School Board votes not to extend contract

After a closed-door session on Friday, the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education voted unanimously not to extend the contract of School Supt. Pete Kudlak for another year.

When he was hired last year, he was granted a three-year contract, so he still has two years left on his contract – through June 2019.

Generally, the school board will extend the contract by a year during the annual evaluation. If the board does not vote on the contract extension, it automatically is extended another year.

The board also unanimously labeled him "effective" for the 2016-17 school year, the second-highest designation. The proposed categories in the evaluation procedure were: ineffective, minimally effective, effective, or highly effective.

The board unanimously increased Supt. Kudlak's base salary by 2%, from the original \$130,000 to \$132,600.

Supt. Kudlak replaced former School Supt. Michael Van Tassel who was making \$139,000 base salary when he was pushed out of his position in February 2016.

Van Tassel was hired as superintendent in July 2012 and every spring during the annual evaluation was labeled "highly effective" by the school board.

On Monday, School Board President Keith Johnston said the board is happy with the job Supt. Kudlak has done, but the student academic growth has got to come up.

"We wanted to be fair," Johnston said, adding over the year of his being superintendent, Kudlak has had two new principals, the Savage School law suit, and depositions for the case.

"If we're happy next year we will extend the contract," Johnston said. "He's done a pretty decent job. We're not displeased."

Wayne County Sheriff swears in five VBT marine officers

Wayne County Sheriff Benny Napoleon granted five Van Buren Township marine officers county-wide powers last Thursday as part of new efforts to combine resources along Wayne County waterways.

A swearing-in ceremony was held June 29 at Wayne County Sheriff's Headquarters in Detroit. Sheriff Napoleon swore in Van Buren Township Marine Officers Mark Buxton, David Champagne, Pat Wehrman, Jeff Stanton, and Chris Fey.

VBT Public Safety Director Greg Laurain said the Wayne County Sheriff's Office has provided a 23-foot patrol boat specifically for VBT officers to use to patrol Belleville Lake.

"This new watercraft will bear the same POLICE markings, but with the patches of Van Buren Police and Wayne County Sheriff," Director Laurain said in a news release on Monday.

"This joint venture is a win-win for both township and county and would not have been possible if not for the efforts of Township Supervisor Kevin McNamara and Sheriff Benny Napoleon," Laurain said.

Postal Regulations Require This Space On The Front Page. "This partnership between both agencies will involve officers and combined resources to help continue to make Belleville Lake safe and secure along the waterways in the township," Laurain said.

"This is a positive move for both the county and township, making available additional personnel to patrol the lake and equipment during water emergencies," Laurain said.

"On behalf of Van Buren Township Public Safety Department and Wayne County Sheriff's Department, we encourage a safe and enjoyable summer on Belleville Lake for our residents and visitors," Laurain concluded.

According to a news alert from the Sheriff's office last week, the partnership provides the county with five new marine officers. The officers from Van Buren Township will have the authority to assist the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

"This is a collaborative effort to combine resources and help continue to make Belleville Lake safe and secure along waterways throughout Wayne County," the release said.

Wayne County has a Marine Unit responsible for patrolling all Wayne County waters, including parts of Lake St. Clair, the Detroit River, Lake Erie, and Belleville Lake. The partnership with Van Buren Township provides additional resources, the Sheriff's office said.

Court Watching:

VBT Fire Fighter Landstrom charged with four misdemeanors

On June 28, suspended Van Buren Township Fire Fighter Kenneth Landstrom turned himself into 34th District Court for his arraignment on four misdemeanor charges: three counts of lying to police and one count of contributing to the delinquency of a minor under 17.

He was suspended from the fire department on June 27, once the warrants were approved.

Landstrom is scheduled to be back in 34th District Court at 9 a.m., July 12, with attorney Robert Coutts.

Danny Rogers of Westland said his daughter has a Personal Protection Order against Landstrom and that PPO was served by police when Landstrom was finger-printed during the booking procedure. Landstrom told the *Independent* he will appeal the PPO, which he claimed was not the idea of the girl, who was made to sign it.

Rogers said Landstrom tried to get custody of his daughter, who will turn 17 in December, but withdrew his legal motion. Rogers said the girl ran away and Landstrom hid the daughter until the June 26 custody hearing. Rogers said his daughter is bipolar and takes anti-psychotic medicine, which Landstrom didn't have for her. This caused the girl to break out in hives, Rogers said. Landstrom said it was nerves causing the rash.

Landstrom said the girl filed with the court for him to be her guardian and he signed the paperwork to agree to accept the role. Then he withdrew the motion when the judge turned the girl over to her mother, who is divorced from Rogers.

Landstrom said he was working a duty crew shift at the VBT fire department at about 1 a.m. and couldn't leave when the teen called to say her dad had assaulted her and she was at Landstrom's house in Van Buren Township. After he checked with his attorney, Landstrom said he was told not to let her stay at his house, so he told her to go to a place of safety and she did.





Sumpter board approves replacing water meter radio-read equipment

The radio-read equipment installed in 2007 to read water meters in Sumpter Township failed in early June and the township has been using a loaner system from Southfield.

At the June 27 regular meeting of the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees, after Treasurer Peggy Morgan explained the problem, the board voted unanimously to spend no more than \$7,771 to replace the inoperable radio-read equipment.

The allocation will purchase a MRX90 Data Collection V3, plus Mapping and Mobility Software from Ferguson Water

Absent and excused was Clerk Clarence Hoffman, who hasn't attended a meeting since April 11.

Treasurer Morgan, who is board liaison to the water department, said the old unit cannot be repaired because its software is

She said there are eight reading ledgers and a ledger is read every three months.

Treasurer Morgan said trucks drive the ledger route and bring back information on memory sticks to the data collection unit until all the ledgers are read. This is uploaded to the equipment at township hall where the bills are generated.

When asked about the problems with the post office not delivering water bills on time or not delivering them at all, Deputy Supervisor/Treasurer Karen Armatis said the recent problem is the second time in two years.

She said after the township residents read the recent letter in the Independent from the township about the water bills not being delivered on time, the township got many phone calls from people who didn't get their bills and wanted their late charges removed.

"It's not just the water bills. It's other bills people get by mail, too," said Treasurer Morgan, referring to the problems with post office delivery.

"It costs the township and individuals money and time," said Trustee Matthew Oddy. "We can't collect the proper fees and it costs residents having to come down here and get another copy of their bills."

Armatis said the township still has to pay for the water whether the residents are

Board members encouraged township residents to share their concerns on delivery with the post office.

In other business at the 22-minute regular meeting, the board:

• Held a moment of silence in memory of township resident Walter Krakowiak, who died at the age of 101 1/2;

- Heard Trustee Oddy say the public hearing on Abraham's request for multiple kinds of property use was tabled for more information and will be resumed at the July 13 planning commission meeting. He said at that meeting the commission also will be considering recommending a repeal of an outdated marijuana caregiver dispensary
- Approved Treasurer Morgan's request for a new procedure for the four men in the water department who get their boots from Red Wing. She wished to have arrangements made so the \$200 each that is paid by the township for the boots would be paid directly to Red Wing and the employees would pay the rest out of their own pockets - or some other similar procedure be instated;
- · Heard Mary Sherwood ask that the board or planning commission look into tiny houses, which have a lot of interest for people. She proposed the 200-400-squarefoot homes be allowed in the township. "A lot of places are changing the rules because that's what people want," Sherwood said, adding, "I'd like one myself." Trustee Oddy said at last year's Michigan Township Association meeting, they were told many are putting such an ordinance in place. 'We could direct the planning commission and building department to look into that," Trustee Oddy said; and
- Went into closed-door session for an update on the pending litigation of Nelson Po vs. Sumpter Township and Police Detective John Toth. Det. Toth was present for the closed-door meeting.

Last week the \$200,000 kayak/canoe launch at Horizon Park in Belleville was damaged, presumably by vandals. Belleville Downtown Development Authority Coordinator Carol Thompson said the ladder support with the sign is gone and the ADA bench is damaged so handicapped boaters cannot use it. The sign explained how to use the launch equipment. "We want to get it repaired, so it can be used," Thompson said. The subject is expected to be discussed at the DDA's regular July 19 meeting. This is the second time the launch was damaged and had to have repairs. Although a boater and his son used a grappling hook to get the missing sign out of the lake last time, Thompson said it was too damaged to be used and had to be replaced. Last July, the DDA allocated up to \$2,400 for those repairs. The launch was funded by a \$120,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, \$38,186.15 from the city's federal Community Development Block Grant funds, and the DDA. It was dedicated in August 2015.

This was the third year that Sen. Hopgood hosted the giveaway at the Taylor Farmer's Market. The event took place in previous years during the Allen Park Street Fair.

City of Belleville gets last-minute funds for workers

It looked like the city of Belleville wouldn't be getting money from the Detroit Wayne Mental Health Authority this year to pay young summer workers, but Councilman Tom Fielder and City Manager Diana Kollmeyer put on the pressure and got a \$47,000 grant.

That grant was announced June 21 and now the city has seven young people working for it and is taking applications for about five to eight more. The workers, between the ages of 14 and 24, are paid with the grant money.

"We're about a month behind," said Kollmeyer at the city's regular meeting on Monday. Last year the city ran a highly successful work program with the agency's

She said one teen came back week after week for the past month to see if they could start up the program. Finally, he was hired and is among those out tending to grass cutting at the cemetery, additional park work, and other projects.

After strong lobbying by Van Buren Township Supervisor Kevin McNamara, the township got early approval for a \$47,497 grant from the Detroit Wayne Mental Health Authority for a summer work initiative, the first time it had offered work to youth. VBT is running a highly stylized program called "The REAL" for 35 students ages 15-19.

The agency hopes to make a difference by putting young people to work in their communities during summer vacation.

To the Editor:



protective services on Rogers, claiming Rogers pointed a loaded gun at the girl and slammed her head into a wall. There was no police report on that allegation, Rogers said. And, Rogers said, it never happened.

Rogers said the girl ran away from home and when police contacted Landstrom at his VBT home, he lied to police, saying she wasn't there. Then, Rogers said, it is believed he hid her at his son's house, which he believes is in Inkster.

Landstrom said when police came to his home, they didn't believe him when he said the teen wasn't there. He invited them to search his house and, Landstrom said, Lt. Ken Floro searched the whole house, including the attic.

Landstrom said Rogers accused him of having a secret room, but Landstrom said there is no secret room.

He said police didn't believe the girl wasn't there because when they would ping her cell phone, it would come from his house. Landstrom said later it was discovered the girl left her phone in a drawer in his house before she left.

Rogers said Landstrom was upset that Rogers' son, Austin Stone Rogers, had sexually abused Rogers' daughter, but his 20-year-old son is now in prison serving 5 to 15 years for first-degree criminal sexual conduct (victim under age of 13).

Landstrom said he certainly is upset about Austin Rogers and what he did to the girl. Landstrom said Austin had been sexually molesting his little sister from the time she was eight years old until she was 14.

Rogers said his daughter has been in therapy for many years.

"He's been manipulating her for years," Rogers said of Landstrom.

But, Landstrom says it is Rogers who has been mistreating the girl, who was Landstrom's step-daughter when he was married to her mother. Landstrom said he and the girl have remained close over the years, since he and her mother divorced. He said he has been concerned for the girl recently because she had been cutting herself and had attempted suicide.

Landstrom said when the girl ran to him for help, he did what his attorney told him

The project was announced at a June 27 meeting of the Michigan Strategic Fund Board attended by numerous community leaders, including Rep. Geiss.

BYC gets approval to build Tiki Bar on the lake behind facility

Belleville Yacht Club was granted final site plan approval to build a Tiki Bar behind its facility at 831 E. Huron River Drive.

At its 14-minute regular meeting on June 28, the Van Buren Township Planning Commission voted unanimously approve the site plan so the BYC could begin building the structure.

Scott Jones was present on behalf of the BYC. He said the BYC had revised the site plan in accordance with township requirements.

No one was present from the BYC for the June 14 meeting when the Tiki Bar was on the agenda and slated to get final approval. The item was tabled by the commission until someone from the BYC could be present. No one mentioned the previous unexplained absence at the June 28 meeting.

Jones said the BYC architect will be back in town the next day (June 29) and will put his official stamp on the documents, as

The 1,665-square-foot Tiki Bar will include a lounge area, bar area, a kitchen, and restrooms. Jones had said earlier when the BYC is rented out to another group, the BYC members can go to the Tiki Bar for

Ron Akers, director of planning and economic development, said the BYC has already received special land-use approval from the township board for the project. The approximate 4.04-acre site is zoned R1-C (Single Family Residential), which permits country club uses via special landuse approval.

Akers said adding the bar brings the BYC closer to compliance on its existing parking lot, which is larger than allowed under the ordinance. Several items, such as landscaping and the dumpster enclosure, will be approved by the township staff.

At the end of the brief meeting, Akers said that the planning commission had asked him to look at a couple of zoning items and now he has help.

He said they have an intern volunteer for a couple of months, Chris Madigan.

Akers said Madigan is preparing an orientation packet for the planning commission and will present it to the commission and to the township board.



The Detroit Wayne Mental Health Authority (DWMHA) recently awarded Van Buren Township a \$47,497 grant to fund a Summer Youth Job Initiative, THE REAL (Revealing Exceptionally Amazing Leaders). The project is now under way.

In a news release from the township, it was pointed out 35 students, ages 15-19, were selected to participate in the program which offers temporary, paid employment opportunities within sectors of VBT government.

On Saturday, the open basements at Cobblestone Ridge subdivision in Van Buren Township remain uncovered, as they have for about ten years. According to a report earlier last week on Channel 4 television, VBT Supervisor Kevin McNamara said the township gave Brad Byarski and Trowbridge Companies until Friday to demolish the foundations or pay \$25,000 bond, "or we'll do it." McNamara said there are six open basements and there have been agreements on them made in 2011 and 2015 that were not followed by the developers. At a recent township board meeting, Anthony Randazzo of Sheldon Acquisitions was also mentioned as among those responsible for the situation. At that meeting, McNamara had asked the township board to pay \$111,000 in township funds to remove the foundations, plus \$2,000 in fencing repairs, and put that as a lien on the property. The board did not approve that expense as yet.

<u> Court Watching:</u>

James Chapman gets probation for unlicensed dog in Van Buren Twp.

James Forrest Chapman, 57, of Van Buren Township, pled guilty to having an unlicensed dog and was put on six months of non-reporting probation.

As part of the plea deal he has to get shots and a license for his dog Diesel and present documentation to the 34th District Court



probation department by July 11. He also has to find a new home for the dog. The dog was to remain in the Romulus Animal Shelter until it is licensed and has a new place to stay OKed by the court.

This all was decided by 34th District Court Judge Brian A. Oakley during a court session on June 27.

Judge Oakley will review Chapman's progress on the sentence during an 11 a.m., July 11 court session, when Chapman was directed to bring in the prospective new owner of the dog.

As part of the probation, Chapman was ordered not to purchase, possess, or consume products containing alcohol, poppy seeds, or controlled substances without the judge's approval, with random tests as directed by the probation department.

Upon notification of testing, he may not consume excessive amounts of liquids.

He also was advised that any form of disrespect to court staff is a direct violation of his probation.

The offense occurred at 11:02 a.m., May 16, when Van Buren Township police were called by his roommate with a report of a dog bite and Chapman fled with the dog in a truck he was unlicensed to drive.

Probation in the dog license sentence continues until Dec. 27, 2017.

Chapman currently is on probation in a 2015 stalking case to which he pled no contest under a plea deal. Circuit Court Judge Margaret Van Houten is reportedly reviewing a new violation of probation charge there due to his guilty plea on the dog license case. Balance due at circuit court on that case is \$1,688.

Judge Oakley levied no court fines or fees for Chapman in the dog license case.
