## 17-year-old male from Detroit jumps into Belleville Lake, drowns

At 10:10 a.m. last Thursday, the Van Buren Township Public Safety Dive team recovered the body of a 17-year-old male from Belleville Lake.

The teen, from Detroit, had jumped off a boat he was in with his father to go swimming at about 7:44 p.m. the night before and did not resurface, according to a news release by VBT Fire Chief Dan Besson.

The VBT Public Safety Department received multiple 911 calls on the teen missing in the lake between the Denton Road and Belleville Road bridges.

VBT police units, fire apparatus, marine officers, and the dive team were immediately dispatched. Wayne County Sheriff Marine Division and Huron Valley Ambulance were also requested to respond to the location.

VBT officers, working in conjunction with the two police boats on the scene, were able to gather additional information and attempted to establish a last scene point for

the victim in order to begin rescue efforts.

Divers started looking for the missing teen at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday hoping to rescue him and then at 9:48 p.m. gave up for the night citing poor visibility and poor search conditions. Fire Chief Besson said there also were concerns for diver safety. And, as time passed, the rescue operations had become recovery operations.

Crews restarted recovery operations at 6 the next morning and found him at 10:10 a.m. The body was turned over to the Wayne County Medical Examiner for further investigation.

Chief Besson said the victim's name is being withheld at the family's request. He reportedly had just graduated from Osborn High School in Detroit. The Van Buren Public Safety Chaplains provided on-scene support for the family.

## Wayne Disposal official to bring information to Sept. 2 VBT board mtg.

Kerry Durnen, Director of Operations of Wayne Disposal, Inc., will be at the 7 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 2, meeting of the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees to bring information on the radioactive fracking waste being accepted by the company at the VBT landfill.

The announcement that Range Resources, a frack operator in southwest Pennsylvania, was shipping low-level radioactive sludge to VBT was in a front-page story in the Detroit Free Press on Aug. 19, which stirred up local fears.

VBT Supervisor Linda Combs said Durnen has assured the township that disposal of these materials is in full compliance with all rules, regulations and guidelines set forth by the MDEQ and the EPA.

Supervisor Combs said late last week that Durnen will be coming to the next township board meeting to give information, but it will not be in a debate format.

After his presentation, Durnen will answer some questions that people in the audience will submit in written form on cards, Combs said.

The day the Free Press story was published, school board candidate Scott Russell came to the evening meeting of the VBT Board of Trustees to voice his concerns and ask the board to get a court injunction or pass an ordinance to stop the shipment.

"I haven't spoken with one person today who is the least bit OK with this," Russell told the board.

Supervisor Combs told him radioactive fracking waste has been coming to the hazardous waste landfill on the North I-94 Service Drive since the EPA granted it approval on Oct. 1, 2013 and the township was advised of the shipments.

"We have been assured by state and federal authorities that this is safe in this community," Combs said.

She noted in the Free Press story that a man (who lives next door to her, a half mile away from the landfill) is quoted as saying if there are problems, Wayne Disposal won't report them.

"But," she said emphatically, "they do report any problems."

"I think we were accepting low-level radioactive waste from building demolition around a nuclear facility being dismantled quite some time ago," said Trustee Jeff Jahr, who sits on the VBT Environmental Commission.

"They were licensed to do so and it's been quite a while," Jahr said, adding he thinks the facility being demolished was Up North and he thought it had been several vears ago.

"They had public hearings and made everyone aware. It's a federal approval," said Trustee Sharry Budd, concerning the fracking waste approval last year.

#### **Governor convenes panel**

On Monday, Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder announced plans to form a panel of experts to look at the state's standards for disposing of low-level radioactive materials.

The group, which will be established through the state Department of Environmental

## Wayne Disposal puts fracking waste on hold for review by Governor's panel

On Monday, EQ announced it would voluntarily suspend receipt of low-level radioactive waste it was scheduled to accept from a Pennsylvania fracking company for its Wayne Disposal hazardous waste landfill in Van Buren Township until Gov. Rick Snyder's newly announced panel could review receipt of such materials from all oil and gas operations.

Gov. Snyder has not set a time frame for organizing the panel or when it could release its recommendations.

An EQ news release said this step is consistent with Wayne Disposal's practice of obtaining preapproval from the

Quality, will review Michigan's standard and look for improvements to ensure protection of public health and the environment, Snyder's statement said.

The waste product from the fracking is known as "technologically enhanced, naturally occurring radioactive materials," or TENORM. The radioactivity, usually from the metal radium, accumulates from drill cutting, the soil, rock fragments and pulverized material removed from a borehole that may include fluid from a drilling process.

It also can be present in flowback water, which is the brine or other fluid injected into shale formations during fracking that makes its way back to the surface. TENORM can Michigan Department of Environmental Quality for the management and disposal of these wastes.

"Wayne Disposal has worked cooperatively with the MDEQ and the local community for many years and will continue to support a strong working relationship with them based on sound science and transparency," said Simon Bell, Executive Vice President of Operations.

"In this tradition, we look forward to supporting this important regulatory review. We take pride in our proven ability as one of the few companies with the expertise to safely manage this material."

also result from other industrial practices and waste products.

The radioactivity levels of the waste are typically low, often not much higher than naturally occurring, ambient radiation in the environment. But because the levels are elevated, special regulations for disposal of the material are in place.

Since the Free Press story was published, a few people have been picketing the landfill and several political candidates have come out against bringing in fracking waste from out of state.

State Sen. Rick Jones, R-Grand Ledge. announced on Thursday that he plans to introduce legislation to stop companies in

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#### Water Safety Tips from Van Buren Public Safety

To the Editor:

It is very unfortunate that within a week's time we have had two fatalities on Belleville Lake. One involved a 50-year-old working off a dock and the other was a 17-year-old swimming off a boat.

In each case, less than experienced swimmers were not wearing PFD's (Personal Floatation Device) or more commonly known as life jackets, when on or around water.

• Even the best water enthusiasts can misjudge changing water conditions when boating or swimming in open water.

• Be prepared at all times by wearing a life jacket while boating because you'll never know when you'll be tossed into the water.

• Wear a life jacket while working on or near water or if there is a possibility of falling into water.

• Have children wear a life jacket that fits them, and watch them closely around water -- they can go under water quickly and quietly.

The number of drownings is staggering each year on natural bodies of waterways and in pools around the country. Think and be water safe. Never work alone on or near the water and don't swim alone.

other states, such as Pennsylvania, from dumping low-level radioactive waste materials in Michigan landfills.

He said it will degrade the "Pure Michigan" idea and hurt tourism.

State Representatives Diane Slavens, D-Canton, and Douglas Geiss, D-Taylor, said on Thursday that they will be exploring legislative options to ensure the protection of the Great Lakes.

"In the meantime, Gov. Rick Snyder and the Department of Environmental Quality should take administrative measures to make sure Michigan doesn't become our nation's landfill," Rep. Slavens said.

Both Slavens and Geiss are term-limited and seeking seats in the Michigan Senate in November.

Kristy Pagan, Democratic candidate for Slavens' seat, on Thursday called on the Department of Environmental Quality to put an end to out-of-state hazardous waste dumping in Michigan.

"We must do everything we can to maintain the health of our kids, families and seniors here in Belleville. We cannot risk having hazardous waste dumped in our backyard," Pagans said in a news release.

Wayne Disposal is a subsidiary of EQ - the Environmental Quality Company. EQ was purchased in June by USEcology, one of the nation's largest environmental services companies.

The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality in 2006 approved the landfill, located between Willow Run Airport and I-94, to receive TENORM.







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#### <u>Court Updates:</u> Jury trials set Nov. 17 for two accused armed robbers in VBT

A jury trial has been set for 9 a.m., Nov. 17 before Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Catherine L. Heise for Devon Lamar Mayes, 21, and Hyo Sang Rogers, 29, who are accused of the July 11 armed robbery of Montroy Market in Van Buren Township.

A final conference on the charges has been scheduled for 9 a.m., Oct. 3, before Judge Heise.

Each defendant is charged with two counts of armed robbery, two counts of assault, and a weapons charge. They were being held in the Wayne County Jail on bonds of \$100,000 or 10% each.

But at the arraignment on the information at circuit court on Aug. 20, Mayes' bond was reduced to \$50,000/10%, plus a tether.

Rogers, who witnesses said actually held the gun, had his bond continued as set.

**Billy Ray Patrick** 

Billy Ray Patrick, 22, of Belleville is accused of shooting his friend in the face on May 12 over a dispute over marijuana. His final conference was moved from Aug. 22 to Aug. 28 before Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Thomas Cameron. His jury trial is still set for Sept. 8.


Patrick's official charges are: assault with intent to murder, assault with intent to do great bodily harm, felonious assault, and felony firearms.

#### Kenneth William Coskie

The final conference for Kenneth William Coskie, 73, accused of first-degree murder and felony firearm in the shooting death of Eric Williams on July 9 in Van Buren Township, was adjourned by Circuit Court Judge Vera Massey Jones to Sept. 12 at the request of the defense.

Coskie is being held in the Wayne County Jail on \$1 million cash bond.



#### **Belleville Church of God** started in a storefront on Main Street 50 years ago

The Belleville Church of God was first organized in a storefront building on Main Street on May 10, 1958.

It then moved to what was at the time "Irv's T.V" on Sumpter Road. Today, that same building is occupied by "Look Auto Insurance."

In the spring of 1964 the church re-located to its present location. Purchasing at the time two acres on Hull Road the church began construction on a new sanctuary.

The first service was held on Sept. 6, 1964. The oldest tenured member Shirley Shelby recalls such a moment, describing it as a "service filled with excitement and anticipation."

In the late '60s the church added a fellowship hall. In the '70s members built a parsonage and, outgrowing its current facility, made plans to build a new sanctuary. In 1979 the new sanctuary was finished and continues today to serve as the worship center.

In the mid '80s the church looked to the future deciding to purchase an additional 16 acres from "Fruit-off Trucking." In one Sunday evening service the church raised \$125,000 to purchase the land.

Today the church occupies 18 acres and has since added two softball fields, a threecar garage, and a large pavilion.

On Aug. 24 the church celebrated 50 years of ministry at its present location. Today, the Belleville Church of God is home to a diverse ethnic and cross-generational congregation.

"We would love for you to come grow with us," said Pastor Jonathan Fuson. Service times are Sunday morning Sunday School at 10 a.m., followed by worship at 11 a.m., Sunday night services at 6 p.m. and Wednesday classes for all ages at 7 p.m.

## VBT approves personal property tax abatement for NEAPCO

At its regular meeting on Aug. 19, the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees held a public hearing and then unanimously approved a request for a personal property tax exemption for NEAPCO Drivelines.

NEAPCO is located at 6735 Haggerty Road and makes OEM prop shafts and drive shafts.

Assessor Linda Stevenson said they are adding \$25 million in personal property.

They qualify for an 11 year exemption and will pay half of the tax rate, she said.

Trustee Jeff Jahr pointed out since the study for the exemption was done on the company, a proposal was passed by voters and NEAPCO will get 50% abatement of a tax that is being phased out in the next nine years.

Stevenson said that is correct and the tax probably will be phased out before the abatement ends.

NEAPCO has been in VBT since 2007 when it opened a facility with more than 340,000 square feet of manufacturing space, Stevenson said.

At its work/study session the day before, on Aug. 18, the VBT Board discussed the Constellium Automotive USA requests for property tax and personal property tax exemptions, which will come before the board at its Sept. 2 meeting.

Constellium, 6331 Schooner Drive, is seeking a 50%, 12-year property tax abatement for constructing 195,000 more square feet to its building at a cost of \$13,265,000. It is also seeking a six-year, zero personal property tax abatement.


Constellium makes aluminum lightweight auto parts and has a contract with Ford Motor Co. to make crash management systems for its F-150 aluminum pickups. The headcount of employees increases every month, said the vice president and general manager of North America for Constellium, who added they expect to add 200 more employees at the plant. He told the board the engineering is fairly sophisticated and there are more robots moving in the shop than people.

In other business at the 40-minute meeting on Aug. 19, the board:

• Heard Brent Mikulski, president of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education, give an update on test scores ("wonderful things to report... there is some room for improvement"), the balanced budget, setting up three-year maintenance plans, transportation issues (costs going up), energy conservation with 13% reduction in energy costs, etc. Mikulski invited the board to upcoming school open houses, adding, "These are wonderful times in the district";

• Heard Fire Chief Dan Besson announce that three fire fighters had made it through the one-year probationary period and now are full paid-per-call fire fighters: Bronson Campbell, Greg Kowalski, and Stephen Jones. Also, Doug Doty, who was promoted to lieutenant six months ago, completed his six-month probation period. "I was going to have several fire fighters with me tonight, but they are busy with the severe weather," Chief Besson said, adding the fire fighters now will get the badges and helmet shields in a private ceremony instead of in front of the board; and

• Heard Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education member Scott Russell voice his concerns about the low-level radioactive fracking waste coming to the VBT hazardous landfill from Pennsylvania that he read about in that morning's *Detroit Free Press*. He brought copies of the story for each member of the township board.

## Sumpter Planners set Aug. 28 workshop on marijuana dispensaries

On Aug. 14, after discussing for two hours a proposed zoning ordinance amendment to regulate medical marijuana Provisionary Centers (also called dispensaries), the Sumpter Township Planning Commission set a 6:30 p.m. workshop session for Aug. 28 to discuss it further.

The township board will be invited to attend, as well.

The commission hopes to get most of its questions answered before the Sept. 11 public hearing on the new zoning ordinance. The township board is in the process of approving a second, general law ordinance on the dispensaries.

House Bill 4271 is pending at the state level that will require local communities to regulate the dispensaries.

Township attorney Rob Young and Sumpter Police Detective John Toth were present to explain the pair of ordinances being proposed and to answer questions.

Commissioner Matthew Oddy led the questions. He said he has had people come to him who said the growers are intrusive on the neighbors. He visited the location and could smell the marijuana.

He said the big building at the grower's place didn't seem to comply with the township ordinances and there was an issue with dogs. This has been going on for some time, he said.

"We're not doing enough to protect the residents," Oddy said.

He said the property values are sure to go down and the facility looks like Fort Knox.

"It's a big mess," Oddy said.

Det. Toth said he thinks he knows the place Oddy is describing on a dirt road that runs east and west and both the grower and the neighbor have businesses in a residential area.

He said the grower put in \$5,000 worth of filtration since the complaint and he believes there's been an air quality improvement. As to the buildings, all are approved by the township.

Toth said kennels have been approved with air conditioning and fencing and he's been told it's 100% legal. He said there is a separate address because DTE required a separate address for the electricity.

"We're speaking in code here," said attorney Young. "I think the complaints that originated were legitimate complaints on the odors.

"Also, the number of dogs. He was ticketed and we settled it right in court. A kennel license was issue and he assured us a ventilating system would be installed," Young said.

"Nobody's poo-pooing it," Young said. "We're not providing Provisionary Center and punishing our own residents."

Oddy said there was a barn on the second lot.

Deputy Clerk Esther Hurst, who serves as secretary for the planning commission, said the property has two zonings, Residential-2 in front and Agriculture in the back.

Township Trustee Donnie Swinson confirmed that as of the previous Saturday there was an improvement in the air quality at the site.

Oddy continued with questions on that situation and on the ordinances.

"We started with something small ... then provisionary centers," Oddy said. "We already have an ordinance that says you can't sell ... We need to understand the full goal is to better protect the citizens and put the provisional centers in."

Young said he will take the comments he heard that evening and go back and take a look at the proposed ordinance to see if changes need to be made.

Planner Laura Krebs said exclusionary zoning is illegal, so they cannot outlaw the centers.

At the end of the meeting, Oddy said, "I think I hogged the floor. I apologize. I think we needed to let him [Det. Toth] and Rob [Young] know there are some real issues going on in the community."

During the meeting, Det. Toth told how police were advised of an illegal grow a few days earlier. It was a newly acquired home with no certificate of occupancy with a grow in the backyard that was not secure.



Do you own land? If so, has someone from an oil & gas company approached you recently? The correct answer is either yes, or not yet.

Thanks to new "3D" seismic technology and improved extraction techniques such as horizontal drilling and hydraulic fracturing, or "fracking," there is an oil boom in Michigan. Oil exploration companies are revisiting old oil fields in Michigan and exploring for new ones. Agents from these companies have been going door-to-door asking landowners to lease their oil & gas rights to them in exchange for a sign-on bonus and possible royalty payments.

But before you sign a lease and become the next John D. Rockefeller, you need to be aware of what you are signing. The fact is, that when you sign an oil & gas lease you have essentially sold a part of your property.

Oil & gas companies may stress the sign-on bonuses and royalties associated with their leases, but the truth is that most sign-on bonuses are only a few hundred dollars, and royalty payments are based on a well's production. Your share is generally only one-eighth of a well's net income. If this does not deter you, then you should at least negotiate for a more favorable lease agreement that gives you a better return.


