# Mark Germano arraigned for murder in Sunday shooting

Van Buren Township resident Mark Germano, 45, was arraigned by video from the VBT lockup on Wednesday morning on a charge of first-degree murder and felony firearm.

He is accused of shooting and killing his acquaintance Edward Kuehn, 38, twice in the head and neck as he sat in his car sipping on coffee he had just purchased at Tim Horton's on Rawsonville Road early Sunday morning.

Police found Kuehn in the Tim Horton parking lot sitting with mortal wounds in his maroon Ford Taurus Limited car that had the passenger window blown inward.

Germano was taken into custody without incident later at his Bemis Road residence. VBT Police Chief Jason Wright said the two knew each other and this was not an incident of a stranger being shot.

Chief Wright said at about 7:33 a.m. Sunday, the VBT Dispatch Center received a call from a woman saying her husband told her he shot her friend at the Tim Horton's on Rawsonville Road.

The woman said her husband had returned to their home in the 45000 block of Bemis Road, reported the homicide, and then went into the barn behind the house with his gun. Apparently, he then headed into the woods.

Chief Wright said police responded to the home and were able to contact the suspect via cell phone. VBT road patrol was able to talk the suspect into coming out of the wooded area, he said.

The shooting was described by police as domestic in nature.

# Sunday fire damages house in Greenbriar Subdivision in VBT

The renter of the home at 6435 Thornwood in Greenbriar Subdivision said he had been smoking meat in a stand-up smoker on Saturday and thought the coals were all cool when he put them in a garbage can in the garage Saturday night.

But, they set the attached garage on fire Sunday afternoon, leading to about \$150,000 in damage, not counting the water and smoke damage.

Van Buren Township Fire Marshal Dave McInally said the neighbor across the street noticed the smoke from the garage, ran across the street, and knocked on the door alerting the occupants. McInally said the smoke had not hit the house yet, so the smoke alarm hadn't sounded.

He said after the occupants had exited, the woman ran back in to get the dog. She

DATAOSARA DAADNATS was evaluated by Huron Valley Ambulance for smoke inhalation. McInally said he believes they had no renter's insurance.

According to the township website, the property is owned by JGJ Rentals.

Part of the roof over the garage collapsed, but fire had not entered the bedroom above the garage but went through the walls to the roof, McInally said.

Both the VBT and Romulus Fire Department ladders trucks were on hand. VBT has a mutual-aid agreement with Romulus that it will bring a ladder truck on mutual aid calls to that section of the township.

McInally said fire fighters were able to get on the roof using the Romulus ladder truck, rather than putting ladders against the house. The fire department was called at 2:41 p.m. and left the scene at 6:07 p.m.

# Two neighbors pull 3-year-old boy out of Belleville Lake

A three-year-old boy and his six-year-old sister were playing along the seawall on the shore of Belleville Lake when the boy fell into the lake.

This was at 178 North Liberty Street in Belleville between 4 and 5 p.m. Saturday, May 27.

Fred Trombley, 69, was working in his backyard at 110 N. Liberty, a couple of doors down, when he heard the little girl calling out, "Help. Help." He started unloading things from his pockets as he ran to her, tossing away the screwdriver, clippers, and pulling off his kneepads that protected his bum knee.

He ran along the fronts of the properties and past the location so he vaulted over a fence to get to the right spot.

Trombley said when he got there, he looked into the water and saw a woman with a coral shirt face down in the lake. Another neighbor, Michelle Calahan, 50, had dived right in the water to help the boy. She saw the boy's head and then it went down. She had her face in the water looking for him.

She found the boy and brought him up and was having trouble with buoyancy as she tried to get the water out of his mouth.

She was next to the seawall and couldn't get up so she called out to Trombley, "Take the boy.'

He grabbed the boy and pulled him up and then turned to her. He had both hands around one of her wrists, trying to hold onto her.


Then, a boat happened to go by and tossed a life preserver to Calahan. She grabbed the preserver and then was able to go along the seawall to the ladder there and climb out.

By then, Belleville Police had arrived. The boy was taken to the hospital for an evaluation and he was fine, said Police Chief Hal Berriman. He said Calahan had applied early CPR to the child.

"I'm really proud of them," Chief Berriman said of the two residents who saved the child. "They did exactly the right things."

He said he is working on getting civilian life-saving citations for both Calahan and Trombley.

Chief Berriman said police have been called to the children's home many, many times because the children have not had proper supervision. He said police have called protective services before to check out the home and - after the accident --they have called them again.

On May 16, the Van Buren Township appeal in the Visteon bond case was dismissed by the Michigan Court of Appeals.

On Monday afternoon, the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees and members of the Local Development Finance Authority (LDFA) met for about an hour behind closed doors with their attorney in the case, Kaveh Kashef.

When they ended the session Monday, there was no public announcement on their conclusions, but at Tuesday's regular meeting the board voted to approve its attorney's recommendation regarding Visteon legislation.

The suit originally was filed in August 2015 in Wayne County Circuit Court. It alleged Visteon breached its contract tied to the construction of Visteon Village.

The township claimed Visteon is legally obligated to cover the projected shortfall between bond payments and tax revenue from its headquarters.

Visteon contends it isn't obligated to cover the shortfall.

Circuit Court dismissed the case in February 2016 saying the township cannot sue for an injury or shortfall it has not yet realized – and the appeals court agreed.

However, both courts ruled that Van Buren Township can refile the complaint when a shortfall actually occurs.

In 2012, Visteon sold Visteon Village to Sovereign Partners LLC, a New York real estate firm, for a reported \$81.1 million. The site now is referred to as Grace Lake Corporate Center. A representative of Sovereign Partners serves on the VBT LDFA.

The Van Buren Township Board of Trustees held its regular meeting at the Belleville Area Museum in downtown Belleville on Tuesday and Supervisor Kevin McNamara waxed poetic about the close links between Belleville and VBT, saying they have two governments, but one community.

City Councilman Tom Fielder welcomed VBT to town in absence of the mayor and talked about a possible merger that – because of VBT's numbers – would mean VBT would get the government, but Belleville would get the name.

Barbara Miller, a VBT resident who practices law in Belleville, asked the supervisor and board to establish a committee to recommend the best use of the old fire hall behind the museum and the expansion of use of the historical museum. The museum and its site in downtown Belleville are owned by VBT.

Miller said the community has a very healthy cultural community, but it is nascent.

The museum's expanded use or limited use shouldn't happen like Topsy, with no plan, she said. Since the library is expanding this is a good time to take a look at the museum which could become a cultural center. It should be a deliberate plan and should not be considered a threat, but an opportunity, she said. Supervisor McNamara said he will set up meetings to advance this idea.

A new day in the community.

We've had several calls from people concerned about scary dogs in Van Buren Township. One lady said there is a new man in her neighborhood – moved in six months ago – with two huge dogs with huge heads.

She said they did attack a little Pomeranian two doors down and the little dog had to be put down. There is a \$350 vet bill that the little dog's owner had to pay because they had to take it to an emergency vet after hours.

She is concerned about small children in the neighborhood and wonders if the two dogs that attacked the man and his dog in Van Buren Park are the same dogs that fatally wounded the Pomeranian.

She thought those dogs would just attack other dogs, but when she read about the man in Van Buren Park, she got to wondering. I directed her to call Van Buren Township police to discuss her concerns.

A reader dropped by to say the new outdoor sculpture near Hayward's reminds him of "Hands Up, Don't Shoot."

Jan Lemmon, chairwoman of the Romulus Cemetery Commission, called me to talk about the letter to the editor printed a couple of weeks ago that said Hillside Cemetery was a disgrace. She said she feels sorry for the people who have loved ones there.

Jan said in 2008, the Romulus Cemetery on Shook Road looked like that and five people got together to form a cemetery commission following state law and with the blessings of the city council.

She outlined all the things they did and noted that a few days earlier she had six phone calls commenting on how beautiful

the cemetery looked. That probably had to do with the trees they planted that were flowering. Each one was put in with a donation of \$335 in memory of someone.

Jan said she thinks the Romulus City Council just thought they were going to talk, but they started raising money and working. She said they earned \$2,000 with a euchre tournament in one night.

She said a pig roast is coming up in August. She said the council saw how hard they were working and how much money they were raising, that they have chipped in with money to help.

"It was not easy, but it was gratifying," she said. At the very beginning, they removed all the rocks around graves that kept the graves from being properly mowed. And, they convinced the city council to have outside people mow, rather than the DPW, and they got a firm run by a pastor that costs much less.

They made rules and made everyone comply. It once looked like a flea market, with all the different decorations, and now it's clear to mow.

She said they have put in medallions to hold the flags for the veterans. They take down the flags in the winter because the winter weather is so hard on flags. The Wreaths Across America wreaths for veterans are propped against the medallions in the winter. National Wreaths Across America Day will be Dec. 16 this year and it is coordinated with wreath-laying events at Arlington Cemetery and 1,200 other locations.

At the May 30 work/study session of the Belleville City Council, the council discussed the limited revenue and how

there are only two DPW workers and a part-time Building Official to keep the city in shape. Planning Commissioner Mike Renaud said, "The city is looking a little shabby," and he was told there is one

more DPW worker in the new budget. He suggested the city consider the \$171,000 in taxes from Victoria Commons that goes to the DDA. If Victoria Commons was taken out of the DDA, the city could really use that money.

The council is looking at different options for the future, but, under the city charter, it needs to get a proposed, balanced 2017-18 budget approved this week. The June 5 meeting could be recessed until the June 19 meeting if councilmen aren't ready this week, as they've done in the past.

There's nothing in that budget for Doane's Landing repairs, replacement of the 28-year-old fire engine, or planning consultants to help with the updated Master Plan required by law. The council agreed to transfer \$6,600 more into the cemetery fund to balance that budget.



#### Van Buren Township **ISO** rating improves from Class 6 to 4

Last week, Van Buren Township Fire Chief Amy Brow announced that the Insurance Services Office (ISO) has announced that the VBT fire department's class rating has improved from a 06/6X to a class 04/4X.

"This means your insurance rates could be reduced," Chief Brow said to township residents and business owners, noting the insurance savings is primarily seen in businesses within the township.

"Again, this savings only applies to VBT and does not include the City of Belleville," Chief Brow said.

She said the ISO finished their report on the VBT last August. The rating is from 1 to 10, with the lower numbers better.

# **Belleville City Council approves 2017-18 fiscal year budget**

The Belleville City Council may have to take \$111,000 out of its \$1 million fund balance to cover the coming year's budget – but there are hopes that some expected cost cuts may not make that necessary.

In its regular meeting Monday, the council voted unanimously to approve the 2017-18 general fund budget of \$2.2 million, plus the other assorted budgets.

The Belleville Downtown Development Authority has not submitted its updated budget to include in the city budgets that will be sent to the state, so the city is including the DDA's budget from last year. When the DDA approves a budget, the city council can amend its budget, said Plante Moran consultant Brian Camiller.

"They have until the stroke of midnight on June 30 [to submit their budget to the state]," Camiller said of the DDA. "If not, they are in violation of the state budget act."

The city is in a disagreement with the DDA about its paying less maintenance for the DDA district than it used to, said City Manager Diana Kollmeyer. "It's deteriorated," she said of the amount paid.

"I anticipate we will get a budget [from the DDA]," Mayor Kerreen Conley said.

She said the city attorney and Kollmeyer will sit down with the DDA attorney and its representatives. In the past, negotiating for the DDA has been DDA coordinator Carol Thompson and DDA president Rosemary Loria.

Mayor Conley said they will come up with a maintenance budget, but she isn't sure what that will look like.

"Hopefully, it will be something we can work with," Mayor Conley said.

Jeff Vernon asked what kinds of options they are looking at for future budgets.

"I read in the paper the residents should 'hold onto their wallets," Vernon said.

"I loved that comment," Mayor Conley said, indicating the opposite. She said the council had discussed options to find an alternative way to continue the services. She said that included cooperative agreements and outsourcing.

Mayor Conley said the city of Belleville offers a level of service different than other communities and, "We have been able to pay for that."

She said Act 33, discussed at the last budget session that allows for the council to levy a public safety millage, was an option.

"We know we've reached the point where there was nowhere else to cut," Mayor Conley said. "We had to look at other things to explore."

Councilman Tom Fielder said he felt they should just deal with the present budget now and then look into other options for future budgets. He pointed out the city budget, under city charter, had to be approved by the first meeting

in June, which was that night's meeting. Mayor Conley pointed out the city would get \$440,000 more in tax money without the DDA, minus its \$369,058 in debt service. She said the DDA takes \$170,000 in taxes from Victoria Commons and it is not a traditional district.

The council also approved a fourth-quarter budget amendment transferring 50% of Major Street Revenue to the Local Street Fund to pay for Harbour Pointe street repairs.

The council also approved the 2017 millage rate of 18.1 mills.

In other business in Monday's meeting, the

council:

• Approved closing High Street from the corner of Roys to the church parking lot on July 4 for Grace Baptist Church's 29<sup>th</sup>-annual church picnic. Pastor Bob White advised the church will celebrate its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary in January;

• Was advised by Paul Henning that the Strawberry Festival Carnival will be the same as last year at St. Anthony's and on Main Street – no new locations, as previously considered;

• Opened the lone bid for spray patching for a temporary road fix at Harbour Pointe. Highway Maintenance and Construction of Romulus bid \$13,140. Building Official Rick Rutherford said he had contacted five companies. This bid is within the amount expected, he said, and they can start in two weeks. This spray patching is the first step in temporarily repairing the streets, he said. The council passed a motion to accept the bid with a cost not to exceed \$16,000, in case more work than estimated is needed;

• Opened five bids for city website design and sent them to the administration for a recommendation. Bids came from Stone Interactive Group in Ann Arbor, Design Hub in Saline, Town Web of Madison, WI, Revie of Troy, and Municode of Tallahassee, FL;

• Approved an amendment to Ordinance # 53-72 on special assessments, changing the maximum number of installments from 20 to 25 years;

• Approved a 14-page amendment to the financing plan and final judgment for the Downriver Sewage Disposal System, as recommended by city attorney Steve Hitchcock;

• Approved accounts payable of \$98,096.06 and the following departmental purchases in excess of \$500: to Oakland County Treasurer, CLEMIS maintenance fees of \$2,495, from general/police budgets; to Fire Catt, LLC, hose/ladder testing cost of \$1,846 from general/fire budget; to Allie Brothers, shoulder patches, \$840 from general/ police budget; to Macomb Community College, firearms training, \$700, from general/police budget; and to Metro Environmental Services, jet service-sewer main, \$607.50, from general/ water-sewer budget;

• Heard Councilman Jesse Marcotte say that he appreciates the fresh landscaping around

the green building on East Huron River Drive. Rutherford said the city paid and can assess it to somebody who owns it now. He said for the last two years nobody would admit to owning it. He said a man is interested in buying it and rehabbing it; and • Heard the mayor say there were 175 cars at that evening's car show on Main Street and a lot of dogs are there, too. She reminded everyone of the farmer's market that will be on the second and fourth Mondays at the Fourth



#### <u>Court Watching:</u> Judge Oakley binds over three in Sumpter Twp. home invasion charges

On May 31, Jamele Johnathon Belton, 18, waived his preliminary exam on first-degree home invasion charges and 34<sup>th</sup> District Court Judge Brian A. Oakley bound him over to circuit court for an arraignment on the information on June 7.

Belton was one of three arrested for breaking into a home in the 27000 block of Sumpter Road in Sumpter Township on April 29. The three have been lodged in the Wayne County Jail since then and a fourth member of the group, a juvenile, is being handled in juvenile court.

Belton's court-appointed attorney Shaun Godwin said his client is an 11<sup>th</sup> grader at Ypsilanti Community High School and has only one previous charge, a juvenile felonious assault in 2012. Godwin asked for personal bond instead of the present \$25,000/10%.

Wayne County Assistant Prosecutor Greg Akaraz opposed personal bond and Judge Oakley reduced Belton's bond to \$10,000/10%.

#### Armani Lavel Chivas Karo

Armani Lavel Chivas Karo, 18, another defendant in the Sumpter Township home invasion also waived his preliminary exam and was bound over to circuit court for an arraignment on the information on June 7.

He is charged with home invasion first degree. His stand-in attorney Godwin asked for reduced bail and Judge Oakley reduced the original \$25,000/10% he had set for Karo to \$10,000/10%.

Judge Oakley noted that the two traffic violations pending for Karo were cleared in light of time served. Karo has been in the Wayne County Jail since his arrest on April 29.

#### Deantwuan Rayshawn Woods

Attorney Godwin also asked for reduced bond for the third co-defendant, Deantwuan Rayshawn Woods, 20, who is also charged with home invasion 1<sup>st</sup> degree. In addition, Woods is charged with assault with intent to murder, assault with intent to harm less than murder, assault with a dangerous weapon, weapon in a vehicle, and five counts of felony firearm.

He was lodged at the jail on bond of \$100,000 cash or surety. Judge Oakley noted Woods is on probation on a conviction of receiving and concealing a stolen motor vehicle.

When Godwin asked for a reduced bond of \$25,000/10%, Judge Oakley refused and kept the previous bond.

Sumpter Detective John Toth is officer in charge of the cases.

#### James Forrest Chapman

Charges from a June 2016 incident in Van Buren Township have been refiled against James Forrest Chapman by the Wayne County Prosecutor's office. That's the time Chapman reportedly jumped into Belleville Lake to flee VBT police.

He is charged with a felony offense of assaulting/resisting/obstructing a police officer and the misdemeanor offense of refusing to provide a DNA sample.

The charges had been dismissed May 2 by Circuit Court Judge Margaret Van Houten when Van Buren Township officers did not show up for the jury trial that was to begin. They were not subpoenaed for the trial and were unaware it was to begin. Charges against Chapman were dismissed without prejudice and the Prosecutor's Office indicated it would refile the charges.

According to the Wayne County Sheriff's Department website, Chapman was booked on the refiled charges at 10:12 p.m. May 30 and bonds were set at \$500 cash or surety and \$2,000 personal recognizance bond. He was in custody via an electronic monitoring unit and was due at 34<sup>th</sup> District Court to face the charges on June 7.

But on Monday, Chapman appealed to Judge Oakley for a reconsideration of his bond and Judge Oakley reduced Chapman's bond to personal recognizance (no cash required) and ordered his tether be removed.

Meanwhile Chapman also is due to be before Judge Brian Oakley on June 21, which was the motion date set for a similar DNA refusal charge, this one that had accompanied a 2015 felony.

Chapman said he would write a motion requesting dismissal of the 2015 charge. Judge Oakley previously dismissed the charge and the Prosecutor's appeal to Circuit Court resulted in Circuit Court sending the case back to Judge Oakley.



AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 53-72: SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS

The City of Belleville, Wayne County, Michigan, hereby ordains that:

Section 1. Section 74-162 "Maximum number of installments; minimum number of installments" in Chapter 74 "Special Assessments" in the Code of Ordinances of the City of Belleville is hereby amended to read as follows:

Annual installments for special assessments shall not exceed twenty-five (25) years, in number, or the useful life of the asset, whichever is less as the Council may determine at the time of confirmation of the roll. If a division of the assessment operates to make any installment less than \$10.00, the assessor shall reduce the number of installments so that each installment shall be above and as near to \$10.00 as possible.
