

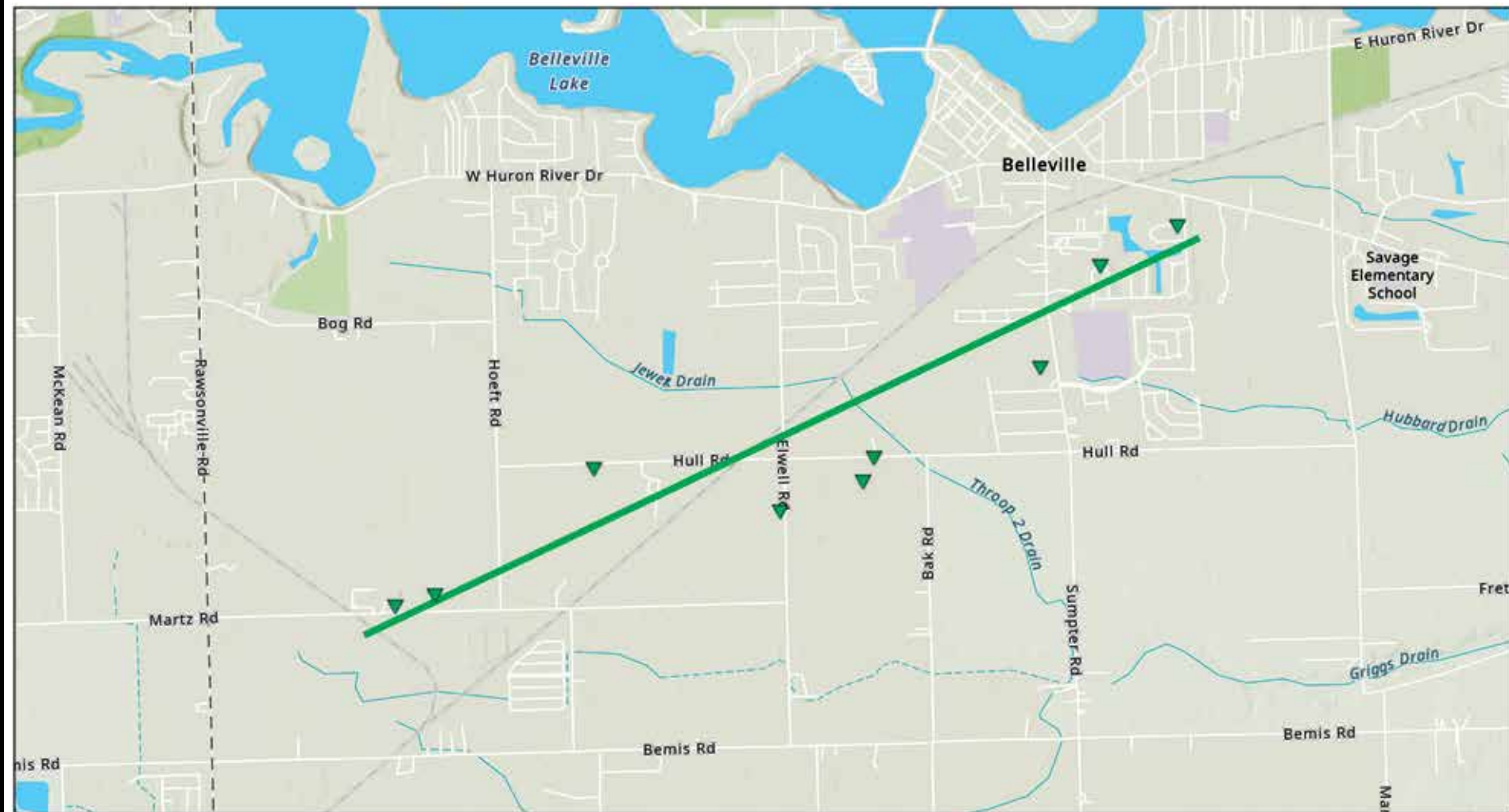

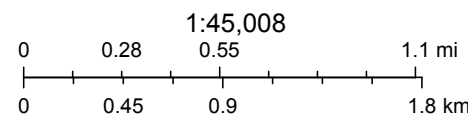

This is the path of the tornado that traveled 3.2 miles, from 5:46 to 5:50 p.m. April 4 at about 48 mph across Van Buren Township and the city of Belleville. It all started when a cold front tracked across southeast Michigan during the late afternoon-early evening hours of April 4, leading to two lines of thunderstorms each producing pockets of damage south of I-94. Despite weak instability, the strongest cells were able to capitalize on low level wind shear near the intersection of the warm front and marine boundary layer, leading to rotation along the line. Storm surveys were conducted in both Whiteford Township (Monroe County) and Van Buren Township (Wayne County). The Monroe County cell was determined to be straight-line wind damage due to a divergent pattern. The Wayne County cell was determined to be an EF-1 tornado based on the damage pattern, radar data, and video evidence. This system also produced heavy rain with widespread storm totals of 1-to-3 inches and localized reports up to 4 inches. This event followed a wet pattern that occurred through the days prior, with widespread 5-day rainfall totals of 3-to-5 inches across much of lower Michigan.



## VBT approves \$1.097 M, plus, for Lakeside Park architecture, eng.

A new Lakeside Park on the former DNR property north of the Belleville Bridge in on track, with bidding set for fall and a final vote scheduled after that for the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees.

At the township’s regular board meeting on April 7, the board approved spending \$1,097,200 for an architectural engineering design contract with Fishbeck Engineering.

Another \$352,400 was approved for a construction administration contract with Fishbeck to do bidding and oversee construction of the park, but that won’t go into effect unless the board approves construction after it gets the final costs following bidding.

A construction management contract was approved, but no amount available until after bidding because it will be a percent of the construction cost.

Elizabeth Renaud, director of community services, laid out the project’s timeline at the meeting, from the original purchase of the property from the Department of Natural Resources in 2017, to a conceptual plan in 2018, and acquisition of the deed in 2019.

She said the township focused on the community center from 2019-24 and now is concentrating on the Lake Park. The park was put into the master plan in 2021.

Environmental studies were begun in 2025, along with public and board engagement.

Renaud said the project includes 110 parking spaces, two major buildings (one with a catering kitchen, restrooms, and meeting rooms), a boardwalk, playground area with a small splash pad, and a central sculpture plaza.

Renaud said supervisor Kevin McNamara said he wanted it to be “a cooler version of Tim Horton’s” as a place to hang out,

“nothing against Tim Horton’s,” she added.

She showed renditions of the proposed construction.

Supervisor McNamara said there was \$3.5 million in the budget for the project. He said if the cost is more than that, the project will be put aside to wait as a “shovel-ready” project and grants will be sought.

In other business at the April 7 meeting, the board:

- Approved the Wayne County Hazard Mitigation Plan as a part of the township’s official plans. The fire chief is charged with supervising the implementation of the plan;

- Approved the supervisor’s reappointments of Helen Wylie, Mary Korgel, and Delores Hogan to the Senior Endowment Committee with terms to expire Feb. 2, 2028;

- Heard trustee Kevin Martin read a proclamation signed by the supervisor recognizing Worker’s Memorial Day;

- Approved having Fisbeck do a study of the township’s existing EQ Basin and approved a Letter of Understanding with Panattoni, the developer, to pay in advance the cost of not to exceed \$130,300. McNamara said since water is to be stored on site at the data center before being released at a certain rate into the South Huron Valley Utility Authority sewer system, this is to assure another location if more space is needed during wet conditions. He said the EQ Basin was built before his time and the township never used it. He said it will be nice to bring it up to standards so it could be used if ever needed;

- Approved the first reading of a zoning ordinance amendment to change the maximum cul-de-sac length in site condominium developments from 1,200 feet to 600 feet. Treasurer Sharry Budd, who sits on the planning commission, said

the planners were concerned about having fire trucks have room to turn around, as well as the safety of the residents. The length will match other cul-de-sac length requirements in other ordinances;

- Approved the first reading of a zoning ordinance amendment on car wash developments, in response to the moratorium on car washes put in effect by the boards. This updated ordinance changes “car wash” to “vehicle wash”, requires a designated drying lane, and keeps vehicle washes at least a half-mile from each other. Because of the overlay district vehicle washes are no longer allowed on Belleville Road north of Tyler. Such developments who have already filed with the township are not affected by this change;

- Approved paying an amount not to exceed \$69,950 to Fishbeck Engineers for professional engineering services related to the Haggery Subdivision Sidewalk Ramp Replacement. McNamara said the replacements will be paid for with the \$412,500 Community Development Block Grant the township received. “We’re getting real lucky in grants,” he said. The project is expected to be done by the end of the year; and

- Heard remarks from five members of the audience, all with negative statements on the data center plans and the township’s “catering to corporate greed.” One charged the board with not following appropriate protocol.

## 'Local News Day' -- Local news matters

I started my journalism career with a typewriter, a notebook and a pretty basic motivation: I wanted to know what was happening in my community, and why.

The typewriter is long gone, replaced by technologies I couldn't have imagined back then. But across Michigan, the curiosity and commitment that brought many of us into journalism in the first place are still there. So is the unshakeable belief that local news matters.

Today is the inaugural Local News Day, a nationwide observance of the role local journalism plays in communities big and small. It's a great opportunity to focus on what this work is really about.

Local journalism helps people understand what's happening around them so they can make informed decisions. That's not a partisan idea.

Everyone benefits from accurate reporting on schools, roads, public safety, taxes, local businesses and the decisions made at city hall and the state Capitol. Communities with strong local news tend to be more connected, more transparent and better prepared to solve problems.

Local reporters show up to meetings most residents can't or don't attend. They dig up records, break down complicated issues and hold institutions accountable. It's often unglamorous and routine work, but it's foundational to civic life.

Mark your calendar for a special event the *Independent* will be having at 6 p.m., Thursday, May 7, at the Belleville Area District Library's Cozadd Rooms. It's all about local newspapers. 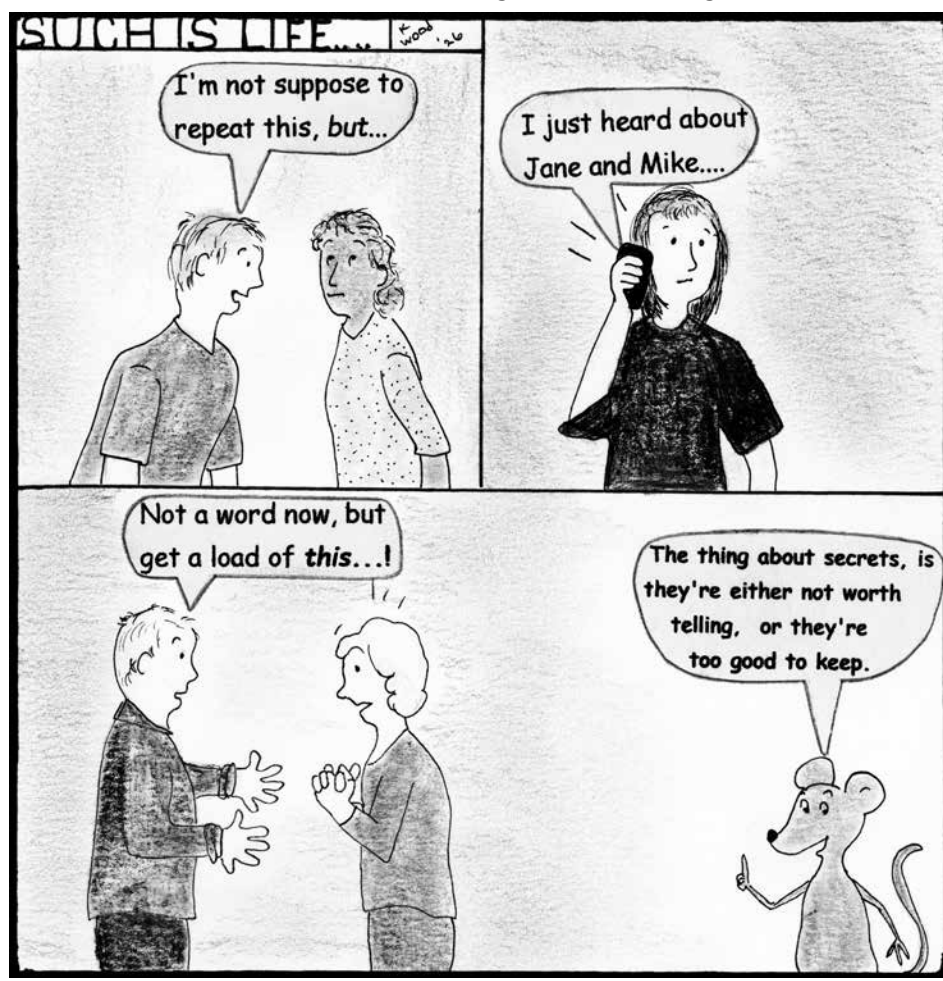
About a year ago, we were getting ready to hang it all up and close the paper because we couldn't sustain it with dwindling advertising, mostly due to social media and people thinking they could get their local news in other ways.

But, a group of people convinced that we need a local paper here wanted to give the non-profit avenue a try and that's what we are doing. This meeting in the library is a step in that direction.

We do want to know what our readers want to see in their local paper. We'll listen to you - face to face. We'll provide more information about the May 7 event in the coming papers.

Chick-fil-A moved some dirt around, but it didn't officially break ground on April 7 as we reported in last week's paper. We had an eye witness to the dirt moving. At a Van Buren Township planning commission meeting the next day, after the *Independent* was already on the presses, we learned that Chick-fil-A had to get one more approval before it could



start construction on its new restaurant on Belleville Road in front of Menard's.

A father of young children said he saw a Washtenaw County SWAT team with weapons drawn raid the house next door to him on West Columbia Avenue in the city of Belleville at about 3 p.m., April 8. This is near Belleville High School.

He said the couple who lived in the house were seated on the grass in front of the house while the team searched, apparently with a search warrant. After a search, they came out and went away. No arrests. The couple's children who often live at that address weren't home.

The young father said he was glad the high school hadn't dismissed yet because the drawn guns could have been a problem for the students. The father said it was a problem for him with his kids next door to the drawn guns. He said he would like to know what that was all about, but there weren't any Belleville officers on the scene. I tried to call the Belleville police chief, but she hasn't returned my call.

Washtenaw Metro SWAT told me it was not involved in this incident.

Van Buren Township police were dispatched at about 8 a.m. Monday, April 6, for a suicidal man who incurred a self-inflicted gunshot wound in the 14000 block of Haggerty Road. When they got there, he was deceased, according to police chief Jason Wright. Neighbors on Savage Road said there were

about six police cars racing down Savage Road toward Haggerty and they wondered what that was all about.

There's a lot of things going on that you can learn about in your local paper. Let us know your questions.

Things are moving right along for the planned demolition of Haggerty Elementary School. The last time someone asked about the fate of the school at a school board meeting, the superintendent said it had not been determined "at this time."

But then last fall the school's bond information for voters included making Haggerty School into a school bus garage and moving the warehouse from Sumpter Road to Haggerty. It was never discussed in public on whether this was a good idea. Maybe board members discussed it privately. Someone made the decision and now things are rushing right along.

In a few weeks the building is expected to be gone and construction of something that's never been shown to the public at a school board meeting will be going up. We're told they will show drawings to the public before too long.

We're disappointed there has not been more transparency.

And it's getting harder to do. Since 2005, roughly 60% of local reporting jobs nationwide have disappeared. Fewer journalists are covering more ground, even as the issues facing communities grow more complex and consequential.

Local journalism also depends on public trust and a shared understanding of how credible news is produced. Media literacy matters. When people can separate verified reporting from rumor or misinformation, public debate improves. When they understand how journalists verify information and correct mistakes, confidence in responsible news organizations grows.

## School district prepares to tear down Haggerty Elementary School

At Monday's meeting of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education, the board approved putting up a fence that is part permanent and part temporary as the district moves forward in the demolition of Haggerty Elementary School.

It approved the base bid of \$79,854 from RMD Holdings, LTD, of Richmond, MI, doing business as Nationwide Construction Group, low bidder of three. RMD was also low bidder for two additional proposed alternates bringing the total project to \$98,619.

Base bid from Davenport Brothers Construction was \$170,850 and Future Fence Company was \$102,430.

Rob Kakoczki of Plante Moran Realpoint

said they will start installing the fence the week of April 27 and begin work on abatement and demolition the first week in May.

Kakoczki said as part of the new Operations Building site, they identified the need to secure the property in advance of abatement and demolition.

Permanent fencing will be installed in select areas where it will not be impacted by construction, while temporary fencing will be used around the primary construction zones to maintain safety and site security, he said.

He said once site work is complete and the building is enclosed, temporary fencing will be removed and the remaining

permanent fencing will be installed.

The cost of that new permanent fencing will be a part of a new contract for construction.

The board also was presented with the information on Haggerty School hazardous materials abatement and demolition of the building.

Kakoczki said there were 16 bids for the work and the team reviewing the bids recommended Thomas Trucking Services, for both abatement and demolition. Thomas was low bidder on both, as well as an alternative.

Kakoczki said there is a tunnel under the school for pipes and it is known to contain asbestos. He said the plan is to demolish the school and then get into the tunnels for abatement. He said after abatement, they plan to remove the first three inches of soil and take it to a hazardous waste landfill, and if it is still contaminated, they will take off another three inches and then another three inches after that, if necessary.

He said the removal of the soil would cost \$25,000 for each three inches, for a total of \$75,000 if needed.

He said it is expected to take a month for abatement and the demolition would be in June.

The school board will vote on this at its next meeting.

Reg Ion, grandfather of a student, tried to ask questions from the audience during the presentation but School Supt. Pete Kudlak cut him off and said he had to fill out a card before he could speak under public comment.

Ion took a card to the board table and later he was allowed to comment.

Ion, who retired from the district as head custodian, said abatement and demolition shouldn't be from the same firm because that might lead to problems. Also, he said, the district had prepared a book for each school showing what hazardous materials are in the buildings. The district should look at the book for Haggerty, he said.

Ion stressed, "Normally, they don't do it right," he said of hazardous waste removal.

Ion also asked what is in the building and anything inside should be put up for auction or sale to the taxpayers. He said that when Belleville High School was demolished, people saw desks and chairs and other school equipment shoved into dumpsters. He said that shouldn't happen with Haggerty School and the items should

be offered to the taxpayers.

Supt. Kudlak's answer to Ion was, "I'll give you a call."

In other business at the 55-minute meeting on April 13 the board:

- Honored coaches and a few students in the BHS winter sports program;

- Approved sale of the 2026 School Building and Site Bonds, series 1, approved by voters, to R. Seelaus & Co., LLC, which was one of nine bidders. Seelaus offered a purchase price of \$24,999,224.81, the par value of the bonds, plus an original issue premium of \$662,200.70, less the Underwriter's discount of \$97,941.24, less the original discount of \$240,034.65. The bonds shall be issued at \$24,675,000 and put into the capital projects fund. Now the bond transaction will go to its closing;

- Approved spending \$254,830 from the '26-'27 Sinking Funds for 850 student Chromebooks from Shei Computing. These Chromebooks are for incoming fifth graders at Owen Intermediate School and incoming freshmen at Belleville High School. Supt Kudlak said they got \$100 off each Chromebook if they acted before a certain date;

- Received information on the BHS HS4 Security Access Control project that will be voted on at the next board meeting. Total cost is \$1,198,839. Kakoczki said that there were only two bids, one for installation by Laforce at \$1,790,979 and one from Osier Electric at \$1,875 for the electrical hookups. This will be completed from May through August and it is part of the bond program already in the budget;

- Approved the retirements of Owen special education teacher Debbie Gerst after 21 years of service; BHS math teacher Rachel Jager after 26 years; Savage teacher/media specialist Pamela Bradley after 28 years; and Edgemont teacher/art teacher Kathleen Hiner after three years;

- Approved the resignations of BHS history teacher Patrick Burrage after three years of service and Early Childhood Center teacher Molly Stevens after less than a year;

- Approved the employment of speech pathologist Courtney Schweers at Tyler Elementary School as of May 11;

- Approved the terminations of McBride food service worker LaLexus Woodard-Rumbley after 1.5 years of service and Rawsonville paraprofessional Tonya Charlesworth after three years of service;

- Approved the retirement of BHS food service worker Yevonne Hochbaum after

Jessica Kaba and her son Eddie, 13, woke up just before 7:30 a.m., Saturday, April 11, to the sounds of a fire in their home on Roger Avenue in Town and Country Mobile Home Estates.

The park is located at 51005 Old Michigan Ave. in Van Buren Township, said fire chief David McNally, who was out of state at the time.

The two made it out of the home along with one of their cats. Their other cats were unaccounted for.

clothes on their backs. They suffered some smoke inhalation so they were taken to a hospital for treatment. A GoFundMe page has been set up to help them with basic needs.

Deputy fire chief Andy Lenaghan said the cause of the fire is under investigation, but it has been determined where it started. He said there was slight damage to the trailers on two sides of the burning home, with some melted siding.

He said the department got the call between 7:30 and 7:45 a.m. and they extinguished the blaze. Crews left the scene about 10 a.m. Deputy Lenaghan said Van Buren Township Fire Department was assisted by fire departments from Ypsilanti Township and Canton Township.

"The guys did a real good job," he said of the way the fire fighters hooked up the hoses.

# Belleville council sells Savage Rd. property to neighbor for \$300,000

At its regular meeting on April 7, the Belleville City Council accepted the \$300,000 cash offer from Savah Rabiah of Blue Sky Cannabis Co. for the property at 420 Savage Rd. the city was selling next door to his business.

Rabiah's purchase offer was without concessions, but a 3' x 20' piece of property between the parklands and the city's DPW yard was discussed. It once was a landlocked easement and part of the city's old skatepark was on that property.

Rabiah bought his property in 2017 with that extra piece attached. He offered that the city would be able to use that property.

Moving the Mitten broker/owner Therese Antonelli reported that the city could get a survey but that would cost from \$1,000 to \$1,500.

She said the other two offers on the property were \$125,000 cash with no contingencies from Davenport Brothers and \$400,000 with contingencies from Rajan Sucariya, that involved site plan approval.

When the sale first came up on the agenda at the meeting, mayor pro-tem Kelly Bates was presiding because the mayor was absent. Also, councilman Jeremiah Beebe was late and not yet present. That left three sitting on the council.

Mayor-pro-tem Bates put the agenda item aside until Beebe could arrive after she could not get a motion to postpone to another meeting so the mayor could be present and there was a full council. The bare quorum at that point was Bates and council members Randy Priest and Julie Kissel.

When Beebe arrived at 6:44 for the 6:30 p.m. meeting, Bates reintroduced the property sale.

She said she would like to postpone the vote until the mayor could be present, as the council had done in the past on other important items so a full council could make the decision.

But, councilwoman Kissel insisted on voting on it immediately.

Interim city manager Steve Jones pointed out the Rabiah offer was the highest with no contingencies.

The vote to accept the \$300,000 offer was unanimous.

Jones said that amount would be put into the city treasury and the land would bring in taxes. It was noted that this was just the sale of the property and the council was not voting on the use of it.

In other business, the council:

- Approved use of Horizon Park on May 12 for dedication of a Wings statue to honor the late Harper Mathis, who died at the age of 15 last year after a battle with brain cancer. High Street will be closed, food trucks allowed, trash barrels placed. A plaque will be installed six feet to the side so it doesn't interfere with people taking pictures of themselves with the statue, which is heat-treated stainless steel wings made by a blacksmith/artist in Sumpter Township. The Mathis family, which lives on High Street, were present at the meeting, along with Chris Donley who raised the \$13,000 and arranged for the sculpture;

- Approved the Hagerman/Poley wedding ceremony at 2 p.m. May 17 at Horizon Park. The mother of the bride said it will be a small, brief wedding;

- Held a public hearing of one minute at which nobody spoke and then approved the second reading and final adoption of the updated Fire Code;

- Approved the FEMA Wayne County Hazard Mitigation Plan. Public safety director Kris Faull said the county has been working on the plan for the last few years and now it is ready to be adopted;

- Approved a resolution to straighten out mis-numbered resolutions in the records. Clerk/treasurer Briana Papin said deputy clerk Michelle Bellingham found five mis-numbered resolutions in the 2024 records. The city attorney was contacted and the

attorney recommended a transparent and procedurally sound approach, formally amending and re-numbering the affected items;

- Approved unanimously the Waterworth water rate study, at a cost of \$6,500 a year, as proposed at a recent meeting. Plante Moran proposed a water rate study at a flat

rate not to exceed \$18,000;

- Approved a rain garden for the Hillside Cemetery entrance area near the Angel of Hope in cooperation with Van Buren Township. This was proposed by the Huron River Watershed Council. DPW director Nathan Johnson said the only cost to the

city would be some drainage pipes;

- Approved a resolution to accept the city attorney's confidential recommendation and reverse a prior FOIA disclosure denial for case No. 26-0684 and authorize release of redacted records consistent with the Michigan Freedom of Information Act. Director Faull said the police department denied a FOIA, but the prosecutor denied prosecution on that case. The requestor appealed the denial to the head of the city council, as allowed under FOIA, and it was reviewed by the attorney who recommended to grant it with redactions and to reduce the price of the FOIA. Redacted will be personally identifying information of minors, sensitive witness information, and any other exempt material permitted by law;

- Heard Jones say that this could be called "Hell Week" because city hall will be moving to its new location at 330 Charles St. City hall will be closed Thursday and Friday, April 9 and 10, and also closed on Monday, April 13, and then reopened at its new location on April 14. "It's been a long process ... and it's something to be proud of ... more efficient," Jones said. He said at the new city hall there are added amenities on the police side, such as a bathroom and shower which they never had before. "We're almost there." He praised the work of councilwoman Kissel who has been purging city hall of unneeded items for two and a half years. He said at the April 20 council meeting they will set an open house; and

# VBT planners suggest denial of special land use for car wash, restaurant

After more than an hour of discussion at its regular meeting on April 8, the Van Buren Township Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend to the township board denial of special land use for a car wash and drive-through restaurant on Belleville Road south of Westlake Apartments.

The Township Board of Trustees will consider the commission's recommendation at an upcoming meeting.

The commission stated the reason for denial was because the plans do not meet requirements in the ordinance.

The preliminary site plan for the project at 10525, 10501, and 10401 Belleville Rd. also was on the agenda for approval. Action on that request was postponed by the commission by a unanimous vote. The site plan request depends on what the township board votes to do with the special land use request. The site plan needs approval of the special land use to move forward.

The project was requested by El Car Wash MI Belleville LLC to construct a 4,640 square foot facility to provide express (automatic) exterior automobile wash services and self-serve vacuuming, along with a 5,667 square foot building comprised of one retail and two restaurant tenant spaces, including one offering drive-through service.

At the public hearing on the special land

use request, three people spoke against allowing another car wash on Belleville Road, including Mike Suliman, co-owner and builder of Auto Works car wash nearby on Belleville Road. Another person speaking against the new car wash was a property owner who said his property abuts the project and he had concerns about noise and privacy.

Former Van Buren Township fire chief Brad Traskos, who now lives in Sumpter Township, said he believes there are

enough car washes in Van Buren Township. Later, he questioned whether the fire department's 100' tower truck to reach the commercial building's second story could get in with these plans.

Ron Akers, director of municipal services, said three letters against the project were included in commissioners' packet and commissioners indicated they had read the letters.

Dave Shook of El Car Wash said the company was founded in 2011 in Miami and now has 100 locations. It decided to expand in 2022 and now have five in Michigan and 30% are employee owned. He expects 10 more open soon and 20 by

the end of 2027. He said 90% of the water from the car wash is reused and the business is state-of-the-art and environmentally friendly. He said 40% of the project is open space with landscaping. El is investing \$16 million in the project.

When asked, he said it takes about 90 gallons per car for the car wash and there are from 400 to 500 cars daily. A new right turn lane on northbound Belleville Road is part of the plan.

Treasurer Sharry Budd, who sits on the planning commission, said there are problems with traffic on Belleville Road and that is not a good location. Others joined her in questions about the traffic

and whether this business -- no matter how good it is -- is in the wrong location.

In other business at the two-and-a-half-hour meeting on April 8, the commission:

- Held a public hearing at which no public spoke on a zoning ordinance text amendment to change the language of approval for prior consecutively approved firework stand/tents. The commission had asked for the change, since groups have had to come before them for the exact same approval for the exact same request, year after year. The commission approved recommending the amendment to the township board. If this is approved by the board, the requests can be approved administratively, if there have been no problems in the past;

- Passed on a 5-1 vote final site plan approval for US Signal Properties, LLC, to continue phased construction of its data center at 9275 Haggerty Rd. The company had complied with the commission's requests on noise protection by putting a sound wall around the chillers, producing a sound study, and getting the rate letter from DTE. Commissioner Jackson Pahle voted no on the motion, after some questions. He has said in the past he is against all data centers;

- Approved an amended site plan for Project Venture (on property owned by Wayne County Airport Authority) at 6845 Denton Rd., which is the land on the north side of Ecorse Road, south of Van Born Road, east of Denton and west of Beck. The amendment added masonry and revised the height of the guardhouse off the main entrance drive by a few inches, changing the footprint. Because of the size expansion it had to come to the commission instead of being administratively approved. The developers were not present because director Akers said it is family owned and this was Passover week;

- Discussed for half an hour the problems developers are having with the Hotel Development Ordinance and its height limitations. I-94 Group and GAV & Associates said they will seek a variance with the Board of Zoning Appeals, as they have had to do at other municipalities throughout the state for their hotel buildings. They plan to build two more

# Belleville planners approve new city Master Plan, send it to council

At its regular meeting on April 9, the Belleville Planning Commission unanimously approved the 2026 city Master Plan and sent it on to the city council for final approval.

This was after a public hearing on the plan at which there were no public comments on the plan. The Independent was the only person in the audience.

Councilwoman Julie Kissel, who as commission vice-chairperson was chairing the meeting, said there were no questions from the public on the final document.

Absent from the meeting were chairman

Jim Courage and commissioners Raytheon Martin and Mark Kowalski. Also absent was interim city manager Steve Jones.

A synopsis of the Master Plan was presented by Andy Aamodt, senior planner at Giffels Webster of Birmingham, and Ava Miller, staff planner at the firm.

They said the Master Plan work kicked off in August of 2024 and finally got to today's public hearing and consideration of final adoption.

Councilwoman Kissel said they will bring the Master Plan to the city council at its April 20 meeting for approval.

Aamodt said state law puts the Master Plan in the hands of the planning commission, but if they want to send it on to the city council that is OK. He said the resolutions of adoption from both the planning commission and the city council will be printed in the Master Plan.

Aamodt said they may not see the Giffels Webster representatives at the council meeting, because their contract is over with the vote of the commission.

It was noted interim city manager Jones, who was absent from this meeting, may want to have them at the council meeting and he could arrange for that, if necessary.

In other business at the half-hour meeting, the commission:

- Heard a report from Kissel on the March subcommittee meeting of the tri-community planning commission. She said the three planning commissions meet together mainly to report on their activities.

hotels on the North I-94 Service Drive next to the hotels they already own. The township's maximum height for a building is 40'/four stories, but builders using wood frames can only get three stories with the spaces required between floors. The ordinance allows 50' buildings if they put a terrace on the top, but the builders said that causes an insurance problem for them, with the winter weather and winds that blow chairs. Setbacks also are a problem. Planning consultant Lauren Sykes of McKenna Associates and the township staff will look at the ordinance to see if it should be changed;

• Learned the April 22 commission meeting will have on its agenda substation data for the data center project. The commission also was informed that Camping World and Tractor Supply are having grand openings and Chick-fil-A started moving dirt around this week and will take about 20 weeks to complete its construction in front of Menard's on Belleville Road.

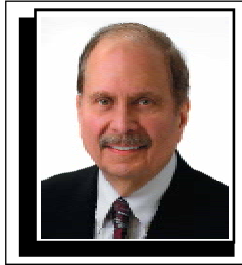
