Steve Jones now interim city manager

Steve Jones, assistant city manager, was promoted to temporary interim city manager at Monday's meeting of the

Belleville City Council.

Mayor Ken Voigt said Jones will get a \$10,000 per year raise, which will be prorated. According to information provided to the Independent, for the year 2024, Jones made \$73,624.96 base pay

and with benefits it was \$87,881. The city manager at the time, Jason Smith, made \$86,923.08 base pay and \$107,859.12 with

The city parted company with Smith on June 19. Mayor Voigt said then that the city probably will do a search for a new city manager, but there is no hurry since they have an assistant city manager.

In other business at the 17-minute meeting on Monday, the council:

- Witnessed the ceremonial swearing in of Heather Holcomb of Garden City as a new Belleville Police officer. She has 17 years of police experience and came to Belleville from Center Line. Her parents Joann and Herb Holcomb of Westland were in the audience;
- Heard brief comments from Diane Blazek and Galen Gates from America in Bloom. The team was in Belleville Monday and Tuesday to assess the town's landscaping and community vitality and to write a report. Before the meeting, mayor Voigt gave them directions to John Juriga's home on East Huron River Drive, where the council apparently hurried to after its

SEMCOG presents \$1.74 million check to VBT

At its regular meeting July 15, the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees was very happy to accept a check for \$1.74 million in federal funds obtained through the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments.

The funds will be used to build a shareduse path along Tyler Road from Quirk Road to McBride Road to increase safety for those walking and biking. It will also have a HAWK signal to create a safer road

crossing near Walden Boulevard.

Supervisor Kevin McNamara had the board walk out of the meeting and down the hall to pose in front of a special backdrop that had been put in place near the front door of township hall.

The meeting wasn't officially paused, but the picture with the ceremonial check was taken with the board, the SEMCOG representative, and state representative Reggie Miller. Then they walked back down the hall and resumed the meeting.

Supervisor McNamara said he was

very excited about the check, saying the township had applied for the Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) grant two or three times and was turned down each

He said they were disappointed, but they applied again.

He said they ramped up their application, put trustee Donald Boynton on the SEMCOG board, he never missed a meeting, and there was a personal application. The township finally got the



Belleville DDA working on final proposal for business incubator

Steve Jones, acting Belleville city manager and director of the Downtown Development Authority, reported to the DDA at its July 16 meeting that he is working to finalize a proposal with a consultant for a business incubator project in the former hardware store the DDA owns on Main Street.

He said Laura Sigmund of Best Practices consulting services, also works out of the Romulus Nest that uses small office space. She plans to run the Belleville program in cooperation with the Romulus project, using the Belleville retail space for

Jones said Sigmund thinks this is a perfect partnership, since Belleville is walkable, the location is on Main Street, and it has big windows.

DDA member Chris Donley said Romulus is not walkable downtown and the entrepreneurs leave Romulus once they are trained.

"The idea behind this is to give entrepreneurs a chance to begin," said mayor Ken Voigt, who added the city plans on working with universities as well, using their graduate students.

Jones said he is still working on the cost. He said there will be a graduated fee schedule for rent, small at the beginning, going up to almost market-grade in seven months.

Mayor Voigt said they plan to guide the trained entrepreneurs into empty spaces and show developers we have people for them. He said there is no shortage of entrepreneurs in this area and all you have to do is walk through the farmers' market to see that.

DDA member Valerie Kelley-Bonner said they want to get the right kinds of businesses

Mayor Voigt said they are seeking foodbased and retail. He said if you study successful downtowns, "What I've been doing for 41 years," they have a critical mass of eating places.

Jones said he expects a successful venture because of Sigmund's experience.

When asked how many participants they can have, Jones said 15, but he has to get the bathroom facilities in place and get the place painted.

Donley said they could turn the outside covered area into an eating area.

"It's slow, but we want to make sure we're doing it right," Jones said.

He said the next step is to get the bathrooms done and finalize the proposal with Sigmund. Then it will be brought back to the DDA for final approval.

In other business at the July 16 meeting,

- Unanimously approved the DDA budget for 2025-26. Mayor Voigt said the maintenance agreement with the city goes away and the DDA only pays for a portion of the director's salary;
- · Heard Jones report that the clock was put up in the Fourth Street Square at around 3 that afternoon and Craig Atchinson dropped off a "sizeable donation" for the clock. Also, the pickleball court is up in Village Park. Mayor Voigt said a ribboncutting is needed;
- · Was introduced to Antonio Harrison, an intern from Grand Valley State University where he is a political science major. He lives locally and wants to be a lawyer. He has been working on projects since May, including the base deterioration of the LaSalle statue in Victory Park and preparing the DDA office for the move to the new city hall;
- · Discussed a proposal to replace the water truck that waters all the flowers downtown. Jones said the former fuel truck that had replaced the old water truck had a transmission failure so they are back to the old truck that is in bad shape. Needed is something to support a 5,000-pound tank filled with water. Mayor Voigt said all the flowers that have been planted, especially

the baskets, have to be watered every day. Jones presented a proposal for a truck from LaFontaine in Walled Lake. He said he didn't contact Atchinson but looked on its website and didn't see a truck they could use. Donley and Voigt said they would like to go local and Atchinson might be able to get a truck. Jones said he would call Atchinson and explore all options. Costs can come out of the fund balance, said secretary Denise Baker. Voigt said the truck they are using now is "pretty rattylooking";

- Heard Donley, head of the Marketing and Community Engagement committee, report on the social media efforts through Kathleen Springer's group. They reported the Summer of Local Love promotion is a big hit with the businesses. Jones said the city is working with Jessica Thomas at Holiday Inn on a marketing of Belleville to motel residents. The DDA also bought pages in Van Buren Today magazine; and
- · Heard Voigt say Belleville might be eligible next year for the Detroit Institute of Arts Inside/Out program, which has put up art in Van Buren Township this summer. He said municipalities can apply every three years and Belleville last had the DIA art a few years ago. Voigt said the city has a lot of public art now and they need to promote the public art with a map.

Winter said the emergency workers stabilized the man for 20 minutes until Huron Valley Ambulance got there to take

Travis Sheets, the president and CEO of the Sheetz family chain of convenience stores/gas stations, was in the area on Tuesday to preside over the second Sheetz store to open in Romulus. This one is at 29225 Smith Rd. The first store opened

last August at 33380 Wick Rd. and is doing

very well.

At Tuesday's celebration, Sheetz sponsored a food drive and everyone who brought a non-perishable item received a gift. And, there were a couple drawings for \$250 gift cards.

Sheetz is in the process of opening 50-60 new stores in Michigan and the first two are in Romulus.

The chain also plans to open a Sheetz location at the southwest corner of Haggerty and Ecorse roads in Van Buren Township. They are working on the drainage problems at that site before work can begin.

The Sheetz request to build at the site came in the same day as another one to build on the northwest corner of Haggerty and Ecorse, right across the street. There already is a truck stop at the northeast corner, so Van Buren Township put a sixmonth moratorium on fueling stations in

the township and just passed an ordinance amendment that requires them to be at least

a quarter of a mile apart. The new law, of

course, doesn't affect those who previously

had applied at the Haggerty/Ecorse corner.

The Michigan DNR sent out a news release about Pete Pitzen's grandson Codie Carlson of Newport who caught a state record-setting 64.46-pound flathead catfish while bow-hunting in the middle of the night June 29 in Plum Creek in Monroe County.

Of course, Pete had already announced this to our readers in a letter to the editor published last week. He's pretty proud of Codie, who grew up in Belleville and attended Tyler Elementary and North Middle School, Pete said in his letter.

Pete still lives here and gives out free American flags through the Belleville VFW. You see a lot of letters from him about flags.

We were glad to see the DNR news release because readers have been asking me where he caught that fish and Pete didn't know. The DNR said it was on Plum Creek in Monroe County. The secret's out.

We're told someone mowed down the carefully planted Trilliums and Lady Slippers and a third of the Monarch Butterfly Garden in Banotai Park recently.

A handful of people have worked on the

few years to get it to where it was growing beautifully. Recently two visitors from France and one from Denmark came to view the garden.

We're told research on Monarch Butterflies was done in 2009 on the International Space Station to see how the loss of gravity affected them. They learned a lot of things, but concluded there is a lot more to learn about the Monarchs.

Recently a resident of Canada who regularly Belleville brought us some Canadian papers

Tiggs sentenced to 18 years in prison for 2023 VBT shooting death

Matthew Torrey Tiggs, Jr., 24, of Eastpointe, has been sentenced to 18 years in prison for the Aug. 4, 2023 shooting death of 26-year-old Jean Thomas Butchart in the Van Buren Estates mobile home park in the 16800 block of Lohr Rd. in Van Buren Township.

The victim, who was pulling weeds on his first day on the job as a maintence worker, was found dead with a bullet wound in the head. Nine charges were filed against Tiggs for this and two other incidents in the mobile home park.

On June 17, 2025 he pled guilty to seconddegree murder, assault with intent to murder, and two felony firearm charges. Three charges of possession of a weapon by a felon were dropped, along with a charge of felonious assault and felony firearm.

On July 9, Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Kelly Ramsey sentenced him to a prison term of 2 years to 20 years, with credit for time served of 703 days. Fees totaled

A jury trial that had been set for Aug 2

A jury trial that had been set for Aug. 25 was canceled.

Van Buren Township Police said Tiggs had approached the victim, produced a handgun and fired it multiple times before fleeing the scene.

Tiggs also was accused of pulling a firearm after an argument with a 45-year-old man around 11:31 a.m. on the previous Friday, July 28, 2023 in the 30 block of Birch Drive in the mobile home park. He pointed the weapon at the man before fleeing the scene. This assault wasn't discovered until after a shooting on Aug. 6.

Van Buren police were at the mobile home

park on Sunday, Aug. 6, investigating the Aug. 4 murder, when they were dispatched to a residence in the 40 block of Birch Drive for multiple gunshots. Officers found a 47-year-old victim suffering from gunshot wounds to the right upper arm and lower back.

Police said Tiggs approached the victim while he was in his vehicle and produced and fired a handgun multiple times, wounding the victim. The defendant then barricaded himself inside the next-door residence.

After a two-hour standoff with the Western Wayne SWAT team negotiating, Tiggs was taken into custody.

He is considered an habitual offender with a

He is considered an habitual offender with a second-offense notice. He had pled guilty to a charge of carrying a concealed weapon on Jan. 27, 2019 in Macomb County and served two years in state prison. He was released July 29, 2021.

Butchart, who was born in Ypsilanti, was survived by his parents and two sisters, and was known for his love of the natural world, as he was nicknamed "Nature Boy" by many of his friends, according to his obituary. He earned a bachelor of science degree in environmental studies with an emphasis in hydrology.





VBT planners OK Autokiniton canopy, Ricardo extension

The request for preliminary and final site plan approval for Autokiniton's new 6,600-square-foot, galvanized, aluminum canopy was approved unanimously at the May 28 meeting of the Van Buren Township Planning Commission.

Autokiniton is at 6201 Haggerty Rd. and is the former L&W site. Brandon Henderson, Autokiniton Corporate Facilities Manager, said Autokiniton was formed after Tower International and L&W were bought and merged together.

He said the firm mainly is a stamping plant auto supplier with some assembly. He said they have 32 facilities across the country, with sites also in Mexico, Brazil, and India.

He said they take large rolls of steel in their press line and huge or small parts are pressed, as needed. As the press comes down, the scrap goes underneath and finally into a dumpster. The scrap is not reused. The new canopy will cover the scrap until it is removed from the site, which will take about two days.

Henderson said the government requires the scrap to be covered to keep oily water out of the water table. He said the former owner didn't cover the scrap and Autokiniton is complying.

At the commission's May 8 meeting, Adam Tabit of Lee Contracting, Inc. was

present but unable to answer questions on all the outdoor storage piled all the way to I-275 at the site, which is a violation. No one from the company was present. Tabit is the contractor to erect the canopy.

The commissioners wanted someone from the company present to answer questions on violations so the canopy project was unanimously postponed until information was available.

At the May 28 meeting, Tabit showed pictures from earlier that day of how all the outdoor storage had been removed.

The commission was satisfied with Henderson's presentation. Tabit said the present "carport" that was put up in violation was to be removed that weekend.

Henderson said a Google map shows some trees in the landscaping need to be replaced and they will be replaced. The commission also approved cutting back the required amount of paved parking on site by 123 spaces since they don't need that many spaces for employees. Also, Autokiniton will change the address on its request from Belleville to Van Buren Township, as requested.

Ricardo temporary land use

After a brief discussion, the commission unanimously approved extending the previously approved temporary land use for a mobile refueling station that was to expire on May 31. Now it will extend to Dec. 31, 2025.

This is at the Ricardo site at 40000 Ricardo Dr., northeast of the Haggerty Road/Tyler Road intersection.

Ken Strang, program manager for this particular project, said they have retrofitted three trucks with hydrogen and now Toyota wants one more truck retrofitted, the reason for the requested extension.

Ricardo also received temporary land use approvals in 2016, 2018, 2019, and 2024. In 2023 temporary land use was approved but never implemented.

Commission vice-chairman Jeff Jahr asked if Ricardo has plans to do this permanently and Strang replied that Ricardo has bigger plans for that facility and will be coming to the planning commission with the project soon. He said there will be no room for the mobile refueling station at the site.

Commissioner Jahr said since Ricardo has done the same thing year after year without any problems and in a safe way that maybe the township staff could approve such temporary land uses in the future.

Vidya Krishnan of McKenna, head planning consultant for the township, agreed that some applications are the same year after year by the same people, such as the fireworks tents, and this could be approved by the administration, but there should be something in writing. She will prepare something and bring it back to the commission for review.

"Pretty heinous scam"

Planning and Zoning Specialist Brittany Williams said she was going to stop putting copies of permit applications into the board packets because of a recent scam. She said emails that look like they are from the township, with a township logo, are being sent out to business people dealing with the township. She said the names and addresses and phone numbers are on the applications and they are being used as part of the scam.

"It's a pretty heinous scam," said Jahr, adding, "I hope law enforcement is working on this, and the FBI."

Williams said the police department is investigating and the FBI has been contacted. She said they have been getting calls from businesses about bills from the township that are not legitimate.

The commissioners agreed they don't need to see the applications in their packets and Jahr agreed they can be reviewed by the staff

McNamara said U.S. Congresswoman Debbie Dingell was a huge supporter and a regional review committee had been selected.

Rep. Miller said this shows good government in action. She said Tyler Road is a corridor for families. She said she was there to celebrate and congratulate Van Buren Township, her home community where she used to serve on the township board.

Clerk Leon Wright thanked Merrie Coburn for all her work on this grant. Coburn is executive director of the Downtown Development Authority and she did the extensive work needed for all the applications for the federal grant.

"We'll be able to do something for our residents," clerk Wright said. "There are a lot of homes on Tyler Road and it's not walkable now."

In other business at the July 15 meeting, the board:

- Went into a 46-minute, closed-door session at the beginning of the meeting to consult with its attorney regarding trial or settlement strategy in connection with specific pending litigation;
- · Held a moment of silence in memory of retired Van Buren Township Police Captain Kenneth Brooks who died July 7. Captain Brooks also had served as 34th District Court Judge Lisa Martin's court officer.

Condolences were sent to the family;

- · Heard a presentation by four representatives of Giffels Webster who will work to design a redevelopment project for the township's 181 acres it purchased from Ford Motor Co. at the northwest corner of Tyler and Belleville roads. A review committee selected Giffels Webster from the top four finalists of eight proposals. They will go through a series of steps to design a vibrant, mixed-use plan for a neighborhood that is economically and environmentally sustainable. They will identify what the community wants there through community engagement and come up with a master plan the community will like. McNamara said all the companies that applied are first-rate companies and any one of them would have been good;
- · Approved the personal services agreement of Kevin J. Lawrence as water and sewer director. McNamara said Lawrence is returning to the position. He said the township let him get away and now it has him back;
- · Approved the second reading and final approval of an ordinance amendment to create zoning regulations addressing Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS). A developer said he is planning a BESS at the northeast corner of Rawsonville and Bemis roads; and
- · Approved the second reading and final approval of a zoning ordinance amendment to require adequate spacing between Motor Vehicle Fueling Stations;
- Approved the recommendation from the attorney in connection with pending litigation;
- · Heard Marlene Jones tell the board the township has been unwilling to help her take her son's English black labrador away from him, so she can take better care of it. McNamara referred to a report by Police Lt. Ken Floro on his investigation into the issue and it says the dog is well-cared-for. She asked for a copy of the report and McNamara said it was a public document and he would give her a copy. He also sent a copy to the *Independent*.

VBT sends out 100 letters asking voters to confirm their residency

Van Buren Township has sent out 100 letters to specific voters asking them to conform their residency.

At the July 15 township board meeting, he said he was glad the Independent was

present so he could explain why and the paper could let the people know.

Clerk Wright said the township received a letter challenging these voters' legitimate right to vote because of their residency.

He said the township uses the state list about eligibility and so he sent out letters for those voters to come into the office and swear they live at the address listed.

17-minute meeting;

- Approved the annual citywide yard sale on Saturday, Sept. 6, and Sunday, Sept. 7. These are the days yard sales can be held without a permit;
- Approved the \$17,864 purchase from STE of Almont of a low-mount hitch and 10' tall, 36" plow for the newly purchased Mack dump truck. With the total labor and hydraulics installation, the total comes to \$28,657. DPW director Melissa Frierson said this would be used for clearing heavy snowfall. Mayor Voigt said the city should have purchased it at the beginning when it bought the truck, but the former city manager didn't recommend that. Voigt said the city hasn't had a major snow event lately and is lucky;
- · Removed the Main Street Striping quote from the agenda, agreeing it needs to be placed on the Downtown Development Authority agenda, instead. The quotes were \$46,597.92 for option A and \$19,065 for option B from Al's Asphalt Paving;
- · Approved the Interagency Audio-Visual Recording Standard Mutual Assistance Agreement with Van Buren Township. Public Safety Director Kris Faull said during the onsite state assessment of the police department, it was found Belleville did not have an interrogation room with audio/visual recording devices as mandated by law. She said Belleville uses Van Buren Township for dispatch and detainment of prisoners and uses its interrogation room when needed, but by law it has to be in writing that they can use that room. She said in the new city hall the police will have an interrogation room as required;
- · Heard interim city manager Jones report the new clock has been installed on the Fourth Street Square. Snider Electric did the installation and Contract Welding modified the plates to make it fit. Jones said this clock lights up at night.

The Amendments will include minimum lot area and width, front yard setback, side or rear yard setback, side or rear yard setback abutting residential zoned property, ingress and egress, driveway spacing, number of driveways, separation distance, pumps, off-street parking and loading, canopy structure, fueling operations, pedestrian circulation, signs, severability, repealer, savings clause, effective date and adoption.




