City Council puts off decision on city manager to June 22

After four hours of interviews of four candidates for the open city manager position, on Saturday, June 13, the Belleville City Council voted unanimously to delay its decision until a special 6 p.m. meeting on June 22.

“It’s a hard decision to make,” said mayor pro-tem Kelly Bates as the meeting closed.

Throughout the long meeting an estimated 40 to 50 people came in and out of the audience to witness the interviews. Four members of the audience spoke before the interviews began, with two urging the council to name interim city manager Stephen Jones as permanent city manager.

The city had hired a consultant to seek candidates for the vacant position and the 19 applicants were reduced to the final four to be interviewed on June 13.

Interviewed were Krystina Laslo, Darwin McClary, Brady Peck, and Stephen Jones.

At the end of the interviews, the consultant said if the council members were ready to identify a candidate, they could make a motion. He said once the candidate was identified, they could begin contract negotiations, do a background check, and come to terms.

The council decided to discuss the candidates before going forward and each gave their impressions of the candidates.

Then, councilwoman Julie Kissel made a motion to select Brady Peck, but there was no second, so the motion died for lack of support.

Then, councilman Randy Priest moved to select Darwin McClary, seconded by mayor pro-tem Bates. The motion failed with councilwoman Kissel, mayor Ken Voigt, and councilman Jeremiah Beebe voting no.

That’s when they decided to think about it some more and wait until the special meeting when a full council will be present. It was noted one council member will be absent at the next regular meeting on June 15.

Krystina Laslo was the first candidate interviewed. She said she started her education to be an aerospace engineer, but then started working on a political campaign and served with the winner in the state legislature for a year. She went to Dearborn Heights with the new mayor and stayed there with him for 17 years as chief of staff. She has two degrees and now has a job in auto financing. She said she really would like to get back to serving the public.

Darwin McClary was the second candidate interviewed. He said he has 36 years of experience as a city and business manager. He currently serves as village manager of Lake Orion. He said he and his husband live in Ypsilanti and his husband, an English teacher, just retired. Their two sons also live nearby. The drive to Lake Orion is an hour and a half each day for him so he would like to work locally. He told how he brought two restaurants into the village and how they got the former town hall, built in the 1900s, to be restored inside and out by a restaurant which invested \$3 million in the effort.

Brady Peck was the third candidate interviewed. He is the director of operations for Washtenaw County. He was born and raised in Ann Arbor and has lived in Florida and California. He said he is looking at this as the next step in his career. He said he had experience with budgets and millage questions. He said his job would be to give his recommendations to the council and the governing body would decide. Then, he would support that decision. He said he would recognize employees’ work publicly and work with the community and area communities and schools. He said he would be here as long as the council wants him.

Interim city manager Stephen Jones was the third person interviewed. He said he has been in the city for 20 years and has served on boards and commissions for the city and has helped run Music Lakeside from its beginning and it is starting its 17th

year.

He said he is always trying to give back to the community. He said he takes part in events and weddings as a DJ and does the car show on Mondays when he is not at a meeting. He said he serves on the Chamber of Commerce board and has been on the board of the Belleville Area Council for the Arts for many years.

Jones said he has been interim city manager twice over three years and he would like to be the permanent city manager to use his talents to focus on the position full time. He currently also serves

as part-time director of the Downtown Development Authority. He said there are great possibilities in the city and it’s come a long way in the last few years.

When asked what his biggest professional failure was, he said it was not having a good work/life balance because he is a workaholic. “I put in 120% every day I show up. I always liked the community since I came here 20 years ago,” he said.

Council members then listed pros and cons on each candidate and then decided to wait until June 22 to make a decision.

Anti data center group seeking VBT recall language approval

At the June 10 Van Buren Township Planning Commission meeting, Jenn Smith announced that an anti-data center group has started the process to recall the whole township board.

She said on June 5 a request for approval of the ballot language was filed with the Wayne County clerk. She said the language will be reviewed by the county on June 23.

The language must be approved for clarity before it can be put on petitions to circulate. Once enough signatures have been turned in and accepted, the recall can be put on a ballot.

She advised that people can get more information by going to Stop the Data

Center 48111 on Facebook.

Under state law, the language must be clear and factual and based entirely on the official’s conduct during their current term of office. After the language is approved, there is a strict 180-day window to circulate the petitions. The petitions must be signed by registered, qualified electors in the district equal to at least 25% of the total votes cast for all candidates for the office of Governor in that district at the last preceding gubernatorial election.

Petition circulators must be registered electors and must personally witness every signature. Circulators cannot sign and



date their circulator certificate until *after* the petition has been fully circulated and signed by voters.

Completed petitions are submitted to the county clerk and they have up to 35 days to examine the petitions and determine if enough valid signatures were collected. If enough valid signatures are verified the election must be scheduled on the next available May or November regular election date.

Van Buren Township board members are Supervisor Kevin McNamara, Clerk Leon Wright, Treasurer Sharry Budd and Trustees Donald Boynton, Bryon Kelley, William Frazier, and Kevin Martin.

Belleville's Main/Liberty intersection construction to being next week

At Monday's regular meeting of the Belleville City Council, mayor Ken Voigt announced that work to reconstruct the intersection of Main Street and North Liberty Street will begin next week.

He said the contractor will maintain two-way traffic at the site, which adjoins the closed roadway to the Denton Road Bridge.

Mayor Voigt said the city has been trying to get this done for seven years and it will be an inconvenience and a mess. "It'll be a mess," he repeated.

He said he has heard the bridge will take 20 more weeks to finish, but it could be ready to open sooner. He said the city doesn't want to hold the work up any longer.

DPW director Nathaniel Johnson said they are not sure what is going on with the bridge and when it will open.

"We don't want to be the reason the bridge stays closed," mayor Voigt said.

The council approved a contract with the bridge contractor E.C. Korneffel, Inc. for \$573,955 for the work, with a 10% contingency to make a total project budget of \$631,350.

A Place to Call Home: Guiding Harbor Seeks Land to Expand Care for Local Youth

The Belleville-area nonprofit is looking for property in Van Buren Township, Belleville, or Sumpter Township to build a unified campus that will serve 40% more children in foster care.

For nearly 70 years, Guiding Harbor has been woven into the fabric of Belleville and Van Buren Township. This community is where the organization was born, and it is where the children in its care have grown up, gone to school, made friends, and found their footing. What began in 1958 as Girlstown, a program founded by local women who wanted to give struggling girls a second chance, has grown into a comprehensive foster care agency serving children from birth to age 21 across Southeast Michigan. Today, the organization licenses and recruits foster homes, provides foster care case management and adoption services, operates Girlstown residential treatment for adolescent girls, and runs Independent Living Plus, a program for young adults aging out of care.

Again and again, this community has shown up for those kids. Van Buren Township and Belleville have welcomed Guiding Harbor, supported its work, and cheered its children on. Now, Guiding Harbor is asking the community it has called home for generations to help write the next chapter.

A Vision Rooted Right Here

Guiding Harbor CEO Jennifer Trotter has a clear vision: bring the organization's programs together onto a single, purpose-built campus in the community where the agency was born.

"The children and young adults we serve deserve spaces that were designed for healing, not retrofitted spaces that we make work," Trotter said. "A unified campus right here in the Belleville area would let us do more for more kids, and do it better."

The proposed campus would bring together three components: Girlstown, the residential treatment program for adolescent girls that has operated on Quirk Road in Belleville since 1974; Independent Living Plus, a transitional housing and life skills program that currently operates out of a deteriorating century-old home in Ypsilanti; and a new administrative building that would replace the agency's outdated and capacity-strained offices on East Huron River Drive.

To make the campus a reality, Guiding Harbor is actively seeking property of approximately 4 to 5 acres in Van Buren Township, the City of Belleville, or Sumpter Township.

You Could Be the Key

Guiding Harbor is reaching out to landowners, developers, and

community members who may be in a position to help. The agency is specifically seeking an outright land donation, a bargain sale at a significantly reduced price, or a long-term ground lease arrangement.

For someone who owns land in the area and wants their property to leave a lasting legacy, this is a rare opportunity. A gift or deeply discounted sale of land to Guiding Harbor would directly translate into stable housing for young adults aging out of foster care, trauma-informed residential care for girls who have experienced profound loss, and a stronger, more efficient operation that can reach 40% more children. And because the children Guiding Harbor serves have often never known what a real home feels like, a residential neighborhood setting is not simply a preference. It is a clinical necessity. Kids in care need to walk outside and see houses, not warehouses. They need to feel like part of a community, not set apart from one.

"We are not looking for just any piece of land," Trotter said. "We want to stay rooted right here, in the community where our kids have grown up. If you have property in Van Buren Township, Belleville, or Sumpter Township and you care about what happens to vulnerable children in this community, I would love to have a conversation."

Decades of Local Trust

Guiding Harbor's roots in this community run deep. The organization was founded by local women, has served local families for nearly 70 years, and owns its Girlstown property on Quirk Road outright. Its administrative office has anchored East Huron River Drive since 2010. Guiding Harbor is not a newcomer looking for a foothold. It is a neighbor that wants to grow deeper roots in the place it has always called home. There are approximately 10,000 children in Michigan's foster care system at any given time. Guiding Harbor has been here for nearly 70 years and intends to be here for 70 more. An expanded, unified campus in this community would allow the agency to serve significantly more of those children, right here in the place that has always shown up for them.

At Saturday's interviews for Belleville city manager, dozens of people came to the meeting throughout the four-hour session to support interim city manager Steve Jones for the position.

They were a kind, considerate, friendly group who wanted their elected officials to know that they supported the person they've known over the years working in the city and want him to stay in the job full time.

This is in contrast to the rude, hostile township mob to the north who is seeking to recall its leadership because it hates data centers. The data center is already on its way, so they are intent on punishing the township board for its decision.

In Belleville, there is a lot of positive activity and Jones is in the middle of it all. He had been hired as assistant city manager in the past, but twice now he has taken over the position without assistance when the original city manager didn't work out.

The council plans to make a decision of some kind at a special 6 p.m. meeting on Monday, June 22. If the council listens to its citizens and business people, it can make only one choice.

The goats arrived in Belleville on Sunday and started their clearing of the Horizon Park shoreline.

DPW director Nathaniel Johnson went over to see them and they were gone. He was afraid they had escaped and reported them missing.

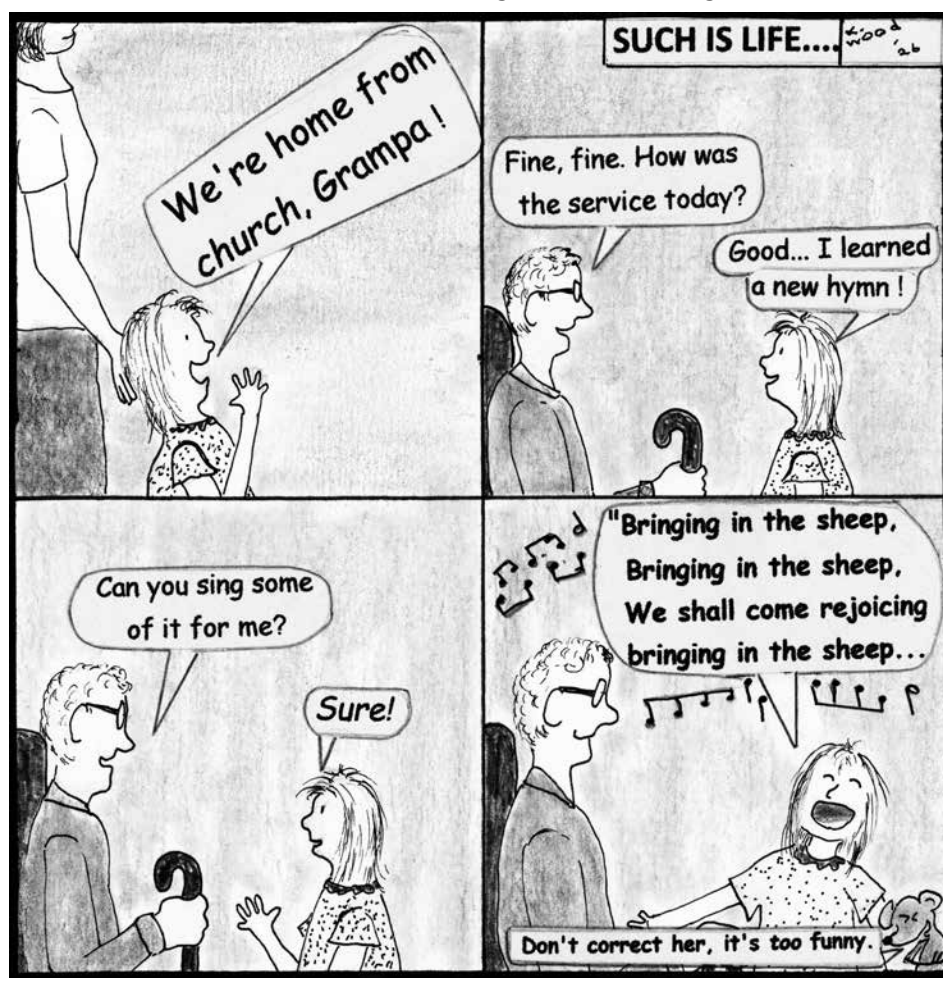
At Monday's regular city council meeting, mayor Ken Voigt explained that Johnson was new in town and hadn't had experience with the city's annual goat visits. He said it was almost 100 degrees in the sun, so the goats all hunkered down for a while in the shade under bushes down by the boat dock.

Goat Day at the park is Saturday afternoon. Mayor Voigt said anyone who donates \$20 to the Friends of Michigan Animals Rescue at the event will get a free goat t-shirt.

On Saturday the four-hour-plus meeting to interview city manager candidates was held at city hall. A young candidate from Washtenaw County, Brady Peck, was asked about how he would manage workers and he told the story of a problem he had with an employee who was always late for work.

He said he understands that a flat tire can delay a person and other things as well, because "life happens."

But, he said, he knows "life doesn't happen every day," which brought a laugh from the council and audience.



We got a message from the DNR that it is looking for help in finding bat roosting locations throughout Michigan.

From tree cavities and trunks to bridges and barns, bats are settling into a variety of summer roosts across Michigan. Just as they did last year, residents can help scientists better understand where these important mammals are living, by sharing information about the bat activity they see around their homes and communities.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Michigan Natural Features Inventory are asking the public to report bat roost locations through the Michigan Bat Roost Monitoring Program.

Providing the information is easy. The online form asks for basic information such as the date and time when you saw bats using the roost, whether the location is on public or private land, the type of structure (house, barn, bat box, etc.), and how many bats you observed using the roost. There also is an opportunity to share photos.

This project focuses on summer roosts -- places where bats rest and raise their young during the warmer months. Bats typically use summer roosts through August or early September. As temperatures cool in the fall, many species move to winter roosts, called hibernacula, where they hibernate until spring. Reports of summer roosts can be submitted at any time, even if the observation occurred earlier in the year.

If bats are found in an attic or other

building, report the observation but please hold off on trying to move or exclude them during the summer maternity season, when young bats may be unable to fly. Instead, wait until late summer to install a one-way exclusion device which allows the bats to leave on their own but prevents their return to that location.

We are invited to learn more about Michigan bats -- species, threats, conservation efforts and other information -- and report roost locations at Michigan.gov/Bats.

The construction work on the intersection of North Liberty Street and Main Street in the city is going to be quite a project. The Denton Road Bridge is currently closed, but it could open soon, we hope. That would add another piece to that intersection puzzle, although the mayor says the contractor will keep two-way traffic up in that area. I really can't see how that's going to work, but we'll find out.

The goal has been to bring people into the city to shop and walk the streets, but this is going to detour them away for a while. Too much traffic. The intersection should be wonderful when it's done.

The mayor promises when it's all done, drivers will be able to drive on new streets from the cemetery all the way to E. Huron River Drive.

The City cannot continue hiring people who do not work out and then expect Steve Jones to step in and clean up the mess. From my perspective, Steve has repeatedly stepped up when previous leaders failed,

and his record demonstrates both his commitment to the city and his ability to lead it successfully.

VBT single-vehicle crash leaves 27-year-old male with significant injuries

At 1:15 a.m. on Thursday, June 11, the Van Buren Township accident investigation team was called to the scene of a single-car accident on East Huron River Drive, east of Martinsville Road.

The team completed an on-scene investigation and follow-up on the status of the driver of the vehicle, said Van Buren Township Police Chief Jason Wright.

He said a 27-year-old male was driving a 2006 Ford Fusion eastbound on East Huron River Drive, just east of Martinsville Road,

when he veered off the road onto the north shoulder for about 150 feet before bottoming out and striking a culvert near the driveway of 42900 Huron River Dr.

This impact caused the vehicle to flip one time and continue to slide east before coming to rest on the driver side portion of the vehicle, in the driveway of 42870 Huron River Dr. The Van Buren Township Fire Department extricated the driver through the front windshield, and his care was turned over to Huron Valley Ambulance.

Chief Wright said HVA advised that the driver had significant injuries. HVA transported the driver to an area hospital. The driver of the vehicle is in stable condition, Chief Wright said. Alcohol is believed to be a contributing factor, he said.



**VBT Police aid with
armed gunman
barricaded in home**

On Monday at about 4 p.m. the Canton Police Department received a call reporting that a driver armed with a gun was heading into Canton Township with the possible intent to harm himself and others.

A Canton police officer located and attempted to stop the vehicle and a pursuit ensued. The short pursuit ended at the driver's residence in the 6000 block of Sandalwood.

The armed subject ran into the home and barricaded himself inside with two family members. Officers from Canton and Van

Buren responded and secured a perimeter around the house.

Crisis negotiators were able to contact the suspect and after approximately one-hour negotiators convinced him to release the hostages, both physically unharmed.

The Western Wayne County Special Operations Team also responded providing assistance with additional tactical officers, along with officers from the City of Wayne Police Department and the Wayne County Sheriff's Office.

The suspect surrendered himself into police custody at 8 p.m. He was transported to a local hospital for a medical evaluation.

The Canton Police Department will submit the case to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office for review of charges, Van Buren Police reported.

MDOT to permanently close Belleville Rest Area on I-94 on June 22

LANSING - The Michigan Department of Transportation will permanently close the Belleville Rest Area on westbound I-94 in Van Buren Township, effective June 22. Signs have been placed notifying regular visitors of the upcoming closure.

The decision to close the facility follows a series of unexpected expenditures, and the need to strategically support the remaining 60 rest areas across the state. The proximity of existing public MDOT facilities and private establishments will ensure a reasonable level of service for drivers in this area.

MDOT remains committed to providing safe and reliable rest areas for the motoring public across the state, providing locations with accessible rest rooms and space for passenger and commercial traffic to rest during travel.

Once the Belleville Rest Area is closed June 22, temporary barricades will be placed to block access to the parking lot. Michigan State Police may ticket and remove vehicles attempting access to the lot. The existing permanent intermittent truck weighing system will remain in place, with MSP Commercial Vehicle Enforcement having continued access to the system.

MDOT's existing rest area funding is limited, placing maintenance and operational costs of these facilities on region budgets. Following the demolition of the Belleville Rest Area -- planned to occur at a later date -- the maintenance funds typically committed to the operation of this facility will return to the MDOT Metro Region maintenance fund to support other facilities and operations across Wayne, Macomb and Oakland counties.

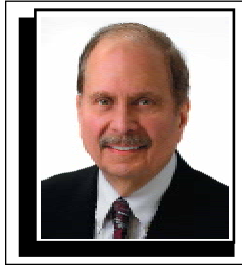

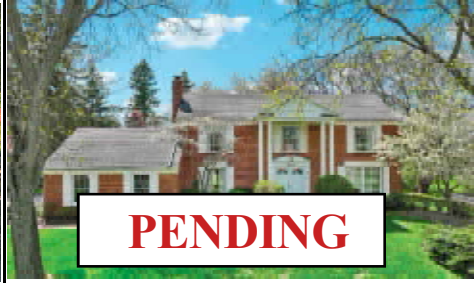
