said 100 cars are in the grass next to his home. He asked the board not to give final approval to the business next to his home until all the unoperational vehicles are removed. People aren't following the rules, he said. Sammy's cars are still there, he said. He showed the board pictures of all the unoperational cars in that lot;
- Hassan Nassar said the Savage Road location for his new business was his dream. He said the people going to the bakery drive on his property. He said an ordinance officer told him he cannot open there now because he has no license from the state. He said they now talk about asphalt behind his fence and to put the cars back there every night after he closes at 5 o'clock. He complained the bake shop sign is in the road right of way and blocks the sight; and
- Heard township manager Ken Marten say a new township website will go in place after the first of the year, he is looking forward to an urgent care in the downtown area, and he'd like them to schedule a workshop on the budget, possibly before the next meeting.

### VBT board votes to abandon part of drain that doesn't exist

At its Dec. 2 regular meeting, the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees voted to authorize a petition to abandon a portion of the Wallace Drain behind Costco that doesn't exist.

Municipal services director Ron Akers said the former county drain on Costco property no longer physically exists. The board is asked to clean up the records by abandoning that part of the drain.

Supervisor Kevin McNamara said this is an example of bureaucracy at work.

"We have to abandon a drain that doesn't exist," he said.

In a written memo, director Akers explained that Costco is in the plan review process at Wayne County for the western expansion of their warehouse building on Belleville Road. The county requires that Costco obtain a Drain Abandonment Resolution from the township in order to abandon a portion of the Wallace Drain which is on the property on which they are expanding. According to the county, there is a portion of the county drain on the property that no longer physically

exists and is not serving the public utility function.

In other business at the 10-minute meeting, the board:

- Unanimously approved a METRO Act Telecommunications Permit for Ezee Fiber Texas, LLC to use the Wayne County roads public right of way to install around 577,000 feet of underground and aerial fiber optic cable in all the residential and business parts of the township. The township should see an increase in annual payment made by the state to the township for telecommunication fees, Akers said;
- Unanimously approved the execution of Wayne County annual permits to allow work along county roadways, including sanitary sewer and water main inspection and maintenance; dust pallative, calcium and salt applications; sidewalk repair and replacement; and street sweeping;
- Unanimously approved the 2026 township holiday schedule (13 holidays) and the 2026 meetings of the township board. The regular meetings of Tuesday, Aug. 4, and Tuesday, Nov. 3, 2026, are canceled due to elections;
  - Unanimously approved the second

reading and adoption of the Third Amendment to the Development and Tax Increment Finance Plan for the township Downtown Development Authority. The DDA was started in 1990 and will run to 2038. It was last amended in 2009; and

• Unanimously approved a resolution to opt out for 2026 of the state required 80/20 employee health care provision of 80% paid by the township and 20% by the employee, in order to keep going with the township's current program. Supervisor McNamara said the township is doing better for its employees. He said this annual opt-out requirement started 20 years ago. He said they have to have 90% of the board approve the opt-out to do more for the employees than the required 80/20. The township is using the EHIM model based on employee usage.

Clerk Leon Wright was absent and excused from the meeting.

Developers quite often meet with the neighbors in a public meeting to explain what they want to do and get input from the residents. In other instances where this has happened with developers, the public later was told this meeting was between the developers and the neighbors to get the information out and make friends with the neighbors.

But, this postcard said the meeting is being held by the township, so you would have thought the officials would have mentioned it at the last meeting that was being cablecast and put on YouTube.

We can all understand that this is not going to be welcomed with open arms because of what's going on around the state with data center proposals. We got a phone call from an upset resident of Haggerty Sub. before the postcards even went out. Other calls are coming in.

We'll all want to know the details, so it's good to know about this public meeting. See you there.

Since then, I'd catch what I could when the judges stream on YouTube and I always check the daily dockets to see what cases are being handled. Judge Oakley is the only one streaming these days, but it's possible to zoom into the other courtrooms as well.

Tuesdays are my deadline days and court will have to take care of felonies without me until after the paper is put to bed and is off to the presses in Davisburg.

Our weekly papers are delivered to our back door just before noon on Wednesdays and then the deliveries throughout the community begin on that day and conclude on the next.

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

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
