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Belleville City Council discusses pros, cons of Strawberry Festival

An hour-long discussion on the Belleville National Strawberry Festival took place at the Belleville City Council's Feb. 18 meeting and at the end the future of the festival was in doubt.

On the agenda was the annual approval for Strawberry Festival policies and that's what set off the discussion.

The festival's executive director Joan Bodnar and its vendor coordinator Sharon Pokerwinski were in the front row of the audience, present to answer any questions.

Bodnar said the Belleville Area Chamber of Commerce will come to the council separately to present a request for the carnival. She said there were no changes to the policy from last year.

Councilman Tom Fielder, who also is president of the festival, said the usual procedure is to refer the policy to the city manager for a recommendation.

Fire Chief Brian Loranger said, "The dogs annoy the crap out of me, and the skateboards." He asked if just the police department handled enforcement of the no dogs, no skateboards rules.

Bodnar said when she sees people with dogs, she goes out and tells them to leave. She said she also asks the police for help and they are very helpful.

Although signs tell of the no-dogs, no-skateboard rules for the festival, the signs are posted at each end of Main Street. Chief Loranger asked if the signs can be put at each intersection, at each side street.

Mike Kole of the chamber of commerce said the chamber wants to negotiate with the city manager because it has been unfairly charged for numerous things.

Mayor Kerreen Conley said with the newly hired interim city manager Tracey Schultz Kobylarz, she will take a new look at it with a fresh set of eyes.

Sumpter Twp. planners postpone decision on paintball field on Judd

After an-hour-and-a-half public hearing before a packed, noisy meeting room on Feb. 13, the Sumpter Township Planning Commission decided to postpone any action for two months on a request for special land use exception for an outdoor recreation area on Judd Road.

Earle Mott and his son Alex of Farmington would like to buy the vacant

58 acres available on the north side of Judd, between Sumpter and Martinsville, to be used for a low-impact, pneumatic paintball field, with possible future use for laser tag and a private soccer practice field.

Alex said they've had a paintball store in Livonia for five years and they would like to have an area for their customers and others to enjoy.

Sumpter's planning consultant Chris Atkin said they did not expect all this opposition and a big crowd. He said there is no rezoning planned from the RF zoning and the use proposed is very low impact. It will not operate after dark.

He said a stream cuts through the property and nothing is planned beyond the stream

which is wetlands. Existing tree lines will stay in place as 100-foot buffers, with a 250-foot buffer to the southeast. More trees will be added at the east property line that is next to a vacant parcel, that may not be vacant in the future.

Parking will be in front and the existing approach will be used to provide two-way traffic.

He said four shipping containers will be stacked to provide a temporary office with a walk-up window for registration and a storage area. Gravel will be added for the drive and parking, or other improved surface, he said. Additional barrier-free parking will be added and they are talking

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

VBT residents ask board to stop all development until water issue solved

Rick Williams and Bob Manier of the 44000 block of Tyler Road, just east of Meijer, asked the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees to stop all development until the water issue is worked out in the township.

This was at the Feb. 4 meeting.

Williams of 44521 and 44429 Tyler Rd. said over the last 22 years the ground around his houses has been getting wetter and wetter.

“My house has a pond next to it after a rain,” he said.

He said he contacted the township and Director of Public Service Matthew Best said the problem is with the drain and is partially Williams’ fault.

“I can’t rent my other house and water is seven feet from my house,” Williams said.

Manier of 44401 Tyler Rd. said he has a water problem, too, and all he gets is the runaround from the road commission and drain commission.

He said there are 24 inches of water right next to his house and his crawl space is at ground level. Many pieces of equipment in

his out building have been destroyed. He put in \$3,000 worth of work last year.

“I can’t sell my house,” he said, referring to plans to move to Florida to be near his grandchildren.

He said the drain line needs to be reestablished.

Manier said the township came in its blue truck and sucked up the water and then the truck got stuck. After they got unstuck, he said they told him they’d be back, but they never came back.

He said the Meijer drainage pond is 938 yards from the county drain and it needs to empty there instead of on the surface.

He said he has five acres of land in back and he can’t go there because of the water.

“I’m the last one at the end of that drain,” he said.

Manier said he tried to backfill his land and after he dumped soil in back, the township said to stop or he’d be fined. He said they wouldn’t let him move the dirt and he had to level it where it was, which made conditions worse.

He said the one to blame for all of this is the VBT engineer who approved that drainage pond. Manier said they try to say

it’s his fault.

Manier said the Speedway parking lot on the corner of Tyler and Belleville roads drains across Tyler Road and comes down the road to his property.

“It’s disgusting,” he said.

“We are concerned,” said VBT Treasurer Sharry Budd who was chairing the meeting in the absence of ailing Supervisor Kevin McNamara.

Treasurer Budd said she is asking Director Best to give a report to the board and, “We’ll see what we can do to help. We will try to help to figure it out.”

“Who is responsible?” asked Trustee Sherry Frazier.

Manier said the drainage pond is 938 yards away from the county drain and the pond should be draining into the drain to take the water away.

“That’s ridiculous,” said Trustee Frazier, adding she’s sure Director Best will be able to help.

“Just dig the trench all the way to the Cleary Drain,” Manier said, adding they would have to make sure the drain was cleared so the water could flow. He said there are trees in the drain now.

“We will get back to you,” Budd said.

In other business at the one-hour-and-ten-minute meeting on Feb. 4, the board:

- Approved on a roll-call vote the second (final) reading of the rezoning of a small strip at 8001 Haggerty Rd. from C-1 General Business to M-1 Light Industrial to make the whole acreage the same zoning. The township had asked for the rezoning;

- Approved purchase of a 2020 Ford F-350 for the Fire Department from Atchinson Ford for \$47,736.60 to pull the now heavier dive team trailer and serve as an off-road brush fire truck. The current F-350 did not have the power to pull the heavier trailer. That truck will be kept in use for field fires and other uses;

- Approved the maintenance agreement with US Signal which outlines its responsibility to maintain the sanitary connect to the township’s sanitary manhole at 9275 Haggerty Rd. The original plan for the sanitary connect was not possible because of huge boulders, utilities, and fiber optics found in the pathway;

- Approved the supervisor’s appointment of Penny Young as an alternate to the Board

Sumpter Twp. fires Independent as newspaper of record

After more than 13 years of being newspaper of record for Sumpter Township, on Tuesday the board voted unanimously without comment to engage *The Eagle* of Associated Newspapers as the new newspaper of record, effective immediately. This doesn't mean the *Independent* would stop covering Sumpter Township news, but only that any legal notices would be in *The Eagle*.

When a member of the audience asked where they could get *The Eagle*, Sharon Pokerwinski said it would be delivered anywhere "Rosemary delivered her garbage paper." She said if anyone needed a paper, they should call her and she would deliver it to them.

A year ago, Pokerwinski brought *The Eagle* owner to a Sumpter meeting to try to get the township to change newspaper of record designation, but she failed. This year she succeeded.

Pokerwinski came to the *Independent* office last year, pointed her finger at the editor and vowed to put the *Independent* out of business because she didn't like what was printed.

At Sumpter's meeting Tuesday, editor Rosemary Otzman thanked the board for allowing the *Independent* to serve it as newspaper of record for 13 years. This was followed by applause from some in the audience. You can look for your Sumpter legals in *The Eagle* and your Sumpter news in the *Independent*.

I didn't mean to eavesdrop on her call, but she was speaking very loudly. It is interesting to hear what people say about the stories we write.

There was no way I could go to Manistee to attend Judge Parrott's bond hearing on Tuesday morning, so I was delighted when Bob Mytych handed me his cell phone where the hearing was being televised live by WXYZ. I got to attend the hearing, after all.

Should we have a Strawberry Festival?

To the editor:
 As the Chamber of Commerce, we represent the will of the business community in the Van Buren, Belleville, and Sumpter area. With nearly 200 members and growing, it is our responsibility to provide services, features, and advocacy on their behalf. Since the reorganization of the chamber in September 2019, we have collected extensive opinions, data, and suggestions from the members on how to move forward.

In the *Belleville Independent* editorial, it states that the Chamber "ran a small poll and found 70% of the Chamber members wouldn't come to the festival. Most closed their doors for the weekend."

We would like to add some context to this quote.

The board has collected extensive data from the members and the community since September last year. The data is very clear, that the Strawberry Festival is the least important of all the priorities for the Chamber. There has been member-only, as well as community surveys that show the Strawberry Festival clearly ranks on the bottom of every list. In the most recent informal poll, 100% of the comments regarding the festival would be perceived as negative, and 70% of both members and community polled, planned on not attending this year. Although the surveys and questions have all been informal, the board feels that they have enough data to make firm decisions.

Long Overdue Discussion

The conversation that took place at the City Council meeting was long overdue. Councilman Voigt clearly asked multiple times what the benefit to the community is for having the festival. The committee representing the festival could not answer this question. The data that your chamber has collected, the absence of the original founding member of the festival, St. Anthony's, and the lack of benefit to the nonprofit groups in the area, is the answer to that question. The festival can boast attendance, but not benefits as originally dictated in their incorporation in 1986.

During the monthly Chamber of Commerce Board meeting, there was a report from the Strawberry Committee representative, regarding this City Council meeting discussion. Deliberations and suggestions for how to move forward were discussed and the board *unanimously* voted the following:

"Should the City Council approve the permit for the Strawberry Festival for 2020, the Belleville Area Chamber of Commerce will share a minimum of 50% of the net proceeds to participating and volunteering member non-profit groups of the Chamber." The non-profits choosing to volunteer at the carnival, and other areas that the Chamber is responsible for, will

share in these funds proportionately.

A second motion was unanimously supported that stated:

"The Chamber of Commerce Building will provide its entire space, free of charge, to any non-profit member group that wants to set up a table inside the Chamber offices." The basic requirements are that the participants be members of the chamber, and that they display, give away, or promote something regarding strawberries. The tables can be used to inform, recruit, or raise funds for the participants.

The intent of both of these motions, was to bring back the *main purpose of the Strawberry Festival*. As noted in the original Articles of Incorporation:

"The purpose is to perpetuate a continual community project with a theme of strawberries grown in the area to provide supplemental fund raising for all participating civic, church, and non-profit organizations in the Belleville area, strengthen community spirit and pride and give the Belleville area national identity."

Clarifying Quote

The Chamber has been quoted as stating that "we don't need the \$12,000." That may seem a bit arrogant to some. However, our Board believes that integrity is key to its future. Putting massive effort into an event our membership is clearly against, would mean that the money is more important than their requirements. This is an "ends justifies the means" argument, and not one that we feel should be perpetuated. This is what resulted in our motions above. Should we be able to continue with the support of those non-profits, we feel then that the ends will be justified.

In closing, the Chamber is not against City festivals. That would be hypocritical considering our own WinterFest that was attended by *thousands of residents* just a few months ago. The Chamber did this with the full support of its *local members* who sponsored 100% of the activities. We also went into the planning of the event with the residents, community, and local businesses as our first priority. We developed a well-executed, four-day event, limiting the disruptions of life and business to only three hours during the parade timing itself. The board considers this event to be the *Premier Event* in the Belleville community, and our members agree.

Should the Strawberry Festival continue? This is the same question the Chamber asked itself a little less than a year ago. A new board, new leadership, clear focus, and winning attitude came from that self-assessment.

What will come from the *Independent* and Councilman Voigt's question?

Charge from Sumpter is politically motivated

Please view 34th District Court Romulus, MI recently arrested Judge David M. Parrott for Domestic Violence/Drugs/Alcohol according to published reports. This judge presided in my case. Please view Judge David M. Parrott charges see the Detroit News/Free Press, the Belleville Independent newspaper, The Eagle newspaper and Associates.

The crimes/charges were carried on local channels 2, 4, 7, 20. See further information on the internet. My case is on appeal in Circuit Court in Detroit, MI and I shall go to the Michigan Court of Appeals to seek justice, if necessary. This is my case #18-0897 Ronald Barrington Robinson vs Sumpter Township, MI, a minor ordinance violation?

It all stems from my politics and activist roles in Sumpter Township. I'm an elected precinct delegate. I've spoken to hundreds encouraging them if they want change, to Vote. I have had a new travel trailer on almost four acres of vacant property I own in Sumpter Township, MI for 16 years without any issues or violations and was told to move it. There have been three ordinance officers within that period of time and no violations were ever issued. We do not live on this trailer. We have a three-bedroom home several miles away. We enjoy the country atmosphere, watching the wildlife that abounds in this country setting such as wild turkeys, ducks, deer. Our property is well-kept. We have three small sheds for lawn mowers, lawn furniture, and several fruit trees. The fruits are harvested and given to food shelters.

I own two horses, both poisoned during the 2016 primary race. One died. Built four flower gardens and there are hundreds of trees that provide fresh air to the environment. I refused to move my trailer on Property Rights and Constitutional grounds. In my case before Judge Parrott I was not allowed to have any witnesses nor was I able to show photos of 15 other trailers on private property "of which are still on vacant land with no houses". Sumpter Township attorney Rob Young was the prosecutor. The judge stated in court he was not going to have a circus in his court room. Judge Parrott assessed me \$2,345 in fines, a \$5,000 bond, two years of probation, with 48 hours community service. All this for a simple misdemeanor?

Justice was clearly absent 100%. The judge and Sumpter Township prosecutor are friends they work in the same 34th

District courthouse in Romulus, MI. I was denied a Constitutionally fair trial. IT'S ALL POLITICALLY MOTIVATED BY OFFICIALS Past and Present in Sumpter Township, MI. We have identified over 15 other travel trailers on vacant property, but no violations were ever issued to them or were they prosecuted. Why?

This whole situation was a SHAM by Sumpter Township officials, the prosecutor, and the judge. My case has also been referred to the Michigan Attorney

General's office, the Inspector General, for investigation and the Michigan Court of Appeals to seek justice in Sumpter Township, MI. If you see wrong say something. Don't let perpetrators get away with intimidation, bullying, harassment and scare tactics because those are the tools they use to deny your rights. 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

to the fire department about safety.

Alex said his father, sitting in the back row wearing a brace, has a back injury from an accident and he was there to answer any questions and dispel any rumors that have been going around.

A man called out that the site is across the road from the cell tower exit.

The commission provided no maps and did not use the large screen on the wall to project the location of the site. Alex got a paper map from Trustee Matt Oddy and Alex went around the room showing the map to small groups in the crowd.

Alex said neighbors wouldn't be able to see or hear anything. He said later he wished the members of the community would look at this as an asset.

After more than 20 people spoke mostly against the project that they feared would put an end to their rural lifestyle, the owners of the property spoke.

Mary Ellen Rounsifer of Ypsilanti explained that the 58 acres was left to her and her sister when her father, Ron Rounsifer, passed last year. She said the land has been in the family for 100 years and taxes have been paid on it over many years.

After her father passed, they put the property on the market because they had no interest in farming. She said if this project doesn't go through, that property will go back on the market and the final use could be more intrusive than the present plans.

"I like keeping it natural," Mary Ellen said. "I have a lot of good memories there when I was a girl." She said her first home was at 44500 Judd Rd.

Mary Ellen said there are not a lot of activities for people in Sumpter Township. She said when the present roller rink was a bowling alley, her dad was a pin-setter.

Rene Rounsifer of Ann Arbor said the 58 acres is the land her father loved. "I think it would upset him that this is upsetting to the neighbors." She said it would stay as a natural setting.

Rene remembers teaching at Elwell Elementary School and the kids in the

neighborhood across the street in the mobile home park would use the school playground. All that is gone now.

Oddy made a motion, seconded by Virginia Belinski, to postpone the rest of the public hearing until the April 9 commission meeting to give the developers time to answer the questions about what tax impact there will be, whether it is wetlands, requirements for the temporary building, a grade review for the parking area, and whether there is a utility easement along the edge that would interfere with the project.

The motion passed unanimously.

Alex said the scheduled closing date on the property is March 4 or 5. He said they have been talking with the township about their plans since October.

Towing business

Planner Atkin told the commission a property owner would like to do a towing and impound business on a general industrial property between the tracks and Rawsonville on Bemis. He said this use is not permitted in general industrial zoning now and the zoning would have to be changed to make this possible.

Commissioner Jim Clark said it would end up being an eyesore and Oddy said that would be the place to put it, right next to 4,000 cars at the Auto Auction and more than 2,000 at Fox.

Atkin said he would look into it and bring samples of zonings from other townships to the next meeting.

Commission members present at the meeting were chairwoman Jane Stallmack and Virginia Belinski, Jim Clark, Mary Sherwood, and Trustee Matt Oddy. Absent were Tyrone Borden and Richard Pokerwinski.

Mayor Pro Tem Jesse Marcotte said he is also interested in resetting the city's fee schedule.

That's when Councilman Ken Voigt began a lengthy statement questioning the worth of the festival, which started in 1976.

He said it is the 44th year of the festival and in the beginning there were three churches, strawberry growers, and all the service clubs in town, with a strict no-commercial policy. He said there was a very nice juried craft area in the bank parking lot.

He said the three churches made quite a bit of money for good works and St. Anthony Catholic Church cleared \$100,000 to use for school expenses.

Councilman Voigt said when they let in food vendors, they put the service club food booths out of business because they couldn't compete. And, two of the three churches no longer are involved and there no longer is entertainment downtown.

"The best parts no longer exist," Voigt said.

He said the chamber would make \$40,000 to \$50,000 from the carnival rides and that would fund the chamber activities.

Kole said \$12,000 was cleared by the chamber last year.

The Central Business Community made \$3,500 off the crafters, Voigt said.

Festival treasurer Janet Millard is craft coordinator and gets 20% of the crafter fees.

"Six figures down to this," he said.

"Why are we doing this?" he asked. "Disrupting our town for four days – and no strawberries. Why are we doing this event? Just because we've always done it is no excuse."

He said last year the festival took in \$80,000 and they had to pay Bodnar and Pokerwinski. There was \$800 left.

He said the festival used to give money to the school and it built the stage in Van Buren Park.

"I don't see the benefit of the festival," Voigt said. "And the reason can't be just because we've done it for 44 years."

"Four of us sat on this board for 20 years," said Councilman Fielder. He said they have been trying to reinvent this wheel and haven't come up with anything new.

Councilwoman Kelly Bates suggested they go to other communities and ask them for ideas. When they replied they have gone to other festivals to see what they had, Councilwoman Bates said they should talk directly to their organizers.

Pokerwinski said the other festivals are "different than ours." She said the commercial vendors were in place before she came along.

"I worked with Plymouth for years," Bates said. "It is crafts, not commercial. You want to support small crafters. Get away from the carnival to a street fair."

"We're looking for entertainment under the tent at the Fourth Street Square," Pokerwinski said, adding that takes money and they are looking for sponsors.

"We need to reconceptualize the whole festival," said Barbara Miller.

She suggested a Dragon Boat Festival which would bring people from all over.

"Those are pretty cool," Voigt said.

Miller said it would take several years to get it started and they would need to get a Dragon Boat team.

"Strawberry Festival was great in its time," Miller said. "Last year was a disappointment. It was awful. No entertainment. No buskers."

Voigt said he read the 1986 articles of incorporation of the Strawberry Festival (with his mother-in-law as one of the signers) and the purpose stated was "to perpetuate a continual community project with a theme of strawberries grown in the area to provide supplemental fund raising for all participating civic, church and non-profit organizations in the Belleville area, strengthen community spirit and pride and give the Belleville area national identity."

"Now it's only benefitting the community to the tune of \$15,000. Am I wrong?" Voigt asked.

Bodnar said she's been contacted by 15 tours interested in coming. She said the festival attracts people to town.

"All they see is junk on Main Street and a carnival," Voigt said. "Now I see it as a net negative to the community ... carney rides and elephant ears."

He said if you bring the people to town, all they see is Main Street and it's not doing the city any good economically.

"It's not worth \$15,000 to shut the city down for four days and tax our public

safety," he said. "The decisions made before you [the present festival organizers] allowing commercial vendors in was a big mistake." He said in the late 1980s or early 1990s they started allowing commercial vendors.

Chief Loranger said he doesn't live in the city but he's had his chiropractic office here for 34 years. He said in the early days the Kiwanis sold bratwurst at the festival and made a lot of money.

"We got shoved out," he said. "Nobody got paid. It was a volunteer thing. Service clubs made money. I take part in Dexter Days where they have Lions, Kiwanis, and other local vendors."

Kole said the chamber ran a poll and 70% said they wouldn't come to the festival. He said 40% of the money goes to two people.

"We don't need that \$12,000," he said, noting the people on Main Street – chamber members – don't want it.

He said the festival brings in people from the outside and chamber members have to close their businesses that weekend.

Marcotte said the city has so many different activities that bring people to town, including all the CBC events, the car show, Music Lakeside, Winter Fest, and Booville.

He said the strawberry farms have gone away, but the lake hasn't dried up. There is a sense of community.

"The ones who pay the taxes are leaving that week end," Kole said.

"We have the Lions Club coming and free dental," Pokerwinski said. "And, this year we're bringing in entertainment, trying to get sponsors. Vendors were in place when we got here."

"I'm not blaming you guys," Voigt said. "I don't want to see it go away. But, how does it benefit the community?"

Bodnar said she has commercials starting the week before the festival and Belleville will be the City of the Week. She said Meijer has pulled out of other festivals, but it's coming back to Belleville.

"But, how does that help the community?" Voigt persisted.

Bodnar said the festival gives free booths to store owners in front of their stores, but some don't want them.

Therese Antoinelli of Moving the Mitten said to Pokerwinski that she's never seen her and Pokerwinski said she left information with her employees.

Kole said a person had to staff the booth all weekend or he was charged.

Bates suggested they have a meeting with the people on Main Street to see what they think.

"Do you post when you meet?" Miller asked and Pokerwinski said it is the second Tuesday of the month at 6 p.m.

Later it was pointed out by Antoinelli that the next meeting actually is Thursday, March 26, at 6 p.m. at Victory Station.

"It's still not benefitting the community," Voigt said. "How can we make it a vital event again?"

Miller said she and others do enjoy the parade and the car show.

Voigt recalled the good times at the festival with a chicken dinner and gambling at St. Anthony, and how shocked he was to see nuns gambling.

"I even liked the beer tent," he said. "It

was a giant class reunion. Now, I don't see the benefit."

"We didn't know St. Anthony was pulling out," Pokerwinski said. "Father John did it himself. I went and talked with him. He's not interested in anything going on in town."

Becky Hasen said, "I think Strawberry Festival needs to go away. I went to the meetings and they say they don't hear anything negative about the festival."

"The president of Strawberry Festival is the representative from the city on the festival committee," she said.

Councilman Fielder, president of the festival, said Kim Tindall was the city representative and she left. Since then he has been the only person there from the city so he brings back the information.

"Outside people are using our community for four days," Kole said.

Voigt said when he was running for council last fall he talked to 100 people in town and they had lots to say about the festival.

"I know, I can leave town or sit on my porch with a shotgun," Voigt said. "How does this help the community?"

"I try to promote Belleville in the radio stations," Bodnar said. "Meijer is still willing to support the Strawberry Festival and you can't force businesses to have a booth."

"Window salesmen? All this junk. It's actually working against it," Voigt said of promoting the city.

Bodnar said she lives in Allen Park and she brings in a lot of people to Belleville from Rochester and Sterling Heights.

Bill Wolters, president of the CBC, said the chamber used funds from past festivals to buy an empty building and turn it into offices. And, the chamber gave \$10,000 and then \$5,000 to the Educational Foundation.

"You throw a huge festival ... and at the end of the day it has become the carnival," Antoinelli said. "Our town is not reaping any of those benefits."

Mayor Conley said this has been talked about before.

"This wasn't an attack on you personally," she said to Bodnar and Pokerwinski.

She said the city wants an event that brings people "because we're different, because we're special and they will want to come back."

Mayor Conley said the festival had something unique in the past and now there is nothing. She said Belleville competes against Liberty Fest in Canton on Father's Day week end.

"I will go to Plymouth, to the Ann Arbor Art Fair," she said, noting people travel to see the unique items. "We're hearing from business owners who don't like it. Either we should not have it or have something interesting and unique."

"Should be stop accepting money?" Bodnar asked.

Pokerwinski said they could rename it and bring in something else.

"I'm not saying we should cancel it this year," Voigt said. "Strawberry Festival has done a lot for this community and at the

present it's not doing anything. It's cheaper to write a check to the CBC for \$3,500. The chamber doesn't care if it gets the money from the festival."

The council voted unanimously to refer the festival policy to interim city manager Tracey Schultz Kobylarz for a recommendation.

"It's late in the game this year," said Fielder.

City Manager Kobylarz said it is a good idea for her to sit down with the Strawberry Festival organization and she already had planned to attend the chamber event the next day.

"Maybe I'll bring back a revised policy, but it has to happen quickly," she said.

Belleville City Council pays Kollmeyer \$14,735 as final payout

The Belleville City Council approved payment of \$14,735 in final payment to City Manager Diana Kollmeyer after her retirement on Feb. 3.

At its regular meeting on Feb. 18, the council approved \$6,235.94 in vacation pay, \$392.28 in personal time, \$7,845.60 in sick time, and \$261 in pay for the one day she worked after retirement.

The payout was to be made on Feb. 20. Changes could not be made to that payroll after 2 p.m. Feb. 18, so the payout was on its way before the council approved it at its 7:30 p.m. meeting on Feb. 18.

Kollmeyer worked for the city from June 1, 1998 until Feb. 3, 2020.

When a member of the audience asked if that wasn't an excessive payout, Mayor Kerreen Conley said the next city manager contract will have caps.

The new interim city manager is Tracey Schultz Kobylarz, who has agreed to serve for six months.

In other business at the one-hour-and-33-minute Feb. 18 meeting, the council:

- Voted unanimously to approve David Robinson as the new, part-time police chief, subject to a level 4 background check through Fifer, a transcript of his educational degrees, and signing of the contract. It was not known how soon he could be on the job. The former police chief, Hal Berriman, retired Jan. 31. Twelve finalists for the position were interviewed by a committee of law enforcement officials and three certified by the Civil Service Commission.

On Feb. 17 the city council interviewed the three selected;

- Approved in one motion all the activities requested on city property by the Central Business Community: Flop E. Bunny on April 11 at Victory Park, Farmer's Market on Mondays in June through September, Taste of Belleville on Aug. 20 on High Street after the Bridge Walk, Harvest Fest Market on Oct. 10 on the Fourth Street Square, Monster Mutt Walk on Oct. 17 on the Fourth Street Square and Halloween on Oct. 30 on the Fourth Street Square; and

- Heard Councilman Tom Fielder express frustration over signing checks to repair city hall. City Hall has been on the Council Follow-Up List since Dec. 15, 2014, and an evaluation and appraisal completed. Then nothing. He said he would like the council to look into selling the property the city has at Five Points to a commercial venture and have the city offices go elsewhere. City Manager Kobylarz said she can very easily find out how much city hall is costing. Councilman Ken Voigt said the police chief's office is falling in and the squad room upstairs is in shockingly bad shape. Fire Chief Brian Loranger said since there is no mortgage on the property, they should use the equity in it to fix it or they can sell it. Kobylarz said any time the council talks about buying or selling real estate they should do it in closed session with an attorney. "Let me reach out to legal counsel first," Kobylarz said, adding they could have a town hall meeting to find out what people think about it.

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

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
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

School Board hears report on Chromebook use at BHS, McBride

On Monday, the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education listened to an hour-long report on the ways its Digital Leader Corps is experimenting with teaching lessons using Chromebooks at Belleville High School and McBride Middle School.

Curriculum Director Jeff Moore said when it was official that each student would get a Chromebook at BHS and McBride, it was determined that the teachers have to know how to use them.

"If teachers get computers for classrooms and don't know how to use them, they gather dust," Director Moore said.

He said a year and a half ago they put together 18 teachers – 10 at BHS and eight at McBride – to develop strong, structural practices.

"We're in year two of our journey," he said of the three-year project.

Susan Duda Osborne, a BHS teacher and member of the Digital Leader Corps, gave a report of her work at the high school and how enthusiastic the students are when using their Chromebooks for interesting projects.

She said they are inviting new members for the DLC and there will be professional development for them in March, April, and May.

Andrew Mills, teacher at McBride, gave a report on work at his school. He said when a project is especially successful, it spreads like wildfire through the staff and students.

Board President Amy Pearce said some staff members are reluctant to use all the capabilities available, noting her student has a teacher that sends everything home on paper.

Mills said the DLC is working on this.

School Supt. Pete Kudlak said the teachers have to accept that the kids are better at it, referring to computers.

Trustee Calvin Hawkins said he likes the children pushing the curriculum for their own learning.

McBride Principal John Leroy said there are growing pains.

Mills said there is massive growth in all of the DLC members.

Trustee Simone Pinter said she would like to have a class on use of the Chromebook for parents, the public, and substitute teachers because many "haven't a clue."

Duda Osborne said they can learn how but it doesn't mean they'll use it.

Trustee Pinter said when she, as a board member, got her tablet, "I erased everything." She said she took it back to the school and the IT person couldn't believe she erased it all.

"You can't keep pushing the buttons," she said.

Mills said they had some sessions on the computers at the beginning of the school year, but some teachers said that was a busy time of year for them and they would have liked the lessons at the end of the school

year so they can practice over the summer. They are looking into that, he said.

In other business at the one-hour-and-36-minute meeting, the board:

- Heard a presentation by Human Resources Director Abdul Madyun on hard caps (the maximum the district would pay for insurance as set by the state) and the ramifications on the different bargaining units. Although information in the board packet said this will be brought to a vote at the next meeting, it probably will be delayed because Director Madyun said he wants to talk to those involved before the board votes. "If we don't vote to go hardcap and it's not negotiated into contracts by July 1, it goes into hardcap by default," Madyun said, referring to state law. In charts, he showed that employee cost for insurance would not change between the current 80/20 VBEA plan, the VBASA, VBAES, and Food Service plans, and the hardcap. If the VBEST contract changed it could negotiate multiple plans like other groups, save the district money, and make it easier for the district to budget, he said;

- Approved the resignation of Charolette Buck-Jackson from McBride Middle School after seven years of service as of March 2 for a job opportunity. Her job has been posted, the district has seven applicants for her position so far, and they are starting to interview;

- Approved the resignation of Patricia Wauford as a bus driver after nine years of service as of March 1 for relocation; and the hiring of Ann Daugherty as a food service worker at Owen Intermediate School as of Feb. 11;


- Heard Director Moore say he met with University of Michigan representatives last week and they will offer one week of summer school in math for incoming fifth graders and one week of ELA for current seventh graders. Also, he is investigating the Michigan Career Quest in Oakland County, where students take a trip to see workers in IT, construction, and other professions as less-traditional career pathways. He said he hopes to have something like that for students here next year;

- Heard Finance Director Sara Cortese announce that the bonds approved by voters will be sold the next day and the district will get the \$13 million all at once. She said there is another investment firm that will bring more interest and she will bring a resolution to the board at the next meeting to add that investment firm to the district's approved list of investments. She also said the Food budget is \$4,500 higher than it should be according to the state and the district needs to spend more money, so they will get a few dishwashers and will get more ideas from a webinar;

- Heard Special Services Director Karen Johnston report that the district's architect met with about a dozen staff members at

- Heard the BHS student representatives on the board tell that last week was Week of Kindness at BHS and it was a big success. This week is Black History Week, with Monday being Black is Beautiful Day, followed by days featuring wearing dashikis, black excellence, culture and generation, followed by an assembly on Friday. Last year snow closed the school and ruined their week and they are hoping it doesn't happen this year;

- Heard Supt. Kudlak report the upcoming U.S. Census is important to schools because some of the district's money is tied to demographics. He said the dance team went to Orlando on Feb. 20 and made it to the second round, falling short by just over one point. It was noted a Black History Celebration is set for 6 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 27, at McBride; and

- Heard President Pearce announce the FIRST Robotics competition is coming back to BHS March 12-14, with competition on March 13 and 14. Kudlak said there is no school on March 13.

Metroparks seeks public input on proposed grants for Lower Huron

The Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority (HCMA) is seeking public input on three projects to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) Recreation Grants program for improvements within Lower Huron Metropark.

Lower Huron Metropark is one of 13 Metroparks owned and managed by HCMA. It is a 1,256-acre park located in southwest Wayne County. These projects are three of four grant projects HCMA will submit to the MDNR and all four will help realize several goals throughout the park system identified in the park Master Plans adopted by HCMA Board of Commissioners in 2016.

A project display will also be posted for a two-week public review period at the Lower Huron park office at 40151 E. Huron River Dr. and Van Buren Township Parks and Recreation Dept. at 46425 Tyler Rd., Van Buren Township.

If awarded these grant funds, the following projects would be completed within Lower Huron Metropark.

- 1. The development of an off-leash dog area at the Tawata Trace Trail area.** Nestled within a bend of the Huron River, the off-leash dog area would re-activate the location of the former par 3 golf course using universal design principles and include:
 - accessible walkways and parking including pathways extending into each dog playfield

- landscaping improvements including a 0.4 acre no-mow zone
 - demolition of old golf building and surrounds
 - accessible moveable restroom
 - four new benches with wheelchair companion sitting spaces
 - dual drinking fountain for people and dogs
 - new trash cans and dog waste stations
 - separate fields for large and small dogs
 - fully accessible bullpen area

2. Campground improvements at Walnut Grove Campground. The park is one of two Metroparks with a public campground. Situated near Tulip Tree Picnic Area, it provides easy access to picnicking, fishing and the popular water facility – Turtle Cove. Improvements would include:

- developing six new camping sites
- developing seven ADA camping sites with new concrete pads
- water and electric hookups to all campsites
- 38 new accessible picnic tables throughout the campground
 - three new fire pits and proposed firewood storage unit
 - landscaping improvements including a 2.7 acre no mow zone and 50 native tree plantings

- wi-fi
- two drinking fountain/water bottle filling stations
- playground improvements including two new ADA harness swings
 - parking lot improvements including pavement removal of excess parking areas

3. Construction of a 0.5 mile Iron Belle Trail segment. The Iron Belle Trail is a state-designated trail with both a hiking and biking arm reaching from Belle Isle in Detroit to

Ironwood in the Upper Peninsula. Known as Michigan’s showcase trail, it utilizes many of the state’s existing hike-bike paths, bike lanes, and biking routes and other planned trail segments.

The proposed project involves constructing a 10-foot-wide universal accessible asphalt trail segment that re-aligns the Iron Belle Trail

at the north end of Lower Huron to connect with a future segment west to Belleville, Ypsilanti, and Ann Arbor. The project is the result of an ongoing collaboration with other communities and organizations dedicated to implementing the regional Border-to-Border Trail system located in nearby Washtenaw County.

of Review with a term to expire Dec. 31, 2020. She fills the unexpired term of the late Loretta Speaks. Young had served on the Board of Review in the past;

- Approved the supervisor's appointment of Patricia Tumas to the Endowment Committee with a term to expire Jan. 15, 2022;

- Approved the supervisor's appointment of Eileen Parent to the Water and Sewer

Commission with a term to expire June 1, 2020. This also fills the unexpired term of the late Loretta Speaks;

- Heard Trustee Paul White say the \$101.90 for the employee Christmas lunch on the prepaid voucher list out of the supervisor's office is not proper since townships cannot legally spend public funds on employee lunches. Treasurer Budd said there were no township funds spent and that was reimbursed by donations from vendors. Trustee White asked if the township had a list of the donations and Budd said she

believed they did. "We cannot combine donations," White insisted. "There is no proof of donations, no list," he said. The Jan. 3 prepaid voucher list was approved on a 5-1 vote with White voting no and McNamara absent;

- Passed the prepaid voucher list of Jan. 30 on a vote of 5-1 with White voting no and McNamara absent. White had this list taken off the consent agenda so it could be discussed. "Many people feel VBT is not meeting the needs of residents in the south end," she said. She said people have expressed dissatisfaction with all the traffic on Belleville Road and said, "They don't like to shop like that. Going across the bridge is something else." The information she has shows there are 234,030 people within 10 miles of Kmart. She also said residents in this area need a laundromat and have to go to Milan or Canton for a laundromat. Trustee Reggie Miller said she called Schostak, which leases the property housing the old Kmart and they told her that people across the country have been asking Kroger to move into vacant Kmarts. "We have been proactive on the south side of town," said Trustee Miller. She asked Ban to come up and talk to the board after the meeting if she had any other ideas.

Manistee judge modifies Judge Parrott's pretrial release conditions

After a bond hearing on Tuesday morning, a Manistee County District Court Judge modified 34th District Court Judge David Parrott's pretrial release order to allow him to be free as long as he continued to wear his Soberlink device.

The Manistee County prosecutor had moved that Parrott's bond be revoked for a violation of parole which would send him to jail to await trial on a drunk-driving charge that now is in the Michigan Court of Appeals.

The judge said it would be too heavy-handed to put Parrott in jail to await word from the court of appeals in that he could serve more than the 93-day sentence he would get if he was found guilty of the charge.

The bond hearing was televised live by WXYZ.

The judge said since Parrott is already wearing Soberlink as part of his bond agreement for the Wayne County charge of domestic violence, he is ordered to submit Soberlink reports to his probation department four times a day as scheduled by their probation officer.

He emphasized that Parrott has a problem with alcohol that led to the two charges he is facing. He was ordered not to possess, purchase or use any alcohol or other non-prescription drugs and not use medical marijuana and to comply with other orders in his Wayne County bond for his domestic violence charge.

Testifying by Polycom from Van Buren Township were VBT Officer Michael Rini, Sgt. Marc Abdilla, and Lt. Charles Bazy. The first two told of the Feb. 8 domestic violence charge that started earlier that day at the Polar Plunge at the BYC and ended in the evening with an argument. Lt. Bazy said Parrott's ex-wife came to the police department on Feb. 14 to ask if one of Parrott's guns that he turned over to police, a 44 magnum, was still registered to her and it was, a civil infraction.

The judge did not find this important to the motion before him.

Parrott's pretrial on the domestic violence charge is set for 8:30 a.m., Feb. 28, at 35th District Court in Plymouth.
