<u>Court Watching:</u> Judge Green is asked to decide if defendant is faking being mute

34th District Court Chief Judge Tina Brooks Green heard more than an hour and a half of testimony from medical professionals in her courtroom on Feb. 1 about a defendant who may or may not be pretending to be mute to avoid facing a felony charge.

She is being asked to determine if Joshua Lee Morris, 24, of Van Buren Township is competent to stand trial on the charge of reckless driving causing death on July 6, 2014.

Morris was driving a Chevrolet Malibu northbound on Morton Taylor Road, just north of Van Born, in VBT at about 2:10 a.m. when he lost control of the car and hit a tree. Dead at the scene was his passenger and lifelong friend Marcus McIntosh, 21.

Morris was taken from the scene by Survival Flight to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital where he reportedly was in a coma for three days.

When he was charged with the felony last June, his defense attorney Murray Duncan asked for a competency hearing.

At the Feb. 1 court session before Judge Green, Duncan said his client can't communicate about the case, has a closed-head injury and has been in the Walter Reuther Psychiatric Hospital in Westland for 14 months. He said Morris can communicate in writing, but it is just gibberish.

"I have a client I can't talk to" to help with the case, Duncan said.

Judge Green said there was an order for a competency hearing in August 2015. She said she didn't think it was necessary to have the defendant in court for that hearing and her Feb. 1 hearing because she thought it was a simple decision. So, she said it was unnecessary for Morris to be present.

But it turns out she got conflicting reports (continued on page 15)

Library goes out for bids for construction manager

The Belleville Area District Library Board voted unanimously to immediately go out for bids for a construction manager so the architect can work with the firm as details are made to construction drawings.

At the Jan. 10 meeting of the board, a detailed Request for Proposals for Construction Management Services for the New Downtown Library was presented by architect Dan Whisler.

Building committee chairwoman Joy Cichewicz said the committee decided to reach out for RFPs by invitation and local subcontractors will be included.

Whisler said the board's building committee met three times since the last board meeting and he made a list based on his past experience with the companies.

"I have not reached out to see if they are interested, but a \$10.5 million project is appealing," Whisler said.

"We've included those who have been involved in building libraries," Cichewicz

said. "We're including Davenport because they're a local firm and done a lot of local work."

Harlan and Steve Davenport were in the audience for the entire meeting, but did not offer any comments. Building committee member John Juriga has been a vocal supporter of having Davenport build the library.

Whisler said there will be a two-step selection process. He said they should ask for qualifications and make a list of who they want based on qualifications. Then, turn to separate sealed fee proposals and look at the proposed fees.

Whisler said he expects completion of the library in late 2019.

He said they don't have the site survey complete yet, but in a week or so it will be ready. He said if it is ready it will be included with the call for RFPs.

Whisler said construction management service firms they plan to contact are: Frank Rewold & Sons of Rochester, The Christman Company of Lansing, McCarthy & Smith of Farmington Hills, Phoenix Contractors of Ypsilanti, O'Neal Construction, Inc. of Ann Arbor, Granger Construction of Lansing, The Dailey Company of Lake Orion, J.S. Vig Construction Company of Taylor, and Davenport Brothers Construction of Belleville.

He said from the nine firms, they should pick three to five to interview and give them two weeks to respond. He recommended strongly that the members of the selection committee sit in on all interviews together.

"This is a big deal ... a big decision," said Board President Sharon Peters. "It's very important we do this and do it right."

After discussion, the board decided to have the building committee do the selection. Currently on the committee were Cichewicz and Juriga. She appointed Mary Jane Dawson to make it a committee of three.

The committee was directed to review the nine RFPs, make a short list of three to five, interview them, and make a recommendation to the board at its Feb. 14 meeting.

"This is intensive," Whisler said, adding he doesn't want them to kick the decision to March. "The earlier we have a construction manager working at our elbow, the better."

Peters told the board members to take home the RFP written by Whisler and if they have any questions on it within 24 hours to let the committee know, otherwise Whisler will send out the RFPs.

[On Feb. 8, the committee interviewed O'Neal, The Dailey, Phoenix, McCarthy, and Rewold. On Feb. 9, it was scheduled to meet at 1 p.m. to make a decision on who to recommend to the board for a decision at the board's Feb. 14 meeting.]

In other business at the Jan. 10 two-hour meeting, the board:

• Elected Sharon Peters chairperson for 2017, Mary Jane Dawson as vicechairperson, LaChelle Caver as secretary, and Tanya Stoudemire as treasurer;

• Approved the financial advisory services contract with PFM Group, Paul Stauder, managing director, for the 2017 Library Facility Bonds;

• Approved the investment advisory agreement with PFM Asset Management LLC, Michael Barry, Sr., managing consultant, so when they get \$14 million they will know what to do with it;

• Approved a resolution to join the Michigan Liquid Asset Fund Plus to assist them in investing surplus funds in certain investment pools;

• Received legal information on former board member Mike Boelter's proposal to offer stipends to board members and tabled the item until the next meeting when it will be discussed. Boelter had proposed \$40 a meeting for board members and \$60 a meeting for the chairperson. Michigan Compiled Laws allows for payment of no more than \$30 per board member per meeting, and they shall not be compensated for more than 52 meetings a year. Peters told board members to think about it and talk with members of the bylaws committee. "It has financial implications," Peters said; and

· Received a budget report for July-September from Treasurer Stoudemire, who reported a \$350,000 fund balance. She also recommended a budget amendment of \$14,000 for the 2016-17 fiscal year for additional staffing, as requested by Director Mary Jo Suchy, which was passed unanimously. The total is for addition of one 20-hour per week librarian at \$9,000 and a promotion from part-time to fulltime library assistant at \$5,000.

dual enrollment at Schoolcraft College

If all goes as planned, students at Van Buren Public Schools, ages 16 and 17, will be able to enroll in Schoolcraft College's new Dual Enrollment Fire Project this fall. And, after two semesters, they would have 20 college credit hours from their classes in fire fighting.

At Monday's work/study meeting of the VBT board, Liam Carroll, fire technology program coordinator at Schoolcraft, explained the new project to the board. On Tuesday, at its regular meeting, the board approved organization of a VBT Fire Department Firefighter Cadet Program.

Carroll said the state of Michigan allows local cadet programs and technically the students would be in the cadet program, not college. Carroll said he will be meeting with Belleville High School officials on Friday and a week from Friday with the city of Romulus.

VBT Fire Chief Dan Besson said he wanted to set this up before he left for his new job Up North so VBT's new fire chief would have it all in place when he takes over. Carroll, who is a former fire chief, said he wanted to give Chief Besson the first chance at the brand-new program. They believe it will interest young people in fire fighting and, perhaps, encourage them to fight fires for VBT after they are trained. Payment for the schooling would come through the high school, Carroll said.

Communities need fire fighters and this is one way to get young people interested.

VBT Police Sgt. Louis Keele told me Wayne County and Washtenaw County trucks worked together the morning of Feb. 1 to spread salt on the hill on Rawsonville Road north of West Huron River Drive. It was a sheet of ice from the Huron River bridge up to McDonald's at the top and vehicles were unable to get up the hill.

Sgt. Keele said he understands Rawsonville Road south of West Huron River Drive also was very icy.

We heard about the iced up Rawsonville Road on the police/fire scanner at about 7 a.m., but by that time the VBT fire trucks had already been summoned from Station #1 and were coming out to block off Rawsonville at West Huron River Drive at the south end and at the South I-94 Service Drive at the north end, so they could work on the icy snarl in between.

On the scanner at one point they said there were two semis and four cars that couldn't get up the hill because of the ice and that the backup on Rawsonville to the south was two miles long.

The cars that had to stream east on Huron River Drive that morning snarled traffic into Belleville and to Haggerty Road and in between. Everybody was probably trying to get to work on time. Sgt. Keele said the vehicles finally got themselves out at the incline near Grove Road. Of course, as you all know, by afternoon the sky was sunny and the roads were clear.

A man who lives in the city of Belleville called me on Monday afternoon to say he received a computergenerated phone message from the IRS saying he was being sued and police were

coming for him if he didn't return their call.

He called the Belleville Police and they said that kind of scam is going on all over the country and he should call the *Independent* to warn residents not to return the call or to worry about the IRS suing them. The IRS never calls you. It always sends messages by mail.

At Monday's meeting of the Belleville City Council a member of the audience asked if Belleville had been a part of putting together the new VBT Lake Ordinance. Mayor Conley said about a year and a half ago, she and DDA Coordinator Carol Thompson were invited in to talk about it, but not since then.


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Lincoln Consolidated Schools adopt positive budget amendment

The Lincoln Consolidated Schools Board of Education and administration announce the adoption of a revised 2016-17 budget projecting a positive fund equity of \$5,217,668 for the year, resulting in an 11.97% fund balance as a percent of expenditures.

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About a year before I joined the Van Buren team, district leaders began a dynamic project with the intent to improve the education that we provide to our students. They started meeting with the MI Excel Team from the state and their new initiative called the Blueprint for Turnaround.

Van Buren Public Schools was an "Early Adopter" of this work as one of the first districts in the state to officially join. We had a presentation to the School Board that explained the process, the work that would be done, and the uneasiness that change causes.


The Blueprint for Turnaround walked us through a process that created districtwide systems. We had issues within



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our own organization in curriculum, communication, data management, and analysis, and having dynamic building teams making real decisions. Many districts that needed a "turnaround"

Many districts that needed a "turnaround" had similar issues. The MI Excel Team developed this process specifically to address these common problems.

I walked into this process in full swing. Over the summer, I spent four days in workshops to learn all about it and another few months learning about VBPS. The work absolutely aligns with our needs. I am thrilled to continue this work.

Currently, 65 districts are engaged in this work from all corners of Michigan. Networking and partnering with these other districts has become a big part of our change. We learn from and share with each other. The competition between districts that has developed since Proposal

A in 1994, is set aside for the common good. It has been very powerful.

Last school year, many of the processes were developed and much of the curriculum was written. Urgency was the district mantra and a lot of work was completed. This year, we are continuing the curriculum work, building the strong building-level teams, and (most importantly) strengthening our foundation on which this Blueprint for Turnaround is built.

The base of this change is anchored in a culture of collective responsibility that is collegial, collaborative, and professional while allocating resources in an equitable (not equal) manner that is based upon on student need. I have been working to build trust in the administration, as well as, treating our professionals as professionals by providing them a voice. Building principals have been working in creating a collegial and collaborative environment to steer their ship through this work.

We are also re-launching this initiative as we get the work into the hands of the staff. They will make the changes come to life and we need their experiences and knowledge in order to do it correctly. Many hands make light work.

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VBT DDA to consider shared driveway at its Placemaking project

A developer, who has an option on the two parcels on Belleville Road just north of the Van Buren Township Downtown Development Authority's Placemaking project, has shown an interest is sharing the DDA's parking lot and driveway.

The DDA has purchased 10101 and 10151 Belleville Road to develop a destination point for residents and visitors.

At the Jan. 24 meeting of the DDA, Executive Director Susan Ireland said the developer inquired if the DDA would like to partner with him, such as he giving the DDA land for a shared driveway. He also wanted to share parking in the DDA's planned parking area.

"I was afraid they would use all of our parking lot," Ireland said. "I told him I would talk to you about sharing a driveway."

"We're all about development," said DDA president Craig Atchinson. "Share a driveway? We can do that. Parking?"

"Leave him on his own for parking," said William M. Wiemer of Wakely Associates/ Architects, who is working as director of construction services on the Placemaking project. He said every parking lot is a hard surface.

"You let him handle his own storm water ... If he wants it, he can put in his own driveway and pay for it," Wiemer said.

Atchinson said the two parcels are very small and Ireland agreed.

"He offered to give you an annual fee for parking," Ireland said, reading from some notes she had just retrieved from her office.



"I said parking is an issue and that we need a drawing of what he plans," Ireland said, adding, "It's not a site big enough to build much." She said each parcel is 35' wide.

She said the developer, who she did not name, said he would put in typical retails, like a 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. store or hair salon. There was the possibility of sharing an approach.

Ireland said she knows that businesses put more money on the tax rolls.

VBT Supervisor Kevin McNamara asked what kind of business could be put in and Ireland said nothing with a drive-through, but "by sharing an access you might get something."

She said the Placemaking project is ready to get going.

"We can't let useless property just lie there," McNamara said.

Ireland said she wanted McNamara to know that the DDA did make a fair offer on that property and they never called back.

Ireland said Realtor Carol Bird, who serves on the DDA, said she received a call from the broker and he said he didn't think the deal between the developer and the property owners would go through. Bird was absent from the meeting.

"We went as high as \$25,000 each and they never called back," Ireland said. The owners wanted \$400,000 total for the two parcels, she said.

Wiemer said the two lots total 70' less the two 10' setbacks, leave the lot at 50' frontage. "That's a small residential lot," he said.

"I think the people here think you should talk to them," McNamara said to Ireland. "If they want to pay for our entryway. The entryway would cost more than the property."

DDA member Victor Delibera said the developer would have to pay for razing the two buildings on the lots.

"Do they have the financial means?" McNamara asked.

Ireland said the developer working on this is also working on a project down the street (referring to the property just north of Belle Tire).

"He's working on a very long due-



diligence period," Ireland said.

"I would like to see us have the property," Atchinson said. "I think we should make another offer."

"Show we're interested in sharing a drive and make another offer," Delibera said.

"It's not a big deal to our project if we get the other property," Wiemer said.

In other discussion on the Placemaking project, the DDA was informed the project's committee met and came to the conclusion it would be best to eliminate all the drainage ponds and put in underground storm water facilities. It would mean two 48" underground pipes.

"That opens up an area for picnicking and you can drive over it," Wiemer said, noting there's a system for stabilizing the surface so fire trucks and other vehicles can drive over it.

This change was estimated at \$100,000, but he said it would be substantially lower.

"We haven't been to Wayne County, yet," Wiemer said, referring to approval for storm water drainage.

"I've seen this at Wayne County approved regularly," said McNamara, who formerly served as a Wayne County commissioner.

In other business at the Jan. 24 meeting, the DDA:

· Discussed ornamental details for the planned pedestrian walkway over I-94 on Belleville Road. Ireland said the Michigan Department of Transportation wants VBT's information in April so it can meet in June for a plan review. Besides the name of the township, other designs were suggested, along with a preference for a wroughtiron looking fence instead of the standard MDOT chain link fence, which would cost 30-40% more. MDOT is furnishing design costs, engineering, construction management and VBT has two grants. Anything more the township wants to add, it will pay the difference. Ireland asked them to think about the additions to the bridge so they can talk about it at the next meeting;

• Heard Ireland explain Public Act 506 of 2016 that was signed by the Governor on Jan. 9. It would exempt certain taxes levied for library purposes from being captured by tax incremental financing authorities (TIFA). She said the DDA's bond counsel said he thought some additional language may be added to this law since there are some internal inconsistencies. He suggested waiting 30 days for the changes. "We may not be able to capture the new stuff," Ireland said of the Belleville Area District Library's millages; and

• Heard Lisa Lothringer report on E-Blasts promoting DDA businesses and other promotions. She did a Monthly Spotlight on Planet Fitness and said it is very nice inside. Atchinson said a dozen of his employees joined and go there on their lunch breaks. McNamara said people can work out at the township senior center for \$15 a year, but Lothringer said not everyone qualifies in age. Ireland said it is nice to see a formerly empty building occupied. Absent from the meeting were vice chair Carol Bird and Directors Bob Bechtel, Ron Blank, and Helen Foster. Present were chairman Atchinson, Secretary Sophia Zoller, Joe Baskin, Jr., Chris Brown, Victoria Delibera, Mark Laginess, and Supervisor McNamara.

already suffering from depression could have a triggering event, like finding out about the charges, which could cause him to go mute.

"I felt his depression was sincere," said the psychiatrist. "But any reason for not speaking was not because of injury."

"I don't care about the reason," Judge Green said. "Is it medically plausible that being charged caused a medical / psychiatric event?"

The doctor said that could be, but he currently is not speaking. She had labeled Morris incompetent for trial in two reports and was not seeing him now.

The prosecution's second witness was Dr. Erin Michael Shepherd, consulting neuropsychologist at Walter Reuther Hospital. He said he reviewed Dr. Hill's reports along with talking to Morris. He said he observed Morris could walk without difficultly and had no external signs of depression. He said he is able to write out things, but did not speak verbally and he did not observe him interacting with any staff.

Dr. Shepherd told of a simple memory test that Morris passed easily the first time and then the second time, after he was charged, he scored very, very low. "He would have to make an effort to go so low," he said.

He told Judge Green that Morris is likely malingering because there is no disorder to cause him to be mute.

"Depression can cause a person to be mute temporarily, but wouldn't prevent speaking. There is no physical thing stopping him from speaking," Dr. Shepherd said.

Judge Green asked if it is plausible that Morris was stable and then was informed there was an accident and he was being held responsible for a death and that impacted him?

"Is it plausible he's not malingering?" Judge Green asked. "He is criminally charged for a felony and ... this triggered something and he is not malingering?"

"It's highly implausible," said Dr. Shepherd "We would see other things. He wouldn't be able to function in his daily life.

"It's not likely that depression caused mutism," he said.

Defense attorney Duncan asked if it was possible and Dr. Shepherd conceded it was possible.

Duncan referred to a report that said Morris may not regain cognitive deficits and Dr. Shepherd said his report doesn't talk about competency. It talks about malingering.

Dr. Shepherd said he had some writings that Morris gave to him, but he did not bring them to court. He said they were childlike and Morris wrote about having lots of toys to play with when he goes home.

"My determination was that he was malingering with the mutism," Dr. Shepherd said.

Next witness was Bernice Diop, clinical social worker at Walter Reuther. She said Morris communicated to her in writing because his Fund Card was empty and he couldn't get snacks at the vending machine.

Another written message was presented that said, in part, "Mom's not coming, is she? How much can I stay here? No robot, no games, cartoons. It sucks here. I hurt no one. I've been a good boy. Only crazy people need help. I need mom ..."

"He'd rather not be here," Judge Green said, noting she could understand that.

Diop said staff had observed him on the house telephone to someone else in the hospital. She said he has spoken with his mother on the other phone where people can call in.

Judge Green asked about his education and was told he finished ninth grade and his communication skills were limited, at best.

Dr. H. Gummadi, a psychiatrist to Morris, said Morris is competent to be able to understand the charges and work with the attorney. He said Morris works with staff and other patients. He said he interacts and gets to sessions on time without help.

Duncan asked about the February 2016 report that said "closed injury cognitive deficiency - may not regain competency."

Dr. Gummadi said he first met with Morris on May 26. The patient was in another psychiatric unit and was transferred into his current unit in a wheelchair with a helmet on his head from an altercation and assault by another patient.

He said the medication seems to be working and he communicates by writing, with a lot of misspellings.

"He can assist his attorney in defending himself," Dr. Gummadi said.

Defense attorney Duncan called his only witness, Dr. George Watson, Jr., a clinical and forensic psychologist hired by the defense for an independent evaluation.

Dr. Watson met with Morris on Jan. 18 and, "My opinion was he was incompetent based on other available documents, plus interactions."

Dr. Watson said he was required to inform the patient of why he was there and Morris would not read the information, so he read it to him.

"He made no acknowledgement. He nodded ... gestures with his hands ... gave no meaningful acknowledgement of the

notice."

Dr. Watson said he asked him to fill out a questionnaire and he didn't. He asked him questions and Morris began to write things in block print that were not responsive to the questions.

Dr. Watson said malingering was defined as a willful presentation of fabricated symptoms of mental or physical disorders for a false result.

"I felt he was genuine," Dr. Watson said.

He went through Morris' problems: traumatic brain injury, special ed., ADHD, traumatized as a youth, trauma on top of trauma.

He said he has not heard anything that means Morris' attention will be up to the task of assisting his attorney. "I didn't see any evidence of him able to process abstract concepts."

Prosecutor Cayce said Dr. Watson met with Morris for an hour. Morris talked to his mom by telephone. Being ADHD doesn't make him incompetent.

"He was out living in the world, driving a car," Cayce said, noting his problems were laid on pretty thick.

"I didn't think it was authentic," Cayce said.

Judge Green said court is not something Morris wants.

"I haven't been in this position in all these years," said Judge Green of her required decision, noting if the defendant is not competent the state would arrange a civil commitment. "But the state says he's competent. If I find him competent, he is taken into custody and goes to trial."

"He had 14-15 months to regain his competency," said Prosecutor Cayce. "His mutism is exaggerated."

"Should he be released tomorrow?" Judge Green asked.

"And be living out in the world?" Cayce asked.

The mother of Marcus McIntosh, the person that died in the crash, told Judge Green that Morris lives near her home and after the accident she watched Morris walk his dog. "I watched him live," she said.

"There is no evidence that brain injury kept him from talking and walking," Cayce said.

Duncan said, "He can't assist me. I can't do anything with him. I'm helpless if I'm forced to represent an incompetent person."

Judge Green said the ATM card activities concern her and she's concerned that people saw him on the phone.

"ON the phone," Duncan said. "There's no testimony he was talking."

Judge Green said she wants to see Morris in her courtroom.

"It's not fair for me to make a decision ..." she said. "I want to see the defendant and see his mother. I apologize to the victim's family for prolonging this. I would feel more comfortable with the decision. I want to see the defendant and I want to ask the mother a lot of questions."

She asked the medical witnesses still in the courtroom if there is a daily attendant that she can talk to and they said there is.

"I want the defendant, his mother, and the daily attendant in my courtroom at 10 a.m., Feb. 22, for a competency hearing."

She asked the victim's family if that would be too long and the victim's mother replied, through tears, "It's been two and a half years."

VBT Detective Mark Buxton is officer in charge of the case.

If found guilty of the felony charge, Morris could be imprisoned for up to 15 years and/ or pay a fine of \$2,500 to \$10,000.

Morris was released April 24, 2014 after serving three years in prison on a plea bargain to criminal sexual conduct, third degree. He is considered a habitual offender. His release from prison was about three months before the fatal accident.

Council to consider proper staffing level for City of Belleville

The Belleville City Council gave a nod to Councilman Tom Fielder's suggestion that it look at city staffing and decide just how many people should be working for the city.

Councilman Fielder said he asked that the item be put on the agenda of Monday's regular meeting because there is a new officer in the police department, a new employee at city hall, and one DPS worker will be leaving.

He said the council should decide how many employees are needed and what their job descriptions are. He asked the council to ask the city manager to develop a staffing plan and develop the appropriate staff level with job descriptions and possible crossstaffing.

"Ask her to brainstorm with her administration and come back with a recommendation," Fielder said.

Mayor Kerreen Conley agreed that this work is most appropriate as part of the budget process.

"Possibly we don't need three, but need two," she said of employees at city hall.

She said they are pleased with Karen in the front office and a good police officer (Sarah Dzagulones) recently was hired, but no part-time officer yet.

"Rick is working on a shoestring right now, with one leaving soon," said City Manager Diana Kollmeyer, referring to DPW Director Rick Rutherford whose department consists of him and two workers.

"That's a part of her job, anyway," Mayor Conley said, noting a lot goes into job descriptions.

Fielder suggested the report be shown to council members first and if a subcommittee is needed, it could be set up.

No vote was taken on the direction given to Kollmeyer because Mayor Conley said the city manager doesn't need to be told to do her job.
