Rep. Miller urges landfill pressure on Gov., House Speaker

During an hour-long press conference on Monday, during which almost a dozen people spoke, State Rep. Reggie Miller, D-Van Buren Township, urged the public to pressure Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and Republican House Speaker Matt Hall on a local atomic waste issue, where bills are pending

The press conference was held inside the Belleville Area District Library, with a crowd of sign-waving people outside the doors who also were against Wayne Disposal getting it license renewed or being allowed to expand.

Reporters from Detroit media jammed the Cozadd meeting room and blocked members of the public who were trying to witness the comments from a line of politicians.

Rep. Miller said the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy

(EGLE) did not follow public engagement because it announced a Sept. 18 public hearing at Wayne County Community College on the renewal of the hazardous waste landfill permit, in "a local weekly newspaper of limited circulation."

She referred to the *Independent*, which is the newspaper of record for the city of Belleville and Van Buren Township. The required legal notice for such a meeting was put into the Aug. 14 edition, with the information that EGLE planned to issue the renewed license for Wayne Disposal on the North I-94 Service Drive unless some information from the public comes up to dissuade them. The public was encouraged to attend the meeting and give opinions and/or write their objections to a given site.

EGLE has said right along that unless something changes, Wayne Disposal will get its renewal because it has followed all the state rules.

Miller pointed out that the wishes of the

community have been ignored. She said there is "no undo button here" and, "Once it's here, its' here."

She said the landfill is steps away from water, schools and you don't want to send your kid to school with a Geiger counter in his lunch box.

"When the community says no, EGLE needs to listen," she said, and there was rousing applause from the crowded room. She called on EGLE to halt the steps to approval until all the questions have been answered.

Miller said to the crowd that on Sept. 18 at Wayne County Community College she wants people to stand up, pack the place, be strong and don't take no for an answer.

"We will not accept this expansion – not now, not then, not ever," and there was more applause. The vertical expansion will put the landfill higher than it is now, made possible by a change in the flight paths at Willow Run Airport. State Sen. Darrin Camilleri, D-Trenton, spoke next saying this area is "not interested in being the country's dumping ground." He referring to Senate Bills 246 and 247 he sponsored that were passed last term and are in committee. He said they raise the tipping costs from the lowest fees in the country and put a five-year moratorium on any expansion while they study the details.

He said this is not a partisan issue and, "our legislature will stop them."

U.S. Rep. Debbie Dingell, MI-6, said EGLE has announced Wayne Disposal will get approval because state law says if they meet the requirements, they get it.

She referred to Republicans holding up progress of the Michigan bills and told them to "quit f---ing" and then showed fake surprise at what came out of her mouth.

She said tipping fees should be at least \$15 and, "We are not the trash capital of the United States of America... There are

strong feelings, but we have to have action." She said raising the fees would have an economic disincentive.

Throughout the rest of the comments from politicians, there was reference to Dingell's statement, with Wayne County Executive

Warren Evans saying, "I co-sign her comments. I just won't say them." Belleville mayor Ken Voigt began his comments with, "I promise not to say the f word."

Romulus mayor Robert McCraight said, "Debbie got me wound up, but I won't cuss"

Mayor Voigt said this is not NIMBY – not in my back yard – because the Great Lakes

is everybody's back yard.

Speaker after speaker railed against having radioactive waste in a local toxic landfill near a lake and schools and urged EGLE not to renew the license or approve expansion.

Janine Rippy and engineer of Van Buren Township, one of the founders of Michigan Against Atomic Waste, with 1,100 members, urged EGLE to pause the expansion to study the elevated lead 210 recently found in the ground water and to implement ground-water monitoring with real-time reporting.

Rep. Miller ended the session asking the public to pressure the Governor and Speaker Hall to get legislation on the issue to a vote.

She also urged the public not to wait until the Sept. 18 hearing, but to get on the EGLE website now and put their ideas in writing.

Informational meeting, public hearing set on hazardous landfill

The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency have given notice of intent to issue a hazardous waste management facility operating license to Wayne Disposal Inc.

A public informational meeting and hearing will take place Sept. 18. The public comment period for the draft license opened Aug. 14 and will close at 5 p.m. Sept. 29.

Wayne Disposal Inc. (WDI) operates a hazardous waste disposal facility located at 49350 North Interstate-94 Service Dr. in Van Buren Township. WDI seeks authorization to begin storing hazardous waste in containers, and to continue disposing of hazardous waste, certain radiological materials, and polychlorinated biphenyls (PCB) waste generated offsite. WDI proposes to expand the disposal

volume and add hazardous waste storage capacity.

The in-person information session and hearing are set for 5-9 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 18, at the Wayne County Community College District, Ted Scott Campus, 9555 Haggerty Rd. in Van Buren Township.

To attend online, register at https://bit.ly/MMD09182025 and participants will receive a confirmation email containing information about how to join the meeting. For those who do not have internet access and would like to join by phone only, use the following phone number: (636) 651-3142, and conference code 374288. Pre-registration is not required to attend. Individuals interested in participating can click the link above at the start of the presentation portion of the event, set for 6 p.m.

The public informational meeting will start with an open house from 5-6 p.m. for residents to come and talk to EGLE and U.S. EPA staff one-on-one, ask questions and learn about the facility in general.

The open house will be followed by a presentation from 6-7 p.m. about the facility's application and draft license, and a session with a panel. The public meeting will be followed by a public hearing from 7-9 p.m. where interested individuals will have an opportunity to submit oral or written comments on the draft license into the formal record.

The public is encouraged to review the draft license, application, and associated materials for more detailed information before commenting. A copy of the draft license is at the Belleville Area District Library. All individuals attending the public hearing in person who intend to speak are requested to register by filling out a comment card.

Comments may be given at any time before the end of the comment period at 5 p.m. Sept. 29. Participants may provide comments on the draft license in any of these ways:

Sumpter board gives itself \$10,000 raise each on split 4-3 vote

At its regular Aug. 12 meeting, the Sumpter Township Board of Trustees voted 4-3 to give itself raises in pay of \$10,000 each.

Voting yes was supervisor Tim Bowman and trustees Tim Rush, John Honey, and

Iames Frazier

Voting no were treasurer Bart Patterson, clerk Don LaPorte, and trustee Matthew

When the item was up on the agenda, treasurer Patterson addressed Bowman who had put it on the agenda. Patterson said he was not in favor of the motion as

presented. He said there was no supporting documents that show what the board is making now and what it will be after the raise, or a review of other communities and what they pay their board members.

Patterson said he thought more investigation should be done and there are some issues with Michigan Employees

Retirement System (MEARS).

"I agree we need an increase," said Oddy, noting that they hadn't had an increase in four years.

He said Van Buren Township is \$30,000 for trustees and the supervisor, clerk, and treasurer make more because they are full

Be sure to let EGLE know your thoughts on landfill

The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy, has said in no uncertain terms that it will grant the renewal of the Wayne Disposal toxic landfill license in Van Buren Township unless it has reason to believe that should not be done.

They've said that the landfill qualifies under all the current laws and so they cannot deny the renewal. We imagine they would get sued by Republic Services, owner of Wayne Disposal, if they tried that.

They have told the protestors that the law is in place and the only thing that could change that is a different law. But protestors push against the evil EGLE for following the law. Go figure.

They need to work with their legislators to change the state law and Rep. Reggie Miller and Sen. Darin Camilleri have proposed laws in the system that are stuck in committee. At Monday's press conference, Rep. Miller said to put pressure on the governor and the house speaker to move the laws forward.

Until then, the present law is in place and the public hearing at Wayne County Community College on Sept. 18 has been announced as part of the required steps in that law. People can go to the meeting and register their complaints in person or write them down and mail/email them to EGLE before Sept. 29. If EGLE thinks one of the ideas is enough to hold off, it can. You have to convince them – or work to change the

doesn't need a building to sit in and look at the lake. The township could put out some benches for that, she said.

She was referring to the Lake House the township is planning for the former DNR property just north of the Belleville Bridge. The township just requested a grant from the county to help pay for the fishing pier the township had to promise to build to get the property from the DNR.

There's sure to be a fishing pier boardwalk, but the Lake House proposal is still being developed. We're told people will be able to hold meetings there.

Our reader said they just built a community center with lots of meeting rooms. The idea of spending \$16 million of taxpayer money on another place to meet makes her crazy.

Connor Stalions has admitted his leading role in the University of Michigan signstealing football scandal after being nabbed by the NCAA which spelled it out in its justreleased NCAA report. Central Michigan University was also involved.

He now admits it was him on the sidelines of a CMU game at MSU in October 2023, dressed in CMU maroon and gold and wearing a goatee while he was still employed as a Michigan staff member.

Stalions received an eight-year show-cause penalty from the NCAA, effective Friday. That means he's banned from holding any job involving college athletics through August 2033, unless a school interested in hiring him can show the NCAA why he is employable.

Stalions resigned in the middle of the 2023 season, when reports began surfacing that he had orchestrated a network of associates to attend and film games of future Michigan

In the NCAA report released Friday, which mostly laid out a case against Michigan that led to stiff penalties, the NCAA wrote Stalions was on the CMU sideline at MSU wearing a bench pass for two reasons: to decipher signals of Michigan State, a future

Michigan opponent, as well as to help Central Michigan with its ingame game plan.

It was right after Stalions quit Michigan job that Van Buren Public Schools quietly hired him in the

middle of its 2023 football program. Let's stay away from him this time. The district has been punished for hand-picking football players from Detroit schools and it needs to get its reputation back.

There are no members of the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees quoted or pictured from Monday's afternoon press conference at the library concerning the toxic waste landfill in VBT. The reason? They were attending an all-day meeting on their budget, that had been set long in advance. The press conference was set at the last minute.

time. "This will take us over them," he said of the trustees.

Oddy said when they were talking about a raise, he was surprised to see it was this high.

Bowman called for the vote and it passed 4-3, with no further discussion.

The pay for 2024 provided to the *Independent* in January under a Freedom of Information Act request showed supervisor Bowman made, \$39,900 base pay and with benefits on top of that total compensation of about \$41,000; Rush made \$31,505, and more with benefits; and the trustees made about \$24,000 each, and more with benefits. The clerk changed after the 2024 election and so the final figure was confusing.

In other business at the Aug. 12 meeting, the board:

- Heard LaPorte announce the planning consultant wants the board to review commercial and business licenses and a proposal to hire a fire inspector. LaPorte said presently the inspections for homebased business licenses are "driveby," which the consultant said is of no value. She wants to come to a meeting to discuss this with the board. Rush said most municipalities are "farming out" fire inspection duties to third parties and the customers pay for the cost;
- Approved a motion to receive and file all the reports from the supervisor, township manager, attorney, police/ordinance, building and fire departments, without any verbal information given to those present;
- Approved hiring Gary Stevenson and Kyle Weaver as paid-on-call fire fighters, contingent on them passing physical and drug tests:



Keystone working toward reauthorization of school charter

Keystone Academy Board of Directors was informed at its regular meeting on Aug. 14 that its presentation to Bay Mills Community College has brought very good feedback.

Keystone is nearing the end of its most recent seven-year school charter granted by Bay Mills and is taking the steps required toward reauthorization. The charter has been authorized by Bay Mills since Keystone opened in 2003.

Bay Mills recently authorized granting charters for up to ten years and Keystone is waiting to hear that the charter has been renewed and for how many years.

At the Aug. 14 meeting the full Keystone board officially ratified its Board PowerPoint Presentation for Reauthorization that was given in June, as required. Former Keystone president Steve Harsant was authorized by the board previously to review and authorize the presentation prior to submission in June.

The Aug. 14 meeting was the first under newly elected president Christine Mihaly who was sworn in for her second threeyear term by National Heritage Academy representative Andrew Roth.

Kimberly Kowalski, who is board secretary, also was sworn in for another three years. Both Mihaly and Kowalski will serve until June 30, 2028.

In other business at the 38-minute meeting, the board:

- Learned Keystone earned two 2024-25 national NHA Eagle Awards, which was announced at an award ceremony in July. Keystone won awards for Employee Engagement and Safety:
- Approved the 2026 Children's Internet Protection Act Form 479, which is required to get universal service fund discounts for internet access services and network hardware and maintenance. It must be submitted by Nov. 15 for the following school year;
- Tabled until the Sept. 11 meeting the proposed resolution on a Teacher Evaluation and Employee Certification Warranty. This annual certification is due to Bay Mills, this year on Sept. 27. The resolution confirms that all personnel working at the academy are properly licensed, certified, and endorsed for the 2025-26 school year;
- Approved authorizing up to \$28,000 from the board fund budget for the 2025-26 school year as requested by principal Jorvanna Drain: Family Fun Night, \$4,000; school store, \$1,500; Perfect Attendance Award for students, \$3,000; athletics, \$13,000; and teacher recognition, \$7,250 (which includes the new Ski Club);
- Heard principal Drain report that the summer learning checkpoint #1 and #2 was a huge success and students celebrated

At Monday's regular meeting, the Belleville City Council received an assessment report on its fire department.

Greg Flynn and Rich Marinucci were present to report on their study of the department and to suggest options for the city to consider, including joining up with a neighboring department for reliable service in a reasonable timeframe and to turn over any situations more than muscular, cuts, scrapes, and bruises to Huron Valley Ambulance to handle.

Another consideration was that the Assistant Chief's position may no longer reflect the department's current needs and could be replaced with a Captain of Training, who would be responsible for coordinating fire and EMS training. Two lieutenant positions were suggested to enhance on-scene supervision.

The assessment team also proposed establishing clear participation requirements, since having paid-on-call personnel has led to inconsistent participation in training and emergency response.

A synopsis of the 17-page report was given by Flynn, who suggested after consideration the city could decide to do nothing different and continue on the way it has.

Councilman Randy Priest asked about the inspections Flynn had suggested and Flynn said inspections of buildings by a fire marshal would help prevent new fires, but if the city is already doing such inspections that wouldn't be necessary.

Flynn applauded the city for reaching out for an assessment, making itself vulnerable. He said local insights can be clouded by historical knowledge.

The council did not discuss the report at the meeting but members of the fire department sat in the audience in uniform to hear the assessment.

In other business at Monday's meeting, the council:

Approved naming interim city manager
 Steve Jones as the alternative representative

to the DUWA sewer board to replace Jason Smith. Jones also was named Act 51 Street Administrator, taking the place previously held by former city manager Smith who is no longer with the city;

- · Received an update from Jones on the upgrades to 330 Charles St., which is being renovated to become the new city hall. He told the council the most up-to-date floor plans are before them, the doors are in the right spots, the budget numbers are becoming more clear and, "We are moving forward." He said the demolitions are done and 90% of the framework is there and it's not just an empty shell. Councilman Jeremiah Beebe said he has toured the structure and you can visualize where everything goes. "I'm excited to see some of the numbers come through," Beebe said. Jones reported the former loading dock is gone and leveled off to make a place for
- Heard councilwoman Julie Kissel thank Beebe for helping with six or seven houses that got volunteer help to meet city ordinances. Beebe said Kissel started the whole project. He said they agree that people should look out for their neighbors and help those struggling with the ordinances. He said three or four members of Redemption Bible Church came out to help and got stung. "We could do more of that civil service. It doesn't need to go through the city," he said;
- Heard Kissel ask about the \$1,982.45 spent on vehicle maintenance for the Vactor truck and she was told it still is not functional; and
- Heard mayor Ken Voigt give a report on the press conference at the library held earlier that afternoon. He said it was well-attended and local activists were there. The event was to protest the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy's recent announcement it would grant the renewal of Wayne Disposal's toxic landfill operating license because the landfill qualifies. He cited details from the speakers and said, "We need to keep fighting this."

Wagner opposed McKenna planning consultant Lauren Sayre's recommendation that the commission table voting on approvals until the company could get better information. She listed 11 items for Yost to consider

She said they could consider the preliminary and final site plans together at a future meeting after everything is worked

Wagner agreed to change the sign that was proposed to read "Superior Township" to read "Van Buren Township" but he said now the height of the building already in place is being questioned, as well as the setback, which was approved by the township before, "but now is wrong, I guess".

And, since only three or four people work at the site and nobody parks and there are no visitors, they would like a total of four parking spaces approved instead of the 37 needed under the ordinance. Four was what was approved in 2023.

Sayre said she did not get elevations and the the photos the developers took that morning were not enough.

Wagner said the business has been operating since 2018 and conforms with state and county rules 100%. He said inspectors from the state and county can show up at any time.

Commissioner Medina Atchinson asked since the building is non-conforming, can the commission approve repairing it? She was told the damage was minor enough for the repair project to be approved.

Commissioner Jeff Jahr said there are more than the usual number of question for a preliminary site plan. He would like a clear diagram of parking allowed in 2021, what it is now, and what is proposed. He said now the information is disorganized and he wants it put on a clear sheet.

Wagner said in 2021 for the last project, they needed just four sheets for the site plan and now they need nine because there have been a lot of changes.

"We're missing information that you have," said commissioner Bernie Grant, who is professional architect.

Wagner said they would submit the application for variances to the height and setback requirements to the Board of Zoning Appeals the next day and get the requested drawings for the planning commission.

Commissioner Jahr said there are a lot of moving parts and, for example, the sidewalk agreement was not executed. He said in 2020, the planning commission deferred the sidewalks and required the applicant to execute an agreement to construct a sidewalk along the site's frontage at a future date when such sidewalks are required as part of a larger redevelopment of the area. The agreement was never executed.

Brittney Williams, the township's planning and zoning specialist, said she was not a part of that and there is no agreement on file. She said she will make sure it is signed.

"They're close," Jahr said, adding they can address the McKenna list.

"I'd like to postpone this, not deny," Jahr said. "And, I would like to see the sidewalk plan closed out."

Jahr made the motion to postpone until the applicant can address the concerns, and the sidewalk agreement is complete. Commissioner Grant seconded the motion and the commission unanimously approved

Commission chairman Brian Cullin said he hopes to approve the preliminary and final site plans at the same time.

In other business at the 54-minute meeting on Aug. 13, the commission:

• Approved the final site plan for the 5,033-square-foot Chick-fil-A drive-thru restaurant at 10150 Belleville Rd., in front of Menards. A correction to the proposed sign was agreed to, so the reference to the city of Belleville will change to Van Buren Township. Chick-fil-A has a grandopening team that will come out weeks before the location opens and works with the owner-operator and staff specifically on traffic management. The team also will meet with the police department and other officials to make sure everyone is on the same page. The restaurant is expected to start construction in April;

· Approved the site plan amendment for The Timbers subdivision for nine revised single-family architectural elevations, so Century Complete can build on the 37 lots in the unfinished development on the east side of Elwell Road, south of Harbour

Pointe Court and North of Lauren Court. When asked the costs, the developer said the smallest houses will be about \$354,990 and the larger homes about \$379,000; and

· Discussed the subcommittee that was proposed at the recent tri-community meeting. planning commission Commissioners Atchinson, Jahr, and Peter Creal volunteered to serve. When asked what they were expected to do, Jahr said usually at the first meeting the group decides if the subcommittee is a good idea and then what they should do. Commissioners said the joint city/township sidewalk along Sumpter Road was mentioned at the recent joint meeting, as well as turning the island into a park.

Sumpter woman dies in 3-vehicle head-on collision on Haggerty

A 64-year-old Sumpter Township woman was pronounced dead at the scene following a three-vehicle head-on collision on Haggerty Road, just south of the North I-94 Service Drive on Friday morning.

At about 11:15 a.m. Aug. 15, the Van Buren Township Public Safety Department and Huron Valley Ambulance were dispatched to site.

Detective/Lieutenant Kenneth Floro said the preliminary investigation revealed that a red Chevrolet Silverado was traveling northbound on Haggerty Road when the vehicle crossed over the center line and collided with a burgundy Ford Explorer that was traveling southbound on Haggerty

A third vehicle, a silver BMW, that was traveling southbound on Haggerty was also involved in the collision.

The township fire department had to extricate the driver of the Chevrolet Silverado from his vehicle. The 22-year-old Belleville man was treated at the scene and then transported to Trinity Hospital – Ann Arbor by Huron Valley Ambulance, where he was further treated for his injuries. He was listed in stable condition.

D./Lt. Floro said Janet Lynn Schonscheck, of Sumpter Township, who was driving the Ford Explorer, was pronounced deceased at the scene. The driver of the BMW was not injured in the accident and was released at the scene.

The Van Buren Township Accident Investigation Team was called to the incident and completed the on-scene investigation, collecting data and securing physical evidence.

The preliminary details of this accident indicate that excessive speed may be a contributing factor, D./Lt. Floro said.


