VBT approves 15-yr. tax exemptions for Google data center

The Van Buren Township Board of Trustees unanimously approved a 50% tax exemption for 15 years for Google's new 1 gigawatt data center.

The action was taken more than three hours after the May 19 meeting started.

There was an overflow crowd in the meeting room and more people across the hall watching proceedings on a TV tuned into the township's channel 12.

Five separate motions were approved after lots of public comment. First was an hour-long public hearing comment session during which 25 people spoke, each for 3

minutes or less.

After that, supervisor McNamara gave a presentation "in my own way" on the issue. He said he wrote it out in advance. He said they keep getting the same questions and the answers have been given.

He said the property was rezoned Industrial in 2005. He said in 2018, the township

had workshops where the township asked residents what they wanted their township to look like, including where would they would like data centers and they said in Industrial, which is the highest, most-intensive use.

He said the state of Michigan has extreme

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

Neighbors oppose Waverly plan in Van Buren Twp.

The plan to build 92 single-family homes on a golf course and to add 277 more multiple-dwellings next door as well is not setting well with neighbors.

The neighbors to the Waverly Apartments were invited to a meeting at the Van Buren Township hall on May 14 to see the plans and to comment.

And comment they did. They are still commenting and gathering up the proof needed to show this is not legal. The original apartment complex was built in 1973-74 and the township let it have greater density because of the golf course amenity.

What's especially rankling is that Van Buren Township officials can't find the documents from that time that show the deal. There are other ways to get to the truth and those pathways are being pursued.

The owners of quiet lakeside property in that neighborhood are not going to let their home life be turned upside down by a plan they say is downright illegal.

Traffic in the city of Belleville had been horrible with North Liberty Street being worked on, as well as the railroad crossing closed down at Haggerty south of the I-94 Service, and roadwork on Belleville Road and South I-94 Service Drive. Supervisor McNamara said they had considered putting in a park there for the Denton neighborhood, but decided it was too close to the railroad tracks for children to play there. We're glad they are cleaning it up. We've heard word they have thought of a new site for a Denton park.

Romulus finally re-dedicated its Veterans Memorial on Memorial Day. It was taken down in 2018 after construction started on the new courthouse and the pieces and bricks with veterans' names on them were stored away. The city has been working on the new site for a year or so and, finally, announced its re-dedication. It's at the entry drive to the 34th District Court and Romulus City Hall on Wayne Road. And, it is lovely.

Now, if Belleville can work on keeping its Veterans Memorial from falling into the lake, that will be great. We understand a committee is at work to keep it safe.

VBT being eaten away by over-development

 Re: the Waverly Housing Proposal
 I have been a resident of Van Buren Township for 32 years and live just off Denton Road past the cemetery. It has been a blessing in disguise having the Denton bridge closed. People are out walking and biking, holding block parties, and the like.

There are no cars screeching around the L bend and running the two stop signs, no teenagers racing each other home from school, and no booming stereos at 3 a.m. That will, of course, all return when the bridge is finally open. Adding multiple homes will not only increase the traffic issues, but will continue to add to the deterioration of Denton Road, which is in constant need of repair.

The township's greatest attraction used to be its undeveloped areas. It was one of the reasons people moved here from overcrowded and over-developed areas. Today, the township's greatest asset is continuously being eaten away by industry and over-development. I am not a tree-hugger (although there is nothing wrong with being one). But I can predict the damage this development will do to the environment. Take a look at the land now being used as dumping sites and landfills for trash coming from outside the township.

The area for the proposed houses by the Waverly Apartment complex is home to wild turkeys, which were once an endangered species in Michigan, and are still tracked and counted by the state. It is also home to bald eagles, osprey, Cooper's hawks, meadow orioles, fox, deer, and many other animals and plants too numerous to list here.

Where is the compulsion to destroy untouched land coming from? Why is it necessary to build up every square inch of the township, and destroy one of its greatest resources?

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Belleville DDA working on call for proposals for hardware store

At the May 20 meeting of the Belleville Downtown Development Authority, DDA member Phil Miller explained that the committee formed to deal with the former hardware store the DDA owns is working on a draft of a RFP (request for proposals).

Miller said the DDA legal counsel is helping them and they hope to have the RFP finalized to present at the next DDA meeting on June 17.

"Finally, it isn't going to be the worst problem we have," Miller said of the long-vacant hardware store.

DDA vice chairman Chris Donley, who was presiding at the meeting in the absence of chairman John Winter, said he is hoping it will turn out to be other than a service-based business.

Miller said they have to pay attention to the zoning ordinance and can't deny anything that's allowed in there.

At the end of the meeting, Miller said the committee had some good conversations on the "Wherehouse," which used to be the hardware store. He said he appreciated that people were able to reconsider their ideas.

The DDA convened May 20 with a bare quorum of five – Donley, Miller, Sabrina Richardson-Williams, mayor Ken Voigt and Valerie Kelley-Bonner -- with four members absent: John Winter, Denise Baker, Mike Gatteri and Whitney Beaubien.

In other business at the 55-minute meeting, the DDA:

- Discussed the DDA Director position and took no action. Present director Steve Jones said he is staying on as the interim city manager until the city budget is done. Miller said the compensation for a full-time or part-time director needs to be put in the DDA budget ahead of time;

- Heard Donley say some of the things on the follow-up list that are ongoing projects should be taken off the list to tighten it up. He said there should just be projects on the list that the DDA is actively working on.

Jones said he had removed many items from the list to shorten it, but he could do what Donley wanted, as well;

- Heard treasurer Richardson-Williams question the work of the Goodbye Geese company, since she said she still sees geese in Victoria Commons and hasn't seen the company at work there. The DDA voucher list to be approved was paying the April charge of \$870 each for Village Park and Horizon Park, for a total of \$1,740. Jones said the company comes at different times of the day and at different locations. Also, once the chicks are hatched, the geese don't go anywhere until they are big enough to leave;

- Heard Kelley-Bonner report on the June 6 Civic Duty Education Day the DDA is helping to sponsor from 1-3 p.m. at Fourth Street Place outside the Belleville Area District Library. Survivors Speak is putting on the event, supported by SOOAR. People will be able to meet elected officials, get snacks, get faces painted, see the animals brought by the Creative Teacher, and take

part in a Play Station-5 giveaway;

- Heard Kelley-Bonner also report she was working on the "You Matter, Belleville" project on suicide awareness in November. She has ordered 100 flyers for downtown businesses;

- Heard Miller ask Jones about the status of the EV charging stations. Jones said it was an ongoing project and at the end of last week he finally got ahold of somebody. He said DTE is part of the holdup, but there are disagreements with how it was going to be done. He said he was assured it would be done. He said it has been a year that the units in the library parking lot have been in place and it's been three years since they started the process. There are four sets of EV stations planned: library parking lot/new city hall, Village Park, Victory Park, and Liberty Street parking lot;

- Was informed there is a draft of the DDA

budget but unresolved issues will affect the figures and it will be a living document;

- Heard Donley announce that 207 Belleville High School senior banners arrived that day and volunteers are expected to put them up on May 21. These will be up for three weeks and then the other half of the banners will be up for three weeks;

- Heard Donley describe online projects to draw people downtown. He said an idea Miller had about artists bringing artworks downtown according to themes, the way Miller had seen it work in California, is a good idea. But, he said it would take "a group to get it off the ground and an army of volunteers"; and

- Heard Richardson-Williams compliment Donley for the Wings of Hope sculpture recently erected in Horizon Park. Donley said the sculpture was his idea in memory

of Harper Mathis, the teen who died of brain cancer, but the credit goes to the family and the foundation that supported it once he brought his idea to them. He said he recently saw the sculpture from the lake and it was shining and beautiful.

rules on property rights and the person who owns the property has the right to sell to an industrial developer.

McNamara said the township has two big problems, with two-lane roads throughout the township, as well as two freeways, I-94 and I-275, that bring nothing but truck traffic into the township. He said they are trying to duck truck traffic and are avoiding distribution companies and warehouses.

“We have the largest data center in the state here – JP Morgan Chase,” he said.

“Nobody seems to know it exists. It’s quiet. It’s clean.”

He said Panattoni developers came along and they thought it was a warehouse they were looking at and they were not excited because the township would end up with more trucking.

“I have to admit when we found out it was a data center, we were kind of happy,” he said. “When Facebook hit, our jaws dropped. We didn’t realize there was that much problem with data centers in our community. So everybody here was upset. I was upset. A sleepless month...”

“But then we started looking into the

Facebook claims. Frankly, I haven’t seen a single solitary, claim against data centers on Facebook that are true. They all are misinformation.

“I’m gonna tell you what we have done. We have listened to you with every, single solitary question. And because we listened, we basically made a stronger, stronger agreement that will be presented later in the meeting.”

He said on sound, they actually went to the Google center in New Albany, Ohio, and sent engineers there. He said township people walked the neighborhoods and talked to people and to the schools and they had no problem with sound. But sound monitoring was written into the agreement and if they violate that they lose the tax deal, McNamara said.

He talked about upgrades to the agreement on water and berms and other things and said whatever the township asked for Google gave them.

He finished up his presentation on why he believes this data center is a good idea for this community.

Then, there was a public comment period for items on the agenda. This took about another hour during which 19 people spoke on the data center, most of whom had spoken during the public hearing.

Most of the speakers said they were against the data center, but a handful of men spoke in support of what the center will bring the township.

Representatives of Panattoni and Google gave presentations on the data center that lasted about an hour as board members questioned them on details. Then the votes came.

The motions approved were:

- Establishing Industrial Development District #27 on about 280 acres between Haggerty, Hannan, and I-94 N. Service Drive. The township is given the authority to establish this district by Act. No. 198 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1974, as revised;

- Granting a Real Industrial Facilities Tax Exemption for Google for a 36-month construction period and 12-year tax abatement on real property taxes. Total of Real and Personal costs is \$7,805,724,103. The company shall deliver \$15.4 million to Van Buren Township for township-wide capital projects;

- Granting a Personal Industrial Facilities Tax Exemption for Google;

- Approving a memorandum of understanding between the township and Google, with details about obligations for both the township and Google related

to financial commitments and other contractual items; and

- Approving a development agreement between the township and developer Panattoni for the data center development concerning the phasing of the development and details of the construction. Treasurer Sharry Budd added wording to the basic motion for approval. She said Panattoni will not install any groundwater wells and all the water used and cooling tower blow down will go to pipes to the South Huron Valley Authority, none into the ground. The final language will be addressed by legal counsel She said this was agreed to elsewhere, but she wanted to confirm it in this motion.

At the very beginning of the meeting, a woman called out a question from the audience and supervisor Kevin McNamara warned the crowd that there will be no outbursts during this meeting. He said if that happens, the person may be asked to leave.

Township attorney David F. Greco sat at the board table with the full board, but did not speak during the meeting.

Supervisor McNamara directed trustee Donald Boynton to read the board’s conduct policy that had been adopted by the board in 2024. The policy requires people not to speak unless called upon by the chairperson. And speakers must use civil language with no personal attacks, profanity, and anything deemed offensive to others. There also should be no debate with board members. No catcalls, whistling, or clapping. Police officers serve as security officers and those not following the rules may be asked to leave and if they don’t they may be escorted out by police, as determined by the chairperson.

As the meeting began, the policy was followed, but then, a man who was late and missed the reading of the policy, started piping up and then others clapped and called out and the rules started unraveling. There was a lot of calling out and clapping heard from the overflow room across the hall.

One woman refused to stop talking after her 3 minutes were up and supervisor McNamara asked her to stop and then when she didn’t directed police to escort her out. She kept on talking and screamed when they touched her and escorted her from the room. Later she returned to the meeting room.

This meeting lasted three and a half hours, in contrast to the previous week’s planning commission meeting that approved a data

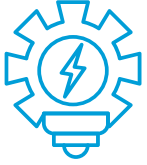

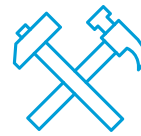

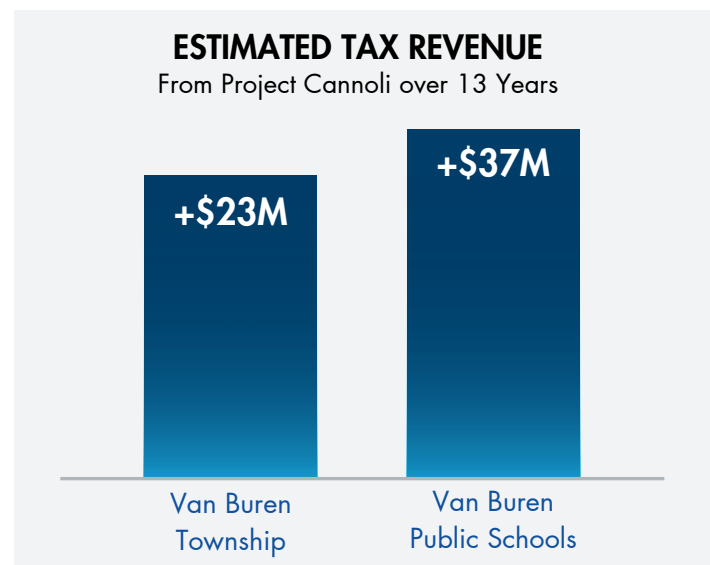

center electric substation that lasted seven hours.

In other business at the May 19 meeting, the board:

- Approved a motion, added to the agenda during the meeting, to purchase real property. The board had met in closed-door session an hour before the regular meeting to consider the purchase of real property, but no explanation of the site was given. McNamara later said it will be disclosed once the purchase goes through and it will be kept secret at this point to protect the price of the property. He said he couldn't make an offer without board approval;
- Approved the re-appointments of Eileen Parent and Walter Rochowiak to the Water and

Sewer Commission, with terms to expire June 1, 2028;

• Approved a resolution adopting the 2026 tax rate request: allocated millage of 0.8917 and extra voted millage for public safety of 6.3803 for a total of 7.2720 mills. The township's taxable value of real and personal property for 2026 is \$1,599,852,952, so the tax amounts to \$11,634,130;

• Approved the second reading and adoption of an ordinance to update the Ypsilanti Community Utilities Authority Sanitary Sewer Rules as required by the township's agreement with YCUA. It concerns controlling pollutants that might be put into the wastewater. It was explained that the township does not have any industrial properties that discharge into the sewer, but it must update the rules under their agreement. Boynton was not at the board table

for this vote;

• Approved the second reading and adoption of an amendment to the township zoning ordinance regarding temporary land use approvals for firework tents. The administration now has the power to approve firework tents that in the past have been approved and have operated without difficulty. This relieves the fire tent requester from having to appear before the planning commission year after year with the exact request;

• Heard clerk Leon Wright say he moved to the township in 1994 and has spent 18 years

in office. He lives about a quarter mile from the proposed data center. He said there are about 20,000 rooftops in Van Buren Township and the township gets just one mill of taxes for operation. He said it is hard for him to hear all the cat calls and threats. He said he is working for the township and he knows how responsible Google is as a company. He said, "We're all in this together"; and

• Heard McNamara say that he is open to talk to people about their concerns and anyone who wants to talk is welcome to come to his office.

The new NHA representative DeAmo Murphy was present only through his cell phone since he was reportedly stuck in traffic on the way to the meeting.

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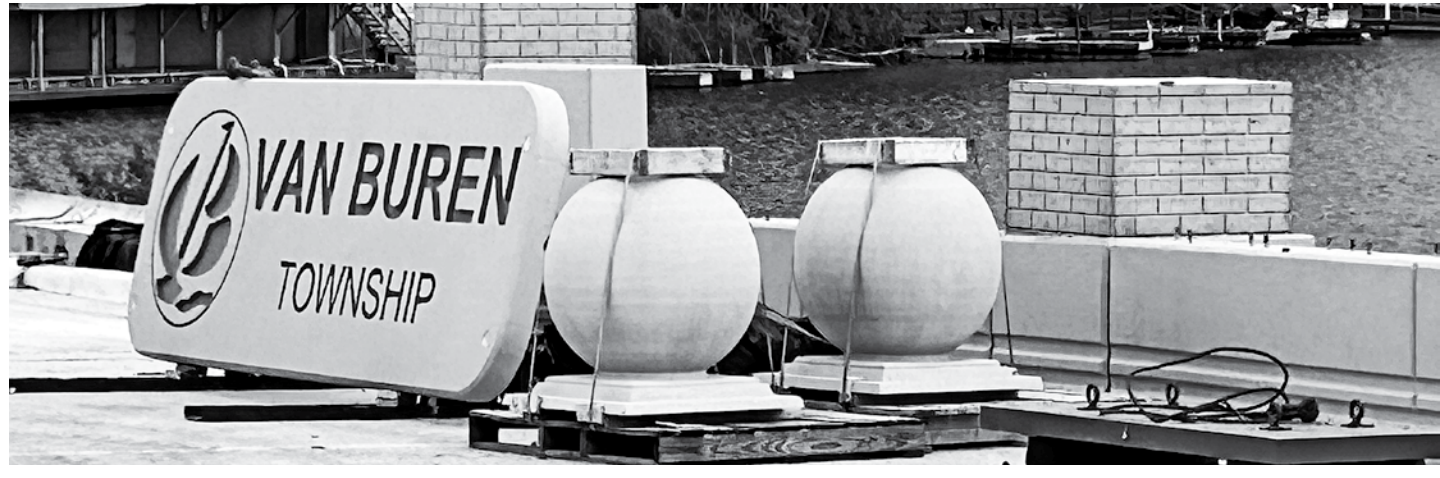

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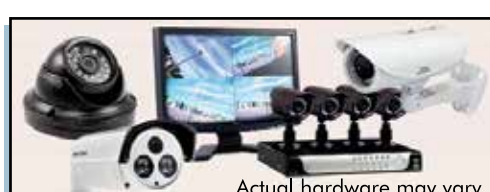

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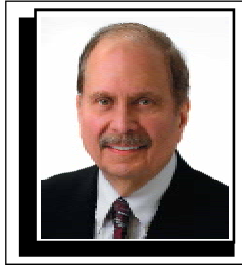
