Lori Day, Pete Pitzen to serve as Grand Marshals for parade

Lori Day of Van Buren Township and Pete Pitzen of Belleville will serve as the Grand Marshals of Belleville's Memorial Day parade at 10 a.m. Monday, May 25.

The parade steps off from the Belleville High School parking lot at 10 a.m. and proceeds to Five Points and then up Main Street to Roys.

The Memorial Day ceremony, put on by the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Polish Legion of American Veterans, follows the parade at the Veterans Memorial on High Street.

Lori Day served in the United States Navy Reserve for 11 years in the Nurse Corps. She entered in 1979 as a Lieutenant JG and received officer training at Pensacola, FL.

She was attached to a fleet hospital unit and drilled regularly at Selfridge Air Force Base, MI and had numerous active-duty assignments, including Naval Station Great Lakes, IL; Bethesda Hospital, MD; Pearl Harbor, Hawaii; and Naples, Italy. She rose to the rank of Lieutenant Commander on

Sept. 1, 1995 and received an honorable discharge on Dec. 18, 2000.

Day said she thoroughly enjoyed her time in the military and feels it is an honor and a privilege to have served our country. She still takes seriously her Oath of Office to support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic.

She is an active member of the Polish Legion of American Veterans post in Belleville.

Peter Pitzen

After graduating from high school in 1954, Peter Pitzen enlisted in the Army on Aug. 10, 1954. He was sent to Fort Leonard Wood, MO for basic training and after graduating was sent to Fort Knox, KY. There he took 16 weeks training for radio repair.

After graduating, he was immediately sent

to Bad Hersfeld, Germany with the 3rd, Bn., 14th A/C, performing Border Patrol during the Cold War. That is where he spent the rest of his Army career prior to discharge in July, 1957.

While serving in Germany, Pitzen was the Chief Radio Repairman for the battalion, and after solving an issue with decoding a classified message, he also was assigned as Message Center Chief. When his tour of duty ended in July, 1957, he was discharged as Specialist 2nd Class and returned to the U.S. classified as inactive reserve.

Returning home to Fort Wayne, IN, it didn't take too long before Pitzen met his first wife, got married, and fathered three children. Finding that his finances were running low, a friend talked him into joining the Indiana Air National Guard's 122 Fighter Squadron, so he could earn an income with monthly meetings and a two-week summer camp. Prior to the first meeting in October, 1961, President John F. Kennedy activated the Indiana Air National Guard during the Berlin Crisis and Pitzen

was sent to Chambley Air Base in France.

About four months into his time in France, he was informed of a serious personal

family problem and was given a leave to return to the states. In the U.S. he was reassigned to the 305 Bombardment Wing, at Bunker Hill AFB, Indiana. There he primarily operated B-58 Hustler Bombers and the KC-135 Tankers.

He spent the rest of active duty with the Air Force until Aug. 20, 1962.

After one year of service, President Kennedy de-activated his unit and Pitzen returned to Air National Guard status. Being a single father raising three children, he resigned from the ANG with an honorable discharge as Sgt. E5 and returned to civilian life.

He is an active member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars post in Belleville.

School board considers \$143,961 band tower for BHS football field

A 31-foot-tall band tower for the Belleville High School football field was described at Monday's meeting of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education.

The project cost of \$143,961 will be up for approval at the May 26 regular meeting. Recommended bidders are Field Towers LLC to supply the tower at \$84,374 and Davenport Brothers to supply the concrete foundation (\$34,350) and install it (\$7,548).

The band tower was part of the 2025 bond program. Consultant Rob Kakoczki of Plante Moran Realpoint, said the band tower was to support the marching band and performing arts program.

"Currently, the district does not have a

dedicated band tower structure, limiting visibility, communication, and operational efficiency during practices, performances and events," according to information provided in the board packet.

"The new band tower will provide a safe, elevated platform for directors and staff to effectively oversee rehearsals and performances while improving coordination and instruction for student participants. The addition of this structure will enhance the overall functionality of the marching band program and support continued student involvement in extracurricular activities," the information said.

Kakoczki said there are four viewing platforms, at 12 and 20 feet and 8 and 16

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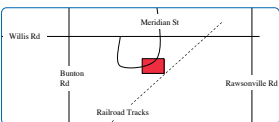

Community considers future of its hometown newspaper

Some 70 people gathered at the downtown library May 7 for “a meeting about keeping your local newspaper.”

It’s a challenge that has two big parts.

The opening *ante* is financial. Doug Peters is a retired attorney and a volunteer consultant to the *Belleville-Area Independent* on this matter. He calculated

Harry Van Gelder that “\$135,000 is what we spent last year. I expect that we need at least \$100,000 to \$175,000 [on top of that] to operate at the same level, with new people.”

In May of 2025, Editor Emeritus Rosemary K. Otzman and Advertising Manager Janet Millard filed with the State of Michigan to create the “Belleville Area Newspaper Foundation,” a domestic nonprofit corporation. Bryon Kelley, Elena Manalp, Barbara Miller, Sharon Peters, and Harry Van Gelder have since joined them to begin formation of a requisite oversight board.

Through year-end, they focused on securing 501(c)3 status, which gives access to grant funding. Ownership of the newspaper is transferring to that foundation, with no money having changed hands, making it in effect a donation — which is permitted by law.

As the potential of what that *could* mean begins to unfold, the question of *should* this newspaper even continue at all moved to the center of the formal program on May 7. This second big part of the challenge at-hand was introduced by Elena Manalp in a guest editorial published earlier that day in



the *Independent*.

“This paper brings together our three communities and gives them a shared identity,” she wrote. At the meeting itself, both Belleville Mayor Ken Voight, in absentia, and Van Buren Township Supervisor Kevin McNamara added municipal-voice encouragements to that assertion, each aiming to include Sumpter Township as an indispensable part of the tri-community.

Acting as meeting host, Harry Van Gelder introduced the feature speaker, Hayg Oshagan of Wayne State University.

Building upon what had been shared by elected officials, he cited research into recent closures of local papers in Seattle and Denver. Data pointed to direct correlations with “less people joining the PTA, less neighborhood watches, [and] less active civic organizations,” he said. “A paper isn’t just ‘reporting’ on things, it’s *creating* community engagement.”

On top of that, when newspapers go under, “corporate violations go up, too — by something like 10 to 15%, in just raw numbers of dollars, whether it’s air pollution, or whether it’s corporate malfeasance. Even if the paper is not doing investigative reporting, just the mere presence of a paper in a community makes [businesses] a little bit more careful about doing things the way they *should* be done.”

He framed this as “identity based on place

“The alternative -- when you don’t have a paper -- is ‘group’ identity. ‘I belong to *this* group’ or ‘I belong to *that* group.’ *Group* identity is much more polarizing. Because people *reject* ‘other groups.’ But identity based on where we live *unites* people. We’re all somehow similar, even if our

groups are different -- even if our races are different, even if our genders are different, our economic class is different -- we’re all from *here*.

“You take that away, and people no longer see what the rest of Belleville is doing, and they no longer feel part of a broad community, and people begin to become part of their own ‘in-group.’ That leads to polarization, and we’ve seen [where that leads elsewhere] in America.”

The authority of his assessments was underpinned by the fact that Dr. Oshagan is also founder and chair of New Media Michigan. Its mission is to raise visibility and strengthen ethnic media throughout the Great Lakes State: In other words, constituencies based on *group identities*.

At the close of that presentation, the floor was opened to discussion. From his seat

among those in the audience, Doug Peters offered “to share a little more information” on *Belleville-Area Independent* operations week to week. The “paper has been subsidized by Rosemary [and] I think the transition period is going to be difficult, because the paper has not built-up resources.”

As the meeting wound to a close, several other voices in the room variously asked about the viability of pursuing mandates or protections out of Lansing in support of surviving local media. References were made to subsidies along the lines of the “California Civic Media Program.”

Dr. Oshagan discouraged such wishes, saying it takes a strong political push to accomplish. “Whatever else that could come, this newspaper still has to run like a business.”

First fund-raising event set July 16 for new newspaper foundation

Master of ceremonies at the May 7 meeting to discuss the *Independent* was Harry Van Gelder, who also is a member of the nonprofit Belleville Newspaper Foundation board.

He said the foundation’s first fundraiser will be held on Thursday, July 16, from 6-8 p.m. at the Belleville Yacht Club. He mistakenly said there would be an “open bar,” but that is not so. The bar will be open to those willing to pay.

Janet Millard at the *Independent* has tickets to the fundraiser for \$50 each.

Doug Peters, who has dedicated his legal expertise to help the *Independent* become non-profit, said the transition period will be difficult, but there are donors who have committed to three to five years of donations and that is a good goal.

VBT denies special land use for car wash, drive-thru eatery

The Van Buren Township Board of Trustees unanimously denied special land use permits for El Car Wash and an accompanying drive-thru restaurant at 10525 Belleville Rd., next to Westlake Apartments.

This was at the board’s regular meeting on May 5.

The planning commission had considered the requests for special land use, recommended that the township board deny the requests. Special land use is needed for the project to be built, so the township board’s denial shuts down the development.

Trustee Kevin Martin read the prepared motion on the issue and it took almost 15 minutes to read. Treasurer Sharry Budd,

who also is the board liaison to the planning commission, seconded the motion to deny, which was unanimously approved.

The reasons for denial were stated in detail in the motion and they are reported verbatim in the official minutes of the meeting which start on page 16 of today’s *Independent*.

El Car Wash attorney Jeff Schlusel said the municipality must approve the special land use. He went through the nine standards in the ordinance, saying the multi-tenant development complies with all the requirements.

Schlusel is a noted land-use and zoning attorney at Carson Fischer law firm in Bloomfield Hills.

In other business in the May 5 meeting, the board:

- Heard a 10-minute presentation by Third

Circuit Court Judge Charise Anderson, who said the court is reaching out to communities in Wayne County to tell them what they do to provide justice. She had given her presentation the night before at the Belleville City Council meeting. Judge Anderson said she is willing to come to speak to a club or a classroom and all they have to do is call her;

- Heard clerk Leon Wright say that Monday was International Fire Fighters Day and he wanted to thank fire fighters for their courage and commitment and he wanted to make sure they are never taken for granted;

- Heard trustee Donald Boynton read a proclamation on Apraxia Awareness, naming May 14 as Apraxia Awareness Day in Van Buren Township. Ashley Shukait of

EXTRA THINGS I KNOW

A roomful of supporters of this newspaper turned out last Thursday for our meeting at the Belleville Area District Library. It was good to see so many from our community who understood how important it is to have someone watching government on their behalf.

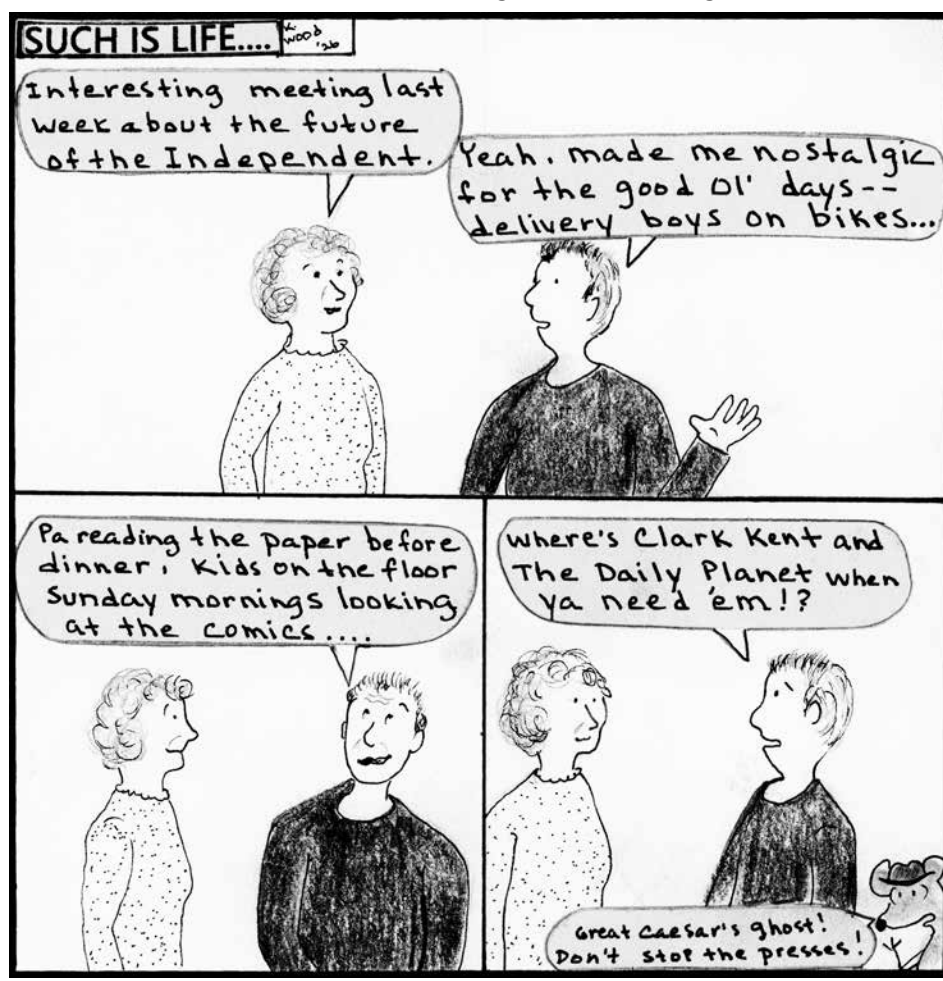
Gary Marshall said at the end of the meeting, "The *Belleville-Area Independent* is the eyes and ears of the community." That's what we've tried to be.

Professor Hayg Oshagan from Wayne State University noted the survival of our paper depends on Belleville residents caring about its newspaper. He said the community had to trust the paper. He had lots of information to share and then he offered to help us.

We were happy to have some of those who chipped in with their hard-earned cash at the beginning of the *Independent's* life to get the newspaper going more than 30 years ago and then stood by over the years to support the paper.

I introduced them: Jeannie Wilder, Lee Herrmann, Bob Stoner, and Barbara Miller. Jeannie noted, "I'm grateful I've been able to deliver the *Independent* for more than 30 years." Each Wednesday, Jeannie is one of our delivery drivers that shows up in the alley and carries off bundles of papers to deliver to business locations.

Many of our original investors have died



over the years and three died in 2025.

We received some complaints about a homeless encampment in the open area between the Presbyterian Church on Belleville Road, behind the post office, and down to the apartments on Quirk Rd. They said there were bonfires at night and people came out and bothered the apartment tenants asking for money.

We asked a police officer, who said there was no one there and then said there were two families near the apartments, but they didn't bother anybody.

We passed our question on to Deputy Police Chief Joshua Monte. He replied: "I happened to be out checking on a potential 5K route for the Education Foundation when I saw your email, so I went over to the apartments to take a look. I located a path along the fence off Lake Villa Drive in the Belle Pointe Apartments that leads east toward Belleville Road. I followed the well-worn dirt path through the woods behind the Presbyterian Church, Post Office, and Urgent Care. The wooded area opens up behind the Urgent Care; however, I saw no evidence of any type of encampment in that area. The path ultimately leads out to Belleville Road."

Also, we got a report of woman's body being found on Belleville Road at I-94 and so, he answered that question, as well: "I'm typically notified by shift command of any suspicious death in the township and had

not heard of anything related to this. I also checked our electronic records and found no reports involving a deceased female. I contacted Chief McNally to see whether he had any knowledge of the fire department responding to a deceased female at I-94 and Belleville Road yesterday [May 6], and he was unaware of any such incident."

We appreciate all the effort involved to answer our readers' questions. Thank you, Chief Monte.

We are advised that Southern Railroad will be completing railroad crossing improvements at two locations during the week of May 18, resulting in temporary road closures in both Van Buren Township and Romulus.

On Thursday, May 14, (today) road resurfacing will close the I-94 Service Drive westbound between Belleville and Haggerty roads between 4 and 8 a.m. After 8 a.m. eastbound traffic will be allowed, but westbound traffic will be closed.

Motorists are encouraged to use alternate routes and expect delays in the area during construction.

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Spring Has Sprung!

Belleville DDA considers selling hardware store, is seeking proposals for use

The Belleville Downtown Development Authority committee considering what to do about the vacant hardware store at 458 Main St. that the DDA purchased, has decided it should be sold.

At the DDA's regular meeting April 15, committee chairperson Whitney Beaubien reported that the "Wherehouse," as it has been dubbed, has been discussed at length at several committee meetings and the committee is recommending the listing and selling of the property. The committee has reached out to a Realtor who will meet with it next week to get the sale in motion, if the whole DDA board agreed.

The property would be listed at the beginning of May on the general market, Beaubien said. The Realtor has paid for a property appraisal which would be presented at the upcoming committee meeting to help set a price, Beaubien said.

She said the committee decided that continuing to invest DDA funds in this property is not a proper use of its resources. She said removing the monthly expenses for this building can help provide funds for a full-time DDA director.

Beaubien said they could go out for proposals to see how those interested would use the building and what the community wants. She said the DDA is in place to attract retail, restaurants, and other businesses that would keep people coming back and walking Main Street.

DDA vice chairman Chris Donley asked if the DDA could deny buyers based on what they want to do with the property.

Beaubien said they will check with the city attorney. She said they want to put it on the market and evaluate proposals.

Donley asked if the DDA could consider a longterm lease and Beaubien replied, "We want to free up out debt." She said the DDA has a land contract on the property with a balloon coming up in the next couple of years.

She said interim city manager/DDA director Steve Jones now is managing the property, collecting rent from the tenants on Fifth Street, and acting as landlord.

DDA member Phil Miller, who joined the meeting 17 minutes late, said an RFP can tell the DDA what someone wants to do and that

person would do a dog-and-pony show on their plans.

Miller said the DDA could set up ways to manage debt and with a lease agreement the DDA could control use of the property. He said there are advantages to both ways, but at the top is a long-term lease. He said a RFP is not a real estate function. It is administrative, he said.

Beaubien said to Miller, "You're on the committee and you missed two meetings." She said he should have discussed his ideas at the committee level instead of attacking the committee's recommendation at this meeting.

Miller said he had been out of state for two weeks.

DDA treasurer Sabrina Richardson-Williams made a motion to go for a RFP, but there was no second, as discussion continued.

Beaubien said retail and restaurants would bring people into the community on a regular basis. She said she is not opposed to developing with 50% retail and 50% office space. She said they want people walking on the street.

Miller explained details of land contracts and preserving the value of the building.

Richardson-Williams suggested putting the property on the market and getting RFPs to get an idea of what will be done with the property.

She said they should move forward because now all they are doing is talking to each other.

Beaubien said the DDA should work with the city council to implement something in our city for a tax stepup.

Miller said any increase in taxes would come to the DDA.

"We came up with a recommendation," Beaubien repeated.

Miller said there are ways to structure a proposal so the one leasing the property could be the first buyer of choice if the DDA decides to sell.

Beaubien made a motion to allow the committee to do an RFP and then be allowed to list the property.

"I've wasted six weeks on this," Beaubien said. "If you opposed it, you should have been there to talk about it," she said to Miller.

The DDA voted unanimously to go out for RFPs. Chairman John Winter said they could get RFPs and then hold a special meeting to approve listing.

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Library to memorialize Alma Hughes-Grubbs with art scholarship

People have donated money to the Belleville Area District Library in memory of the late library board member Alma Hughes-Grubbs, who died Jan. 7.

At the April 14 meeting of the library board, library director Mary Jo Suchy said she consulted with Hughes-Grubbs' family and with Michele Montour, head of the art committee, and is pleased to announce that the library will award an annual art prize in Hughes-Grubbs' memory to a student displaying art at the library.

She said details are still being ironed out for the Alma Hughes-Grubbs Art Award. It will be an ongoing art scholarship to a local student artist.

Suchy said Hughes-Grubbs was an original member of the library's art committee and also sat on the Rotary Scholarship committee as a representative of the community.

"This is a nice way to keep her name alive," said board chairwoman Sharon Peters.

In other business at the hour-long meeting on April 14, the board:

- Heard Suchy report that after questions at the last meeting about possible shared maintenance of the 90-slot parking lot since city hall has moved next door, she got out the copy of the library's agreement with the city on ownership of the shared parking lot. The library owns 59% and the city owns 41%. She presented copies of the agreement to board members and said the agreement calls for the library to be responsible for the cost of routine maintenance such as snow removal. It calls for future capital improvements to be divided up in cost by the percentage of ownership. She said this arrangement seems to be working well. She said there are 35 parking spaces on the opposite side

of their building, so she does not think use of the public lot will be a major issue. There were questions about whether there were enough handicap parking spaces now;

- Learned Suchy received quotes from two elevator companies for elevator maintenance and has engaged with City Elevator of Michigan for service beginning June 1. The low quote was \$1,200 per year to perform quarterly service, much lower than the current company charges. She said the City Elevator representative was very good at explaining things and answering her questions; and

- Was informed the library will be closed on Friday, April 24, for staff in-service training, which includes reviewing best practices, procedures, and safety training.

Van Buren Township stood at the podium with her son who suffers from apraxia;

- Approved a resolution for the long-term maintenance of storm water management at Zippy Auto Wash, 11600 Belleville Rd.;

- Approved an agreement with the Michigan Department of Transportation for the completion of safety improvements to the intersection of Belleville and Quirk roads. This will be with up to \$750,000 of EARMARKED funds which will be reimbursed through State Rep. Reggie

Miller;

- Approved recognizing Michigan Against Atomic Waste as a nonprofit operating within the township to obtain a charitable gaming license. The board's approval was requested by township resident Chris Donley;

- Approved the personal services agreements with Garret Brice as water and sewer superintendent, Brooklyn Little as desktop support specialist, and Breanna Shipley as senior programmer. Board members then shook hands with the new employees all and then posed for a picture with them and their family members;

- Approved The Mannik & Smith Group, Inc. of Canton Township as the contractor for the 2027-31 Parks and Recreation Master Plan Update in the amount of \$25,000. A current master plan is required for many of the grants sought. Township supervisor Kevin McNamara said the township has had \$10 million to \$20 million in grants for its parks so far;

- Approved Fishbeck to perform CCTV Sanitary Sewer Inspection Design and Administration services of \$146,400 for the last three years of this project, to finish up the rest of the township south of the I-94 Service Drive from Rawsonville to Hannan roads. The township will go out for bids for the project to find out the condition of the sanitary sewers;

- In a joint motion approved a contract with PLM Lake & Land Management Corp. to perform an aquatic weed treatment on Belleville Lake for \$56,450 and a contract with Aqua-Weed Control to perform a phosphorus inactivation treatment on Belleville Lake for \$14,500. Supervisor McNamara said it takes 30 days to get a permit and they want the first treatment in June. He said weeds are taking over the lake and the lake defines the township. He said the township had contracted a study last fall with Progressive AE and these two contractors were recommended for the work. He said 75 lakefront owners had a meeting to discuss the problem. He said there has to be a sustainable program that can't stop. He said a lifetime solution has to be put in place to improve the lake;

- Approved the second reading and adoption of a zoning ordinance amendment to change the maximum cul-de-sac length in site condominium developments to improve safety. The change would make it consistent with the subdivision ordinance;

- Approved the second reading and adoption of a zoning ordinance amendment to change zoning regulations pertaining to car wash developments. A moratorium on car washes was put in place last fall and this tighter ordinance written;

- Approved the first reading of an ordinance to update the township's Ypsilanti Community Utilities Authority Sanitary Sewer Rules per new requirements with YCUA. If anything industrial comes on line in that area there are parameters for toxic screening;

- Approved the first reading of a zoning ordinance amendment to allow the administration to approve temporary land use approvals for firework tents that have been coming each year without problems.

This would allow the fireworks companies to not have to come before the planning commission each year for the same request;

- Heard Elizabeth Renaud, director of community services, report that the recreation department received a grant for \$1,086 from the National Wild Turkey Federation to buy new archery equipment. This includes three new bows and targets. She said summer programs are in place now and archery programs will begin again in September; and

- Heard deputy supervisor Dan Selman read into the record a statement sent online against the proposed data center. The writer asked for it to be read at the April 15 meeting, but since that meeting had been canceled, Selman read it at the May 5 meeting. It was signed by Jennifer Cox, 44970 Bemis Rd, who had concerns on noise, water, and electricity.

Sumpter Township precinct part of Huron School District vote

Voters in the Huron School District approved a \$65,830,000 bond proposal in a special election on Tuesday, May 5.

Wayne County voters approved the 30-year proposal by 53.4% (with 1,302 yes votes), according to unofficial results. There were 1,134 no votes, with a total of 2436 votes cast in Wayne County.

A small portion of the Huron district falls in Monroe County. The proposal failed in Monroe County, with 3 voters approving and 8 rejecting it.

One precinct in Sumpter Township is in the Huron School District and the 111 who voted May 5 turned down the bond proposal with 61 no votes (54.95%). There were 50 yes votes (45.05%).

The bond proceeds from 2.17 mills a year starting in 2026 are for remodeling, including security improvements and re-equipping school buildings.

The school district serves Huron Township and portions of Romulus, Flat Rock, Brownstown Township, Sumpter Township and Van Buren Township along with that small area in Monroe County.

Also on the May 5 ballot was the proposed Monroe County Intermediate School District Regional Enhancement Millage Renewal Proposal. Voters in Sumpter Township's precinct in Airport School District turned it down 26-20.

But it passed in Monroe County with 10,334 yes votes and 6,920 no votes, according to unofficial results. The 0.9866 mill tax will be levied for a period of five years, 2027-31.

NEW BUSINESS:

Martin moved, Budd seconded to deny application 25-025 for the special land use request for El Car Wash to construct a drive through carwash at 10525 Belleville Road based on the following findings:

A. The analysis and specific concerns provided in the review letters from McKenna & Associates dated March 10, 2026, Fishbeck dated March 10, 2026, and the Van Buren Township Fire Department dated March 9, 2026.

B. Noting the feedback and concerns received during the public hearing from residents, members of the business community, and adjacent land owners.

C. The Board of Trustees finds that the application does not comply with section 12.306 of the Van Buren Township Zoning Ordinance which are the standards for granting special approval.

D. The Board of Trustees finds that the requested use of a car wash in an already served area where the use could create significant adverse effects in that location including traffic congestion, water runoff in the public streets, noises that are incompatible with adjacent residential areas.

E. The Board of Trustees finds the multiple drive-through nature of their proposal is not intended to be pedestrian friendly, its not conforming to the purposes of the Belleville Road Overlay District or the Master Plan and requesting special use for two (2) separate activities in the same facility, a car wash and a drive-through restaurant, either of which could be detrimental to other permitted land uses when considered alone are far more likely to give rise to need problems with respect to their impact on neighboring properties when considered together.

F. The Board specifically incorporates and adopts, and will attach to this Motion, its Statement of Findings and Conclusions, which provides as follows:

This Statement of Findings and Conclusions is submitted for consideration and possible adoption by the Charter Township of Van Buren Township Board of Trustees ("Board") regarding Application VBT-25-025 (Special Land Use Review #3) by El Car Wash MI Belleville LLC ("Applicant") for 10525, 10501, and 10401 Belleville Road (the "Property"). The Property is within the Belleville Road Overlay District ("BROD") and is zoned C-1 (General Business District).

The Applicant requests special land use ("SLU") approval for (i) an express (automatic) exterior car wash with self-serve vacuums and (ii) a commercial building with one retail and two restaurant tenant spaces, including one drive-through, as shown on the revised site plan dated February 18, 2026.

Following the April 8, 2026 public hearing, the Planning Commission voted to recommend denial based on issues identified in the McKenna & Associates review letter dated March 10, 2026, with consideration of the Fishbeck letter dated March 10, 2026, the Van Buren Township Fire Department letter dated March 9, 2026, and public comments, and found the request did not satisfy the SLU standards in Section 12.306 of the Zoning Ordinance.

The Record Considered

- Applicant's SLU application materials for VBT-25-025, including the revised site plan dated February 18, 2026.

- McKenna & Associates "Special Land Use Review #3" letter to the Planning Commission dated March 10, 2026 (the "McKenna Letter"), including references to the Fleis & Vandenbrink traffic study and the Applicant's market study.

- Fishbeck letter dated March 10, 2026.

- Van Buren Township Fire Department letter dated March 9, 2026.

- Planning Commission proceedings and public input from the April 8, 2026 hearing, including the motion recommending denial (as reflected in the April 29, 2026 memorandum from Ron Akers to the Board).

The Applicable Standards

Section 3.111(C) of the Van Buren Township Zoning Ordinance permits Auto Wash Establishments and drive-through restaurants as *special land uses* in the C-1 (General Business) District. Section 12.306 of the Zoning Ordinance sets forth the criteria that must be satisfied for approval of a special land use. In addition, because the Property is within the

Belleville Road Overlay District ("BROD"), the Board considers whether the proposed use and site design are consistent with the BROD's purpose and the Township's planning policies as referenced in the McKenna Letter (including the Master Plan Future Land Use designation of the Belleville Road corridor as "Gateway Commercial").

The Findings of Fact

A. Socially and economically desirable land use

The Board finds the proposal concentrates multiple auto-oriented, high-traffic uses on an approximately 3.13-acre site (car wash, vacuums, and a building with one retail and two restaurant tenant spaces, including a drive-through). McKenna indicates this intensity would generate traffic substantially greater than other BROD sites of comparable size, and the record does not provide competent, material evidence demonstrating that resulting circulation and economic impacts would promote a socially and economically desirable land use for adjacent properties or the Township. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 1.)

The Board further finds the public benefit of an additional car wash at this location is not established because several auto wash facilities already operate within approximately three miles. McKenna also identifies deficiencies in the Applicant's market study assumptions regarding "convenience" relative to nearby competitors. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 1.)

B. Necessity for public convenience at that location

The Board finds the record does not show the car wash use is necessary for public convenience at this location. McKenna identifies an existing car wash less than one-half mile north of the Property and another new facility approximately three-quarters of a mile south, with additional modern facilities nearby. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 2.) The Applicant has not provided persuasive, location-specific evidence of unmet demand; therefore, Criterion 2 is not satisfied.

C. Compatibility with adjacent uses of land

The Board finds that, while the Belleville Road corridor includes commercial and service uses, the proposed site configuration raises compatibility concerns because it clusters multiple auto-oriented, traffic-heavy uses with shared access drives. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 3.) The car wash is immediately south of Westlake Apartments and the site is near residentially zoned property to the east, increasing the potential for conflicts related to traffic circulation, noise, and operational effects. (McKenna Letter, Criteria 4 and 6; Planning Commission motion.)

D. Protection of public health, safety, and welfare

Traffic and safety. The Board finds the traffic study referenced in the McKenna Letter indicates the site drive would operate at LOS D or better during certain peak hours, except the left turn out operating at LOS E during the PM peak. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 1.) The study recommends a right-turn lane along northbound Belleville Road at the site drive, and the record does not clearly establish what operational restrictions or roadway improvements would be required to avoid unsafe or congested conditions. The Planning Commission motion also identifies potential for significant adverse traffic effects, including congestion.

Noise, operational impacts, and runoff. The Board finds the Applicant's assertion that equipment and vacuum stations will be "low-noise" is not supported by noise-generation

information in the record, and the wash tunnel would be open on both ends during operation. (McKenna Letter, Criteria 4 and 6.) The Planning Commission motion identifies incompatible noise impacts on adjacent residential areas and the pedestrian environment, and concerns regarding water runoff in public streets. The record does not demonstrate the use is designed and proposed to be operated to protect public health, safety, and welfare.

E. No injury to other property in the neighborhood

The Board finds the BROD is intended to support a mix of businesses in a pedestrian-friendly environment. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 6.) The intensity of uses on the Property, unresolved traffic questions, and the lack of supporting noise documentation create a reasonable likelihood of adverse impacts on nearby properties and the corridor. (McKenna Letter, Criteria 4 and 6; Planning Commission motion.) McKenna further references DDA data showing heavy traffic and accident history in the BROD and calls for these issues to be addressed; the Board finds they remain inadequately addressed. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 6.)

F. Natural environment and conservation of natural resources

The Board finds McKenna identifies substantial tree removal (including regulated trees) and discrepancies in the landscape plan regarding replacement counts and calculations. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 7.) The record does not clearly demonstrate compliance with applicable tree replacement expectations; therefore, Criterion 7 is not satisfied.

G. Harmony with zoning district purposes, BROD, and applicable regulations

The Board finds that, although a drive-through restaurant and auto wash are eligible for SLU approval in the C-1 District, the Master Plan designates the Belleville Road corridor as "Gateway Commercial," intended for retail and office uses. (McKenna Letter, Criterion 8, citing Master Plan p. 57.) The proposal's auto-centric components and clustering of high-traffic uses are inconsistent with the BROD's pedestrian-oriented intent and raise site design, traffic, and circulation concerns identified in the McKenna Letter. (McKenna Letter, Criteria 1, 3, 6, and 8; Planning Commission motion.)

Conclusions and Decision

Based on the foregoing Findings of Fact and the record identified above, the Board concludes the Applicant has not demonstrated compliance with the special land use standards in Section 12.306 of the Zoning Ordinance. The Board further concludes that denial of the SLU request is a reasonable and lawful exercise of the Township's zoning authority and police power to protect the public health, safety, and welfare and to implement the Township's planning policies for the Belleville Road corridor and the BROD. Motion Carried.

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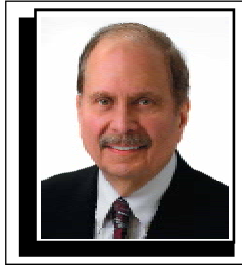
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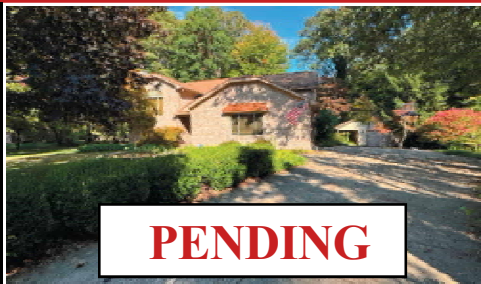
