Federal safe schools program hosted by **Belleville PD at BHS**

The Belleville Police Department hosted a Partnership for Safe Schools program put on for law enforcement agencies, schools and other juvenile justice agencies on Tuesday and Wednesday at Belleville High

The two-day workshop was designed to prepare diverse teams of juvenile justice stakeholders to implement or strengthen school safety plans that enhance the protection of students, teachers, and the surrounding community.

Through interactive discussions, case study exercises, and individualized action planning, participants obtain practice skills they can apply immediately on the job.

The workshop, offered without charge to participants, was sponsored by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the Office of Juvenile Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice, and was co-hosted by the Belleville Police Department.

Retired Belleville Police Chief Gene Taylor had been working through the Department of Homeland Security to get this program locally and it originally was set for last year. But then the federal sequestration cuts hit and money was cut for this program.

Chief Taylor said they told him they would put Belleville at the top of the list when funds were available.

Chief Taylor said he repeatedly dropped by the Homeland Security office to remind them that Belleville Police were waiting to host the specialized training. He said last week he was told registration for the workshop was full.

Topics covered included: Developing a school safety team, assessing the safety of your school, developing prevention and intervention strategies, analyzing your school safety plan, and preparing for, responding to, and recovering from a crisis.

A historical society organized to restore it to operating condition after a decade of exposure to the weather. It ran on a variety of excursion trains between 1979 and 1993, after which the 765 was sidelined for a major overhaul that began in 2000 and took six years to complete. Two years ago, in part to celebrate its 30th corporate anniversary as well as the historical group's 40th, Norfolk Southern arranged for a series of excursions led by Engine 765.

Sumpter Township Police Chief James Pierce will have a brand-new car to drive

"It's time to buy another vehicle," he told those gathered at the meeting.

Captain Luke said Sumpter has been buying its cars from a Ford dealer in Brighton for the past 10 years. He said this year Craig Atchison said he would be able to match the price.

"This is the first police vehicle from a local dealership," said Luke.

He said a regular police vehicle lasts three to three and a half years because it is 24 miles around the township.

Luke said Chief Pierce was quiet about the condition of his car and didn't want to bring it up.

"I asked for it," Luke said.

Luke said when the police department bought the 2011 Crown Vics, they talked the township into an extended warranty of \$2,000 on each car that has really paid off over the years. He said a repair that would cost \$5,000 to \$10,000 is fixed and the township only pays \$100.

In other business at the July 8 meeting, the board:

Sumpter Planners postpone public hearing on MJ zoning ordinance

At its meeting July 10, Sumpter Township Planning Commission members voted unanimously to postpone the planned Aug. 14 public hearing to Sept. 11 on the proposed zoning overlay for medical marijuana provisionary centers.

The item was not on the meeting's agenda, but Commissioner Matthew Oddy, who had not been at the June 12 meeting when the public hearing was set, wanted to discuss it.

He said he has a friend who is familiar with both the Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor dispensary ordinances and he had questions about the Sumpter proposal.

Sumpter Police Detective John Toth, who has been enforcing the medical marijuana growers' ordinance passed last fall, was present at the June planning meeting to explain the details of the new ordinance, along with Laura Kreps, planning consultant from Carlise / Wortman.

Det. Toth was not at the July 10 meeting.

Commissioner Oddy said he had received the proposed overlay zoning laid out for commercial zoned property for the dispensaries that was discussed at the June meeting

Kreps said her original sentiment was to put the dispensaries in commercial districts, but there are not many commercial districts in Sumpter. What she wrote was what the police wanted.

She said the planning commission is working on the zoning ordinance part of the project. She said a second ordinance, the general law ordinance, will have five possible locations laid out for dispensaries, but only three sites will be chosen.

Kreps was informed the general law ordinance put together by the police department and township attorney Rob Young had had its first reading approved by the board at its July 8 meeting.


Kreps said she had not seen that ordinance and was not told it was in the process of approval. Township Deputy Clerk Esther Hurst gave her a copy of what the board had given first approval.

The two ordinances had been planned to move forward together.

Deputy Clerk Hurst said the plan is for the board to wait until the zoning ordinance is recommended for approval by the planning commission and sent on to the board, so the two ordinances can be approved together.

Oddy said measurements in ordinances are usually lot line to lot line and the zoning ordinance Kreps wrote for the planning commission says building to building.

Kreps said ordinances usually say lot line to lot line, but if they do that in Sumpter, "None of them would be able to operate."



There are five proposed areas for Marijuana Provisionary Centers under current plans in Sumpter Township in commercial areas. The Planning Commission has some problems with where the centers would be placed.

She said the ordinance does not have the intention to exclude.

"You're benefitting certain individuals and excluding others," said Commissioner Jim Clark.

Ordinances in Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti were referred to and Kreps said those two cities have large commercial areas.

Commissioner Clark said the areas laid out for dispensaries will be affecting other people in those neighborhoods.

That part of the ordinances was being handled by the board, she said, noting, "I did not work on the general law ordinance."

Clark said the Sumpter ordinance should not be less restrictive than Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor and, "Other people are trying to make this fit for existing operations."

Commissioner Joy Cichewicz asked if any other ordinances are not lot line to lot line and Kreps replied, "Not any that I saw."

"Looks like it should be rewritten," said

"I sent this to the police department and got no response. It's been two months," Kreps said.

"I don't want to come next month and be on the hook," Kreps said, referring to the public hearing.

She referred to the belief that a large crowd of people will be at the public hearing on the proposed zoning ordinance, including people who are growing medical marijuana now, their customers and supporters, and people opposed.

Oddy said all the commercial properties named have residences above businesses.

Clark said the commission shouldn't hold a public hearing unless the ordinance is the way they want it.

"If you're not comfortable with the language, you shouldn't have a public hearing," Kreps agreed.

She said she has been waiting six weeks for feedback from the police department and attorney.

Commission chairwoman Jane Stalmack said she was not comfortable with the proposed ordinance.

Kreps said she could rewrite it to specify commercial property and change the measurements from lot line to lot line.

Commissioner Sharon Claxton said all the commercial property Sumpter has in the township is in the five places specified in the proposed ordinance.

"Stick with commercial and redo the map," Clark said. "I don't like the idea of favoring individuals.

Oddy said the master plan could be changed to make more commercial zoning.

Kreps said if they wanted to keep their public hearing for Aug. 14, she could make the changes the commission wants before the public hearing.

She said she could tell the attorney the proposed ordinance is now different from what the police wanted.

"I would hate to come next month and have a lot of angry people here," she said.

Oddy pointed out the proposed zoning ordinance says the dispensary needs to be 500 feet from a school and the general law ordinance being accepted by the board says 1.000 feet.

That discrepancy was what did it for Oddy. He made a motion to postpone the Aug. 14 public hearing until Sept. 11 because of a lack of clarity and conflicting definitions between the general law and zoning ordinances.

Township Trustee Alan Bates, who is a member of the planning commission, seconded the motion and the board passed it unanimously.

The Sept. 11 meeting will be held at the community center, since a large crowd is expected.

VBT Board OKs lawsuit against Wayne County

At Tuesday's meeting of the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees a proposed law suit against Wayne County, regarding the Downriver Sewer System, was approved unanimously. Trustee Phil Hart was absent and excused.

The law suit was first brought to the board at its July 1 meeting and it voted 4-3 to postpone action until the next meeting. DPW Director Jim Taylor said litigation is a last-ditch effort to bring issues to the forefront. He said the system's Joint Management Committee has been trying to meet with the county since the contract expired two years ago. Once the law suit was proposed, the county wants to meet, he said.

At the July 1 meeting, Assistant Wayne County Executive Alan Helmkamp told the board he had information for them and they didn't have all the facts, so they postponed action and township representatives met with Helmkamp to hear what he had to say.

Apparently, they weren't impressed. He said the county took enterprise funds from the Downriver Sewer System, but they have been restored with interest and they won't do that again.

Trustee Jeff Jahr recommended approving the resolution to file suit, but it won't be filed tomorrow or next week. Meanwhile, attorneys from the township, county and others in the 13-member system will be meeting on Friday to try to avert the suit. Get tough with the county.

The Davenport Center is looking all bright and welcoming as it gets into the final stages of construction. Belleville's Secretary of State office is moving in to the big part of the building under the clock. (Is that a real clock?)

The Secretary of State plans to open there on July 21. This new office will have public restrooms, which will be a nice change. I've been told at the old location people who needed a restroom went over to the nearby restaurant.

They seem to be getting near an agreement for Blue Country Walk people to be able to get permits to build at Country Walk #3 and #4 in Van Buren Township.

Maybe a special township board meeting will be set up to approve the Memo of Understanding that then must go to the HOAs for approval. The construction season is fading fast.

Wayne RESA millage a raw deal for taxpayers

To the Editor:

Slipped into the Aug. 5 primary ballot is a proposal to raise taxes for Wayne County residents. Enhancement millages, as they are deceptively known, override constitutional limits on school property taxes. This proposal is a raw deal, and there's why:

If approved, taxes will increase by about \$80 million per year. While proponents attempt to minimize the increase by dividing it into "only \$50 per year on a home with a \$50,000 market value," that's like breaking up your 32-ounce soda into "only 100 calories) in each of six servings - that's deceptive when you finish the bottle at one sitting. It's still an \$80 million annual tax increase which will remain in place for the next six years.

That's a total tax increase of \$480 million, and that's a big pile of money out of the taxpayer's pockets, no matter how it's sliced

This local tax doesn't fund local schools; funds are collected based on property values and distributed based on pupil counts. As a result, districts that have attracted residents and businesses, increasing their tax base, will pay more; others that have often driven out development will pay less. My district, Northville Public Schools, will receive only \$2.8 million per year on \$5 million in new

It's no wonder that our Board of Education voted 7-0 to opposed this new millage and 43% of the districts in Wayne County voted against even putting this income redistribution scheme on the ballot. The biggest winner is the Detroit Public Schools, which, while having made strides to improve the school and its finances, remains significantly behind other districts in enacting necessary reforms."

far as to celebrate that the new tax revenue will come without "strings." Those "strings" include necessary reforms, like competitively bidding non-core services, adjusting healthcare benefits to reflect market realities. and disposing of surplus property.

Some districts, like Northville, have enacted those reforms and the state has rewarded our district and others with extra financial resources. Many districts that voted for this millage have surprisingly not reformed. turning away additional state funding. Those same districts, after turning down state funding, are now asking their residents, and ours, to pay more taxes.

Rather than making the difficult choices and often heart-wrenching changes that Northville public Schools has over the last five years, these districts have kicked the can down the road. Now the road is at its end, and they are again asking voters to part with their hard-earned money so that unpopular but necessary changes need not be made.

They ought to instead seek their residents' advice, many of whom adjusted their own lives to reflect today's economic conditions. It's not too much to ask that our school districts undergo the sometimes painful changes that our hard-working residents already endured.

Raising taxes by \$480 million isn't the answer, fixing structural financial problems



the two proposals on the upcoming ballot;

• Heard Hamm report that the ad in the *Independent* for a plumbing inspector brought no applicants, so they will be putting it on MLive through the internet. Clerk Clarence Hoffman asked if the Van Buren Township person who applied for the job is still on the list and he was told she was. Hamm also said a trustee came into township hall recently complaining about the time it is taking to demolish buildings. FMAR explains how it helps community dogs

To the Editor:

I read your editorial on the dogs in the city of Belleville and I wonder if you wouldn't mind letting me comment on a couple of things regarding the city and Van Buren Township.

First, I would like to thank Dr. Yvonne Craiger from Sumpter Pet Care for her compassion and offer to help by starting a committee to address this issue.

FMAR [Friends of Michigan Animal

Rescue] agrees that we may be too small to take every animal that someone may want to re-home, however FMAR has a section in their website that has resources for people who need help with medical care for their pets http://www.fmarl.org/pet_help.aspx. If you can afford a low interest rate loan there is a company called *Care Credit* who will give a 0% interest loan to families who qualify. Many of our friends, family, and board of directors have used *Care Credit* and say it is wonderful and most vet offices will help you through the process.

FMAR is happy to give food to families who have dogs who they can't afford to feed, in fact, we have given out 100s of pounds of food to our community and have a couple volunteers who have actually looked for people in need and delivered the

food.

Most importantly, FMAR has answered several calls from the city of Belleville when they needed help with an abandoned, stray, or hurt dog. In fact, we currently have a stray dog at the shelter that was running in the city of Belleville. We have also had several conversations with Van Buren Township regarding their decision to take their dogs to Taylor, and then to Romulus Animal Control. We were told to call these shelters and they would work with FMAR to get the dogs once they were delivered to them; but that is not the case. In fact, they want FMAR to pay to get dogs out of their shelters and they won't let us have the Van Buren dogs. They want us to take the dogs they choose.

FMAR would like the opportunity to have first choice at the dogs they pick up, however, they felt it was too much trouble so it had to be all or nothing. FMAR has never asked to be compensated, however they pay Romulus a monthly fee to take the Van Buren dogs and then Romulus charges rescues to take their dogs. FMAR agrees that we can't save them all and there are some dogs we would not take for aggressive behavior and we limit our shelter to 1 or 2 Pitt Bulls because they require extensive adoption procedures, are the hardest to get adopted, and they stay in our shelter an average of 3-5 years before someone adopts them. We do have a couple of Pitt Bull rescue groups in our community, so we try to leave it to them to do what they can.

Even though we don't take aggressive dogs, we have been known to take dogs with medical issues. We have taken everything from broken bones to dogs with diabetes, blind, and even a pup with heart problems. We make sure every animal is spay/neutered, vaccinated, tested, micro chipped, and as healthy as we can get them before they are adopted out. Our medical and food bills are extensive. We have spayed and neutered over 2,000 stray cats and kittens on our own dime and we raised all of it ourselves through fundraising and generous supporters and volunteers. The only thing we have asked from our townships and city is to let us know when they have a stray and let us try to help out before they take them somewhere where our community will probably never find their pet because it ended up in another

I am not sure if our community knows but Sumpter Township works with FMAR when they find a stray dog. They don't have a paid animal control officer but the police department contacts us when they find a nice dog and we do everything in our power to make room for it. It has been a great partnership and we wish we could do more for Sumpter Township, but they understand we are doing what we can to help our community and they work with us. The City of Belleville has also worked with FMAR and we will continue to do what we can for their stray dogs if they ask.

When FMAR started in 2003 our goal was to help as many adoptable dogs in highkill shelters and animal control facilities as we could. We have more than doubled our dog capacity in the last 10 years and will continue to try to do more, however in order to survive we need to have limits. Dogs who have homes are safer than the dogs who are in kill shelters waiting for their "end date" to arrive. We have to limit our intakes to the space we have so we have to make tough choices and we think taking animals from high-kill shelters is the best choice. There is a way to keep some of our community's adoptable dogs from getting to these shelters. We hope someday soon we can come to a compromise with all of Belleville and save more of the dogs in Belleville. For now we go to the Monroe Animal Control to get our dogs. They allow FMAR to choose who we take and they don't charge us to take them because FMAR is state-licensed (however we are not state-funded, just state-inspected). We believe if you ask Monroe Animal Control if they think FMAR is making a difference in their euthanasia rate we are sure they would say we are making a significant difference.

FMAR is more than happy to help with the dogs in Belleville even if it is on a smaller scale for now. However we do have a building that we can renovate to help even more if the Belleville groups would like to help fund a renovation! It is 8,200 square feet and will hold twice as many dogs as we have now! Perhaps you might want to pool your animal control resources and help us grow?

I hope I have helped our community get a better understanding of FMAR and how dedicated we are to the dogs in our community.





travel over I-94 rather than dodging cars and trucks that are entering or exiting the freeway ramps. My understanding of the DDA's plan is to have sidewalks connect to the **EXISTING** pedestrian overpass that was installed a number of years ago by MDOT. This overpass is currently aligned with Quirk Road.

FACT CHECK: The DNR property on the north side of the Belleville Road Bridge was purchased about 30-some years ago by funds from the MDNR Trust Fund in order to provide recreational access to Belleville Lake. As such, it **cannot** be sold to, gifted to, transferred to, or deeded to a personal property owner, a homeowner's association, or a commercial enterprise, etc.

It can, however, be sold to a Taxing Authority with the approval of the Director of the Department of Natural Resources. The Belleville Area District Library (BADL) became a Taxing Authority for library funding when the Belleville City Council, Sumpter Township Board of Trustees, and the Charter Township Van Buren Board of Trustees approved and signed the District Library Agreement in 2010. The Director of the DNR approved and signed off on the purchase agreement that was negotiated between the DNR and the BADL in May of 2014. The written agreement between the DNR and the BADL

is that the DNR will provide the funding to build the recreational components along the lakeshore of the main library site. The DNR plans to build their recreational amenities in phases.

There is <u>factual</u> information available to everyone regarding the BADL Board's plans for the main and satellite library locations. This information is available at the library and online via the BADL website and includes written and video reports from the very qualified consultants that have been retained by the board over the past four years. In a free society such as ours, I would hope that whether one votes for or against any proposal that one at least <u>knows the facts</u> rather than relying on rumors that have been bandied about.

A little cost here, a little there adds up to a lot

To the Editor:

"Credit is not a dirty word;" at least this was my opening statement to a General Business Class that was just starting the Credit Unit. "It is the ABUSE of credit that creates the stigma of it being an evil creature!" People use credit every day, for water, rent or house payments, electricity, gas heat for our homes, automobile payments, and a myriad of other everyday living expenses. When the amount due is

not paid and the amount due continues to grow and is ignored, we then have an abuse of credit.

The definition of credit is: the commitment of future earnings. This seems pure and simple enough until some individuals consider only the litany of TV hucksters who pander their wares with, "No money down and only \$15.00/month for this \$450 room set." Or, how about: "Buy this car for zero down payment, and only \$199/ month!" Then add the deftness of that sly Visa or Master or Discover card that allows you to charge \$3,500 for only \$10/month? Wow, it's only \$10 here, \$10 there, or \$20 on this card or \$30 on that one. When you only make the minimum payment you are in deep trouble. Even when I watched the reporter on TV talk to some people in Detroit with overdue water bills that started at \$15/month, then \$30, then \$75 until there is a \$1,500 balance due. No attempt to pay the previous small amounts, just "I need water!"

So what does this have to do with the "price of beans?" Well, the panderers of a small amount of the millage for the library are doing the same as those TV hucksters. "...For a home worth \$150,000 and having a taxable value of \$75,000, this would average \$147 a year." My first question is, what 'average?' Is this a mean, median or modal average? Second question, average of what? This is not an average. This is a "would be an additional \$147 a year!" There are 15 listings for real estate in this issue of the Belleville Independent and only ONE is \$150,000, ONE is \$119,900 and ONE is \$139,900; FOUR are \$160,000 or \$165,000 or \$169,900 and ONE is \$189,000. The SEVEN left are listed from \$204,900 (tax increase of \$201/year,) \$225,000 (\$221/YEAR,) \$250,000 (tax increase of \$260/year,) \$259,000 (tax increase of \$254/year,) \$265,000 (tax increase of \$260/year,) \$279,900 (tax increase of \$275/year), and \$350,000 dollars (tax increase of \$343/year.) Again the owners of business buildings will pay their unbalanced share on this one example of a listing at \$795,000 or \$779/year. And these ARE the increased amounts!

We have the schools needing more money for enhancement/operating funds or an additional \$150 a year on that "mythical \$150,000 house." Now some county prison taxes (additional dollars) are heading our way - yes we are in Wayne County - there are the Visteon Bonds (additional dollars) with which to be reckoned; more dollars needed for the replacement of the high school football field that is of the disposable

Then we are all involved with the Detroit mess, especially the distinct possibility of quadrupling of water/sewer rates to adjust for a deteriorated system and millions of dollars in unpaid water usage. Remember, ALL FUNDS be it state, county, township, city, school, and yes, library, come from you the taxpayer. There are no free rides, nobody else footing the bill, just you the little guy struggling to make ends meet, to meet the financial demands of our state and community. Yes, there are needs... but this library is a selfish want!
