VBT announces 69 new homes on Haggerty Rd.

Planning commissions from Van Buren Township, Sumpter Township, and the city of Belleville met together at a one-hour, 20-minute meeting on May 1 at Belleville High School Commons to compare notes.

There were six members of the Van Buren Township commission, plus Township Supervisor Kevin McNamara and Trustee Donald Boynton, along with the township's Director of Municipal Services Ron Akers and the commission's recording secretary.

Three commissioners were present from the Sumpter Township commission and four from the Belleville commission, along with Assistant Belleville City Manager Steve Jones.

Last year at the joint meeting, Supervisor McNamara first announced that a new Tractor Supply store was coming to a location at the southeast corner of Hull and Sumpter roads

This year, Director Akers listed the projects under way by the Van Buren Township planners:

• A new site with 69 homes is planned for the 22 acres of vacant land on Haggerty Road north of the former Haggerty Elementary School. The property involved runs north of the school, stopping short of the area around the historic, brick home. At first Akers said it was 80 homes, but then corrected that to 69. It is in the early stages of its plans, he said;

• Tractor Supply plans are going through the review process and will have a public hearing at 5:30 p.m., May 22. Akers brought in the site plan so those present could look it over after the meeting;

• Ashley Capital's 800,000 square foot building is being constructed between Van Born and Ecorse roads and now has

City approves buying Chevy Tahoe to replace police car

Explaining that Belleville's 2018 Ford Interceptor blew its engine and would be expensive to repair, Police Chief Kris Faull told the city council on Monday that she wanted to purchase a GM Chevy Tahoe to replace it.

She said she got a demo vehicle for officers to drive around and she got rave reviews from them on the space inside.

Chief Faull said the Fords that they had been buying were too tight because of where the computer had to sit and officers had to sit a little askew, which hurt their backs.

Although she found there weren't any 2024 Tahoes available in Michigan now, she was able to find three in Kentucky and a car would cost \$55,406 plus \$500 for shipping.

She said it would cost about \$1,800 more to outfit the new car and another \$5,500 for the cage.

The council unanimously approved the outright purchase of the vehicle.

Also, at Monday's almost two-hour meeting, the council:



• Was introduced to new police officer Jeffrey Gueli, who retired from Van Buren Township police and worked elsewhere before beginning work in Belleville. New officer Boudreau was on the agenda to be introduced as well, but was unable to be present;

• Heard comments on the proposed fire budget from Fire Chief Brian Loranger and the proposed police budget by Police Chief Faull;

• Approved the second reading and final adoption of the amendment to Ordinance *(continued on page 16)*

ESP and a Danish logistics company as tenants and is also putting up two more 250,000-square-foot buildings;

• Pulte Homes will put up Cedar Chase residential development at the northwest corner of Tyler and Morton Taylor roads and will pave Morton Taylor from Tyler to the first entry of Walden Woods. They are working on a planned residential development (PRD) and the project will be on the June 12 planning commission agenda;

• Cobblestone Creek is building out its development with 80-90 more homes;

• The Denton Road Bridge work is ongoing;

• The Downtown Development Authority is working on expanding Belleville Road between Tyler and Ecorse roads and will have a non-motorized trail on the east side and a sidewalk on the west side;

• A zoning ordinance amendment on Agritourism came back from the township board for a tune up after a property owner pointed out possible problems. "A member of the public came to tell us, 'You guys are going to screw up," said VBT Commissioner Jeff Jahr;

• An amendment clarifying signage regulations has been passed;

• Conversations on having an industrial/ office district are under way; and

• A committee is studying a new ordinance for electric vehicle charging stations.

VBT Trustee Donald Boynton asked about the trees being cut down on E. Huron River Drive and Supervisor McNamara said Huron Valley Steel tried to stop the township from cutting them down.

Supervisor McNamara said he was told they were "garbage trees and shrubs" and after the Iron Belle Trail is put in there, they will put some nice trees in.

Belleville commissioner John Juriga said 23 years ago he was on the Van Buren Township Planning Commission and they wrote an ordinance requiring replacement trees to be planted when trees are removed. McNamara said that is still in effect and the trees will be replaced.

Akers said the township is also working on being Redevelopment Ready and it is working on a marketing plan that is being finalized. He also said a Housing Readiness grant is being sought for condos, duplexes, quads, and other alternatives to singlefamily homes.

Jane Stalmack, chairperson of the Sumpter Planning Commission, said Sumpter's commission is redoing the township's Master Plan, but there are no plans for developments.

Belleville assistant city manager Steve Jones said Belleville's planning consultant is working on the Master Plan, they have

passed a mobile food ordinance and are working on an animal ordinance, which he said they may have read about in the paper. Jones said they have updated an ordinance on trailer storage, making provision for seasonal storage of boats and trailers.

Jones said SEMCOG announced a grant last week to do a traffic safety study on Main Street and the DDA recently bought two buildings, one of which was the old hardware store. They are considering popup shops in there to allow small businesses to take a half step to bring them out of the garages and basements and eventually into a shop.

He said the property directly behind the hardware store, where the U-Hauls were parked, will be cleared so the city parking lot can be extended by 25 to 30 more spaces.

Jones said Victory Station is being improved, they are waiting for confirmation of the grants for two pickleball courts, and they are working on amendments to the city charter.

Brian Cullin, the Van Buren Township commission chairman who was chairing this meeting, asked about the status of the vacant CVS store on Main Street.

Jones said they were told that CVS held a five-year lease on the property and they intended to keep it vacant for that period. Jones said with the help from friends in the State House, CVS was convinced to put it up to lease and it currently is advertised as for lease.

Chairman Cullin also asked about the corner of Third and Main and Jones said the DDA is finalizing purchase of the property right next to the Chamber building. He said they are considering sheds or glass houses seasonally at that site for more retail. He said there are environmental issues at that site, but most of the work has been done. It has yet to be Oked by the EPA. It can be

parking and green space, he said.

Commissioner Jahr asked if they will have to change their zoning ordinance for popup shops and Jones replied that may be necessary.

Jones said with all the new construction at the bridge end of town, they want to work down the street to city hall. He said they have to sell the city hall property and build the new city hall next to the DPW property.

Jones said Scott Jones owns property at Third and Main and had talked about a multi-storied building with retail on the bottom and residential on top. He said this year is the last year that now-vacant property will be available for Lakefest activities.

Chairman Cullin asked about the parts of the Iron Belle Trail that are now yet constructed and Supervisor McNamara said they are doing the trail in legs from A to J. The latest leg under construction is over the railroad track on E. Huron River Drive heading east, over the bridge, and into Lower Huron Metropark.

"We are trying to connect up to our downtown, which we know is Belleville but we can't admit it," McNamara said.

Sumpter commissioner John Honey asked if they ever get grants in Sumpter Township. "We don't see it down there," he said.

Sumpter commission chairperson Stalmack said Parks and Recreation committee is active with grants.

"I like Sherwood Park," commissioner Honey said. "But out-of-towners are misusing it." He asked why they couldn't charge to enter and he would be glad to pay.

Van Buren Township Treasurer Sharry Budd said all of VBT's parks are open to everyone, but they have fees to enter.

Honey continued his comments on Sherwood Park: "It's a nice park, but it needs work."

Treasurer Budd said Van Buren charges starting Memorial Day, but not in the winter when there is nobody in the booths. Akers said at the next meeting they can

comment on grants.

Budd suggested they send out the minutes of this meeting, being taken by VBT, with the agenda of the next meeting when it is being announced so people will remember what they talked about.

Jones said a Cliff Notes version of what VBT learned about grants would be a little bit of help to the city and Akers agreed someone could come out and give a presentation at the next meeting.

Jones said businesses were exploring geothermal and Akers said his nephew's school in California has solar panels on the roofs of the parking structures.

Commissioner Juriga said the library structure was built strong enough for solar panels, but they didn't have enough money to include solar panels.

Jones said the city was offered free EV power stations and the company is now working on the power to the sites designated by the city.

Commissioner Jahr said the VBT committee's concern was when independent businesses want to put in 30-40 EVs. "What do they look like?"

Also discussed was erosion on the lake; a tri-community calendar prepared by Belleville, VBT and the Chamber of Commerce working together; and a VBT survey coming up on safety at specific intersections, which everyone was invited to take.

The next meeting of the three planning commissions was set for 5 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 29, at the Belleville Area District Library, where the acoustics were better than at the school.

Mayor directs police to cut off Owen parents

"If I lived there I wouldn't want all that traffic," said Belleville Mayor Ken Voigt at Monday's regular meeting of the Belleville City Council.

He was referring to the report by Victoria Commons resident Tom Jones who said at least 100 cars are coming down Victorian Lane at 8 o'clock in the morning so parents can deliver their students to a place they can be dropped off and walk over the subdivision border to Owen Intermediate School.

Jones said at the recent Victoria Commons Homeowners Association meeting a resident showed the video he had of this traffic and said he was going to take it to Detroit newspapers. Jones said he thought he should bring it to the city council first.

"Why are we allowing this?" Mayor Voigt asked Police Chief Kris Faull. He said it should be posted.

Chief Faull said they have been doing it for 20 years. She said ever since the district cut back on buses it has gotten worse. She said since COVID, the parents don't put their students on buses and deliver them and pick them up themselves. She said she sees the buses at the high school are half empty.

Mayor Voigt said to post that area as no standing or parking except by permit and make permits available to the residents.

The mayor is a retired Belleville police officer and pointed out to Faull that she was in charge of traffic enforcement. On Tuesday morning we received a message from Belleville City Manager Jason Smith: "I just checked in on the WDIV website and our SkyCam is live! It's currently showing off a beautiful shot of downtown and the lake. If you go to <u>https://www.clickondetroit.com/live/</u>, you'll be able to see the option to select Belleville's cam. Belleville joins downtown Detroit, the Detroit Riverfront, Metro Airport, Ann Arbor, and Mount Clemens on WDIV's roster of live cams."

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
Be sure whatever you do in Belleville is suitable because you are now on camera.

Belleville Police Chief Chris Faull is asking people not to blow their grass clippings into the roadway, which causes motorcycle accidents – especially this weekend since many motorcycles will be heading into our area and will be vulnerable.

She said a group of motorcycles, she doesn't know how many, will be coming through Sumpter Township, Van Buren Township and the city at around 11:45 a.m. on Saturday heading for a Blessing of the Bikes at Faith Community Church, 894 E. Huron River Dr. She said they are starting at 11 a.m. at the American Legion Hall in Milan and heading this way.

It would be very nice if they encountered clean, non-slippery roadways.

It was so nice to see so many elementary students clustered around robots last Saturday morning at the FIRST Robotics event held at Belleville High School Commons. The cafeteria was open to sell coffee to the parents and lots of food for





everyone as they waited for their children to be taught more about robots. The parents seemed to be very interested, as well.

The elementary clubs, 13 of them from the region, had set up their displays of Lego robotics in one part of the room and it was neat to see little Lego people moving and vehicles and other activity. In the larger part of the Commons, the advanced BHS robot was tossing rings for the kids to catch and performing other tasks to get kids more familiar with another kind of robot, next up on their chain of learning.

The beautiful line of evergreen trees that used to shield a work area at Huron Valley Steel has been cut down to make way for another leg of the Iron Belle Trail that is coming from Washtenaw County through Van Buren Township and the city of Belleville and then on west through VBT to the Huron Clinton Metropark.

The current leg being developed is from the railroad track on the south side of E. Huron River Drive eastward to Haggerty Road, crossing to the north side of the road to cross the bridge and then crossing over Huron River Drive again to reach the park.

It's this part that has to go from the southbound Haggerty Road to cross it over Huron River Drive that has put all the cutting and chopping in front of Huron Valley Steel. Anyone who drives that way knows that Huron Valley Steel has a beautiful, parklike atmosphere and teams of landscaping workers can be seen all summer long keeping everything gorgeous.

Van Buren Township Supervisor Kevin McNamara said Huron Valley Steel tried to stop them from cutting down the trees, but were unsuccessful. He later said the pictures he was shown was of scrubby bushes and trash trees.

That isn't what was in that section and those of us who drive by really miss those beautiful trees. They not only were hiding the work area, but protected the roadway from the blowing dust

and sounds of their work.

Supervisor McNamara said they are really going to have to replace those trees with something nice after the work is done on the trail going by.

Many people have commented to me about missing those trees.

At Monday's city council meeting, it was nice to hear assistant city manager Steve Jones and Mayor Ken Voigt both praise the new working relationship the city has with Van Buren Township. The mayor said it has never been this good before and Jones also praised how great it is to be working together with the township.

The city feels it can work together with the township and not feel it is competing.

I work for a multi-milliondollar company located here in Belleville. We are on Rawsonville Road, north of Willis Road. Over the years we have been established as the North American headquarters in our business with other locations across the world.

The company is A2Mac1. We are the leader in automotive benchmarking and research and we have until recently been a family owned business. We are now owned by an investment company which has quickly changed upper management here in Belleville.

Our new leadership has methodically reduced our workload while building a new facility in Mexico. We have had "visitors" from our Mexico facility on location to observe our production in order to learn what is expected of them when their location is fully operational. We have been told many times that our jobs are not in jeopardy and we are just training our "colleagues."

We have been flat out lied to. It was recently announced that our last day of work



here in Belleville is June 3. Our current workforce in Belleville ranges in age from mid-20-year-olds to an age of late 60s who were looking forward to retirement.

We are in the heart of the automotive capital of the world and the decision to close our facility will be a big mistake. I believe A2MAC1 will lose our customers and be impacted by lower quality and longer lead times.

To make things more difficult, we are required to pack up our entire facility including heavy machinery, vehicle lifts, and even our desks and computers to prepare them for shipment to Mexico.




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

Sumpter Supervisor told to get three sealed bids for his office renovation

Sumpter Township Supervisor Tim Bowman was advised by his township board that he had to get three sealed bids for his office renovations and refused to make a motion to approve his proposal.

This was at the April 23 regular meeting of the township board. Trustee Donald LaPorte was absent and excused.

Supervisor Bowman asked for approval of renovations for his office at a cost of \$47,860 plus an addition cost of \$8,000 for fixtures and furniture for a total not to exceed the cost of \$55,860.

There were no motions for approval and Trustee Matthew Oddy noted that when the board members discussed the renovations, it included glass in front of his secretary, like all the other offices where officials met the public. He said safety was the primary reason.

Bowman said, "Karen doesn't want glass in front of her," referring to Karen Woodington, his assistant. He said they are making the wall in front of her taller and narrower and there will be an area for

She would like to reach out to the community to donate treats for the project;

said. "They made me look like a dumb ass. That's real support."

Rush said the board is in support. He said he is talking about bids.

"We have to advertise," Hurst advised. In other business at the 51-minute meeting on April 23, the board:

• Approved a motion to promote police patrol officer Sean Hudson to sergeant effective April 22, as recommended by Public Safety Director/Police Chief Eric Luke. The meeting paused while Hudson's father pinned the new badge on his son and the board paused for photos with the Hudsons;

• Approved purchase of a new sewer pump for the Rawsonville Road pump station at a cost of \$64,132 plus freight from Kennedy Industries. The current pump failed and it would take more than \$38,000 to repair it, a significant amount for a standby pump. • Approved on a 4-2 vote, with Clerk Hurst and Treasurer Bart Patterson voting no, to keep Kristina Stencel on the part-time pay of about \$16 per hour in the temporary position and raise it retroactively to the permanent part-time position pay of \$22.87 effective April 24;

He also said a training professional who does behavior modification, will do a presentation at the May 14 board meeting. He reported on virtual meetings on the use of ARPA funds, work on the compensation for Fire Chief Brown, and attempts to get things put in place at a Parks and Recreation meeting.


