### School Board OKs \$77 million bond proposal for ballot

The Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education voted unanimously on Monday to place a \$77 million, 30-year bond proposal on the Nov. 4 ballot.

School Supt. Pete Kudlak said the board needed to officially pass the resolution to put it on the ballot.

The bond language for the ballot lists all the things that could be done with the money and notes that the total amount of qualified bonds currently outstanding is \$65.875,000.

The bond proposal advises that under state law the bond proceeds cannot be used for repair or maintenance costs, teacher, administrator or employee salaries, or other operating expenses.

Supt. Kudlak said the proposed bond will add zero amount to the millage the voters are already paying on their school taxes. He said since the 2019 approval for three series of 30-year bonds for \$36 million, taxpayers have been paying 2.98 mills. If this new millage is not approved, he said, the amount of the millage would go down slowly as the former bonds are paid off.

In other business at the 32-minute public part of the meeting, the board:

• Approved a three-year collective bargaining agreement with the Van Buren Education Association, generally with 4% raises for union members. The other changes were detailed on the report to the board. Starting salaries for teachers will be \$51,600 for the 2025-26 school year and \$54,100 in the 2027-28 school year. Top salary for the 2025-26 school year is \$98,500 and that top salary goes up to \$107,500 in 2027-28. Human Resources director John Leroy said they checked with other districts to keep the local pay competitive. They started negotiating in

### Corps of Engineers says radioactive waste going to Texas

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has confirmed that the lightly radioactive waste from Lewiston, NY, that was going to be buried in Van Buren Township, is heading instead to Andrews, TX. Shipments by rail began July 15 to the site, 350 miles west of Dallas.

The lightly radioactive material from the Manhattan Project in Niagara County was generated during the 1940s, when the U.S. government built an atomic bomb to put an end to World War II in the Pacific.

The Waste Control Specialists site in Texas has accepted the contract to store the radioactive waste.

A lawsuit filed Sept. 16, 2024 by local communities and a temporary Wayne County Circuit Court restraining order blocked the planned shipments of the latest material to Wayne County. The court order was to be discussed again on July 28.

The shipments now will travel via

specialized railroad cars on the long route to Texas after being hauled out of the site by truck.

Brent Lasada, project manager for the NiagTexasara Falls storage site, explained the logistics.

"Now it's a combination of trucking and rail. So the trucking outside, coming out of the site, looks very similar.

"It looks identical to what it would have been going to Michigan. Just now, we're going to a transload facility to load it up via rail and take it to Texas.

"So it is dependent on the rate at which the material comes out of the site to go to the rail. Once to rail, I believe it's a couple of days, a handful of days down to make that trip down to Texas."

Lasada said this has added on costs: "Our feasibility study had the cost at just under \$600 million. As we go through our design, we're getting updated costs."

Wayne Disposal, owned by Republic Services based in Phoenix, is licensed to receive 722 different types of hazardous waste compounds not suitable for disposal in a conventional landfill.

It is one of only 12 landfills in the U.S. licensed to receive PCBs, and the only such facility in the Midwest.

When asked by the public about the level of radiation at the Wayne Disposal landfill, the EGLE (Michigan Department of Environmental, Great Lakes and Energy) representative said the normal level is 0.4 in a home and 0.41 at this landfill.

The waste from the World War II Manhattan project was due to start arriving Sept. 25, 2024 via a route from Niagara Falls, NY, through Canada to the Blue Water Bridge and then to Van Buren Township.

The defendant in the law suit is Wayne Disposal, Inc. Listed on the complaint, filed

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

### 135 Years of Service: Belleville Seventh-day Adventist Church

Belleville's Seventh-day Adventist Church can trace its beginnings to a series of tent meetings begun in July 1889 by Eugene LeLand.

Cassius Hughes returned in December and found they had been faithful in maintaining their Sabbath meetings and were of good courage. Brother D.E. Wellman, the district director, came for three days and organized a Tract and Missionary Society and a treasurer was appointed to receive tithes.

The brethren and sisters exhibited a commendable zeal in trying to learn how to work for the Lord. The Belleville Company of believers had begun, December 30, 1889.

Additional meetings were held late February and into March, 1890 at the Model School located at the corner of Rawsonville and Martz with two more signing the covenant. Henry Basney along with Elder R.C. Horton then returned and held tent meetings beginning June 21, 1890. At the close they baptized 22 souls leaving behind 29 members who had signed the covenant.

Within a year this group erected a new house of worship in Willis with only \$200 debt. The labors who made this possible, Eugene LeLand, H.C. Basney, and D. Van Horn invited Ellen White, to speak at that dedication on Sabbath, April 4, 1891. Ellen was a co-founder of the Seventh-day Adventist denomination. She is known for her practical and spiritual Bible based council. This included, health reforms in diet and hygiene. She is the most translated non-fiction female author. She wrote about that event:

In response to an urgent call from the brethren who had been laboring in Willis, Mich., I left Battle Creek April 3, in company with sister E. S. Lane, for that place. The Lord had opened the hearts of a goodly number to receive and obey the truth. A church of forty-seven members had been organized, and a neat house of worship built, which is nearly free from debt. {Review and Herald, July 21, 1891 par 3}

A large portion attending at Willis were

from Bellville and it's reported that Ellen White said the church shouldn't have been built there, "for out of Belleville will walk God's children". Conference records continued to show activity until the 42th session of the Michigan Conference in September 1902. At that meeting a petition was presented requesting the organization of the Belleville Company into a church. Belleville Church had taken its new identity on Sept. 28, 1902.

The Belleville members motivated to build their own building decided on a plan to raise money. Mrs. Plague, a mother of a large family, took in laundry until she made enough to have trees, donated by Cylus Coy, cut into lumber. In 1903 with the help of Mr. Courey, also a new convert, they built the first church, a one-room building where the present Liberty Gospel Church stands.

Belleville was for many years a self-supporting church without a full-time pastor. Many workers would come occasionally, but some of the most rewarding were students working on advanced degrees at the nearby University of Michigan. They included William Murdock, William Landeen and Dr. Edward Heppenstall. And many "bright lights" as Ellen White said came from Belleville church. These include the youth, Herber Lohr, Dr. Paul Robb, Elder Samuel Elie, Keylor and Esther Noland, Robert Hoag and others.

In 1953 Pastor Melton Henry came with youth and enthusiasm. The one-room wooden church had serviced the congregation for 50 years from 1903-1953. Its centered pot belly stove having drawn the worshipers close together on many a cold night had served its purpose. Pastor Henry now supervised it being taken down, the wood being saved and a modern brick structure was built on the same site.

This new brick church would hold its first service on Nov. 17, 1954. And within two years Belleville church was dedicated debt free on Oct. 6, 1956. One feature of that location was to keep the pastor's sermons short and on target. If not, the fire station's whistle would witness to the congregation

that the pastor was running behind and all attention was lost.

The new building on Liberty again served the needs of the church for another 50 years from 1954-2003. Then the Canton Adventist Company visited and soon joined with Belleville. They saw the need for a larger church and it was sold in 2003. A five-acre parcel was purchased on Belleville Road and plans were drawn for a 120-seat church all on one level. The sales agreement that allowed them to meet in the old church soon ran out as did money and patience. Arrangements were made to hold Sabbath Services at the Trinity Episcopal Church on Belleville Road near the freeway which continued for 9 years.

In the spring of 2013, Michigan Conference President Jay Gallimore made a surprise visit. He encouraged the congregation to find a new home and secured temporary funding for a used sanctuary. This church at 89 South Edgemont holds 120 people with four classrooms, an office, adequate parking and includes an adjacent parsonage.

Just one week before the first meetings were held, final work and inspections were completed and the required occupancy permit received. The transition from vacant building to the energy and unity of an active church is spiritually rewarding. Belleville Seventh-day Adventist Church continues to serve our community as one of the oldest for 135 years.

### School Board approves net-zero-tax-rate-increase bond proposal

The Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education has approved a resolution to place a bond proposal on the ballot for the Nov. 4, 2025, election.

In a news release from the school district, it is announced the \$77 million proposal, offered at zero mill net increase to the current debt tax rate, aims to build on

the district's recent projects by funding renovations and upgrades across every school in the district.

This bond proposal reflects the district's commitment to ongoing building improvements taking into account community collaboration. All proposed projects align directly with Van Buren

Public Schools' strategic plan, which was shaped by input from over 900 community stakeholders and prioritizes safe, innovative, and inclusive learning environments.

"The impact of our previous bond has been felt in every comer of our district," said school board president Amy Pearce. "The district has one of the area's lowest school debt tax rates and remains committed to making prioritized improvements while not increasing the current debt millage rate of 2.98 mills."

Key components of the proposed bond focus on improvements to help meet

Today's paper has an unusual set of numbers on the front page. It is Vol. 31 for the year, 31 for the week, and July 31 for the day.

There were quite a few guests who arrived to party with the America in Bloom team that came to Belleville on July 21 and 22. After a very brief city council meeting on July 21, the council members and other guests joined the two members of the team at John and Debbie Juriga's home on the water on East Huron River Dr. for an outside catered meal.

The council has to be careful when meeting with a quorum at a private event. If the members talked about anything they are going to vote on in the future, they could be in violation of the Open Meetings Act.

Warren city voters will weigh in on a charter amendment that will allow the mayor to make interim appointments for up to six months.

The Belleville City Charter does not mention interim appointments, so we wonder where the new interim city manager appointment, without a time limit, comes from. Maybe the voters of the city of Belleville should consider amending the charter to allow what was done anyway.

That rainstorm on Monday afternoon canceled the Main Street car show, of course, but some of the vendors at the farmers market stayed on.

That storm stalled over Romulus and some of the streets were in deep water downtown. My son, Bill, works in Romulus and when he tried to drive home he was amazed by

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
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

### Contractor to begin work on invasive growth in Sherwood Pond

Zach Goodhart of Michigan Lake and Pond gave a presentation on the vegetation treatment he will begin on the fishing dock, swim area, and area south of the beach at 17-acre Sherwood Lake.

This was at the July 22 meeting of the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees.

He said he will focus on the vegetation close to shore to begin the eradication of the milfoil invasive species in one acre of the lake. He said it is late in the season for this and he will begain the main program in April, when he will have six treatments

He said he will notify the township before the treatment and post yellow treatment signs at the lake. He said while the herbicide is approved by the Environmental Protection Agency and the state, he will post a 24-hour swim restriction and threeto-four day irrigation restriction.

He said five to seven days after treatment the plants start to wilt and in 10 to 14 days they are falling down. After three to four weeks, there is a marked difference.

Trustee Tim Rush asked if they should do aeration of the pond and Goodhart said anytime you add oxygen it is good for the lake. He said if they decide to add bacterial matter to fight the algae, adding aeration will help to disperse the material.

Supervisor Tim Bowman asked if it wouldn't be better to just dredge the lake and take everything out so it won't come back, instead of just treating and treating.

Goodhart said that milfoil spreads by

Supervisor Bowman agreed a little would break off, but it still would be a better

Goodhart said the treatments cost less than dredging because the state requires the plants be buried in specific landfills or, if at the site, rules for how the hole must

He said to treat it repeatedly is like mowing your lawn. He said he has yet to survey the whole lake.

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

by Canton Township attorney Brandon Michael Grysko, were plaintiffs Canton Charter Township, City of Belleville, City of Romulus, Van Buren Charter Township, and Van Buren Township Fire Chief.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is managing the removal of low-level radioactive soil from Lewiston, NY, a legacy of the Manhattan Project, the secret government project to develop atomic bombs during World War II featured in the 2023 movie "Oppenheimer."

Wayne Disposal in Van Buren Township

was considered to be the closest licensed facility that can take the hazardous material, according to the Army Corps.

Republic Services, owner of Wayne Disposal since 2022, released the following statement:

"Wayne Disposal Inc. has been safely receiving and managing technologically enhanced naturally occurring radioactive material (TNORM) for several years, and our management of this material poses no risk to the community. The landfill meets or exceeds all regulations and is designed to safely manage this type of material, which can be generated through a variety of industrial and other processes.

"The Michigan Department of

Environment, Great Lakes and Energy (EGLE) and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have stated that the material from the Niagara Falls Storage Site does not pose a risk to public health or the community.

"Many industries rely on Wayne Disposal Inc. to responsibly manage waste material, and the court ruling, which was issued without a hearing, impacts our ability to serve these customers. It also hinders important environmental remediation activities and interstate commerce. We look forward to presenting our position to the court in the very near future.'

The Corps of Engineers said in order to keep its site cleanup going, it decided to stop waiting for an approval for the Van

Buren Township site and find another landfill to use.

In May 2018, TNORM waste began being sent to Wayne Disposal from the Brush Beryllium site near Luckey, Ohio. The plant was built by the government in 1949. Wayne Disposal was owned by US Ecology at the time. In 2022 the hazardous landfill was sold to Republic Services, the second-largest landfill company in the nation. Waste Management, which also has a landfill in Van Buren Township, is the largest landfill company in the country.

The Army Corps of Engineers started sending informational letters to the press in 2018 and the Independent regularly published the updates on the transfer of the Luckey, Ohio, waste.

### **Bill To Exempt MICHIGAN SENIORS** From Paying Property Taxes

Senate Bill 292 would amend the state's General Property Tax Act by adding Section 7yy, This bill exempts Michigan residents age 70 or older from paying property taxes on their primary residence, effective for taxes levied after December 31, 2025.

TO QUALIFY FOR THE EXEMPTION UNDER SB 292, AN INDIVIDUAL MUST:

- Be 70 years of age or older
- Own and occupy the home as their primary residence
- File a claim with a local assessor, along with documentation verifying their age and residency. If SB 292 becomes law, it could offer financial relief to thousands of households, particularly in fixed-

income or retirement situations. The bill must clear the Senate committee before heading to the floor for a vote. If passed, it would

then move to the Michigan House and potentially to Governor Witmer's desk. The bill was introduced by Sen. Michele Hoitenga (R-Manton). Contact her or your state Senator if you support this bill!

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

January or February and closed up July 1. VBEA president Aaron Lange said the negotiations were a dialogue rather than demands. He said the union members passed the agreement by 93 to 94%;

- Heard resident Reg Ion say, under public comment, that he is against the bond. He said the board always settles a contract and then asks for voters to pass a bond. He said he recalled when the board wanted \$150 million to build a school on Van Born Road, then \$110 million for it to be on Hull Road. The high school finally was built for \$48 million. He said he has been in the community for 50 years and worked for the school district for 30 of those years. He said all the school districts do this: ask for big numbers for dream things. He said he and other senior citizens have to pay an astronomical amount of money for school taxes and he objects, especially when he doesn't like the way they are being run;
- Heard Curt Harrison say he is the president of the union that represents parapros, mechanics, building and grounds, and others, and "all of us are here for the students, not to argue." He said they need to find out what the needs are for the students;



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
